### Full-Time Programs

- Area Superintendents met on the 9<sup>th</sup> discuss the new school year, COVID concerns, changes to COVID protocols and OSDH guidance as well as how districts are managing a variety of local, state and federal requirements.
- Threat Suppression training for our area schools and public safety providers is scheduled for the 13-14<sup>th</sup>. This training related to active school shooter prevention and response is sponsored by P66, Oklahoma Sheriff's Association, and Kyler Construction and is free to all of the public schools. Area law enforcement, mental health, municipalities and other crisis responders are invited to participate as well.
- Several of our new staff members started in July or just prior to Oklahoma Summit. All but two of the openings have been filled, and those individuals hired were able to join us for our welcome back inservice activities.
- Back to School Night on August 10<sup>th</sup> – COVID required us to adjust our process last year to appointment only, and we discovered it work very well. We will be offering the event in the same format this year. We have almost 220 registered for that event, as of 8/10.

### Business and Industry Services

- Jennifer Cowns, Apprenticeship project manager from the Department of Commerce met with Traci, Kahle Goff, Molly Kyler, Janet Schwabe, Dr. Burkett and Kendra Keelin to discuss apprenticeships and

the process other schools have used to initiate apprenticeships for targeted industries, such as HVAC and plumbing.

- The Fall classes for our Adult Training and Development kicked off at the beginning of September, with 18 certification and general interest classes.
- The next CDL class will begin at the end of September and is eligible for tuition assistance with ARP funds.

## Capital Planning

- We are in the 62nd week of the project. The exterior work scope remains approximately 45 days behind schedule due to inclement weather. The detention pond correction has been completed, and the sod has been laid and is being watered in. The paving work scope has begun for the west parking lot area, with half of the West lot as well as the curb and guttering has been poured. Two-thirds of the north parking lot has been poured, with some remaining curb and guttering and the final 1/3 of the lot expected in the near future. The outdoor planter installation along the new construction areas is underway, and the final two courses of block is expected in the next two weeks. Following the installation of the French drains, the stone will begin installation on the planters. Restroom fixtures have begun installation and are about 85% complete and will resume after the millwork is installed. Toilet partitions will begin the week of 8/9. Installation of the wood grain ceiling in the Cosmetology area is being complete. Mud and taping of the Conference Center sheetrock is complete. LVT flooring will begin once the area has been conditioned sufficiently to allow installation. Cosmetology workstations and shampoo bowl cabinets have been installed. Exterior metal wall panels for the new addition are complete, and we are only waiting on trim to complete the spline wall. The canopies along the west wall of the new addition are complete. Fire suppression installation is in progress and about 60% complete in the main building. Production kitchen patch and repair of the existing concrete floor is scheduled to begin. Reshaping of the soil at the west parking lot island and the new driveway is set to begin. Soil backfill and grading will continue along the new concrete installation. Electrical wire pulling continues in the new addition, and troffer light installation continues as the ceiling grid is installed. Exterior canopy light installation is to be performed in the next two weeks. Stainless steel grease hood duct system installation is in progress in the Production Kitchen and Culinary Classroom.

## CERTIFICATE OF EXCISE BOARD

State of Oklahoma, County of Kay

We, do further certify that we have examined the statement of estimated needs for the current fiscal year ending June 30, 2021, as certified by the Board of Education of Pioneer Technology Center, District Number AVTS # 13 of said County and State, and its financial statement for the preceding year, and in so doing we have diligently performed the duties imposed upon this Excise Board by 68 O. S. 2001 Section 3007, by (1) ascertaining that the financial statements, as to the statistics therein contained, reflect the true fiscal condition at the close of the fiscal year, or caused the same to be corrected so to show; (2) struck from the estimate of needs so submitted any items not authorized by law and reduced to the sum authorized by law any items restricted by statute as to the amount lawfully expendable therefor; (3) supplemented such estimate, after appropriate action, by an estimate of needs prepared by this Excise Board to make provision for mandatory functions based upon statistics authoritatively submitted; (4) computed the total means available to each fund in the manner provided, applying the Governing Board's estimate of revenue to be derived from surplus tax of the immediately preceding year and from sources other than ad valorem tax, or reduced such estimate to not less than the lawfully authorized ratio of the several sums realized from such sources during the preceding fiscal year or to such lesser sum as may reasonably be anticipated under altered law or circumstance and using for such determination the basic collections of the preceding year and the ratios on which distribution or apportionment must be made during the ensuing or current year.

To the several and specific purposes of the estimated needs as certified, we have and do hereby appropriate the surplus balances of cash on hand of the prior year, estimates of income from sources other than ad valorem taxation within the limitation fixed by law, and the proceeds of ad valorem tax levy within the number of mills authorized, either by apportionment by the Legislature, allocation by the excise board or by legal election, all of which appropriations are made in so far as the available surpluses, revenues, and levies will permit, except in that we have also provided that, after deducting items consisting of cash and the revenue from all sources other than the 2021 tax and the proceeds of the 2021 tax levy are in excess of the residue of such appropriations, by a sum included for delinquent tax, computed at 10.0% of such residue. And provided further, if said School District has been ascertained to be a well defined State Aid District, the local budget, as approved and appropriated for, has been applied wholly to its operating accounts.

We further certify that the amount required to be raised from tax, excluding Homesteads, for General Revenue Fund purposes as approved, requires a total ad valorem tax levy of 10.000 Mills. Said levy is within the statutory limit, and if in excess, is within the constitutional limit and has been authorized by a vote of the people of said district, as shown by certificate of the School Board to-wit:

To this District, with valuations shown below, the Excise Board allocated 5.000 Mills, plus 0.000 Mills authorized by the Constitution, plus an emergency levy of 0.000 Mills; plus local support levy of 5.000 Mills; for a total levy for the General Fund of 10.000 Mills.

We further certify that the amount required to be raised for building fund purposes as approved requires a tax levy of 5.000 Mills, and said levy has been certified as authorized by a vote of the people at an election held for that purpose. We further certify that Assessed Values used in computing Mill-vote levies have been applied as certified by the County Assessor.

We further certify that we have examined the within statements of account and estimated needs or requirements of the Governing Board of Pioneer Technology Center, School District No. AVTS # 13 of said County and State, in relation to the Sinking Fund or Funds thereof, and after finding the same correct or having caused the same to be corrected pursuant to 68 O. S. 2001 Section 3009, have approved the requirements therefor to fulfill the conditions of Section 26 and 28 of Article 10, Oklahoma Constitution, and have made and certified a tax levy therefor to the extent of the excess of said total requirements over the total of items 2, 3, 6, and 12 of Exhibit "Y" and any other legal deduction, including a reserve of 10% for delinquent taxes.
