UPDATES

- **Summer School:** 35 students earned at least one credit during the June sessions of Summer School at BHS. A total of 47 credits were “recovered” over the three-week period. Seven teachers and two paraprofessionals worked with students over during the 15 days in June. The July session is scheduled for July 6 – 20 and has 34 students scheduled to participate at this time.
- **Summer Workouts:** 247 10th-12th graders and 127 9th graders initially registered for 5 morning sessions & 1 afternoon session. Of those 374 students, 145 students have been able to attend 80% or more of the 17 days - with 19 students able to make all 17. 6 students have dropped out. 25 different BHS coaches have been involved with the supervision of summer workouts.
- **Construction:** The bus loop and parent drop-off loops have been poured and surfaced. Crews are completing the paint markings in the loop, on the curbs, and islands of the parking lot.
- **Alan Pokorny:** Coach Pokorny was recognized as a National Wrestling Coach of the Year finalist by the National High School Athletic Coaches Association. Alan was nominated by his coaching colleagues in the state of Nebraska.
- **Girls Tennis:** Koch Tennis Center informed BHS that there will not be room for the BHS Girls’ Tennis program at the KTC for the 2023 Spring Season. The administration is exploring facility options in the Metro area and surrounding communities / districts including the Fremont YMCA, Elkhorn Mount Michael, and Private organizations as possible locations for the Spring of 2023.

2021-2022 Federal Grant Summary

IDEA Grant

This supports Birth-5 service providers, teachers, and supervision, as well as special education services for students who are part of non-public programs. This year we also received ARP funds due to the COVID-19 Pandemic and therefore we had additional funds and those were placed towards school-age special education staff salary and benefits.

IDEA Total = \$652,730

ESSA Grant (Title I)

This supports our Title Reading and Math Services. The funds are used to pay for Math and Reading Specialists at our Targeted Assistant Schools (schools with the highest Free Reduced Population, this is typically either Bennington Elementary or Heritage Elementary).

This supports professional development. The district specifically utilizes these funds to support summer work hours for staff in regards to curriculum work and TIP grants.

These funds were the second of three federal grants allotted to public schools due to the COVID-19 pandemic. These funds were utilized for additional services within counseling and reading/math interventionists (ESSER III Federal grants will be utilized in the 2022-2023 school year).

Superintendent Notes July 2021

1. Enrollment update: To date, we have 4,014 students registered to attend Bennington Public Schools this August. The district has another 22 students in the process of enrolling online. We have seen an increase in the number of families enrolling new students in the past week. In October of 2021, we projected a K-12 student enrollment of 4,090. We could reasonably increase our student enrollment by 250 to 300 students this year. The largest enrollment increases this district experienced was an increase of 334 students from the school year of 2019/20. Currently, we have 313 new kindergarten students enrolled for the coming school year. This is down 43 students from an expected 356 enrollment number back in October of 2021. We understand other suburban school districts are experiencing the same unexpected decrease in kindergarten student enrollment. We have no solid explanation for this decline in kindergarten enrollment other than the birth rate for Douglas County has been declining (RSP).
2. Chief Deputy Hudson from the Douglas County Sheriff's Department would like to send a team of law enforcement personnel to tour all of our facilities before the start of school. This is in response to the tragedy at Uvalde, TX. Dr. Blomenkamp and Mr. Edens will coordinate this work with the Douglas County Sheriff's Department.
3. We are working on a new communication feature that will be posted on the website by the end of this week. This new feature will update the community on several of the district's ongoing construction projects. We hope to include some of the pictures and information that DLR Group provides the Board on a monthly basis for the community to see.
4. The District will be sending a newsletter out to all box holders. This newsletter should have hit some mailboxes on Friday. This is a special newsletter filled with information about our need for additional facilities and the upcoming community forums to gather additional input on a possible bond issue in November. Our annual back to school newsletter filled with information related to registration and back to school information for families will be sent at a later time.
5. The church organizations continue to use our facilities during the summer. We have one organization using Anchor Pointe and two looking to start up meetings at Bennington Elementary and Heritage Elementary later this summer.
6. We have a long-standing collaboration with the Visiting Nurses Association (VNA) for the services of a school nurse. The 2021-22 agreement was for a total of 1,060 hours at a rate of \$51.50 per hour. The VNA School Nursing Program would increase their time to 1,200 hours of nursing services contracted by Bennington Public Schools (BPS) for 2022-23. Their costs will increase from \$51.50 per hour to \$52.50 per hour. The total costs for VNA nursing services for 2021-22 contracted hours was \$545,90.00 (1,060 nursing hours at \$51.50/hour). The total costs for VNA nursing services for 2022-23 contracted hours will be \$63,500.00 (1,200 nursing hours at \$52.50/hour).
7. We will have approximately 80 new certificated staff come to the district office starting with some training this week. New certificated staff will be asked to complete some HR paperwork and receive a district laptop and some technology training. New elementary staff will be requested to return on Monday, August 8th for two days of reading assessment training. All new certificated employees are scheduled to return for two days of new induction training on Wednesday, August 10th, before all staff report for the first contract day of the 2022/23 school term on Friday, August 12th.
8. We will be in read only mode for all administrative reports this evening (typical July). We will have three district administrators and an administrator from all three levels in attendance tonight.

BENNINGTON PROJECTS (Status Update)

The following is the status update (as of Thursday, July 7, 2022) of the Bennington projects as provided by Michael Berg from DLR:

The projects are nearing completion and the contractors are working to finish work and work with the district for possession of the areas. Landscaping, seeding and sod continues onsite at the new middle school with ground sprinkler system starting at the ES for sod to go down prior to the start of school. The elementary school is working on commons / cafeteria flooring and athletic equipment installation in west area of the building with the academic areas being reviewed by DLR getting ready for move in. The 171st street and Woodney road project has completed concrete paving and continues sidewalk installation and backfilling. The HS stadium project is proceeding with parent drop off concrete and closeout of concessions building

Middle School #2

1. Corridor flooring is being done in the academic wing to finalize the academic wing
2. The administration area is complete with the vestibule entry glass and security in process
3. Kitchen equipment is being started up as it is set in place
4. Parking lot paving and drives are complete with striping and signage being installed this week
5. New football field sod has been installed and practice field modifications are being done for sprinkler and sod to be installed in the coming weeks. The athletic field lighting is scheduled for the end of the month due to shipping delays
6. Band and vocal areas are being finalized with flooring and ceiling clouds
7. The wrestling room pads are onsite and will be installed as soon as the final coat of paint is completed this week

Elementary #5

1. The academic wing work is complete with paint touch up and casework securement is being done
2. The front and back entry storefront glass doors are installed with glass being completed this week. Designer glass was delayed and should be installed next week and ready for the start of school
3. Administration area casework, lighting and paint are complete with finish carpeting being installed this week
4. Kitchen equipment has been installed and connected
5. Playground basketball court has been poured with playground area prepped and coordination has been done with the playground contractor
6. Academic lockers are scheduled to be installed next week
7. Building air conditioning is running throughout and is being climatized.

Policy Changes 2022

The recent Nebraska Legislative session passed numerous bills dealing with schools and they have resulted in several policy revisions. In addition, the federal government and the supreme court has issued new regulations and guidance that have resulted in revised or new policies. Please see below for more information on such changes or additions.

Revised Policies:

204.10 – Agenda: Beginning July 31st, LB 83 passed in 2021, and LB 742 passed in 2022, requires that Board agendas and meeting minutes be posted on the District's website. Each agenda must be posted at least twenty-four hours before the meeting. Both the agendas and meeting minutes must remain on the District's website for at least six months.

204.11 – Meeting Minutes: See explanation above (204.10).

204.12 – Public Comment in Board Meetings: This policy is updated to include changes from LB 83 passed in 2021 and allows the board to require those wishing to address the board to provide their name, address, and organizational affiliation.

702.02 – Budget Planning, Preparation and Schedules: Changes to this policy are a direct result of changes to 702.03 (see below). LB 644 changes some procedures for passing the district's annual tax request which has led to a revision of this policy. LB 644 creates the Property Tax Request Act and became operative on January 1, 2022.

702.03 – Budget Adoption Process: LB 644 changes some procedures for passing the district's annual tax request and this has led to a revision of this policy. LB 644 creates the Property Tax Request Act and became operative on January 1, 2022. The measure applies to counties, cities, school districts, and community colleges. If the political subdivision seeks to increase its property tax request by more than the "allowable growth percentage," the political subdivision may do so if: (a) A public hearing is held and notice of the hearing is provided in compliance with the new law; and (b) The governing body of the political subdivision passes a resolution or an ordinance that complies with the new law.

Other changes to this policy include but not limited to are:

- Each political subdivision within a county that seeks to increase its property tax request by more than the allowable growth percentage must participate in a joint public hearing. The joint public hearing must be held on or after September 17th and prior to September 29th.
- Each political subdivision that participates in the joint public hearing must send the information for the postcard to the county clerk by September 5th. The county clerk must transmit the information to the county assessor no later than September 10th. The county assessor will mail the postcards.
- After the joint public hearing, the governing body of each participating political subdivision must pass an ordinance or resolution to set the political subdivision's property tax request (see Administrative Regulations).
- LB 644 amends existing law to require school district and ESU budget statements to be filed by September 30th rather than the current September 20th.

NASB also developed Administrative Regulations 702.03R1, 702.03R2, 702.03R3 and 702.03R4 to go along with these new revisions for the adoption of the budget.

The Perry Law Firm developed a FAQ for this new statute with 56 questions and answers. Board members may contact the supt. if interested in obtaining this information.

902.02 – Construction Plans and Specifications: This is a minor change in the monetary limits for the hiring of an architect or engineer. Neb. Rev. Stat. 73-106 generally requires the District to approve an agreement in excess of \$100,000 when hiring an engineer or architect. However, that amount is subject to adjustment by the State Board of Education. The State Board of Education has adjusted this amount to \$118,000, so Policy 902.02 has been updated to reflect this change.

902.04 – Bids and Awards for Construction Contracts: This is a minor change in the monetary limits for when a formal bid is required on all construction projects. Neb. Rev. Stat. 73-106 generally requires the

District to bid construction projects in excess of \$100,000. However, that amount is subject to adjustment by the State Board of Education. The State Board of Education has adjusted this amount to \$109,000, so Policy 902.04 has been updated to reflect this change.

New (Additional) Policies:

204.13 – Virtual Conferencing During an Emergency: This is a new policy that can be added to the board policy manual by virtue of LB 83 passed in 2021. Passage of LB 83 amended the Open Meetings Act in Chapter 84, Article 14, to: 1) modernize the way public bodies hold virtual meetings; and 2) create the statutory framework for public bodies to hold virtual meetings during a declared emergency by the Governor, Mayor, Village Board Chair or County Board Chair. “Virtual conferencing” is defined as “conducting or participating in a meeting electronically or telephonically with interaction among the participants subject to subsection (2) of section 84- 1412” which allows the public body to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations regarding the conduct of persons attending, speaking, and recording at the virtual meeting.

402.20 – Vacation: This is a new policy and was created out of need for clarification of compensation for unused vacation leave. There is an opinion in the State of Nebraska that employers should pay all 12-month employees on a per diem rate of pay for any unused vacation leave the employee has accrued from contract year to contract year. This newly drafted policy is base off of Nebraska court case history and Nebraska Department of Labor opinions. The policy is short and general in nature; however, the second page outlines the rules and regulations for compensation for unused vacation leave per employee that will be included in personnel handbooks at the suggestion of our legal counsel.

508.17 – Seizure Safe Schools: This is a new policy and was created by LB 639 passed last year. The Legislature enacted LB 639, which requires, among other things, that “at least one school employee at each school who has met the training requirements necessary to administer or assist with the self-administration of a seizure rescue medication or medication prescribed to treat seizure disorder symptoms as approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration.” This requirement becomes effective, beginning in 2022-2023 school year.

There may also be a few minor policy revisions coming out later this month, but these are the major ones resulting from this year’s changes to state statutes.
