High School Principal Report  
June 2016**

**Goal #1: Wakefield Community School will provide students an education that develops relationships utilizing a relevant curriculum that infuses technology providing 21<sup>st</sup> Century learning for all students.**

- Mr. Wulf and I are in the process of updating our assessment data and school improvement data, (as well as finishing reports for the Nebraska Department of Education). We are also making arrangements for a data retreat, to take place on June 30. Approximately 12 teachers will attend. During our annual data retreat this summer, some of the data we plan on discussing includes NeSA results (Reading, Writing, Math, and Science), MAP results, as well as disaggregated results for all tests.
- Similar to last year, in addition to looking at the entire school data as a whole, we want to break it down to the individual student level whenever possible. Sometimes students themselves show “trends.”
- Some example of information that comes out of our data retreat include: School Improvement Goals; Action Plans to address concerns; Trojan Time reading groups; ELL student schedules; Focus points for teachers as we begin the school year.
- Data on our NeSA results will be shared in the fall, when all the test results are made available to the public.

**Miscellaneous**

- Graduation Commencement took place on Sunday, May 15. Student speakers included Mayra Mena, Megan Muller, Yesenia Ibarra, Daniel Jimenez, Tiffany Saquique, and Juan Delgado. Several scholarships were awarded, eight seniors were given their Honor Chords, and the band and choir performed. Mrs. Harding has compiled a list of graduates, their future plans, and scholarships awarded.
- Three students qualified for the State Track Meet: Josephine Peitz in the 800 (repeat qualifier), Savannah Nelson in the 200 and 400 (repeat qualifier), and Dylan Hurlburt in the 110 M Hurdles, 300 M Hurdles, and Long Jump. Dylan placed 6<sup>th</sup> place in the long jump.

## Superintendent's Report

June 2016

- 1. Goal #1:** Wakefield Community School will provide students an education that develops relationships utilizing a relevant curriculum that infuses technology providing 21<sup>st</sup> Century learning for all students. (Curriculum, Americanism & Technology)
  - a.** This past spring Wakefield students in grades 5 through 12 participated in a drug education program taught by Mrs. Allie Mousel, from Heartland Counseling, South Sioux City. Students in grades 5 – 8 received drug education using curricular materials entitled “Gateway to Drugs & Beyond.” High School students participated in the “PRIME for Life” program. I would refer you to the summary of our drug education this year and the learning gains by our students. The plan for continued drug education next year will focus on grade 6 and the freshman class. I believe the interventions were beneficial and provided our students with quality information to help them make informed decisions concerning their lifestyle.
  
- 2. Goal #2:** Wakefield Community School will make an efficient use of all resources. (Business & Finance)
  - a.** As of the end of May, Wakefield Community School is 6.4% under budget for the year. Becky and I will be attending Budget Workshops on June 23<sup>rd</sup> and June 29<sup>th</sup>. The budget season is quickly approaching.
  
- 3. Goal #3:** Wakefield Community School will facilitate communication with staff, parents, patrons, and students (Public and Personnel Relations)
  - a.** June 15<sup>th</sup> the Northeast Nebraska Legislative Committee of Superintendents will meet at ESU #1 to discuss plans for the upcoming legislative session. I believe we can anticipate increased political pressure to limit school funding and reduce property taxes. Thus far no actual plans are in place to raise additional tax revenue to reduce property taxes. Given the number of new legislators this will present challenges. If you have ideas or suggestions for the session, please let me know.

I am planning on discussing at the meeting of proposing a possible change to special education program regarding students in the life skills program. I would like to see these students be allowed to graduate on time and be allowed to remain in school with state funding for life skill development up to age 21.

#### **4. Miscellaneous**

- a.** I have attached my list of vacation, sick leave and professional development utilization for your review. I have participated in 169 hours of professional development over the course of the year. Sick leave time has been limited to 12 hours. So far this year I have utilized 43 hours of vacation time. Other time was divided into FFA activities and NSAA activities which accounted for 22.5 hours. Overall for this year I have utilized a total of 246.5 hours.

We are purchasing the second half of the iPads for next years' freshmen and juniors. I have attached a copy of the purchase orders and bids from Apple Inc. We are looking to purchase 70 iPad 2 Airls and cases for the new machines. The iPad 2 Airls are Wi-Fi units with 64 gigabytes of memory.

The cost of the iPad Aire 2 are \$474 each for a cost of \$33,180. The protective cases are black and have worked well this year and would like to continue with the same brand, an STX dux Case, costing \$34.95 each, for a cost of \$2,446.50. The total cost of purchase for the iPads and covers is \$35,626.50.

**Discuss and take appropriate action to purchase a floor scrubber.** The TomCat Carbon is a 28" cleaning path. The scrubber comes with a 21 gallon cleaning tank and 23 gallon recovery tank. This unit is designed to remove two layers of wax, clean and rough the surface allowing new wax to be applied. The unit utilizes a 2000 rpm vibrating motion to remove wax, which will save us time and wax as only two coats of wax will likely need to be applied instead of the traditional 5 - 7 coats of wax.

The TomCat is also a traditional floor cleaner and will clean the halls, classrooms, multi-purpose room. The team is okay with purchasing a walk-behind instead of a riding unit for the cost savings, approximately \$4,000. A rider unit would cost \$11, 891 where as the walk-behind unit is \$7,714.47. We can look and see if another entity would be interested in purchasing our current machine or we may keep her in reserve for the time being.

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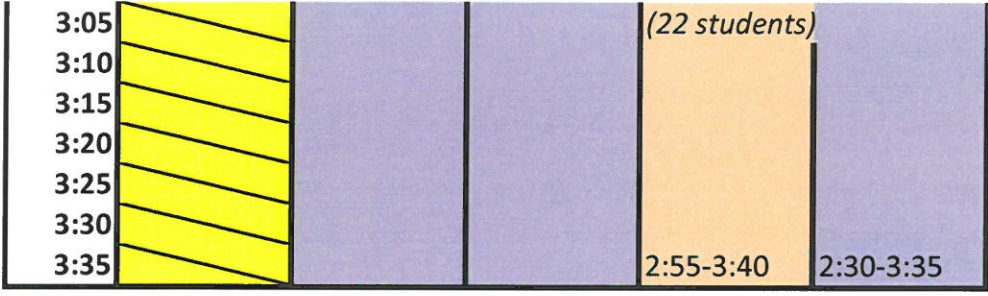

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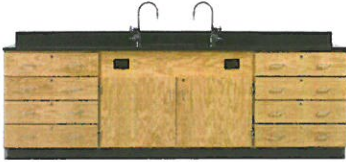
