Administrative Reports

This time of the year, as we all know, is already hard for both our students and our staff with the holidays right around the corner. Adding Covid into the mix only makes it that much harder. Mental health suffers. It is important that we continue to find ways to take care of one another during this time but it is just as important that we continue to check in with ourselves. I always tell our staff that our students deserve the best of us, not what's left of us. This is also true for my staff and my family. They deserve the best of me, not what's left of me. Our staff continue to do "Whatever It Takes" to keep our doors open, and our students and staff safe both physically and emotionally, but not without adding stress to their plate. As educators, it is in our nature to burden the weight of our students and colleagues because we want to fix and heal. I am so thankful for the staff at the Junior/Senior High for always doing "Whatever It Takes" to keep our doors open and our students/staff safe during a stressful time. There is no doubt that we will get through this together. I look forward to the days where I can actually see the smiles behind the masks, hear the laughter in the workroom, and be able to say "we got through a pandemic, we can get through anything."

As of November 7, we received all ACT scores from our October testing date. I will have a data set prepared for the December Board Meeting. The ACT date for our juniors will be April 4, 2021.

Year 1 of Discovery Ed is up and going. Our teachers have had two 30 minute coaching sessions with Mark from Discovery Ed. They have also gone through two 3 hour PD sessions.

Below is the A/B schedule which was sent to the Jr-Sr High School staff for their review and to seek feedback on what they thought. They were receptive to the change and felt this would be better all around. We have heard from both students and parents through conversations that they like the block schedule. We are finding with our current 5 day rotation that the length of the homeroom is too much. Also, sometimes students may go 2-3 days before having a class again which is not a benefit to our students. We have to make some changes to the schedule and continue to work as an administrative team to make a decision for our district as a whole before we communicate out with families and students.

Parent Teacher Conferences were held on October 13 and 15. Attendance data is listed below. We appreciate parents showing their support of their children's education. The teleconference format and on-line sign up worked well for most families. Valparaiso had 89% overall conference turn-out while Ceresco had 95% turn-out.

The School Improvement Committee continues their book study, A Repair Kit for Grading, with very interesting discussion.

Our Discovery Ed Grant training is in full swing. Teacher leaders have attended virtual trainings and also participated in one on one coaching sessions. Administrators also attended training. Teachers have been doing a great job with remote learning, especially with the number of students who have had to quarantine recently. They are to be commended for their work.

Professional Learning Communities have been working on their SMART goals and action plans. November 18 professional learning will focus on Trauma Informed Classroom Training.

Many thanks to the PTO for the meals provided for staff during parent-teacher conference nights. A virtual BINGO Family Game Night was held on October 22 with Dr. Joel serving as the BINGO caller. PTO purchased a popcorn treat for each student to enjoy at Halloween class parties on October 30. The cookie dough sales have started with delivery scheduled for December 10. PTO has partnered with local businesses to earn a percentage of their sales for patronizing on a given day/night. A family day at

Curriculum Report

Remote Learning Update

Remote learning can be a challenge for students as there are a lot more distractions at home. A breakdown of our 6-12 remote learners was shared with the Board. Our K-5 remote learners seem to have a better success rate.

The district is looking to revamp the remote learning option for students. A committee has been formed that will provide recommendations for 2nd semester. Our goal is to get more students back into the school sites and to only utilize remote learning for students and families with a health risk or who are out due to a positive case or high exposure.

Superintendent's Report

In an attempt to become even more transparent, I will send out the minutes of our board meetings (once complete) via BrightArrow. This allows easy access for our stakeholders to review the minutes and conversations.

360 Evaluation Update - Surveys were sent to the following groups: Administration, Board Member, Certified Staff, Classified Staff, Community, Parents/Guardians, and Students. Response rates were good, however, not 100%. NASB is now in the process of analyzing the data and creating the report.

Our goal is to review at the December Board Meeting.

COVID-19 positive numbers at Raymond Central for students increased significantly last week. If we cannot contain the spread of COVID-19, we risk continuing our ability to attend school and participate in winter activities. We must become more socially responsible, wear masks at all times, and avoid the three C's (close contact, crowded spaces, and confined spaces).

The NASB Annual Conference scheduled to be held in Omaha next week is now 100% virtual.

The Student Advisory Committee had a socially distanced leadership retreat on Tuesday. Part of the retreat was a Leadership Summit. The Committee also spent time furthering our conversation around equity and developing what the Board's approved resolution looks like and sounds like at Raymond Central.

Best Practices in Grading - The School Improvement Team met on Tuesday to continue their learning around the development of a district wide grading philosophy. The book, A Repair Kit for Grading: 15 fixes for Broken Grades by Ken O'Connor, will provide foundational knowledge for team members. Once complete with the book study, we will begin editing the draft document before seeking feedback from stakeholders.

The Teacher Evaluation Committee met two weeks ago. We have taken a major step forward as we discuss the future of teacher evaluation at Raymond Central. Using the "new" teacher performance standards, the committee has paired down the indicators from NDE. The next step will be to wordsmith the indicators and develop what each looks like and sounds like for RC. Once this step is completed, the committee will develop the process and find an online software vendor so we can move to paperless.

First National Capital Markets (Carl and Matt) continue to work on the Feasibility Study. Surveys have been sent out to families who option in and out of RC. It will be interesting to see the data collected.

EIR Grant Training Update - The administrative team had their second DiscoveryEd training last week. Our focus was on the 4 C's of STEM: collaboration, critical thinking, creativity, and communication. We also discussed that innovation requires trust and vulnerability. It was exciting to learn more about the resources available to our teachers as they work to embed more STEM activities into daily instruction. We will need to find time to provide more training to all staff in regard to the digital resources we have access to and also to develop common language within our STEM framework.

Review of Technology Plan

We have a bid from Kidwell to transition our current cameras to a cloud based server. All cameras require an update in software (Avigilon). Cameras will now be able to be viewed from any device including a cell phone. The bid includes 13 new cameras at the Jr-Sr High School and 2 at Ceresco. Future cameras will cost between \$850-\$1500 depending on resolution. This is phase I of III to update all cameras at our school sites. Total for the project is \$51,825 and will happen in spring 2021.

December 2020 RC Board of Education Report

It has been a bit of a roller coaster ride for Winter Sports in Lancaster County. On November 13th, the Lincoln-Lancaster County Health Department suspended Winter Sports just before practice was scheduled to open on November 16th. In discussions with our coaches at that time, there was a common message, “We are in season.” This meant we reverted back to the template we created in March when school and spring sports were shut down.

The first step in this process was to establish a reliable line of communication to participants and parents. From this point, coaches were able to utilize Zoom, Google Classroom, and other tech-based platforms to enrich that line of communication. I am proud of how our coaches were able to creatively think of ways to provide opportunities for our student-athletes during the shutdown. We were also fortunate to have unseasonably good weather during the three week break.

On December 7th, the health department allowed us to open up under tight restrictions. Our coaches, student-athletes, and parents were thankful for this opportunity and willing to abide by any and all restrictions if it meant giving the kids an opportunity to compete. Our players jumped right into competition with limited practice and competed hard. I will be excited to see how our athletic teams grow through the winter sports season.

The Central Players Speech Team have been able to compete in multiple competitions remotely from either their own home or classrooms here at school. Regardless of what we hear from the Health Department or NSAA, it is nice to know that speech will continue to move forward in a virtual capacity.

FFA was also able to compete at Districts virtually from the Ceresco Senior Center. Sarah Lange was district champion in Discovery Speaking. The Senior Parliamentary Procedure team was district runner-up. Congratulations to them!

As we continue to move forward with activities during the pandemic, it is important to note that we will continue to operate under the jurisdiction of the local health departments. Governor Ricketts and the NSAA have recently released new relaxed restrictions, however our local health department has not changed their guidance. Spectator restrictions will continue to be 2 household members per participant. As we travel to other venues, I have created an evolving document that will incorporate the many different COVID protocols our students and parents will be expected to follow.  - During the 2019-2020 school year, the district was able to complete two performance indicators on the strategic plan.
 - Research and implement an online resource for accepting applications for all open positions. The district purchased and implemented *Unified Talent*, a PowerSchool resource.
 - The district will research and implement an anonymous reporting app for students, parents, and staff that will be used in partnership between the school and law enforcement. The District purchased and implemented the *StopIt* application for students to utilize inside and outside of school.
 - For the 2020-2021 school year, the district will focus on the following performance indicators:
 - Performance Indicator (1): Develop and implement pathways for teacher leaders that allow them to gain leadership experience and

expertise through professional collaboration with other teachers and administrators.

- Performance Indicator (7): The district will research, design and implement a grading and assessment philosophy based on research and best practice.
- Performance Indicator (3): Hire a consultant to assist in future facility planning including the construction of a Performing Arts Center.
- Performance Indicator (2): Develop and implement a district-wide reunification plan as part of the adopted standard response protocol.

Goal Update #2 - December 16, 2020

Ensure continuing well being of staff and students by creating an equitable framework for responding to and recovering from a pandemic.

1. Performance Indicators:

- a. Expand the community knowledge and information about equity in the district through the implementation of the Board of Education adopted resolution in response to the current racial disparity and injustice.
 - i. *The Student Advisory Group (Superintendent Advisory Committee) has broken down the BOE passed resolution into student friendly language and definitions. The group of students were tasked with what each component of the resolution looks like and sounds like at Raymond Central. The next step for the group will be to create action steps toward implementation. The focus question will be "how will we educate students and families about our work and what evidence will we accept to measure progress?"*
 - ii. *The end goal is to share our work with students districtwide and bring in Aaron Davis to help deliver the message.*
- b. Continue to monitor the spread of COVID-19 to make data informed decisions and communicate accordingly.
 - i. *Each week I engage in three COVID-19 related Zoom Meetings. One meeting is with the Lancaster County Health Department, one with ESU2 superintendents, and one with the Three Rivers Health Department. These meetings focus on local data to be used when making decisions.*
 - ii. *We have recently adopted the new quarantine guidance from the CDC and local health departments. This has been communicated to students, staff and families. We continue to remind everyone to communicate with the school if they are getting tested, have been exposed, or showing symptoms. Our school nurse has been a big part of our ability to track and monitor students and staff.*
 - iii. *We have made changes to our remote learning plan for students. Using several data points (grades and attendance) the district proposed more accountability for students and families while learning from home. We understand every student and family is in a different situation, however, we must be diligent in providing effective and engaging instruction for all students.*
 - iv. *I was selected to be on the task force to develop consistency among Lancaster County Schools when the health department announced a three week delay to winter sports. I worked with several other local superintendents to ensure clarity with the language from the health department.*
- c. Preserve the continuity of essential school functions through the use of research based mitigating measures.
 - i. *We have had no changes to our reopening plan in regard to the mitigating measures we implemented on Day 1. The challenge we have in front of us right now is sustaining face-to-face instruction while the spread of COVID-19 surges. We will continue to provide learning at our school sites until we hear differently from our local health departments. Our sports and activity plan has been approved by the Lancaster County Health Department.*
 - ii. *Changes will be made for 2nd semester based on what we have learned thus far in providing education during a global pandemic. We have been working with*

staff and teachers to get feedback on what is working well and what is not. While there may not always be a perfect solution, we remain committed to providing a sense of normalcy for students while at school. We have used the flexibility from NDE to provide teachers and staff with more work time without being penalized for not meeting instructional hours.

- d. Minimize educational and social disruption.
 - i. *We currently have 28 students learning remotely. Changes to the remote learning plan will be communicated this week. Our goal is to get as many students back into the classroom as possible without putting students and families at risk.*
 - ii. *While no perfect plan is possible, we have made significant strides in our ability to support remote learning for students. Our teachers have been going above and beyond to ensure this is possible.*
 - iii. *The next major challenge in front of us is the distribution of a COVID-19 vaccine. The State of Nebraska will not require individuals to take the vaccine, however, there will be a level of control for organizations. At this point, educators are in the 1B group. The timeline for vaccines is still unknown for anyone outside of the medical profession.*
- e. Respond to academic losses.
 - i. *Professional Learning Communities are now reviewing and using MAP and FastBridge data to develop individual student learning plans. This will continue through the winter and into spring before the next testing window.*
 - ii. *We continue to revise our MTSS structure to ensure students have the interventions necessary to close achievement gaps.*
 - iii. *At the January BOE meeting the administrative team will provide the BOE with a student achievement update. During a recent conversation I had with a staff member centered around a student's growth in reading, the teacher was excited to see one of their students grow significantly from the initial FastBridge assessment to the next assessment. Data is more readily available for teachers to provide targeted feedback and support/enrichment.*
 - iv. *Steve Rose has been working hard to get our new software, EDUClimber up and running. This software will be a one stop shop for student data. It will breakdown a student's attendance, demographic, achievement scores, etc. One of the most difficult tasks for Steve is uploading historical data.*

Continue the creation of a 10 year facilities strategic plan for implementation that addresses maintenance and improvements for existing building assets.

2. Performance Indicators:

- a. Continue partnership with First National Bank to provide visual and cost projections for the future of RC facilities using the data and results from the 2020 feasibility study.
 - i. *We are on target to meet our goal of reviewing the Feasibility Study in January 2021. The Feasibility Study will provide the BOE with data to be part of the decision making process.*
- b. Add to the existing plan start / end dates, projected timelines, list of contractors, and a progress monitoring system.
 - i. *I continue to update the priority list on a weekly basis and check in with Jared to monitor our progress. Jared has done a fantastic job of organizing workflow and prioritizing the needs of the district.*

- c. Prioritize list of projects for all building sites to ensure minimal impact on instructional practice.
 - i. *The Facility Committee met to visit each building site to establish the priority list attached.*

Develop progress monitoring tools to evaluate the effectiveness of district initiatives to ensure the sustainability over time.

3. *Performance Indicators:*

- a. Sustain an effective and meaningful Professional Learning Community framework at RC to drive professional inquiry among staff.
 - i. *Professional Learning Communities will continue to be our vehicle for professional learning, growth, and collaboration. We have revamped the two hour late starts to provide 1 hour of PLC time and 1 hour of teacher preparation time. This balance came from survey data when teachers were asked what they needed to continue high levels of teaching in their classrooms. Teachers continue to discuss Essential Learning Outcomes that stem from content/grade level standards. We continue to use the 4 questions from the work of the Dufour's "Learning by Doing".*
 - ii. *Every PLC has created a data driven SMART Goal that they will collaboratively work towards for the 2020-2021 school year.*
 - iii. *With the current COVID-19 situation we are not sure what the future of Solution Tree PLC workshops are. Once we find a location, we will send another group of teachers.*
 - iv. *We have worked teacher engagement into the revised teachers evaluation document that is still in draft form. This has been an excellent opportunity for administration, teachers and BOE members to reflect on what current practice is and connect it to best practice.*
- b. Adopt the Multi Tiered System of Supports to ensure learning for all students through targeted interventions.
 - i. *We have continued to create our MTSS system as resources become available. The academic side of the triangle continues to improve with increased use of Fastbridge and MAP assessments. Teachers have also started to co-create common assessments to track student progress. Teachers have collaborated to provide support for students at all levels. The key to a successful MTSS structure is understanding what essential learning outcomes students are working towards. Feedback and assessment are key to providing targeted support to students.*
 - ii. *The behavior side of the triangle is currently under construction. Once the grading and assessment component is complete, more targeted interventions and supports can be implemented. The next step is to create the district wide behavior system.*
 - iii. *The social emotional side of the triangle is taking a step forward through the Disaster Grant. Training will be provided for staff on trauma informed care, self care, etc.*
- c. Create a districtwide grading and assessment framework focused on student growth and learning.
 - i. *The School Improvement Team has finished reading the book, "A Repair Kit for Broken Grades" by Ken O'Connor. This text strengthened our "why" behind making changes to our grading practices. At the last meeting the team reviewed*

the draft document that will drive future grading practices. Our goal is to rollout grading practices this spring for a fall adoption.

ii. The next guiding text will be "Grading Inside Out".

d. Create a Positive Behavioral Intervention System of Supports district wide to track and reward positive behavior.

i. This performance indicator is a work in progress. No specific update at this time.

e. Update/Modify the current teacher evaluation system (P.R.I.D.E) to emphasize teacher growth and reflection for the betterment of student learning.

i. The Teacher Evaluation Committee has a draft document that outlines the components for teacher evaluation. The committee has until December 22nd to review the draft and provide feedback. At the next meeting in January, the committee will finalize the document and begin looking for an online software company to partner with.

f. Model and reinforce a "fail forward" attitude among staff and students to focus on learning rather than compliance.

i. Being visible in schools, classrooms and hallways has been a goal for myself each year. I feel as if the entire first semester was a case study for "fail forward". As we continue to become more focused on STEM, teachers will be implementing the 4 c's (communication, collaboration, creativity, critical thinking). This not only aligns to our Vision 2025, it is what our students need to engage in to meet our district's mission statement.

ii. Our professional readings and conversations around grading practices has increased our knowledge around engagement and learning versus compliance. This has been a topic of discussion through our partnership with DiscoveryEd.

iii. I have continued to model a positive outlook during a year that it could be easy to fall in a crack. Our buildings have done a number of things to build culture and stress the importance of teamwork. We are truly in this together and living day-to-day.

Switches -

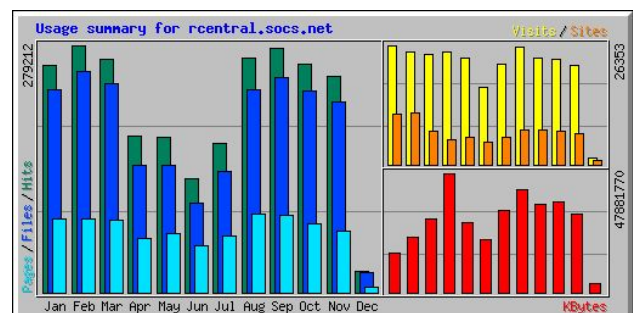

PARENT/STUDENT REMOTE OR ALTERNATE LEARNING ELECTION FORM

Raymond Central Public Schools is updating the process of learning remotely for the second semester of the 2020-2021 school year. Given the continued potential risks of the COVID-19 pandemic, Raymond Central will continue to provide a remote learning option on a limited basis for those parents/guardians and students who elect not to send their child(ren) to in-person instruction. Parents/Guardians may request that their student(s) attend remote learning by completing this form no later than **Monday January 4th, 2021 and sent to the building administrator.**

Parents/Guardians who select the remote learning option do so knowing that the District is willing to educate all students in-person. Students in remote learning classes are expected to make weekly progress and attend class on a daily basis. Students will complete the course requirements independently within designated timelines. Because of the nature of remote learning, it is important the teacher, student, and parents/guardians agree to commit the time and energy needed to be successful.

As the parent/guardian of a remote learner, I also understand and acknowledge that my child(ren) may not be eligible for certain activities. Nonetheless, I elect to enroll my child(ren) in a remote learning environment for the second semester 2020-2021 school year. I further understand that, by electing to enroll my child(ren) in the remote learning environment, my student will be required to adhere to the following rules and expectations at all times:

1. Assignments will be completed on time. Remote learners cannot have any failing grades or they may be required to return to in-person instruction.
2. Students will “check in” to record their attendance, when prompted by their teacher. Excessive absenteeism of students will result in being required to return to in-person instruction. Excessive absenteeism will be determined by the building administrator.
3. Students will keep their video “on” when prompted by a teacher, and will be engaged during instructional time. Students will not disrupt instruction or participate in activities that would typically not be allowed during in person instruction.
4. Students will not access inappropriate websites during instructional time, including those websites that students would not be permitted to access if they were in school.
5. For District-owned devices or property, students will adhere to the acceptable use guidelines and will promptly report any damage to any devices or property.
6. No lewd, profane or vulgar language will be used.
7. Students must be honest at all times and avoid academic dishonesty, such as cheating or copying the work of others.
8. Remote learners will be held to the same expectations as if they were learning in-person. As a general rule, if a student’s conduct would violate a school rule at school, then that same conduct is prohibited by a remote learner.

I understand that if my student, in the sole discretion of the District's administration, fails to adhere to these rules and expectations, then the District may rescind my student's ability to learn remotely and may require my student to return to in-person instruction.

I understand that this decision is entirely voluntary and that the District will educate my child(ren) in person if I decline to sign and submit this form. I understand and agree that my signature below represents a signature on behalf of myself and my child(ren).

Raymond Central Dual Credit Advantage Scholarship

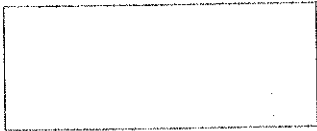
