Social Studies Curriculum Requirements

- Stress the Contributions of All Ethnic Groups in the development of America
- Incorporate Multicultural Education
- Include Formative, Interim, & Summative Assessments

Components of a Comprehensive Social Studies Curriculum

- Below the sixth grade, schools shall devote at least one hour per week to exercises or teaching the following purpose:
 - Noteworthy events pertaining to American history
 - Background, memorization, and singing of patriotic songs
 - Star-Spangled Banner & America the Beautiful
 - Respect and conduct for the American flag
- Two of the three grades from fifth grade to the eighth grade will teach American history and two courses in every high school will teach civics and American history to include:
 - the Declaration of Independence, the United States Constitution, the Constitution of Nebraska, and the structure and function of local government
 - benefits and advantages of representative government, the rights and responsibilities of citizenship
- Communicate historical background and significance of national holidays:
 - George Washington's birthday, Abraham Lincoln's birthday, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday, Native American Heritage Day, Constitution Day, Memorial Day, Veterans Day, and Thanksgiving Day

Colonists protested taxation without representation through petitions, boycotts, and violent resistance, such as the Boston Tea Party. Britain responded to colonial resistance with increasingly harsh measures, including the Intolerable Acts, which further united the colonies against British rule. The First and Second Continental Congresses organized resistance against Britain and ultimately led to the Declaration of Independence in 1776. The Declaration of Independence, written primarily by Thomas Jefferson, outlined Enlightenment principles of government and justified breaking away from Britain. The Revolutionary War began in 1775 with the Battles of Lexington and Concord and continued until the Treaty of Paris in 1783. George Washington, Lord Cornwallis, etc. Key battles, such as Saratoga and Yorktown, turned the tide of the war in favor of the Americans. The war was influenced by foreign assistance, particularly from France, which provided troops, naval support, and supplies. The Articles of Confederation, the first governing document of the United States, created a weak national government that struggled with economic issues and maintaining order. Shays' Rebellion highlighted the weaknesses of the Articles of Confederation and the need for a stronger national government. The Constitutional Convention of 1787 resulted in a new framework of government that balanced power between state and federal authority. The Great Compromise settled disputes between large and small states over representation in Congress. The Three-Fifths Compromise addressed how enslaved people would be counted for taxation and representation. The U.S. Constitution established the principles of separation of powers and checks and balances to prevent tyranny. The Federalist and Anti-Federalist debates shaped the ratification of the Constitution, with Anti-Federalists demanding a Bill of Rights to protect individual liberties. The Bill of Rights, ratified in 1791, ensured protections such as freedom of speech, religion, and due process under the law.</p>

 - 9th-12th grade

Committee on American Civics Checklist

- ❑ Minutes of the Committee on American Civics' meetings have been kept and show the time and place of the meeting, which members were present or absent, and the substance and details of all matters discussed.
- ❑ Confirmed that the curriculum approved by the Committee is available for public inspection.
- ❑ Confirmed the District's social studies curriculum is aligned with NDE standards.
- ❑ Confirmed that the District's social studies curriculum stresses the required patriotic themes.

Committee on American Civics Checklist, cont.

- ❑ Confirmed that the District's social studies curriculum includes all required components, in accordance with state law and NDE standards, including (a) one hour per week of patriotic instruction for grade levels below sixth grade; (b) a set amount of time to teach American history for grade levels from fifth grade to eighth grade; and (c) at least two courses in high school that teach American civics.
- ❑ Confirmed that the District's social studies curriculum includes a requirement, in accordance with state law, that high school students (i) complete a written test; (ii) attend a public meeting; or (iii) present or write a paper on an appropriate topic.
- ❑ Confirmed that the District will conduct appropriate patriotic exercises for the following holidays: George Washington's birthday, Abraham Lincoln's birthday, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday, Native American Heritage Day, Constitution Day, Memorial Day, Veterans Day, and Thanksgiving Day.
