To provide a rigorous curriculum and opportunities for academic enrichment. We believe that students should be allowed to extend their learning process and enhance their social responsibility. Therefore, we are committed to providing these students options that are integrated with the regular school program.

The high ability learner program is designed to identify students in grades 3-12 who exhibit high performance capabilities. Appropriate services shall be provided to these students.

Program Goals:

The goal of the HAL program is to provide a differentiated program that will meet the needs of our district’s high ability learners. The program will strive to:

- Identify students who demonstrate potential abilities of high performance in recognized areas of giftedness.
- Provide education services that meet the needs of all high ability learners.
- Provide professional development opportunities for staff to engage and differentiate instruction.
- Follow the identification procedures as outlined in the district identification procedures.

Identification of High Ability Learners

Screening Process:

The High Ability Learner coordinator will gather all achievement test scores and select a committee. All students in grades 3-12 will be screened for our district’s high ability services based on NWEA MAP scores in the areas of reading, language usage, mathematics and science. Teachers who believe that students should receive services but may not meet all of the criteria can submit a letter of recommendation with collected data to the selection committee.

Criteria:

- Students who score in the 95% in one of the four MAP tests.
- Students who score in the 90% in two of the four MAP tests.
- Teacher Recommendation to the committee with evidence.

The selection committee’s decision is final and will be communicated to students who are selected.

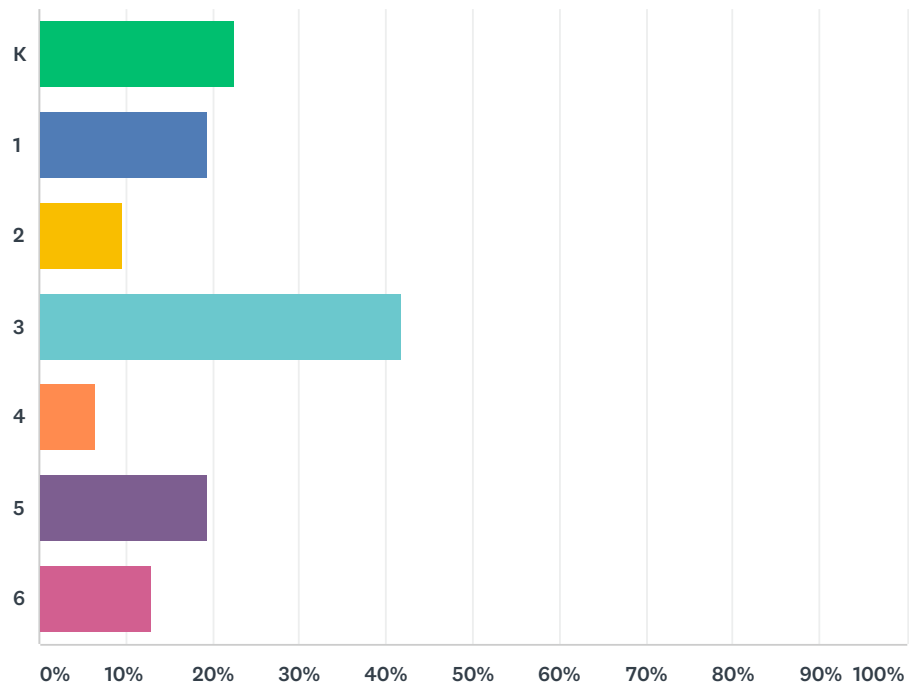

Q1 In what grades do you have children currently enrolled? Check all that apply.

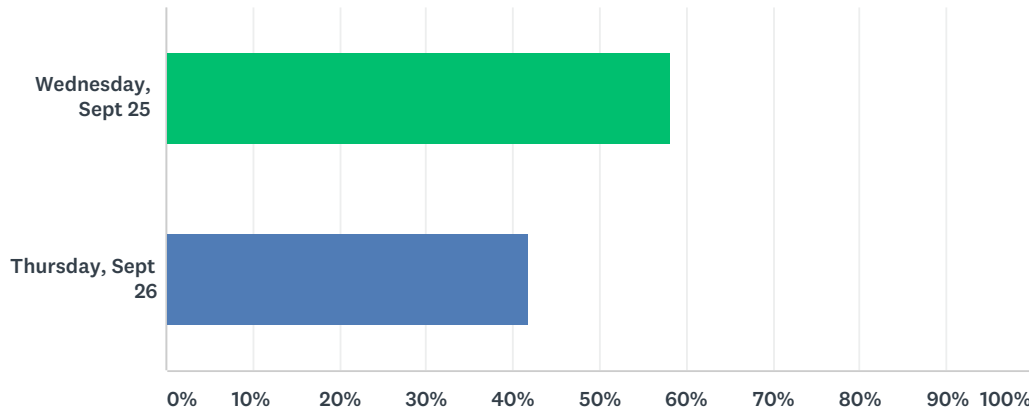

Q2 On which night did you attend Parent Teacher Conferences?

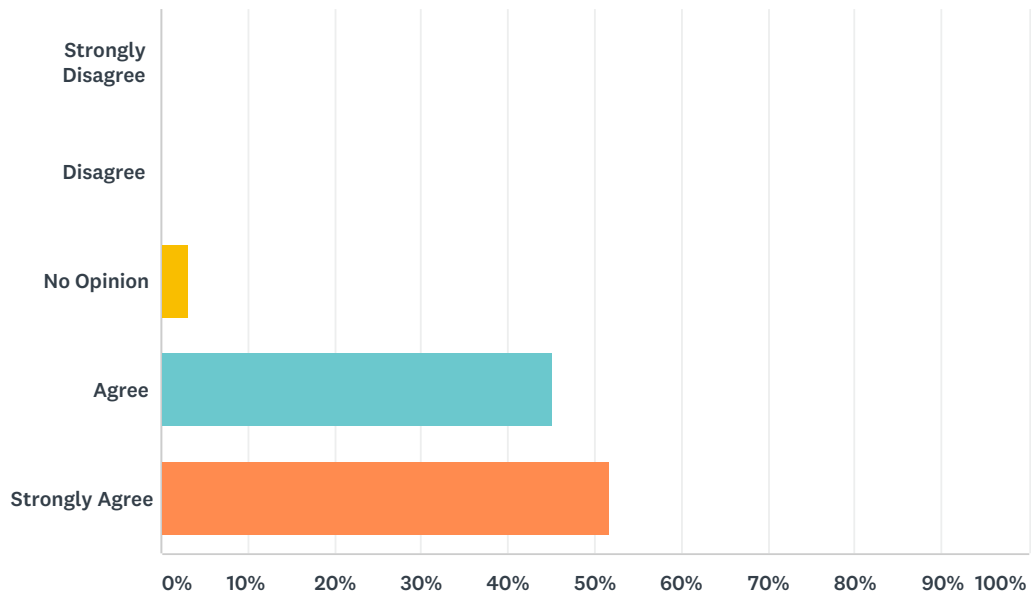

Q3 I was provided with relevant information regarding my child's academic progress?

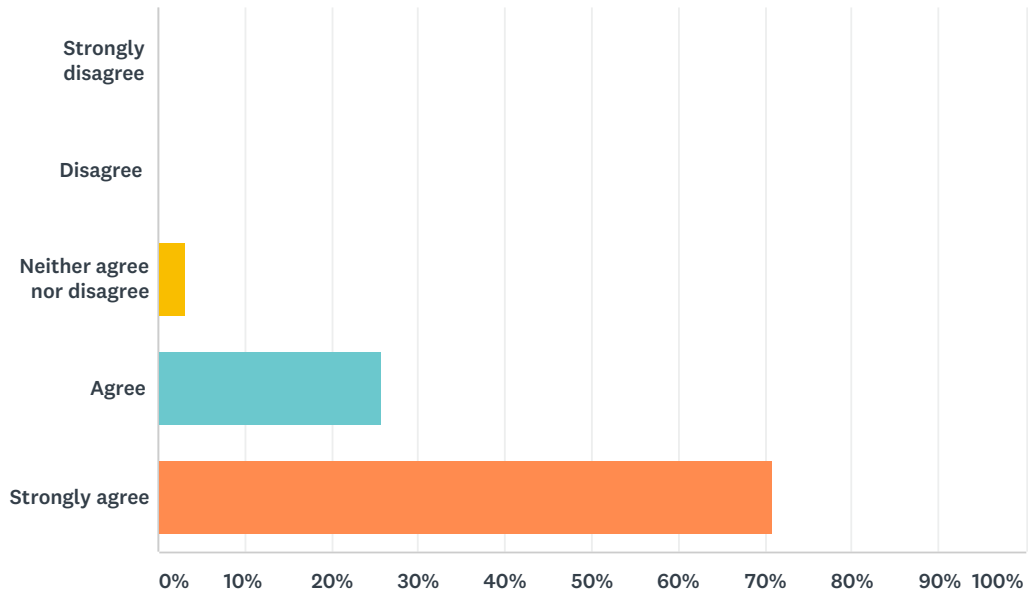

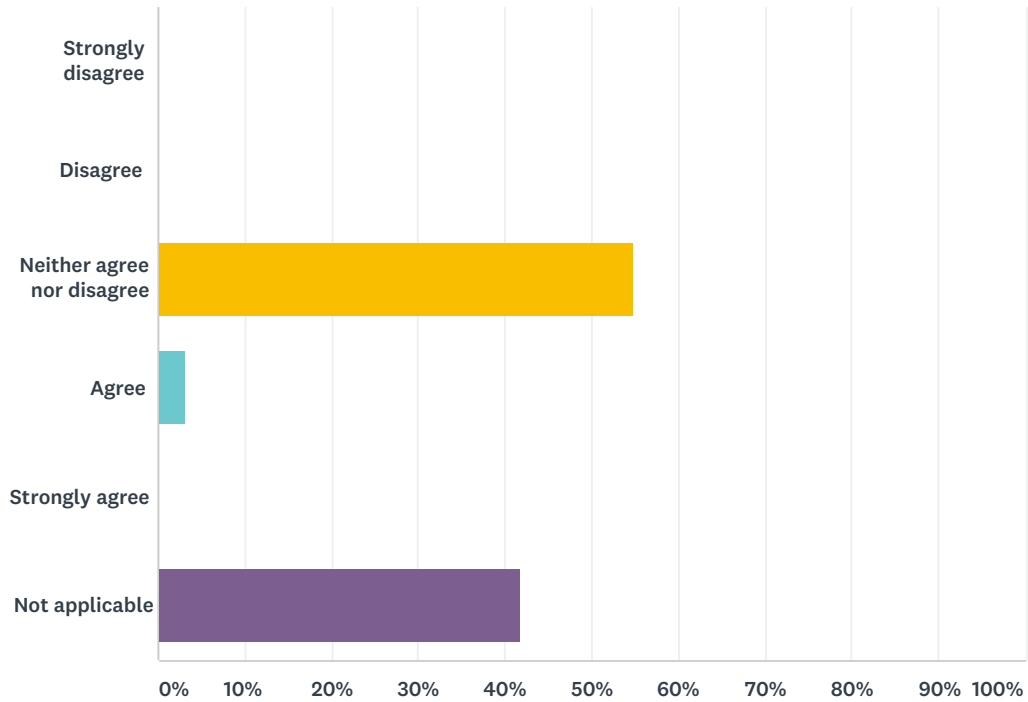

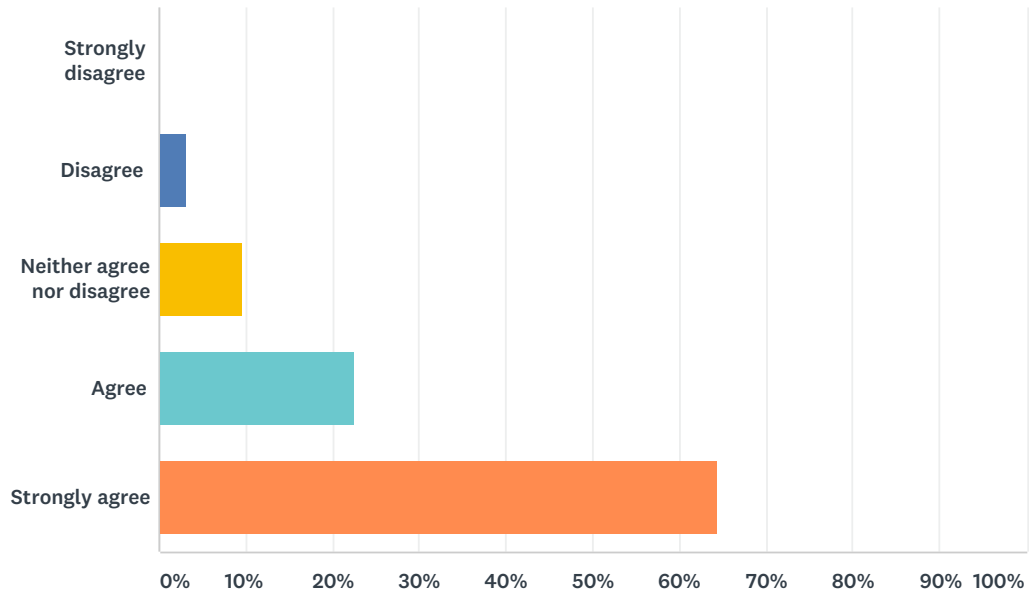

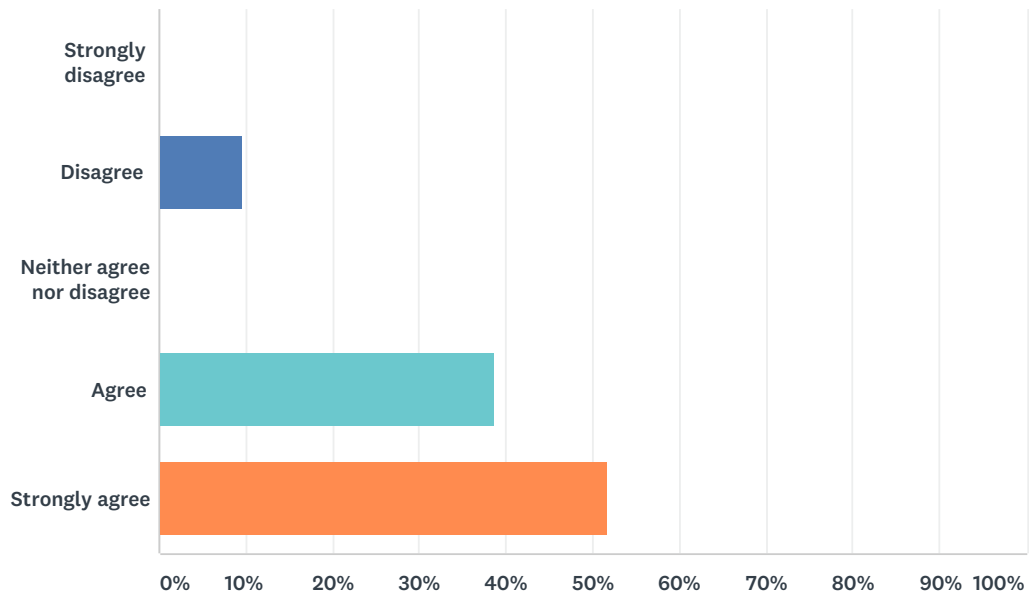

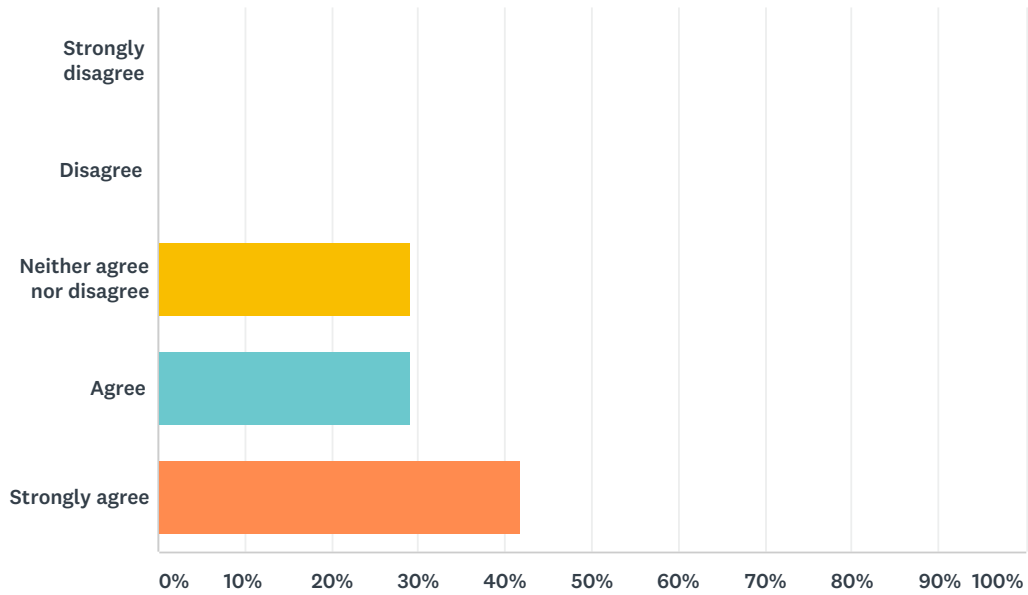

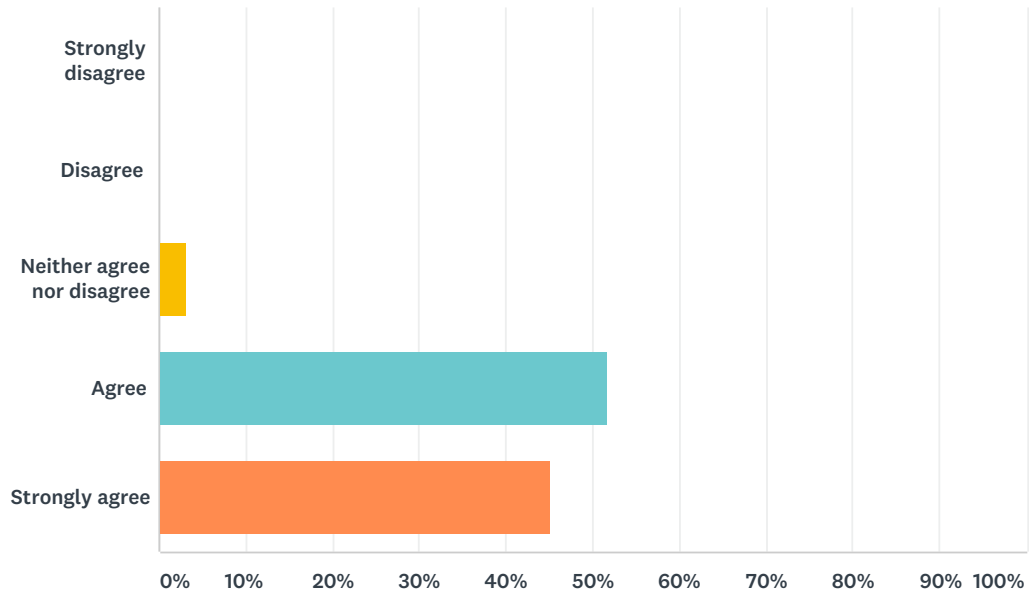

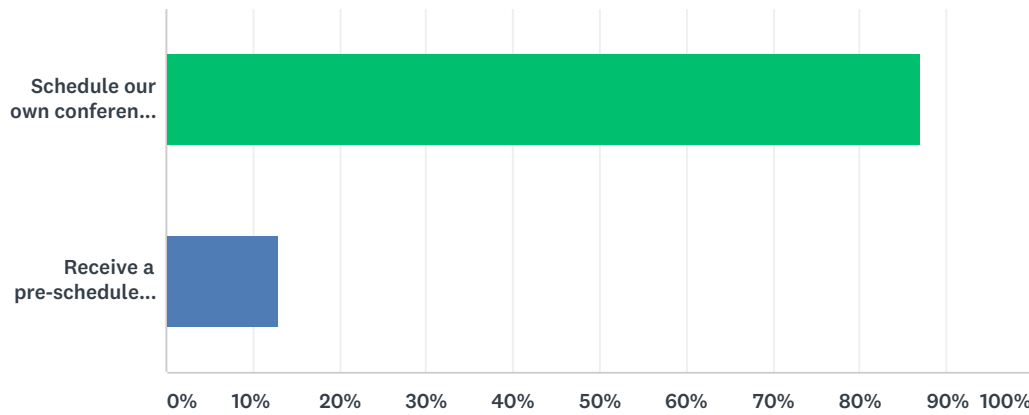

Q2 On which night did you attend Parent Teacher Conferences?

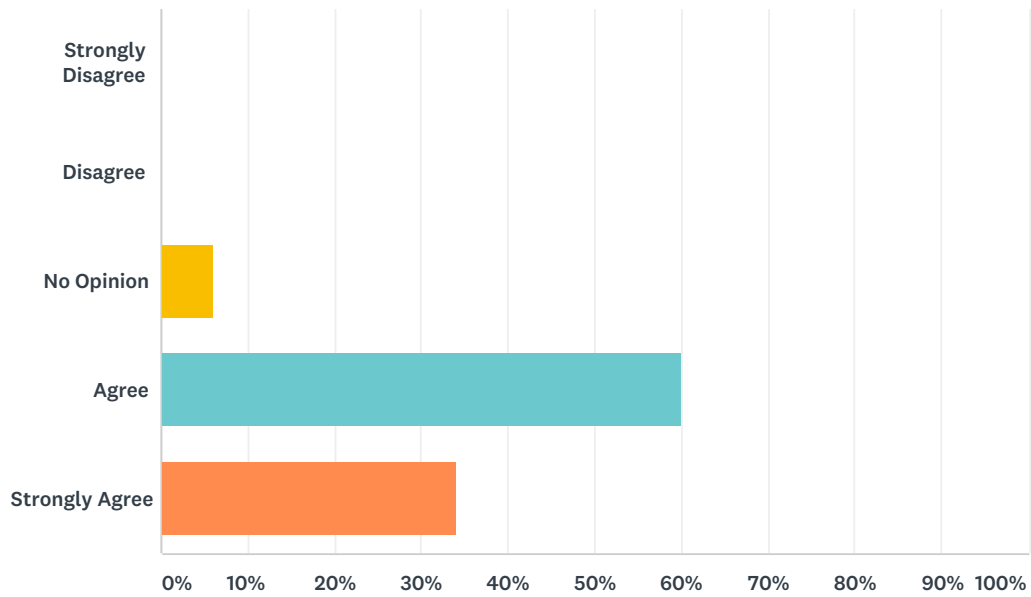

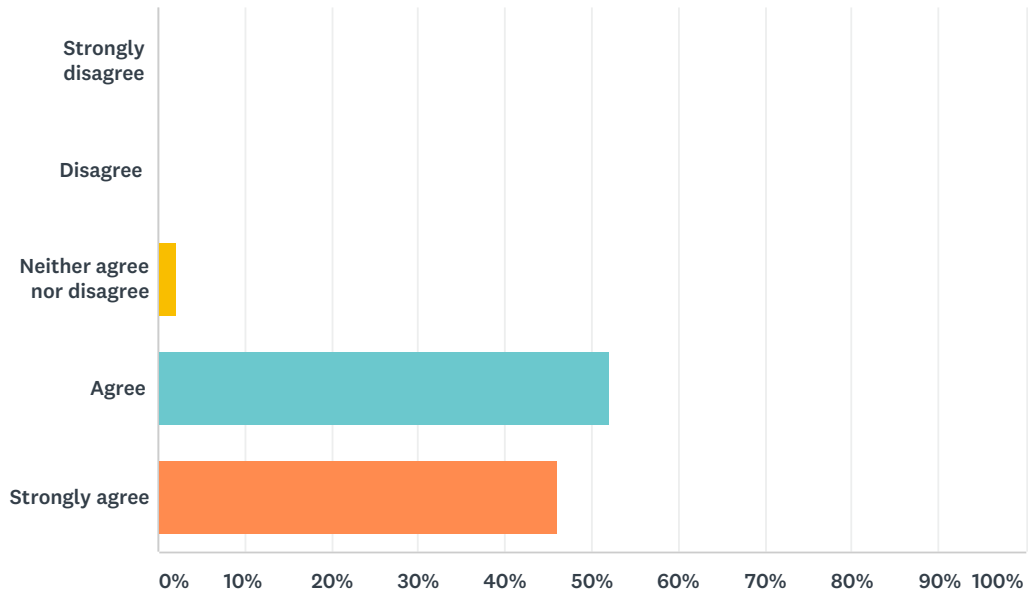

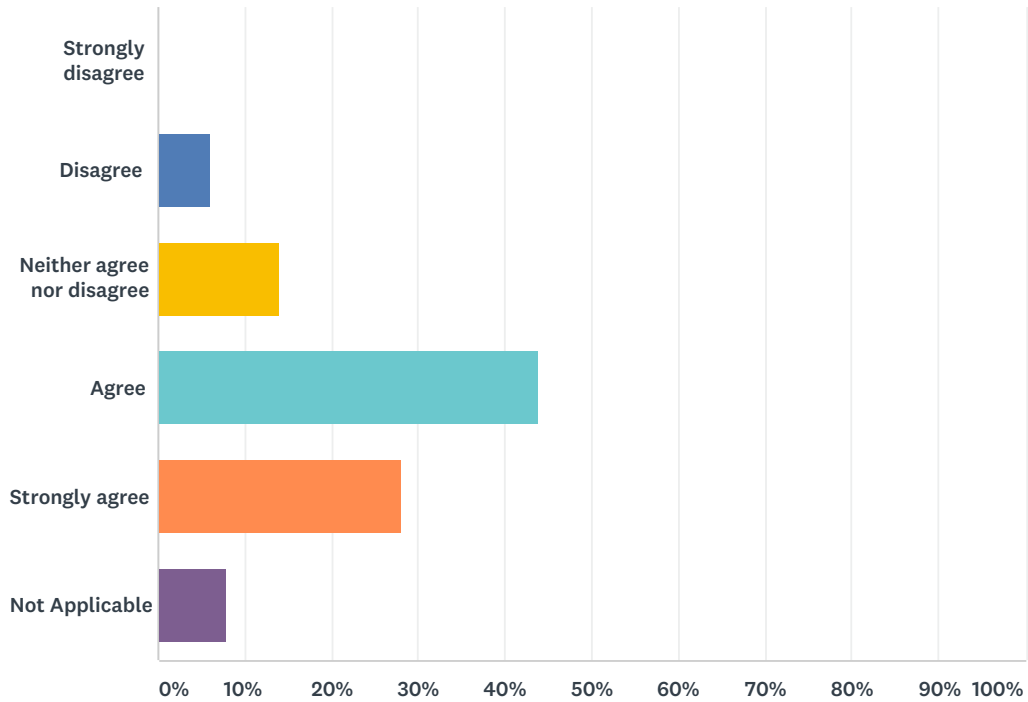

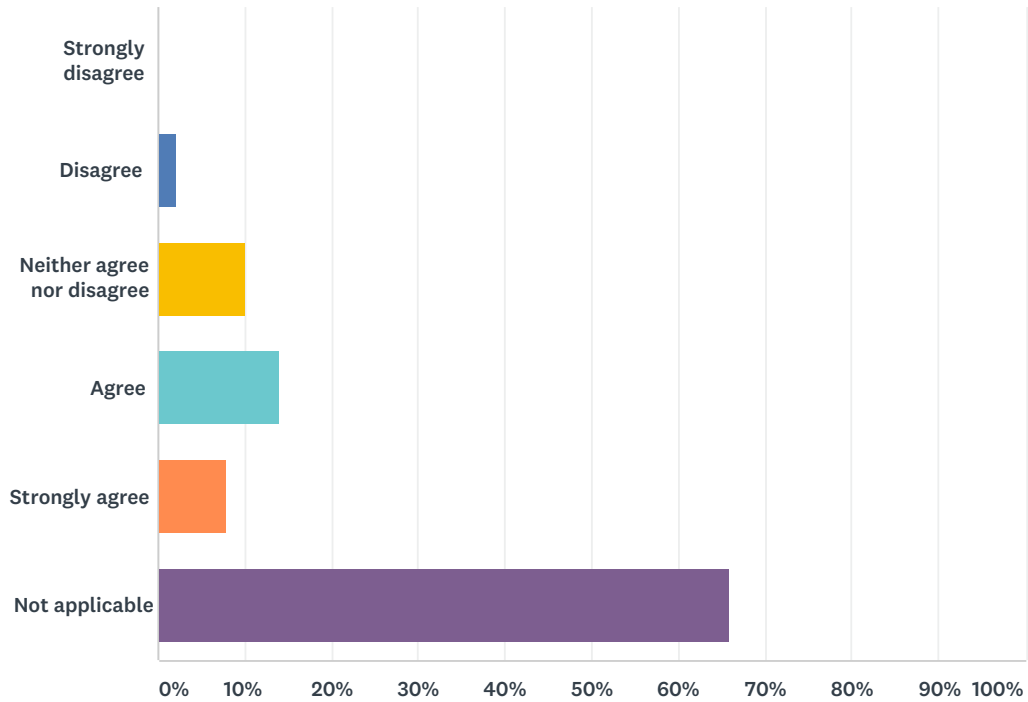

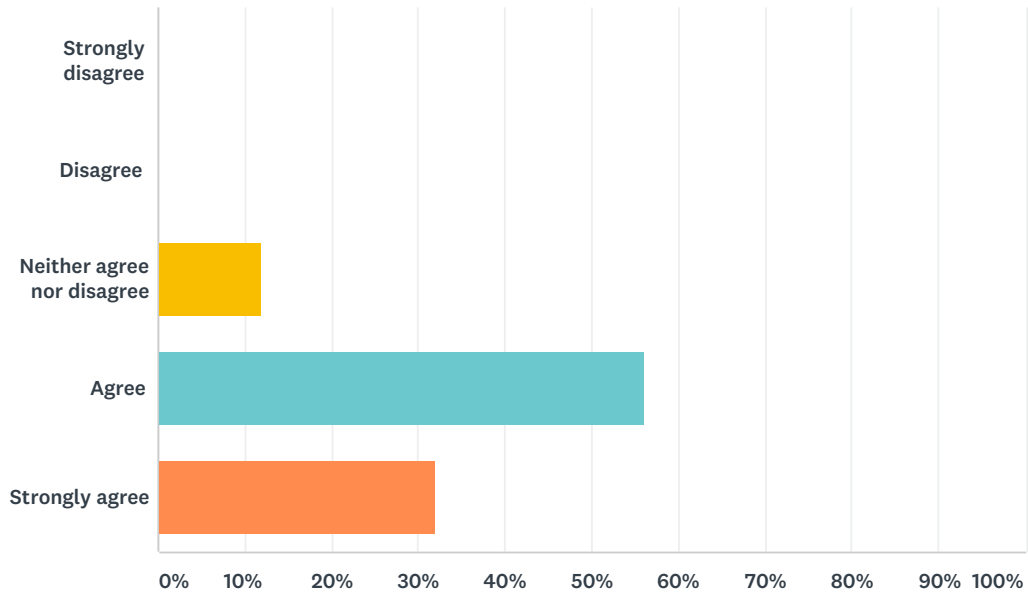

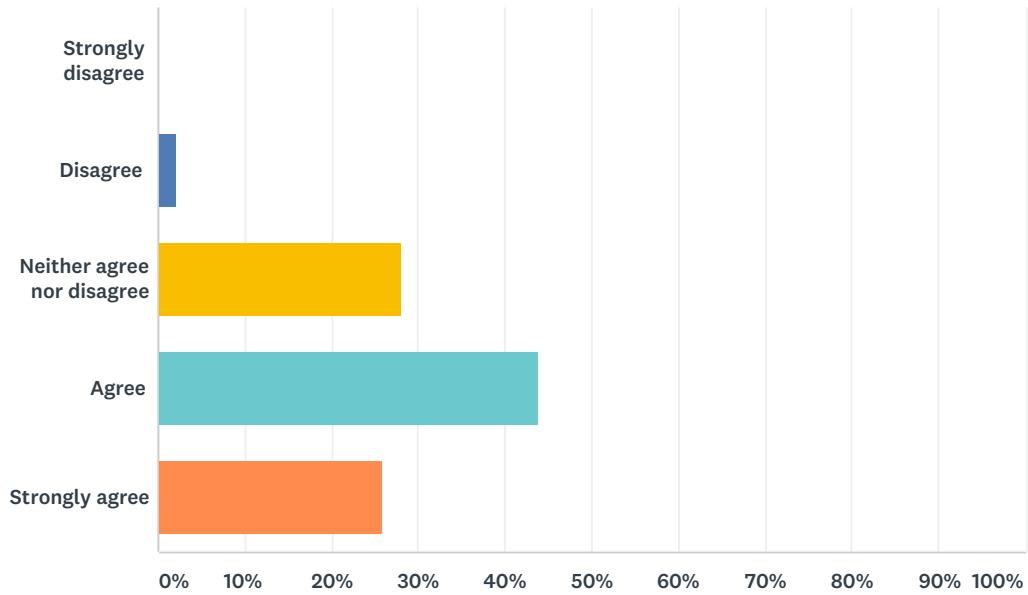

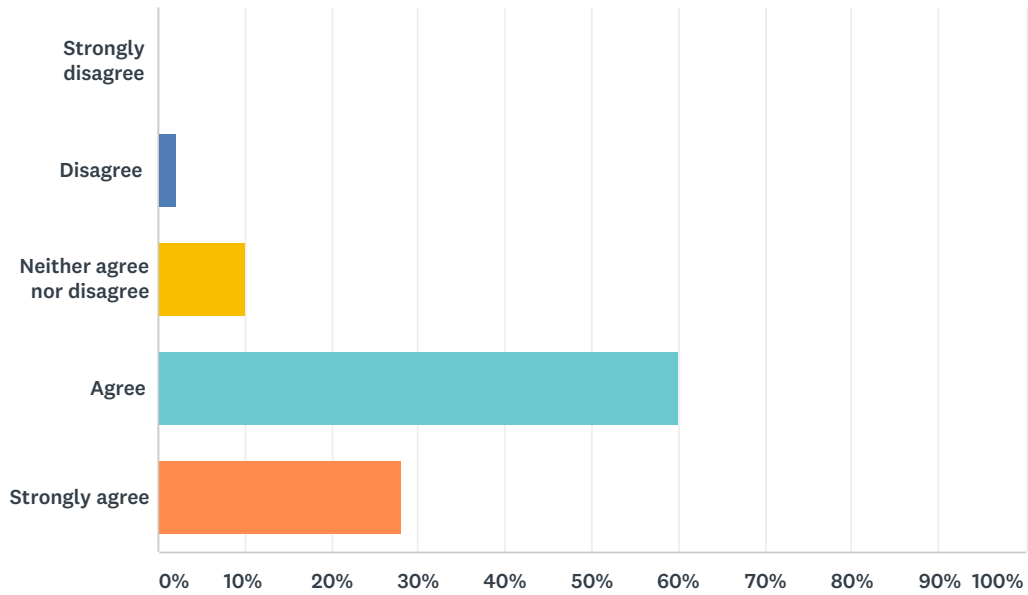
