Nebraska law allows public school employees to organize and bargain collectively with school boards on the issue of salaries. An agreement has been reached and ratified by the Bellevue Education Association, the employee organization representing teachers, nurses, school psychologists, and therapists. The negotiated agreement with teachers represents an agreement with a proposed total package increase of 3.99% for the 2026/2027 school year.

- 2026/2027 Base Salary for teachers increases to \$40,534
- Professional Recognition Stipend increase to \$7500
- Health Insurance Stipend shifts to \$10,248
- Vertical and Horizontal salary increases for individual employees

The current and proposed salary programs are attached. Also attached is the ratification notice from the Bellevue Education Association. Administrative

Mr. Wickham proceeded to explain how the tax anticipation notes process works, which would be an alternative to help build the districts' cash reserve.

Dr. Kari Veleba, Director of Curriculum and Instruction gave an overview of Priority #1 Instructional and Curricular Innovation of the Strategic Plan. Tonight, the focus was on curriculum and instruction, along with professional learning. Dr. Veleba shared the NDE Standards Revision Timeline for all Content Areas, which takes place every 7 to 8 years. The district is currently in the writing curriculum cycle for science, math, library, and career education. With the minimal changes to the state standards for science, the district decided to update the current curriculum and not purchase new curriculum. An update was provided on the Nebraska Career & Technical Education Model, which Bellevue supports 5 of the 6 content areas, the ELA revisions, the upcoming curriculum cycles and what's new in the curriculum department this year. Dr. Veleba provided an update on the professional learning opportunities for teachers, instructional coaches and principals. Finally, Dr. Veleba discussed these groups can complete a survey after each professional learning session they attend to provide feedback.

**AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE NEGOTIATING TEAM REPRESENTING
THE BOARD OF EDUCATION, BELLEVUE PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND
THE BELLEVUE EDUCATION ASSOCIATION**

The following agreement has been reached by the teams of the Board of Education and the Bellevue Education Association as a result of the negotiations process. This agreement will be presented to the Bellevue Education Association and the Board of Education with the recommendation that it be ratified.

Article I: General Provisions

A. Recognition

The Board recognizes the Association as the exclusive and sole collective bargaining representatives for all teachers, nurses, psychologists, occupational therapists, and physical therapists employed by the District.

B. Duration of Contract

This contract shall be effective as of the beginning of the 2026-2027 school year and shall continue in effect until the end of the 2026-2027 school year. If upon the expiration of this agreement, the parties hereto have not agreed to a collective bargaining agreement for the next school year, the terms of the 2026-2027 contract shall continue in full force and effect until a new agreement is ratified.

Article II: Salary

A. Salary Schedule

The present index salary schedule identified as "Teachers' Salary Schedule A" will continue based on 188 contract days, twelve of which would not be student contact days.

B. Base Salary

The base salary is increased to \$40,534 for school year 2026-2027.

C. Longevity Pay

Payment in recognition of professional service in excess of twenty (20) years shall be included in basic contract salary.

It is agreed that a payment in recognition of professional service be made in the amount of 3.75% of basic contract salary to those individuals who have completed twenty (20) years of cumulative professional service with the District as a certificated employee.

D. Supplementary Compensation

The District will provide each full-time employee with \$7,500 in supplemental compensation for professional service.

Article III: Insurance

A. Health Insurance

The District will apply \$10,248 for health and accident insurance offered by the District. Employees selecting the HDHP will receive \$9,248 toward premium costs and \$1,000 deposited in an HSA account. Married employees may apply both district shares (\$20,496 or \$18,496/\$2,000) toward a family health insurance policy.

B. Section 125 Benefit Plan

A Section 125 Benefit Plan will be available to employees for insurance.

C. Life Insurance

The District will provide term life insurance in the amount of \$25,000.

D. Disability Insurance

The Long Term Disability plan will be continued.

Article IV: Leave

A. Annual Leave

Ten days of leave will be earned annually. In the event an employee is employed on a part-time basis, leave days will be prorated according to the percent of time employed.

B. Special Leave Days

Three of the annual leave days, subject to the availability of a substitute as verified by Personnel, may be used as special leave days each year at the certified employee's discretion without explanation, with a minimum of one-week advance notice. A black-out calendar will be created annually by Personnel to reflect dates that certificated staff may not use special leave days. Special leave days will accrue annually as part of the employee's overall leave bank. A maximum of three special leave days may be used each school year.

C. Compensation for Unused Leave

Additional pay will be provided to employees with a balance of at least 33 days who have shown exemplary attendance by accruing more than 7 days of leave during that contract year. If the exemplary attendance payment option is selected, accumulated leave will be limited to 7 days for that year. Pay for exemplary attendance shall be paid at the employee's applicable rate of pay over a 12 month period beginning in July.

Additional pay will be provided to employees who have shown exemplary attendance by accruing more than 110 days of leave. Annual leave is limited to 110 days. Any employee who accumulates more than 110 days in a given contract year will automatically receive exemplary attendance pay for the additional days. Pay for exemplary attendance shall be paid at the employee's applicable rate of pay over a 12 month period beginning in July.

Upon resignation after twenty years of service, compensation for one-half of the days accumulated shall be paid to certificated employees at the applicable rate of pay. Those certified employees with less than twenty years of service, will receive compensation for one-fourth of the days accumulated at the applicable rate of pay.

D. Bereavement Leave

Five days of non-accumulating bereavement leave will be available annually, separate from the employee's Annual Leave Days, which will be granted following the death of the employee's spouse, parent, child, step-child, or parent-in-law. Two days of non-accumulating bereavement leave will be available annually, separate from the employee's Annual Leave Days, which will be granted following the death of the employee's brother, sister, grandchild, grandparent, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, nephew, niece, aunt, uncle, grandparent-in-law, or any other individual who is a permanent resident in the employee's home. In the event additional leave is needed, the employee will work with their administrator. Any additional leave time will be deducted from the employee's Annual Leave Days.

Article V: Voluntary Separation

A. The Program

The Voluntary Separation Program shall continue through a Bellevue School District plan.

B. Insurance upon Voluntary Separation

Those employees who are 55 years of age or older and elect participation in the program shall be provided \$2,500 toward the district's health and accident program. This benefit will continue until age 65.

Article VI: Bellevue Education Association

A. President's Release Time

The Bellevue School District agrees to provide the President of the Bellevue Education Association with one (1) class period/or the equivalent of release time to be used for association work.

B. Association Leave

The Bellevue School District agrees to provide the Bellevue Education Association with twenty (20) days of paid association leave. Five additional association leave days may be purchased on the basis of substitute deduction. The association leave shall be only for the purpose of professional association work at the local, state, and national level and all such days shall require the authorization of the Association President and Executive Board and Superintendent.

Article VII: Points of Interest

A. Grievance Procedure

It is the policy of the Bellevue Public School System to discover and practice reasonable and effective means of resolving difficulties which may arise among employees, to reduce potential areas of grievances, and establish and maintain recognized two-way channels of communication between staff and administration. A grievance procedure will be provided for the prompt and equitable adjustment of differences at the most immediate level of supervision.

B. Plan Time

The district recognizes the importance of plan time and will strive to provide regular plan time for all teachers.

**AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE NEGOTIATING TEAM REPRESENTING
THE BOARD OF EDUCATION, BELLEVUE PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND
THE BELLEVUE EDUCATION ASSOCIATION**

The following agreement has been reached by the teams of the Board of Education and the Bellevue Education Association as a result of the negotiations process. This agreement will be presented to the Bellevue Education Association and the Board of Education with the recommendation that it be ratified.

Article I: General Provisions

A. Recognition

The Board recognizes the Association as the exclusive and sole collective bargaining representatives for all teachers, nurses, psychologists, occupational therapists, and physical therapists employed by the District.

It is agreed that a payment in recognition of professional service be made in the amount of 3.75% of basic contract salary to those individuals who have completed twenty (20) years of cumulative professional service with the District as a certificated employee.

D. Supplementary Compensation

The District will provide each full-time employee with \$7,300 in supplemental compensation for professional service.

Article III: Insurance

A. Health Insurance

The District will apply \$9,562 for health and accident insurance offered by the District. Employees selecting the HDHP will receive \$8,562 toward premium costs and \$1,000 deposited in an HSA account. Married employees may apply both district shares (\$19,124 or \$17,124/\$2,000) toward a family health insurance policy.

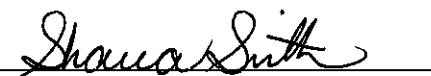

Strategic Plan Highlights for Priority 2- February 2026

Priority 2: Supportive Learning Environment (Board Report February & August)	Bellevue Strategic Plan 2024-29
Objective: To provide appropriate social-emotional and behavioral support for all students in a positive, supportive learning environment.	
Strategy: Support the continued implementation of a multi-tiered system of support (MTSS) to address the social-emotional and behavioral needs of students.	
Performance Indicator 2.1: Improve social-emotional supports and targeted interventions to address the behavior needs of our diverse student population.	

Actions:

- 1. Increase the use of core behavioral strategies to support the needs of our diverse student population.** BPS continues to increase the use of core behavioral strategies through a structured framework that combines the Boys Town Education Model with PBIS. In October, 524 classrooms were visited with individualized teacher feedback provided on the evidence of the Boys Town Education Model in action. In addition, every school received a comprehensive report on each component of the model. Boys Town Consultations will occur again in January and February. School improvement plans were updated with threshold percentages to provide progress monitoring for continuous improvement and to drive professional learning within their buildings on specific strategies. In addition, school teams have begun introducing the PBIS Self-Assessment Rubric to readily identify additional classroom practices that can be strengthened to best meet the needs of our diverse student population. Ensuring that all staff are trained on best behavioral strategies for interacting with students, new paraprofessionals hired since the onset of the 2025-2026 school were also trained on Fostering Positive Student Behavior in January.
- 2. Develop decision rules to provide targeted group and individual interventions.** The district is currently collecting and evaluating implementation data for Tier 2 interventions, including Check-In Check-Out (CICO), Modified CICO, and Social & Academic Instructional Groups (SAIG). Building-level MTSS teams are using established criteria with increasing consistency, and current data indicates high fidelity of use and strong student success in these interventions. In addition, all elementary teams have received training and are now utilizing the Teachers and Parents as Partners (TAPP) intervention, with building teams receiving ongoing coaching from NeMTSS and UNL. Moving forward, the district MTSS team will focus on refining SAIG for middle and high school contexts during the second semester and is beginning to explore the development of more targeted "Complex Groups" to meet the needs of students across all grade levels (K-12).
- 3. Increase the utilization of Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) and Boys Town Education Model at the school level to improve effectiveness.** Data indicates that fidelity of implementation continues to improve for both models. Each building MTSS Team

completes the PBIS Tiered Fidelity Inventory (TFI), and these scores have continued to increase for all three Tiers (Tier 1, Tier 2, Tier 3). In-district Boys Town consultants continue to provide feedback and support to each school, and consultants are assigned to collect the fidelity of implementation each semester for the 2025-2026 school year.

4. **Provide resources and engage families with strategies to reinforce positive behavior in the home environment.** BPS will once again be providing the Boys Town program, Common Sense Parenting, to parents of school aged children this semester. In addition, schools are communicating the social skills being explicitly taught during school to parents via school newsletters to not only provide information on what is being taught, expected and reinforced but with the recognition that the partnership between home and school is what solidifies the use of the expected social skills.

Performance Indicator 2.2: Expand school-based partnerships and services for the mental health needs of students.

Actions:

1. **Continue to build partnerships with outside agencies to increase mental health support.** BPS continues to develop and refine partnerships with outside agencies to increase mental health support. To date, the district has MOU's with Connections (Project Harmony and Family Connections to provide school-based mental health therapy. The Connections program is a K-8 program in which school counselors make referrals based on the individual needs of students. A mental health therapist from Project Harmony responds by providing mental health support at the student's individual building. BPS continues to have the second-highest utilization rate amongst schools in the Omaha Metro area. The MOU for Family Connections provides a total of 8 FTE for therapists. This is an increase of 3 therapists since Fall 2025. These therapists allow for a consistent presence in the district's secondary schools. Both Connections (Project Harmony) and Family Connections have been instrumental in providing school-based individual and group therapy to students. The total number of therapists serving students equates to a 6.0 FTE increase from the completion of the district's initial strategic plan and a 4.5 FTE increase since February 2025.. All therapists and therapy services are provided at no additional cost to the district.
2. **Expand access to the Military & Family Life Counseling (MFLC) program for military families.** The district aims to expand access to the Military & Family Life Counseling (MFLC) program for military families. In 2022-23, the district received our first MLAC Counselor. The military hires these certified mental health specialists to serve students of active-duty military families inside the school setting. In 2023-24, the base liaison asked if the district would be interested in expanding to additional schools. Currently, no new funds have been allocated to Offutt to expand the program.
3. **Work with community agencies to monitor school safety plans and revise them as needed to address safety plans.** BPS makes an effort to work with community agencies to monitor school safety plans and revise them as needed to address student and staff safety. BPS has implemented a process to review and revise safety plans in all schools with the support of the building administration, building safety teams, and School Resource Officers. A separate audit will be conducted at all schools by the Bellevue Fire Department during the 2025-2026

school year. The District Safety, Drug, and Alcohol Advisory Council, consisting of administration, certified staff, classified staff, and parents, continued to meet five times last school year. This council focused on safety-related topics and was proactive in drug and alcohol awareness throughout the district. The district continues to work with the School Resource Officers to utilize effective threat assessments and respond proactively. BPS added an additional School Resource Officer through a MOU with the City of Bellevue in 2024-25. This additional SRO specializes in threat assessment and threat reduction. BPS has mechanisms to monitor data related to anonymous tip reporting from students, parents, and community members. The District Safety, Drug, and Alcohol Advisory Council consistently reviews this data for trends. To further enhance preparedness, The district has integrated new digital maps to better inform and direct first responders in the event of an emergency response.

Performance Indicator 2.3: Align continuous improvement efforts to enhance professional practice that supports students' social-emotional and behavioral needs.

Actions:

- 1. Provide ongoing professional learning opportunities for staff to deepen the implementation of PBIS and Boys Town Education Model.** On January 5, 2026, newly hired paraprofessionals were provided training on core behavioral strategies through the use of PBIS and the Boys Town Education Model. Through continuous improvement work days, BPS district administration is emphasizing Midwest PBIS Classroom Practices to reinforce consistent behavioral expectations within the classroom as well as other school settings.
- 2.** BPS continues to provide ongoing professional learning opportunities for staff to deepen the implementation of PBIS and Boys Town Education Model. In June and July, the three new administrators for BPS were trained in the Administrative Intervention program of the Boys Town Education Model to ensure continuity of the model's quality components when students are referred for office interventions. In order to continue to meet the needs of all students, we are expanding our use of SAIG (Social, Academic, Instructional Groups) at all elementary schools this fall, and any new school SAIG facilitator will be provided with professional learning pertaining to Boys Town Social Skills for direct instruction.
- 3. Provide ongoing professional learning opportunities for staff to deepen their understanding of trauma-informed practices and strategies.** BPS continues to provide and refine professional learning opportunities for staff to deepen their understanding of trauma-informed practices and strategies. Trauma-informed professional learning continues to be integrated into new teacher training for all staff new to BPS. The district Trauma-Informed School Training Team comprises school counselors and social workers to provide biannual professional learning to each building that focuses on effective classroom practices and staff self-care. Continuing for 2025-2026, school leadership has the ability to select two of four focus areas for the professional learning sessions. These focus areas include crisis response, regulation-establishing strategies, relationship-enhancing strategies, and responsibility-developing strategies. The Trauma-Informed School Training Team has developed a plan to present the remaining focus areas to schools during the 2026-2027 and 2027-2028 school years.

4. **Develop and provide training for staff in de-escalation strategies to manage and diffuse challenging behavior.**

5. **Provide continuous improvement teams support to build the capacity to address the social emotional and behavioral needs of our diverse student population.** Each of the twenty schools are scheduled for CIP work days at the end of January or early February. Principals have been asked to provide input on which components of SEBL their team wants to focus on during those work sessions with direct support from district administration. Topics included are the following: SST, TAPP Intervention, Boys Town Implementation and refinement, CICO, SAIG, TFI, attendance or the use of eduCLIMBER to pull reports by demographics. In addition, resource allocation reviews will be conducted with each school that has a subgroup population identified as ATSI as part of the Nebraska accountability system, AQuESTT.

Purple Star School Designation

In November of 2021, all Bellevue Public Schools Elementary, Middle, and High Schools were designated by the Nebraska State Board of Education as Purple Star Schools.

Signed into law in 2021, the Purple Star Schools Act recognizes schools committing to support the unique needs of military-involved students and families. To qualify, schools had to commit to the following required activities:



1. Designating a military liaison
2. Maintaining a dedicated web page for military-connected students and families
3. Maintaining a transition program led by students
4. Offering professional development for school staff related to military-connected students
5. Creating/Doing **one** of the following:
 - Resolution from the school board showing support for military-connected families posted on the school website
 - Recognize April as Military Child Month or November as Military Family Month with relevant events being held
 - Partner with a local military installation to provide opportunities for service members to volunteer or otherwise be involved in the school

Bellevue is proud of our partnership with Offutt Air Force Base and our commitment to supporting the needs of over 2,400 military-connected students across the district. All twenty schools in the district have been designated as Purple Star Schools.

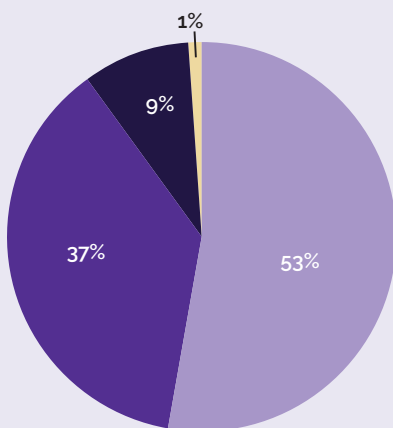

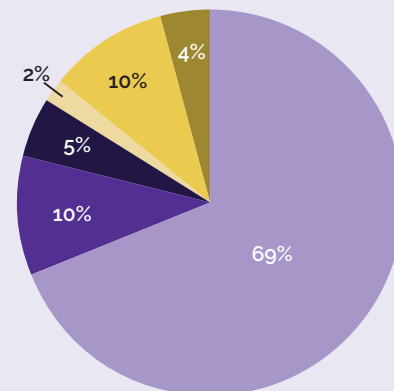
Where Does the Money Come From?

BPS Bond Initiative

2016 BPS Bond Initiative

The 2016 Bond Initiative was completed in February of 2026 with the opening of the Bellevue West Auditorium. The district greatly benefited from the 2016 bond initiative by improving facilities and supporting student learning. Many projects have been completed since 2016, and the district is very grateful to our community for providing the resources needed. As a result of the bond initiative, the district improved instructional technology and ensured that every student has access to a device to support their learning. The bond also provided funds to upgrade HVAC systems in multiple buildings, increase safety and security across all buildings by installing security cameras, and improve school entry access control. Over 4 million of the bond funds were used for replacements and repairs of numerous school roofs. There were upgrades and enhancements to the Bellevue East auditorium, along with the construction of a full auditorium at Bellevue West. The bond has also allowed the district to resurface both high school tracks, improve stadium lighting, replace the playing surfaces at both high schools, and perform long-overdue maintenance on the competition swimming pools. Initial bond funds were also allocated for enhancing our career education programs. As a result, the district purchased and renovated a facility on our BPS District Campus to create the Frank Kumor Career Center. This facility is home to four new career academies (Aviation, Automotive, Education, and Health Sciences/CNA). BPS is also utilizing this facility to provide additional storage options for the district. Many schools received new and updated fire suppression systems, and the Lied Activity Center pool was upgraded along with new rubberized courts installed to replace the old floors. Funds were also used to purchase new food-service equipment and to update our school bus fleet. These are just a few of the many completed projects. Without the generosity of our community, the district would not have had the financial resources to implement these improvements. BPS would like to thank the community members who served on the bond oversight committee and the community as a whole for voting in support of the bond initiative.

Due to a favorable, competitive market for bond purchases over the past five years and the strategic issuance of bonds, the district was able to secure an additional \$9.2 million to expand projects while staying below the expected tax increase originally approved in 2016.

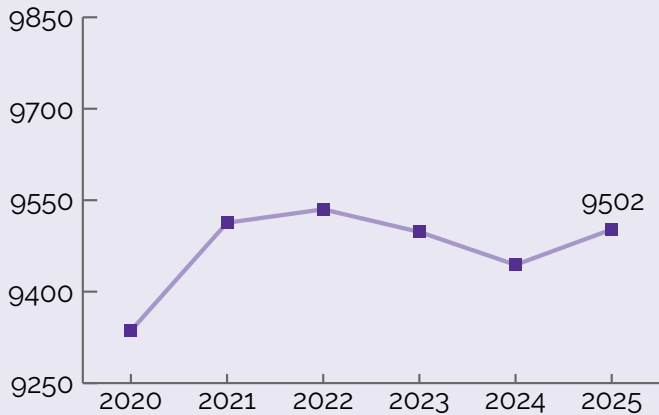

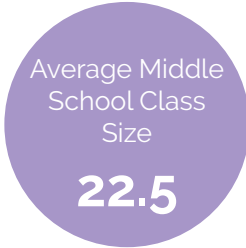
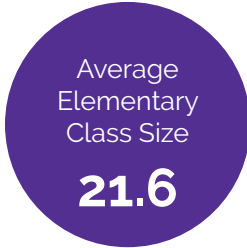


Graduation Rates

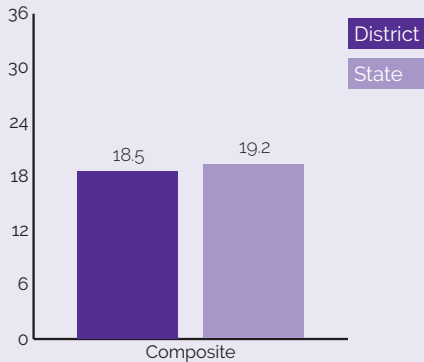

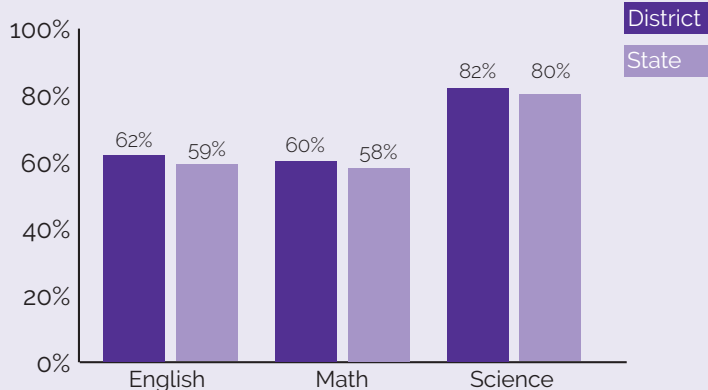

Teaching and Learning

Elementary School

Bellevue Public Schools provides 15 neighborhood elementary schools that serve nearly 5,000 students from pre-kindergarten through sixth grade. Elementary students participate in a rigorous curriculum developed by Bellevue Public Schools' teachers that aligns with Nebraska's educational standards. At the elementary level, there is an emphasis on reading, writing, math, science, and social studies. Schools provide additional classes to engage students in art, music, physical education, STEM/STEAM, social-emotional development, and library media. Additional support and services are provided for students who qualify for special education, English Learners (EL), and High Ability Learners (HAL) at all schools. Most elementary schools offer additional engagement activities through various clubs, competitions, and curriculum night(s).

Middle School

In seventh and eighth grade, Bellevue Public Schools' students attend one of three middle schools that serve nearly 1,400 students. All BPS middle school students are placed on grade-level teams to create smaller learning structures within the building. This team approach creates a nurturing, cohesive student environment. Middle School students receive core instruction in English, math, reading, science, and social studies. Additional offerings include PE & health, world language, choir, instrumental music, family sciences, and industrial technology.

High School

Over 3,000 students in grades nine through twelve attend one of our two comprehensive high schools. BPS high school students have access to over 200 courses, including a robust offering of Advanced Placement and high school/college dual credit courses. Both high schools offer co-curricular and extracurricular activities, including athletics, music, and Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps (JROTC). BPS students and teams consistently earn regional, state, and national awards and recognition in various athletic and academic competitions.



Technology



Blended Learning

To provide students with new opportunities to investigate, create, collaborate, reflect, publish, learn and grow, Bellevue Public Schools uses a Blended Learning Model. This allows students to develop skills to become empowered learners, digital citizens, global collaborators, knowledge constructors, and innovative designers. Blending learning is the combination of active engaged learning online and active engaged learning offline designed intentionally to increase student engagement and learning while fostering a culture of creativity, curiosity and personalization through student driven learning. Staff are provided Blended Learning training to support the effective utilization of iPads in the classroom as an instructional resource that enhances teaching and learning. Areas of focus for training are differentiated and include digital workflow, digital citizenship, and instructional strategies based on the staff roles and responsibilities for implementation. District-adopted core apps and digital curricular resources are also incorporated into the training provided. Training approaches include in-person workshops and virtual independent study modules, which are accompanied by implementation coaching and building instructional coaches. The priority has been for all current staff to receive the Blended Learning training. In the upcoming years, the Blended Learning instructional technology training to support one-to-one iPad implementation is embedded in the quarterly new staff induction training program and the Bellevue Public Schools Instructional Model.

One-to-One iPads

Bellevue is a one-to-one school district. Each student K-12 has access to an iPad that is used to enhance the delivery of the curriculum. All students 7-12 can utilize their devices at school or at home. Students in K-6 have access to their iPad during the school day under the direction of their classroom teacher. Regardless of the location of use, all district devices are filtered for content and monitored by district personnel.

Schoology and Core Apps

The district utilizes the Schoology Learning Management System, and all available apps utilized in the classroom or home setting can be found on our website under the Technology Department tab. All parents, guardians, and students have access to PowerSchool to access grades, attendance, and other student information.

Programs

Academic Center of Excellence (A.C.E.)

The Academic Center of Excellence (A.C.E.) alternative program meets the needs of BPS students who have yet to be successful in the traditional education environment. The A.C.E. program is located at the BPS Support Center at 2820 Arboretum Drive and accepts students in grades 9-12. Students are placed into the program through a referral process initiated at the school level. The program targets students meeting multiple at-risk criteria from the following, which may lead to dropping out of school: credit deficiency; poor attendance; social/emotional or behavioral issues; challenging life issues; substance abuse; traumatic events; teen pregnancy.

Frank Kumor Career Center

In 2024, the district remodeled the Frank Kumor Career Center. The grand opening was held in October with local, state, and national dignitaries in addition to students, staff, and community members in attendance. Bellevue Public Schools offers various career and professional studies programs at the Frank Kumor Career Center, named after long-serving School Board Member and supporter, Mr. Frank Kumor. These programs enhance high school students' education with real-life and relevant learning experiences in collaboration with local businesses, non-profits, and industry professionals at one central hub. All coursework allows students to earn dual enrollment or industry certification credit through Metro Community College and Doane University. The career center building houses the BPS Automotive Maintenance Academy, BPS Health Science (CNA) Academy, BPS Educational Career Academy, and the BPS Aviation Academy. The Frank Kumor Career Center is located at 2812 Arboretum Drive.

Special Education

Bellevue Public Schools believes that children are served best in general education classrooms where they can develop peer relationships and gain exposure to the core curriculum. The Special Education Department works to prepare each child from birth through age 21 to contribute to their communities in meaningful and positive ways by providing specialized instruction, allowing for individual differences and learning styles, and developing independence.

Birth-3 years old Services

Bellevue Public Schools provides Birth-3 years old services in-home or at private/community child centers. The program offers families the following support services as needed:

- Family service coordination
- An early childhood special education teacher
- Speech-language pathologist
- Physical therapist
- Occupational therapist
- Teachers of the deaf/hard of hearing
- Teachers for the visually impaired

Children who qualify are served based on an Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP). Services are delivered using a Primary Service Provider (PSP) Model. The PSP Model consists of a team of professionals who work together to support families and caregivers. Children must live within the BPS' attendance area to receive services.

Preschool

Bellevue Public Schools' Preschool program serves children who are four years of age (by July 31). The preschool programs serve children qualified for special education through an evaluation process and have a verified educational disability with a current IEP. The program also serves targeted Title 1 eligible students. Most BPS Elementary Schools have a preschool program. BPS will place identified students in elementary attendance zones without programs into a program at one of the district's 12 preschool sites.

CHAP Center

The CHAP Center provides level III services to BPS students who need an intensive, alternative educational setting. Only an IEP team may place a student at the CHAP Center. CHAP's daily programming includes individual educational planning that is trauma-informed with a therapeutic approach to address social and emotional skills. Components of the daily program include academic content, IEP implementation, daily life skills, and employability lessons under the structure of PBIS. Specific behavioral lessons focus on mindfulness, distress tolerance, emotional regulation, and interpersonal effectiveness skills.

Bellevue Expanding Student Transitions Program (B.E.S.T.)

Bellevue Public Schools established the B.E.S.T. Program in 2011 to serve the transition needs of developmentally disabled young adults ages 18 to 21. This program emphasizes skill development in functional academics, personal management, motor development, vocational development, communication and social skills, and independent living. According to their Individual Educational Program (IEP), students are taught the skills needed for competitive employment, volunteer activities, or sheltered workshops. The B.E.S.T. Program's goal is to assist in a smooth transition from school to the community.

Project SEARCH at Nebraska Medical Center Bellevue

The Nebraska Medicine Bellevue Project SEARCH program provides unpaid internship opportunities to help individuals with developmental disabilities gain knowledge and skills that could lead to paid employment. This program targets students ages 18-21 who would benefit from total immersion in a business setting. Total workplace immersion facilitates a seamless combination of classroom instruction, career exploration, and hands-on training through three 10-week internship site rotations. Project SEARCH interns gain experience in various settings: environmental services, general nutrition, facilities, access services, sterile processing, administrative support, and outpatient rehabilitation.

Bellevue Public Schools Early Childhood Center

The Bellevue Public Schools Early Childhood Center, located at 2600 Arboretum Drive, is intended for children birth to eight years old and their parents. The center is open to families in the BPS' attendance area or active duty military families. Parents can check out toys and resources to take home to support the development and learning of their children. The parents must accompany their children while participating in the center's activities. The program provides an on-site early childhood teacher to support children and families.

Child Find

"Child Find" refers to the process of locating, identifying, and evaluating children with disabilities to ensure that they receive services to which they are entitled. Children and youth, ages birth to 21 living within the BPS District, who are suspected of having a disability may be referred for a possible evaluation to determine if they are eligible for special education services. Please contact a building principal to refer your child currently enrolled with BPS (preschool-Grade 12). If your child is birth through age five and not presently enrolled with BPS, families should contact the BPS Early Childhood Office at 402-293-4941.

Unified Sports

In partnership with Special Olympics of Nebraska, BPS promotes social inclusion through shared sports training and competition experiences. Unified Sports join people with and without intellectual disabilities on the same athletic team. A simple principle inspired it: training and playing together is a quick path to friendship and understanding. BPS currently offers unified soccer at middle schools. High school students can participate in unified bowling and unified track.

English Learner Program (EL)

The Bellevue Public Schools English Learner students receive services from EL endorsed teachers at their home school. The district provides instruction and support to students who are not yet proficient in English. Students are supported in groups by their language ability in listening, speaking, reading, and writing to succeed in the content areas. EL students receive services primarily in the general education classroom and full access to all curricular and extracurricular activities. All cultures and languages are welcomed and valued. Additional programs, such as PADRES and a Family Literacy Center, are offered for EL parents to promote connections between home and school.



National Center for Family Literacy Program

Bellevue Public Schools received the National Center for Family Literacy grant (NCFL) in August 2021. Bellevue Public Schools became a Nebraska Legacy Family Literacy site in August 2024. The NCFL's mission is to eradicate poverty through education solutions for families. NCFL engages families, educators, administrators, and advocates to promote family education solutions and reduce educational inequalities. BPS works with families and utilizes resources within the community to provide literacy strategies, programming, and resources for students and families. The development of a BPS Family Literacy Center will engage multiple generations of families, particularly English learners, in learning together with a holistic approach to create a stronger impact and greater success for families. BPS Family Liaisons work with the parents to develop leadership skills within their community. BPS has created a district hub site to recruit PreK-6 families to offer training for parents regarding how to be the primary teachers for their children and full partners in education. BPS has a partnership with Metropolitan Community College (MCC) to offer adult English language classes for parents. The purpose of this program is to remove barriers while supporting parents as partners in their children's education by developing welcoming culturally and linguistically responsive environments.

STEM

The district strives to integrate STEM learning throughout our curriculum and allows students to develop STEM skills through collaboration, creativity, communication, and critical thinking. Other STEM activities include LEGO and VEX robotics, CyberPatriot security teams, school gardens, aquaponics, STEM nights, and Science Olympiad programs.

High Ability Learner (HAL)

The Bellevue Public Schools High Ability Learner (HAL) program supports students who demonstrate exceptional potential through advanced ability, strong task commitment, and well-developed problem-solving and creative thinking skills. Identified students are provided a range of flexible, differentiated learning opportunities tailored to their strengths and needs. These opportunities may include curriculum and grade-level acceleration, subject-specific advancement, tiered and replacement instruction, inclusive co-teaching models, pull-out services, supplemental programming, curriculum compacting, enrichment through external partnerships, peer grouping, career exploration, internships, Advanced Placement coursework, and independent study.

HAL services are intentionally designed to address both academic and affective needs, ensuring students are appropriately challenged while supported as learners. Instructional experiences emphasize higher-level thinking, creativity, perseverance, effective communication, and the development of study skills, empowering students to thrive in complex and demanding learning environments.

Advanced Placement & Dual Enrollment

BPS continues to expand access and opportunities for students to engage in rigorous courses through advanced level, Advanced Placement (AP), and dual enrollment opportunities. In 2024-25, over 1300 students took advanced level or AP courses, and 821 students took 21300 dual enrollment classes, earning over 9500 college credit hours through Metro Community College, University of Nebraska-Omaha, and Doane University.

Metro Career Academy

Bellevue Public Schools students can access the Metropolitan Community College (MCC) High School Career Academy program at a minimal cost. The MCC program allows high school juniors and seniors to learn specific career knowledge and skills before high school graduation. By participating in year-long MCC Career Academies, students can explore a career field and even start a degree and job while earning up to 37 college credit hours.

UNMC Health Alliance

The UNMC High School Alliance allows high school juniors and seniors to take college-level courses in preparation for careers in health care. The program, held during the school year, provides unique hands-on learning experiences, including courses in infectious diseases, anatomy, and medical decision-making taught by UNMC faculty on the Bellevue campus.

Henry Doorly Zoo Academy

The mission of Zoo Academy is to provide students with knowledge and career explorations relating to life sciences through authentic STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) experiences at Omaha's Henry Doorly Zoo & Aquarium. Zoo Academy is an excellent model of forming successful collaborations between an informal science education organization and school districts.

Air Force Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corp (JROTC)

The Air Force Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corp (JROTC) program's mission is to develop citizens of character dedicated to serving their nation and community. The JROTC program promotes citizenship, community service, personal responsibility, character, and self-discipline. The program achieves this through classroom education in air and space fundamentals and hands-on learning opportunities in several challenging extracurricular activities.

Co-curricular Organizations & Clubs

Students can participate in various co-curricular organizations and clubs to extend learning opportunities beyond the classroom settings. School staff also sponsor non-curricular clubs that allow students to engage with other students who share an interest or passion. BPS currently offers over 40 co-curricular organizations and clubs at the secondary level. Many co-curricular organizations allow students to participate in curriculum-related competitions at the local, state, and national levels.

Extra-curricular Activities

Bellevue Public Schools provides students access to over 20 extracurricular programs. These programs include team sports, individual sports, and competitive fine arts. BPS athletic and fine arts students regularly win state championships and compete successfully in regional and national competitions. BPS believes that students who participate in extracurricular programs are more connected to school and community life, resulting in better academic outcomes and engagement in school.



Grant-funded Programs

Department of Defense Educational Activity (DoDEA)

The Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA) is a field activity of the Office of the Secretary of Defense. DoDEA's mission is to plan, direct, coordinate, and manage the education programs for eligible dependents of U.S. military personnel and civilian personnel of the Department of Defense. DoDEA is committed to ensuring that all school-aged children of military families are provided a world-class education that prepares them for postsecondary education and/or career success and to be leading contributors in their communities as well as in our 21st century globalized society. BPS has been awarded five million dollars in competitive grants from DoDEA since 2018.

Project Shape Up

In 2024, Bellevue Public Schools was awarded a \$2,000,000 Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA) competitive grant for Project SHAPE UP. Project SHAPE UP aims to improve overall physical activity, health, and well-being for K-12 students at military-connected schools by providing staff training, equipment, and supplies for school health and PE programs. This project will improve instruction, increase engagement, and encourage an active lifestyle for our students.

Grant funds have provided staff access to professional learning opportunities and new PE equipment and supplies to incorporate into their classrooms. Grant funds also provided each elementary school with an outdoor fitness course and indoor traverse climbing walls. Elementary PE teachers are integrating these new structures into their current curriculum. The district also used grant funds to install an inclusive playground at two elementary schools to support the needs of students with severe disabilities. Middle schools will receive new PE equipment, supplies, and an outdoor fitness gym in the spring of 2026. High schools received funds to purchase new equipment and supplies for each school's various physical education classes.



Operation Taking Flight

In 2023, Bellevue Public Schools was awarded a competitive grant of \$2,000,000 from the Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA). The 5-year award will be used to increase Math Proficiency for all students and initiate a BPS Aviation Academy. Grant funds are being utilized to improve math performance by funding costs associated with K-12 curriculum development in alignment with the new Nebraska College and Career Ready Standards for Mathematics. Grant funds have also been utilized to initiate the BPS Aviation Academy at the Frank Kumor Career Center. The new aviation courses allow students to explore the aviation industry by introducing them to concepts related to flight, aircraft systems and performance, the flying environment, flight planning, and drones. The program also focuses on careers in aviation and allows students to earn industry certifications, including the Private Pilot Knowledge Test and Part 107 Remote Pilot Knowledge Test.

Project Career Launch

In 2020, the district received a \$1,500,000 grant to fund Project Career Launch. The grant has expanded student access to dual credit courses in health sciences and supports district-wide efforts to provide reading intervention and phonics resources for students in grades K-12. The grant funds assisted the district in initiating a dual enrollment Health Science Academy at the Frank Kumor Career Center. Project Career Launch has also provided both high schools with the needed technology, equipment, and support to transition current health science classes to dual enrollment through Metro Community College. Students in the health science courses at both high schools and the BPS Frank Kumor Career Center have the option for dual enrollment at no cost due to the funds provided by the grant. This grant program concluded in May of 2025. However, the continued impact of the grant will benefit our students for years to come.

IMProving Access, Curriculum, Training for World Languages

In 2021, the district was awarded a \$2,400,000 IMPACT-WL grant to provide our students and staff with quality world language curricular resources and increase our students' access to dual enrollment opportunities in high school. The grant provides summer language programming for elementary students and expands professional development opportunities for our world language teaching staff. Through this grant program, BPS has increased enrollment in world language courses and transitioned all upper-level language courses to dual enrollment opportunities through Metro Community College and the University of Nebraska-Omaha. Since the program began, hundreds of students have earned more than 4,000 college credit hours in world languages at no cost. Additionally, many of our world language teachers have earned master's degrees and language certifications to offer additional dual enrollment opportunities for our students.



Partnerships



Since 1985, the Bellevue Public Schools Foundation has worked to improve the lives of students and educators by providing funding and support for special projects and initiatives within the school district that would otherwise not be possible. BPS Foundation uses donations, corporate sponsorships, and income from the Kids' Time before-and-after school program to fill funding gaps within the District. The BPS Foundation's mission

is to accelerate educational achievement for ALL students through the effective mobilization of innovation, relationships, and resources. Over the past two years, the Foundation has provided over \$900,000 of financial support to the district through classroom grants, playground donations, and scholarships for graduates.



The Bellevue Public Schools Foundation Kids' Time is a before-and-after child care program for kindergarten through sixth-grade students. The program provides quality child care in each of Bellevue's 15 elementary schools under the guidance of trained caregivers in a structured and fun atmosphere. Proceeds from the Kids' Time program help support Bellevue Public Schools Foundation projects contributing to the education and success of BPS students. Kids' Time is

licensed through the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and complies with all standards and regulations. To learn more, please contact the BPS Foundation at 402-827-1858.



Bellevue Public Schools is one of eighteen districts receiving direct support from ESU 3 located in La Vista. Educational Service Units provide services for participating school districts, including staff development, technology, instructional materials, and purchasing support.



Bellevue Public Schools partners with Metro Community College (MCC), the University of Nebraska Omaha (UNO), and Doane University to provide our high school students the opportunity to earn

dual enrollment credit at a reduced cost in various courses and career education fields. Bellevue students participate in the Metropolitan Community College Career Academy program through our partnership with MCC. The MCC High School Career Academy offers over 20 programs of study at select MCC campuses and at Bellevue Public Schools' Frank Kumor Career Center. The program allows our high school juniors and seniors to learn specific career knowledge and skills before graduation.



MOEC serves as a forum and community for education professionals and is a catalyst for identifying high-priority issues common to member organizations and addressing these issues through joint task forces and projects. Through the consortium, BPS staff members collaborate with our surrounding school districts to share and learn best practices that support the needs of our students and staff.
