PROCUREMENT PLAN

CHILD NUTRITION PROGRAMS

The Clinton School District Child Nutrition Department, known herein as the SFA, in order to comply with the applicable provisions of the USDA procurement standards and any AFA Purchasing Policies and Procedures, has established and made accessible to all of its employees with authority to purchase for the Child Nutrition Programs, herein known as the CNP, the following Procurement Plan for the purchase of goods and services for the CNP's under its authority.

- I. Effective Date: July 14, 2025
- II. Purpose and Goal: The purpose of this Procurement Plan is to establish procedures for the procurement of food, equipment, other supplies, and services that will ensure that such materials and services are obtained in an effective manner and in compliance with all applicable federal and state laws. All procurement transactions of the AFA, without regard to dollar value, will be conducted in a manner that provides maximum open and free competition. It is the goal of the SFA to purchase only good quality merchandise and services, which will assist in meeting the goal of serving high quality meals at a reasonable cost.
- III. Authorized Purchasing Agents For the CNP: Nathan Meget, Superintendent; Leslie Lewis, Opa! Director, Buyer; and Natalie Blundell, Child Nutrition Director, Director of Purchasing; or others as approved by the SFA. The purchase of all goods and services will be done by the authorized agent(s) of the SFA in the central SFA office.
- IV. Open and Free Competition will exist to the maximum extent possible by, among other ways, (1) the maintenance of a request file for potential bidders; (2) involvement of all known vendors to the extent they are capable of meeting the needs of the SFA; (3) utilization of clear, fair and identical specifications; (4) the public announcement of the Procurement Plan annually or the issuing of same to any interested party; and (5) the advertising and/or posting of all bids, proposals, etc.
- V. Comparability of Prices and Products will be achieved through (1) the use of identical specifications, and (2) an on-going evaluation of products and services.
- VI. Adequate Documentation will be achieved through, among other ways, (1) bidder request files; (2) records of communication (telephone quotes, written quotations, proposals, bid instruments); (3) records of the opening and awarding of sealed bids, proposals, and quotations; (4) if the lowest bid, proposal, or quotation is not selected, documentation of the reasons; (5) post-award notification to all vendors who responded; and (6) other documentation as required.
- VII. Code of Conduct: No employee, officer or agent of the SFA nor any member of his immediate family, his or her partner, or an organization which employs, or is about to employ, any of the administration of a contract supported by Program funds if a conflict of interest, real or apparent, would be involved. The SFA's officers, employees, or agents shall neither solicit nor accept gratuities, favors, or

anything of monetary value from contractors, potential contractors, or parties to sub-agreements.

Additionally, Compliance with all applicable provisions of the Code of Governmental Ethics or any order, rule, or regulation promulgated thereunder is required.

Penalties, sanctions, or other disciplinary actions for violation of these standards will be determined by the Commission on Ethics for Public Employees as prescribed in the Code of Governmental Ethics and/or by Title 74 O.S. § 3401 et. Seq. also known as the Anti-Kickback Act of 1974.

- VIII. Procurement Plan Review Procedures: Procurement Actions will be reviewed by external auditors, thereby ensuring that established procedures for the procurement of food, equipment, other supplies and services that will ensure that such materials and services are obtained in an effective manner and in compliance with all applicable Federal and State Laws.
- IX. Contract Administration: (1) All purchases will be verified upon receipt; (2) assurance that all contractors and vendors conform in accordance with the terms, conditions, and specifications of their contracts or purchase orders will be realized; (3) all successful vendors and contractors will be informed as to how, when, and on what basis payments will be made. The following person(s) will be responsible for contract administration: Nathan Meget, superintendent; Natalie Blundell, C.N. Director, Leslie Lewis, Opaal Director, Buyer.
- X. Contracting With Small and Minority Firms, Women's Business Enterprises and Labor Surplus Area Firms: To the extent possible the above-named contractors will be offered contracts when they are potential sources for goods and services, and when economically feasible total requirements will be divided into smaller quantities and delivery requirements established to permit maximum participation by these contractors.
- XI. Contract Provision:
- A. All Contracts Other than Small Purchases: (1) Contracts other than small purchases will contain provisions or conditions which will allow for administrative, contractual, or legal remedies in instances where contractors, violate or breach contract terms and provide for such sanctions and penalties as may be appropriate. (2) All contracts other than small purchases will include a provision to the effect that the SFA, the State Agency, USDA, and Comptroller General of the United States, or any of their duly authorized representatives, will have access to any books, documents, papers, and records, or the contractor which are directly pertinent to that specific contract, for the purpose of making audit, examination, excerpts, and transactions.
- B. Contracts Over \$10,000: (1) All contracts in excess of \$10,000 will contain suitable provisions for termination by the grantee including the manner by which it will be affected and the basis for settlement. In addition, such contracts will describe conditions under which the contract may be terminated for default because of circumstances beyond the control of the contractor. (2) All contracts awarded in excess of \$10,000 by grantees and their contractors or subgrantees will contain a provision requiring compliance with Executive Order 11246, entitled "Equal Employment Opportunity", as

amended by Executive Order 11375, and as supplemented in Department of Labor regulations (41 Part 60).

- C. Contracts Over \$150,000: Contracts over \$150,000 will contain a provision which requires compliance with all applicable standards, orders, or requirements issued under Section 306 of the Clean Air Act (42 USC 1857 (h)), Section 508 of the Clean Water Act (33 USC 1368), Executive Order 11738, and Environmental Protection Agency regulations (40 CFR Part 15) which prohibit the use under nonexempt Federal Contracts, grants, or loans of facilities included on the EPA list of Violating Facilities. The provision will require reporting of violations to USDA and to the USEPA Assistant Administrator for Enforcement.
- D. All Contracts: All Contracts will recognize mandatory standards and policies relating to energy efficiency which are contained in the State energy conservation plan issued in compliance with the Energy Policy and Conservation Act (P.L. 94-163)

XII. Procurement Methods: The procurement methods that will be used by the SFA and the categories of goods and service that will be purchased by each method are as follows: Note: The \$10,000 threshold may apply to individual item or multiple item purchases on an aggregate basis. Aggregate is defined as any purchase or group of purchases estimated at \$10,000 or more and capable of being secured from a single source on a given date or purchase period. Breaking up purchases with the intent of circumventing formal advertising procedures is contrary to federal procurement regulations. Any change in the district's normal purchasing practices which results in the aggregate amount purchased becoming less than \$10,000 must be documented for review and audit purposes.

- Small Purchase Procedures will be used to purchase goods, equipment, and services where the aggregate cost is less than \$150,000, and fresh produce regardless of the dollar amount.

When small purchase procedures are used, the following conditions, stipulations, and terms will be met:

1. The goods, equipment, or services to be purchased will be adequately and consistently described for each prospective supplier so that each one can provide price quotes on the same merchandise or service;
2. Written or verbal "requests for quotations" for the goods, equipment, or services to be purchased will be made;
3. An adequate number of qualified sources will be contacted to provide such quotes. NOTE: The term "adequate number" is determined by local market conditions;
4. Responses to "requests for quotations" will be in either written form or verbal with a written confirmation;
5. Cost plus a percentage of cost method of purchasing is prohibited;
6. Price quotation responses will be retained with other Program documentation and records for a period of five (5) years after the end of the fiscal year to which they pertain.

- Competitive Sealed Bids

When competitive sealed bids are used, the following conditions, stipulations, and terms will be included:

1. The invitation to bid will be publicly advertised.
 2. Bids will be solicited from an adequate number of known suppliers in sufficient time prior to the date set for the opening of the bids.
 3. The invitations for bid will clearly define the items or services needed for the bidders to be able to properly respond. This includes product specifications and general purchasing conditions.
 4. All bids will be opened publicly at the time and place stated in the invitations for bid.
 5. A firm, fixed-price contract award will be made by written notice to the responsible bidder whose bid is lowest, assuming the bid conforms to the requirements in the invitation for bid, except that preference may be given to products produced, manufactured, or grown in Oklahoma which are equal in quality to products produced, manufactured, or grown outside the State, provided the cost does not exceed by more than five percent the cost of products which are equal in quality that are produced, manufactured, or grown outside the State.
 6. Where specified in the bidding documents, factors such as discounts, transportation costs and life cycle costs (for equipment), if applicable, will be considered in determining which bid is lowest.
 7. Payment discounts will only be used to determine the low bid when prior experience of the SFA indicates that such discounts are generally taken.
 8. Any and all bids may be rejected when there are sound documented reasons in the best interest of the Program.
 9. Cost plus a percentage of cost method of contracting is prohibited.
 10. All bids received will be documented and such documentation shall be maintained by the school district with other Program records for five (5) years after the end of the fiscal year to which they pertain.
- A. Competitive Negotiation will be used whenever competitive sealed bids are determined to be inappropriate, unfeasible or impossible, and will adhere to the following conditions, stipulations and terms:

1. Proposals will be solicited from an adequate number (at a minimum, two) of qualified sources to permit reasonable competition.
 2. The request for proposals will be publicized and reasonable request by other sources to compete must be honored to the maximum extent possible.
 3. The request for proposal will identify all significant evaluation factors including price or cost where required and their relative importance.
 4. The SFA will provide a mechanism: (1) for technical evaluation of the proposals received, (2) to determine which responsible bidders will be further contacted for the purpose of further written and verbal discussions, and (3) for selection of contract award.
 5. The contract will be awarded to the responsible bidder whose proposal is most advantageous to the SFA when price and other factors are considered. Either a fixed-price or a cost reimbursable-type contract may be awarded.
 6. Cost plus a percentage of cost method contracting is prohibited.
 7. All requests for proposals received will be documented and such documentation shall be retained by the school district with other Program records for five (5) years after the end of the fiscal year to which they pertain.
- B. Noncompetitive Negotiation is procurement through solicitation of a proposal from only one source and will only be used when the procurement is not feasible under small purchase procedures, competitive sealed bids (formal advertising), or noncompetitive negotiation will be justified in writing and will be available for audit and review. As with the other methods of procurement, such documentation will be maintained with other Program records for five (5) years after the end of the fiscal year to which they pertain, and cost plus a percentage of cost method of contracting is prohibited.

Circumstances under which procurement may be made by noncompetitive negotiations are limited to the following:

1. The merchandise or service is available only from a single source;
2. A public emergency exists and the urgency for the requirement will not permit the delay involved with competitive sealed bids (formal advertising) or competitive negotiation;
3. After solicitation from a number of sources, competition is found to be lacking.

Changes in the Procurement Plan will be made as conditions warrant upon the approval of the SFA's School Board.

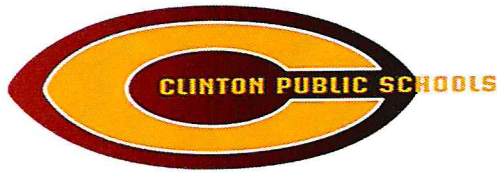

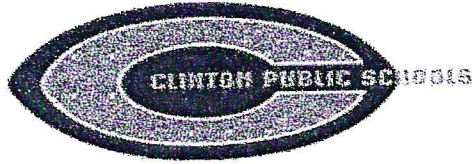

Jobs for Oklahoma's Graduates (JAGOK) by CareerTech 2025-2026 Memorandum of Agreement

This Memorandum of Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into on July 1, 2025 ("Effective Date") by and between the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education, ("ODCTE"), and the **Clinton School District**, ("School District") for the purpose of establishing a Jobs for America's Graduates (JAG) accredited multi-year JAG program at **Clinton High School**.

Program Description: The JAGOK program ensures that at-risk high school students remain in school and attain leadership and employability skills through classroom and work-based learning experiences and graduate high school. These students will receive twelve (12) months of follow-up services by their JAG Specialist to ensure they are successfully transitioned into a career and/or a postsecondary education.

Performance Goals:

The five (5) primary performance goals of the JAG Model in serving seniors are results-oriented and measurable:

- a 90% graduation/GED rate;
- a 75% overall success rate at the end of twelve (12) months after graduation, with participants either employed in a job leading to a career, in the military, or enrolled in a postsecondary education or training, or a combination of work and postsecondary education;
- 60% of graduates are employed;
- 60% of employed graduates are in full-time jobs leading to careers; and
- 80% of the graduates are employed full-time and/or are combining work and school.

The performance goals are process-oriented and measurable in grades 10-12:

- Daily recording of information and data using **JAGForce** to assure accuracy;
- Reduction in the number of absences compared to prior year;
- Improvement in GPA compared to prior year;
- Reduction in the number of suspensions and expulsions compared to prior year;
- Reduction in disciplinary actions;
- Participation in the student-led Career Association;
- Involvement in no less than ten (10) hours of community service per month;
- Enrollment in summer school to overcome any deficiencies;
- A return to school rate of 80% (as measured in September of each year);
- Reduction in the number of barriers while enrolled in the Multi-Year Program;
- Achieve the minimal number of 120 contact hours per school year;

Scope of Work:

School District Responsibilities

1. Employ a full-time (12-month position), mutually acceptable, certified teacher qualified to fulfill the responsibilities of the JAGOK Specialist. The **inaugural year** of the school's JAG program, the Specialist is responsible for no less than 30 and no more than 45 students who are most at-risk of leaving school before graduation and/or becoming unemployed or underemployed after graduation. The first year of the program may reflect less than 30 students as JAGOK Specialist receives on-boarding and engagement in a training plan.
2. Work with ODCTE in providing performance evaluations of the JAGOK Specialist to ensure performance goals are being met and job responsibilities are being fulfilled for the position. See Appendix A for JAGOK Specialist Responsibilities.
3. Provide classroom space and equipment for the JAGOK Specialist to conduct competency-based instruction which follows the JAGOK/JAG Model Program. This should be a regularly scheduled class or classes that include no less than nine (9) months of in-school and twelve (12) months of follow-up services for identified students in the 10th, 11th, and 12th grades. First year, 10th and 11th, and 12th (30-45 students total) **Second year (+)** 10th, 11th and 12th; including the graduates from the year before. (40-60 students total).
4. Provide academic credit toward graduation to those students who successfully complete the JAGOK/JAG program.
5. Establish an in-school advisory committee to assist the JAGOK Specialist in recruiting, screening, and selecting students most in need of services delivered in the multi-year JAG program and provide on-going support for students and the JAGOK program. At a minimum, the committee should consist of a representative from administration, counseling, faculty and the JAGOK Specialist. The Advisory Committee and Specialist are mutually responsible for recruiting, screening, and selecting students who satisfy JAG criteria to receive the in-school and follow-up services of the program.
6. Provide scheduled time for the JAGOK Specialist to conduct interviews to identify, screen, select and enroll qualified students in the JAGOK accredited program.
7. 2nd year: Provide adequate space for JAG Career Association activities and enable students to attend statewide leadership and career development conferences held in the State of Oklahoma. Transportation should be provided for students to attend these events.
8. 2nd year: Coordinate JAGOK program and the JAG Career Association with other school programs and services where appropriate.
9. Support JAGOK's efforts to involve parents, family, employers, and community to meet the needs of JAGOK students to keep them in school through graduation and ensure full cooperation and participation during the post-graduation follow-up period.

11. Provide feedback to ODCTE regarding the JAG program for continuous improvement and to maintain accreditation by Jobs for Americas graduates.
12. Classes should be conducted in the morning, and the specialist should be provided a minimum of one class hour of planning, and two class hours release time in the afternoon for the JAGOK Specialist to perform JAGForce documentation, employer marketing, job development, and placement responsibilities. Active face-to-face contacts with employers are essential to a successful Multi-Year JAG Programs. All engagement is documented.
13. Provide adequate school-based supervision to ensure that the JAGOK Specialist fulfills the responsibilities of this Memorandum of Agreement and achieves the performance standards of the JAG Program Model.
14. Allow time for JAGOK Specialist to attend weekly virtual JAGOK Specialist training, the 2-day in-person JAGOK State training in July in Stillwater OK, the annual JAG National Training Seminar (July), the Pre-NTS Workshops, JAGOK State competition, and the National Student Leadership Conference.

ODCTE Responsibilities

1. Provide technical assistance and training to the JAGOK Specialist and other key staff of the participating school on the successful implementation and operation of a JAG accredited program.
2. Provide JAGOK Specialist weekly virtual JAGOK Specialist training, and the 2-day in-person JAGOK State training in July in Stillwater OK,
3. Provide JAG Model Books computer files including a SPECIALIST HANDBOOK, CAREER ASSOCIATION HANDBOOK, and NATIONAL CURRICULUM MODULES and other program materials, publications, access to the JAG Genius Learning Management System, JAGForce and national communications to the participating schools. The JAGForce program (training provided) provides documentation tracking of students served, services delivered, and outcomes achieved. Statewide and school performance outcomes are used in JAG's National Accreditation Process. State and local affiliates must receive standard accreditation to remain an affiliate in good standing. It is understood that it may be the third year of operation before performance goals are achieved.
4. Provide staff support and conduct periodic school quality assurance reviews and consulting visits to give encouragement, support, and feedback to JAGOK Specialist. Provide a periodic review of documentation required of a JAG accredited program committed to tracking students, services, and outcomes and 12-month follow-up period. Every 1-2 years, JAG will conduct a site review and prepare an accreditation report for review by the JAGOK management team, and participating school and JAGOK Specialist.
5. Starting the second school year (+), sponsor the annual JAGOK State Career Association Development Conference, utilizing input from students, JAGOK Specialists, and others.
6. Conduct periodic school visits and reviews and assist JAG in its accreditation process to ensure conformity with the performance standards as promulgated by JAGOK and JAG.

Funding:

1. Through partnership with Oklahoma Department of Human Services (DHS), ODCTE will provide a \$55,000.00 annual allocation to the School District for each approved JAGOK program to cover a portion of operational expenses. This allocation will be paid 1/12 on a monthly basis. See Appendix B for funding agreement details.
2. If the JAGOK Specialist position is vacant for three (3) months or greater and/or the JAGOK program has no students, the monthly payment amount may be adjusted. Exceptions may be made to this in the first year.
3. All JAGOK program expenditures shall be OCAS coded using Project Code _TBD_ and Source of +- Revenue Code _TBD_.
4. An OCAS Detailed Expenditure Report shall be submitted to ODCTE at fiscal year-end. Appropriate documentation of expenditures should be maintained.

Agreement Period:

1. This agreement shall be in effect for a period beginning on the Effective Date of this Agreement and ending June 30, 2026.

Termination:

1. **Termination Due to Unavailability of Funds** – The payment of money by ODCTE under any provisions hereto is contingent upon the availability of funding. In the event funds for this Agreement become unavailable, ODCTE shall have the right to terminate this Agreement without penalty except for services already rendered.
2. **Termination for Convenience or Cause** – The parties agree that either party may terminate this Agreement for any reason upon 30 days' written notice to the other party. When the Agreement is terminated, ODCTE shall be liable only for services already rendered.

Audit and Records Clause:

1. As used in this clause and pursuant to 67 O.S. §203, "record" includes a document, book, paper, photograph, microfilm, computer tape, disk, record, sound recording, film recording, video record, accounting procedures and practices, and other data, regardless of type and regardless of whether such items are in written form, in the form of computer data, or in any other form. School District agrees any pertinent federal or State agency or governing entity of ODCTE shall have the right to examine and audit, at no additional cost to ODCTE, all records relevant to the execution and performance of the Agreement.
2. School District is required to retain records relative to the Agreement for the duration of the Agreement and for a period of seven (7) years following completion or termination of the Agreement. If a claim, audit, litigation, or other action involving such records is started before the end of the seven-year period, the records are required to be maintained for two (2) years from the date that all issues arising out of the action are resolved, or until the end of the seven (7) year retention period, whichever is later.

Miscellaneous:

1. **Equal Employment Opportunities and Affirmative Action** - The parties ascribe to principles of equal opportunity and affirmative action. Through this Agreement, the parties reaffirm the policies set forth in their respective statutes and policies. However, in mutual recognition of the sovereignty of each, each party is responsible for its actions only with respect to its own applicable statutes and policies, as the case may be.
2. **Invalidity and Severability** - In the event that any provision of this Agreement shall be held invalid, such provisions shall be null and void. The validity of the remaining provisions of the Agreement shall not in any way be affected thereby. It is the intention of the parties that if any provision is considered to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, there will be added in lieu thereof a provision as similar in terms and content as is possible to be legal and valid.
3. **Governing Law and Venue** - Any claim, dispute, or litigation relating to the Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State without regard to application of choice of law principles. Pursuant to 74 O.S. §85.14, where federally granted funds are involved, applicable federal laws, rules and regulations shall govern to the extent necessary to ensure benefit of such federal funds to the State. Venue for any action, claim, dispute, or litigation relating in any way to the Agreement, shall be in Payne County, Oklahoma.
4. **Modifications and Amendment** - This Agreement shall not be altered, extended, or amended except by mutual consent of the parties in writing and signed by both parties.
5. **Assignment** – The parties agree that the rights and responsibilities of this Agreement are not assignable to any other party, except provided herein.
6. **Disruption of Services** – Performance may be suspended by either party for any acts of nature or natural disaster, serious disturbances or riots, fire or other casualty resulting in the loss of space, or any other just cause that prevents the performance of any party.
7. **Breach or Failure to Perform** – Material breaches or substantial failure to perform any required duty or contractual obligation by either party shall be grounds for termination or recession of this Agreement. Any outstanding payments shall be paid subject to the terms of this Agreement.
8. **Liability** – Nothing herein shall be construed as conferring upon either party the authority to assume or incur any liability or any obligation of any kind, express or implied, in the name of or on behalf of the other party, respectively.

Entire Agreement:

This Memorandum of agreement constitutes the entire Agreement and understanding between the parties and supersedes all prior and/or contemporaneous discussions, representations, or contracts, whether written or verbal of the parties relating to the work to be performed.

Appendix A: Responsibilities of the JAGOK Specialist

The following are the job responsibilities for the JAGOK Specialist:

1. Recruit and select: First year, 10th and 11th, and 12th (30-45 students total) Second year 10th, 11th and 12th; including the graduates from the year before. (40-60 students total) screened students to the program who satisfy the criteria as set out by JAGOK/JAG. Targeted high school students for the program include those who are at-risk prior to graduation; who are not taking advantage of their high school year(s); most likely to be unemployed after graduation; or, undecided on a career path with no plans for a postsecondary education. Since participation in the JAGOK program is limited, students must **need, want, and can benefit** from the services available through in-school and one year follow-up phases of a JAG Model program.
2. Establish an in-school Advisory Committee to assist in recruiting, screening, and selecting students most in need of services delivered in the multi-year JAG program and provide on-going support for the students and the JAGOK program. At a minimum, the committee will include one representative from administration, counseling, and the faculty as well as the Specialist. The Advisory Committee and JAG Specialist are mutually responsible for recruiting, screening, and selecting students who satisfy JAG criteria to receive the in-school and follow-up services of the program.
3. Utilize in the class the JAG National curriculum which is endorsed and based upon JAG's eighty-seven (87) competencies for multi-year program participants. For grades 10-12, JAG students should recognize improvement and school retention. For the first-year 12th grade only participants, participants should attain no less than the thirty-seven (37) JAG employability skills taught over the course of the school year. A recommended sequence will be provided to the JAGOK Specialist in the initial New Specialist Training.
4. 2nd - Year: Organize the establishment of a highly motivational, career-oriented student-led organization. Each student will be a member of the Career Association for purposes of belonging, creating a sense of ownership, building self-esteem, and developing leadership and followership skills. Each student will be required to give a minimum of ten (10) hours of community service which can be performed individually or in groups. Incorporate community service into the program to increase student awareness of the needs of the community and develop leadership, fellowship, and teamwork skills.
5. Work with students and other staff/faculty to provide remediation and/or tutoring required for students to improve their basic education skills and graduate with their class. Provision of any necessary services required to help students overcome barriers to staying in school, graduating, becoming employed and/or pursuing a postsecondary education.
6. Provide career counseling. Provide personal counseling referrals to school or community-based services as needed to overcome the barriers to high stakes tests, graduation, employment, and career entry and advancement.

7. Attend JAGOK staff development experiences and JAGOK staff meetings. Work with ODCTE staff to assist with special events or peer-based training as needed.
8. Develop work-based learning and/or job shadowing experiences linked to the JAG National curriculum modules to enhance student learning and employability skills to gain employment in their chosen career field.
9. Develop and provide work-based learning experiences for students during the 12-month follow-up phase of the program.
10. Contact graduates and non-graduates (at least monthly) and employers (three times) during the 12-month follow-up period; maintain contact with multi-year participants during the summer months to increase the probability of their returning to school and graduating.
11. Provide personal and confidential information for screening in accordance with local and state laws governing those working directly with students in schools.
12. Complete and maintain all required documentation including JAGForce electronic documentation. Submit properly completed written and electronic documentation as directed by ODCTE and JAG National.
13. Work with ODCTE Staff to complete all monitoring agreements and documentation required by funding sources.
14. Participate in a performance evaluation conducted by ODCTE annually to determine if JAGOK and JAG standards are being upheld.
15. Develop a positive working relationship with local communities, including employers, postsecondary or technology centers, and community services organizations for the purpose of promoting and establishing the local JAG accredited program in accordance with the JAG program model.

P. Right to Representation

ARTICLE II-P: RIGHT TO REPRESENTATION

A. Members of the bargaining unit shall have the right, if so desired, to be accompanied by a Clinton teacher at any disciplinary conference with administrators. A disciplinary conference is defined as a conference with a teacher and their supervisor which will result in documentation that shall be placed in a permanent personnel file or be documented as part of the Oklahoma Teacher and Leader Effectiveness system. If documentation of a disciplinary conference is to be made, the administrator shall:

1. give reasonable notice (1 working day), except in emergency situations, of said scheduled conference.
2. inform the member of the subject to be discussed. (07-08)

B. If documentation of a disciplinary conference is to be made, the teacher shall have the right to have a representative present during the conference.

1. Administrators are to notify the teacher if a conference is of a disciplinary nature 24 hours in advance for the teacher to request representation of their choice during said meetings.
2. If the teacher is asked to attend a disciplinary conference and desires representation, the teacher must notify administration that representation has been notified and if the representation will be attending the meeting.
3. The administrator shall have the right to have a witness present during such conferences. (24-25)

PERSONAL ELECTRONIC DEVICES

It is the policy of the Clinton Board of Education that a student may possess a personal electronic device while on school premises, or while in transit under the authority of the school, or while attending any function sponsored or authorized by the school upon consent of both the student's parent or guardian, and the superintendent or the superintendent's designee. Students may be issued a device by the school district such as a laptop, tablet or other electronic device. School-issued devices or school-approved devices are exempt from the requirements of this policy and shall be utilized only for educational purposes by students.

Students are prohibited from utilizing cell phones and personal electronic devices while on the campus of a public school district from bell to bell. Exceptions may be made as follows:

1. Emergency use of cell phones or personal electronic devices by students during the school day. Emergency use includes situations where immediate communication is needed for safety or urgent personal matters. This includes, but is not limited to:
 - a. Medical Emergencies – Calling 911 or a parent if a student or someone nearby is having a severe health crisis (e.g., asthma attack, allergic reaction, seizure).; or
 - b. Natural Disasters or Lockdowns – Communicating with law enforcement or family during events like tornados, fires, lockdowns, or other emergencies affecting the school; or
2. Use of cell phones or personal electronic devices by students who use them to monitor health issues. This includes, but is not limited to, glucose monitoring which may occur multiple times during the school day; or
3. Students with special needs may use cell phones or personal electronic devices during class time or during the school day if their IEP, Medical Plan, or 504 Plan explicitly requires it as assistive technology for medically or educationally necessary purposes. To qualify for this exception, the use must be listed as a documented accommodation necessary for instruction or communication within the student's IEP, Medical Plan, or 504 Plan.

“Bell to bell” means the time between the first bell ringing at the start of the school day to begin instructional time until the dismissal bell at the end of the school day to end instructional time.

“Personal electronic device” means a personal device capable of connecting to a smartphone, the Internet, or a cellular or Wi-Fi network, or directly connecting to another similar device. Personal electronic devices include, but are not limited to, smart watches, smart headphones, laptops, tablets, and smart glasses. Personal electronic devices shall not include school-issued or school approved devices that are specifically limited for use in classroom instruction.

Students found to be in possession of or using a personal electronic device in violation of the rules shall be subject to disciplinary action under the student discipline policy. Punishment for violation will be determined by the administration on a case-by-case basis.

STUDENTS

- A. For all students in Clinton Public Schools, personal wireless devices will only be accessed and operated outside of the regular school day unless an emergency involves imminent physical danger or a school administrator authorizes the student to use the device. If a student brings a phone to school, it is to be turned off and kept in their backpack at all times.
- B. Students will not send, share, view, or possess pictures, text messages, emails, or other material depicting sexually explicit conduct in electronic or any other form on a cell phone or other electronic device while the student is on school grounds, at school-sponsored events or on school buses or vehicles provided by the district;
- C. When a school official has reasonable suspicion, based on objective and articulable facts, that a student is using a telecommunications device in a manner that violates the law or school rules, the official may confiscate the device. Any personal wireless communication device that is confiscated will be returned to the student or the student's parent/guardian at the end of the school day.
- D. Students are responsible for the devices they bring to school. The district will not be responsible for the loss, theft, or destruction of devices brought onto school property or to school-sponsored events;
- E. Students will comply with any additional rules developed by the school concerning the appropriate use of personal wireless devices.
- F. Students found to be using any personal electronic device for any illegal purpose, violation of privacy, or to in any way send or receive personal messages, data, or information that would contribute to or constitute cheating on tests or examinations shall be subject to discipline and the device may be confiscated by the administration of the school district. Any personal wireless communication device that is confiscated will be returned to the student or the student's parent/guardian at the end of the school day.
- G. Students violating this rule may be disallowed from carrying any wireless telecommunication device following the incident unless the device is utilized to monitor a health condition

EMPLOYEES

- A. Personal wireless devices may only be used during work time if they further the employee's performance of their professional responsibilities. No employee may use work time to engage in any personal electronic or digital communication, Internet activity, gaming, social media posts, etc. Employees will make reasonable efforts to use district resources rather than personal wireless devices for electronic or digital communications with other employees, parents, and students.
- B. No individual may use any personal wireless device while operating a district vehicle. Personal wireless devices may not be used by employees to photograph or record conversations or events outside private areas without first obtaining consent to record from all parties, with exceptions allowed according to the Oklahoma Open Records Act. Administrative approval for student recordings will consider whether prior approval has been granted from parents/guardians and whether the recording would identify a specific category of students, such as special education students.
- C. School personnel cannot communicate with students one-on-one via text, email, or other digital means unless the parent or guardian is also part of the conversation. Employees may only communicate with students on school-approved platforms.
- D. No employee may use a personal wireless device to engage in conduct that is illegal or which could be construed as inappropriate conduct with a student or students. If an employee receives an inappropriate electronic or digital communication from a student or parent, the communication must be promptly reported to the employee's supervisor. The district acknowledges that personal wireless communications devices are the employee's property. Unless an administrator has reasonable suspicion that an employee's personal equipment contains prohibited content, an administrator may not inspect an employee's personal equipment without the employee's express consent.

WARNING: Possessing, taking, disseminating, transferring, or sharing obscene, pornographic, lewd, or otherwise illegal images, photographs, or communications, whether by electronic data transfer or otherwise (commonly called texting, sexting, emailing, and other modes of electronic or digital communication) may constitute a crime under state and federal law. Any person possessing, taking, disseminating, transferring, or sharing obscene, pornographic, lewd, or otherwise illegal images, photographs, or communications will be reported to law enforcement and other appropriate state or federal agencies, which may result in arrest, criminal prosecution, and inclusion of sexual offender registries.
