SUMMARY OF OCTOBER 9, 2023 MEETINGS

- Approved the current pay application from BIC Construction and additional invoices related to services completed to date on various school facility expansion projects. A BIC Construction representative also provided a current construction update for both district buildings.
- Aspire Academy students and program staff presented information to the board about our transition program for our 18-21 year old special education students. The students shared their program experiences and program staff provided a comprehensive overview of the activities, curriculum, and social and career readiness skills being developed and implemented. Special thanks to our local businesses and district staff for partnering with the program to create positive “real world” experiences for our students. This program, in its first year, has shown great success.
- Mr. Bryce Wilson from NDE gave a presentation on option enrollment and the impact of option enrollment for our district.
- Approved action items included the purchase of a new student and staff passenger van and a newer 71 passenger diesel bus to accommodate increasing student transportation needs, the approval of a board member voting delegate at the upcoming State Education Conference in Omaha, and the approval of minor changes to Policy #1300 related to fundraising and the types and purpose of various fundraising activities.

 - **Part-time student enrollment: LB 705**
 - *Each school board must allow the part-time enrollment of students, for all courses selected by the students, who are residents of the school district and who are also enrolled in a private school or a home school.*
 - *Any student participating in extracurricular activities to be enrolled in no more and no less than five credit hours offered by the school district in any semester. Schools may not allow preference in the selection of a student for participation in an extracurricular activity based on the student's status as a full-time student in the school district.*
 - *Any student participating in extracurricular activities to follow school policies that apply to other students when present on school grounds or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event.*
 - *Participation in extracurricular activities may not entitle a student to transportation, except to and from practices and events to the same extent as public school students participating in the activities, or transportation reimbursement.*
 - **Dress Code and Grooming Policy District Policy:**
 - **By July 1, 2025**, the school board of each school district must adopt a written “dress code and grooming policy” to be implemented at the start of the 2025-26 school year that is consistent with the model policy developed by NDE.
 - Schools must develop and distribute a model dress code and grooming policy for schools that facilitates and encourages an inclusive and positive learning environment.
 - Require that the school reasonably accommodate student's appearance or any attire, tribal regalia, hairstyles, adornment, or other characteristic associated with race, national origin, or religion
 - Provide a process to obtain consent from a student's parent or guardian prior to altering a student's appearance or removing or altering a student's attire, tribal regalia, hairstyle, adornment, or other characteristic associated with race, national origin, or religion
 - Provide a process to ensure records are kept on each effort to reasonably accommodate a student's appearance, attire, hairstyle, adornment, or other characteristics associated with race, national origin, or religion occurring at school, on school grounds, or at a school sponsored event.

- “National origin” includes characteristics associated with actual or perceived place of birth, ancestry, or ethnicity including, but not limited to, skin color, natural and protective hairstyles, headdress, tribal regalia, and attire.
- “Natural and protective hairstyles” include, but are not limited to, braids, locks, twists, tight coils or curls, cornrows, bantu knots, afros, weaves, wigs, or head wraps; (c) “Race” includes characteristics associated with actual or perceived race, ancestry, or ethnicity including, but not limited to, skin color, natural and protective hairstyles, tribal regalia, and attire
- “Religious attire and characteristics associated with religion” includes, but not limited to, natural and protective hairstyles, tribal regalia, burkas, hijabs, head wraps, or other headdress, adornments, and clothing garments used to express or observe one's religious beliefs
- “Tribal regalia” includes natural and protective hairstyles and traditional garments, jewelry, or other adornments or similar objects of cultural significance worn by members of an indigenous tribe of the United States or another country. Tribal regalia does not include any dangerous weapon.
- **FASFA Law: LB 705**
 - Beginning in the school year 2024-25, each public high school student must complete and submit to the U.S. Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) prior to graduating from high school.
- **Youth Organizations 705:**
 - Requires each school district, upon request, to allow a representative of any “youth organization” to provide: (i) oral or written information to the students of such school district regarding the youth organization and how the youth organization furthers the educational interests and civic involvement of students in a manner consistent with good citizenship, and (ii) services and activities to any student of such school district who is a member of the youth organization.
 - Each requesting youth organization must be permitted to provide such information, services, and activities in a school building or on the school grounds of a school in each school district at least once during each school year.

Mental Health Supports Screening Instrument and Process.

For Discussion: October 9, 2023

During the Fall of 2023, Winter of 2024 and in the Spring of 2024, the district will administer the SAEBRS (Social, Academic, and Emotional Behavior Risk Screener) survey to all students, K-12. The SAEBRS screener is a short, 20-item survey.

The items included in this survey have been extensively researched to include the best indicators of student success in the domains of academic behavior, social behavior, and emotional behavior.

The SAEBRS screener was created under the principle that a student's success in school is not only related to their academic achievement, but also to success within multiple behavioral domains. As such, the district will gather the results of this survey in order to identify and address any academic, social, or emotional barriers that may be hindering the unique excellence of each student.

The SAEBRS screener is one tool of many that District OR-1 uses in order to ensure and promote a culture of excellence that supports increased student achievement, social emotional skills, and positive behavior.

Our elementary school SEL curriculum is Second Step. This curriculum is aligned with the Casel standards and is actually a Casel Select program. The school counseling program at Bennet Elementary follows the ASCA national model which has student and professional standards that are also aligned with Casel. The small group curriculums follow the ASCA model as well so those are also Casel aligned.

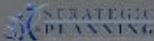

 - *Each school board must allow the part-time enrollment of students, for all courses selected by the students, who are residents of the school district and who are also enrolled in a private school or a home school.*
 - *Any student participating in extracurricular activities to be enrolled in no more and no less than five credit hours offered by the school district in any semester. Schools may not allow preference in the selection of a student for participation in an extracurricular activity based on the student's status as a full-time student in the school district.*
 - *Any student participating in extracurricular activities to follow school policies that apply to other students when present on school grounds or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event.*
 - *Participation in extracurricular activities may not entitle a student to transportation, except to and from practices and events to the same extent as public school students participating in the activities, or transportation reimbursement.*
 - **Dress Code and Grooming Policy District Policy:**
 - **By July 1, 2025**, the school board of each school district must adopt a written “dress code and grooming policy” to be implemented at the start of the 2025-26 school year that is consistent with the model policy developed by NDE.
 - Schools must develop and distribute a model dress code and grooming policy for schools that facilitates and encourages an inclusive and positive learning environment.
 - Require that the school reasonably accommodate student's appearance or any attire, tribal regalia, hairstyles, adornment, or other characteristic associated with race, national origin, or religion
 - Provide a process to obtain consent from a student's parent or guardian prior to altering a student's appearance or removing or altering a student's attire, tribal regalia, hairstyle, adornment, or other characteristic associated with race, national origin, or religion
 - Provide a process to ensure records are kept on each effort to reasonably accommodate a student's appearance, attire, hairstyle, adornment, or other characteristics associated with race, national origin, or religion occurring at school, on school grounds, or at a school sponsored event.

- “National origin” includes characteristics associated with actual or perceived place of birth, ancestry, or ethnicity including, but not limited to, skin color, natural and protective hairstyles, headdress, tribal regalia, and attire.
- “Natural and protective hairstyles” include, but are not limited to, braids, locks, twists, tight coils or curls, cornrows, bantu knots, afros, weaves, wigs, or head wraps; (c) “Race” includes characteristics associated with actual or perceived race, ancestry, or ethnicity including, but not limited to, skin color, natural and protective hairstyles, tribal regalia, and attire
- “Religious attire and characteristics associated with religion” includes, but not limited to, natural and protective hairstyles, tribal regalia, burkas, hijabs, head wraps, or other headdress, adornments, and clothing garments used to express or observe one's religious beliefs
- “Tribal regalia” includes natural and protective hairstyles and traditional garments, jewelry, or other adornments or similar objects of cultural significance worn by members of an indigenous tribe of the United States or another country. Tribal regalia does not include any dangerous weapon.
- **FASFA Law: LB 705**
 - Beginning in the school year 2024-25, each public high school student must complete and submit to the U.S. Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) prior to graduating from high school.
- **Youth Organizations 705:**
 - Requires each school district, upon request, to allow a representative of any “youth organization” to provide: (i) oral or written information to the students of such school district regarding the youth organization and how the youth organization furthers the educational interests and civic involvement of students in a manner consistent with good citizenship, and (ii) services and activities to any student of such school district who is a member of the youth organization.
 - Each requesting youth organization must be permitted to provide such information, services, and activities in a school building or on the school grounds of a school in each school district at least once during each school year.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Opinions

We have audited the cash basis financial statements of government activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Palmyra Schools District OR-1 as of and for the year ended August 31, 2023 and the related notes to the financial statements, as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective cash basis financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the School District, as of August 31, 2023 and the respective changes in cash basis financial position for the year then ended in accordance with the cash basis of accounting as described in Note A.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of District and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a bases for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and Government Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if, individually or in aggregate, they would influence the judgements made by a reasonable user based on these financial statements.

Supplementary Information


Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the School District's basic financial statements. The supplementary information on pages 18-30 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements.

Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the cash basis financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supplemental information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Governmental Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated October 30, 2023 on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Governmental Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

A. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization – Palmyra Schools, District OR-1 Public Schools (the “School District”) is a tax-exempt political subdivision and a Class 3 school district of the State of Nebraska.

Reporting Entity – The financial statements of the School District include all significant separately administered organizations for which the School District is financially accountable including its entities for which the School District is considered to be financially accountable.

Basis of Accounting – The accompanying statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles using the cash basis of accounting. Under the cash basis of accounting, resource inflows are recognized when collected rather than when occurred and resource outflows are recognized when paid rather than incurred. Accordingly, the financial statements and supplemental schedules are not intended to present financial position and results of operation in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Taxes and other revenues collected by the county treasurers are included in receipts of the School District in the year collected by the counties and the School District funds held by the county treasurers at year end are included as assets of the School District. This is in accordance with the requirements of the State of Nebraska, Department of Education.

Government-wide and fund financial statements – The government-wide financial statements report information on all the nonfiduciary activities of the primary government. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental receipts, are reported separately from business-type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support. The District does not report any business-type activities.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct disbursements of a given function or segment are offset by program receipts. Direct disbursements are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program receipts include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment, 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general receipts.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and fiduciary funds, even though the latter are excluded from the government-wide financial statements. Each individual governmental fund and each individual fiduciary fund are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

The financial transactions of the School District are reported in individual funds in the fund financial statements. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund balances, receipts, and disbursements.

Fiduciary funds report assets held in a trustee or agency capacity for others and therefore cannot be used to support the School District's own programs. The Activities Fund is the only fiduciary fund.

Funds – The accounts of the School District are organized based on funds which are grouped into the following funds:

Government

General Fund – Finances the basic educational services rendered by the School District and is used to account for all financial resources except those required or determined to be accounted for in another fund.

Depreciation Fund – Accumulates resources for eventual significant future capital outlays. The Depreciation Fund is considered a component of the General Fund.

Employee Benefit – Accumulates resources for unemployment compensation claims. The Employee Benefit Fund is considered a component of the General Fund.

Bond Fund – Accounts for the accumulation of resources utilized to retire general obligation bonds at maturity or when called and to pay interest due on those bonds.

Special Building Fund – Accounts for the acquisition, erection, alteration, or improvement of buildings and sites.

Qualified Capital Purpose Undertaking Fund – This fund may be established for the removal of environmental hazards, the reduction or elimination of accessibility barriers in school district's buildings, the repayment of qualified zone academy bonds (see 92 NAC 87) issued for a qualified capital purpose, modifications for life safety code violations, indoor air quality projects, and mold abatement and prevention products. General Fund disbursements for the purpose of this fund are not allowable.

Activities Fund – Accounts for the financial operations of quasi-independent student organizations, interschool athletics, and other self-supporting or partially self-supporting school activities not accounted for in another fund.

School Nutrition Fund – Accounts for the proceeds of breakfast and lunch receipts, U.S. Department of Agriculture reimbursements and commodities receipts which are restricted to disbursements for specified purposes.

Student Fee Fund – Accounts for all money collected from students pursuant to the Public Elementary and Secondary Fee Authorization Act, including fees for extracurricular activities, postsecondary education, and summer/night school. Disbursements from this fund must be for the purpose for which the fees were collected.

Capital Assets – Capital assets are recorded as disbursements when paid for by the School District and are not recorded on the government-wide or fund financial statements

Long-Term Obligations – Long-Term debt is not reported as a liability in the government-wide or fund financial statements. Proceeds from long-term debt are reported as receipts, and payments of principal and interest are reported as disbursements in both the government-wide and fund financial statements.

Equity Classification

Government-Wide Statements

Equity is classified as net position and displayed in two components:

Restricted net position consists of net assets with constraints placed on the use either by external groups, such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws and regulations of other governments, or through constitutional provisions or enabling legislations

Unrestricted net position consists of net assets that do not meet the definition of restricted.

It is the School District's policy to use restricted net assets first, prior to the use of unrestricted net assets, when a disbursement is paid for purposes in which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available.

Fund Financial Statements

Governmental fund equity is classified as fund balance.

Fund Balance Classification

The governmental fund financial statements present fund balances based on classifications that comprise a hierarchy that is based primarily on the extent to which the School District is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in the respective governmental funds can be spent. The classifications used in the governmental fund financial statements are as follows:

Nonspendable

This classification includes amounts that cannot be spent because they either (a) are not in spendable form or (b) are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. The School District has no amounts classified in this category

Restricted

This classification includes amounts for which constraints have been placed on the use of the resources either (a) externally imposed by creditors (such as through a debt covenant) grantors, contributors, or laws and regulations of other governments or (b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Equity Classification - continued

Committed

This classification includes amounts that can be used only for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal action of the Board of Education. These amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the Board removes or changes the specified use by taking the same type of action (ordinance or resolution) that was employed when the funds were initially committed. This classification also includes contractual obligations to the extent that existing resources have been specifically committed for use in satisfying those contractual requirements.

Assigned

This classification includes amounts that are constrained by the School District's intent to be used for a specific purpose but are neither restricted nor committed. This intent can be expressed by the Board of Education or through the Board delegating this responsibility to the School District administrator through the budgetary process.

Unassigned

This classification includes the residual fund balance for the General Fund.

The School District would typically use restricted fund balances first, followed by committed resources, and then assigned resources, as appropriate opportunities arise, but reserves the right to selectively spend unassigned resources first to defer the use of these other classified funds.

1. Prior to August 1, the Board of Education proposes a budget on the cash basis of accounting for the fiscal year commencing the following September 1. The budget includes proposed disbursements and the means of financing them.
2. The School District establishes legally adopted budgets for its funds in the following manner:

Budgetary Data – The Board of Education (the Board) follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the accompanying financial statements:

3. Hearings are conducted at a public meeting to obtain public comments.
4. Prior to September 20, the budget is legally adopted by the Board of Education and submitted to the Office of the Auditor of Public Accounts, Nebraska Department of Education, and all applicable county clerks.
5. Once approved by the Board, total disbursements cannot legally exceed total appropriations at the fund level nor for “regular education” in the general fund without holding a public budget hearing and obtaining approval from the Board of Education.
6. Appropriations lapse at the end of the fiscal year.

Property taxes – The tax levies for all political subdivisions in all applicable counties are certified by the County Board on or before October 15. Real estate and personal property taxes are due and become an enforceable lien on property on December 31st. The first half of real estate and personal property taxes becomes delinquent on May 1st and the second half becomes delinquent September 1st following the levy date. Delinquent taxes bear a statutory rate (currently 14%) of interest. Property taxes levied are recognized when received by all applicable counties.

Interfund Transfers – Permanent reallocation of resources between funds of the reporting entity are classified as interfund transfers. For purposes of the statement of activities and net position – cash basis, all interfund transfers between individual governmental funds have been eliminated or reclassified.

Use of Estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the cash basis of accounting used by the District requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures; accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Leases

Right to use assets are not recorded as assets on the government-wide or fund financial statements, and amortization is not recognized. Likewise, the related liabilities for these leases are not recognized in the financial statements. Payment on all leases are recorded as disbursements by function in the financial statements.

New Accounting Pronouncements

GASB Statement 87, Leases, was implemented in the current year. Under the standard a lease is defined as a contract that conveys control of the right to use another entity’s nonfinancial assets as specified in the contract for a period of time in an exchange or exchange-like transaction. Since the District reports on the cash basis of accounting there was no effect on the financial statements other than note disclosure. Leases that transfer ownership (formerly disclosed as capital leases) are now disclosed in the footnote for long-term debt and other leases are disclosed in a separate footnote. Disclosure of terms and lease obligations are disclosed to maturity for leases with the exception of those leases meeting the criteria of short-term leases. Short-term leases are those with maximum possible terms at inception of 12 months or less. No disclosures are required for these leases. The standard does not apply to intangible assets including subscription-based technology arrangements. The District currently has no leases other than short term leases with maximum possible terms of 12 months or less. No disclosures are required for these leases.

GASB Statement 96, Subscription-Based-Information Technology-Arrangements (SBITAS), was implemented in the current year. This standard provides guidance related to accounting and financial reporting for subscription-based information technology (SBITAs). The standard generally requires the recording of a right-to-use subscription asset (intangible asset) and a corresponding liability. There is an exception for short-term SBITAs defined as those with maximum possible terms of 12 month or less including option to extend, regardless of their probability of being exercised. Since the District is on the modified cash basis of accounting, there was no effect on the financial statements other than note disclosures.

B. CASH IN BANK

For the following disclosures, deposits – including checking accounts, savings accounts, money market accounts, and certificates of deposit – are all classified as cash in the bank on the financial statements.

Custodial Credit Risk – Deposits

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the School District's deposits may not be returned to it. As of August 31, 2023, all of the School District's deposits with financial institutions were fully insured or collateralized by securities held in the School District's name in the form of joint safekeeping receipts. State law requires all funds in depositories to be fully insured or collateralized, and the School District's policy is to require depositories to provide pledged securities to cover deposits in excess of FDIC limits.

Investments

Nebraska statutes allow the School District to make any investment allowed by the State Investment Officer. This includes bank certificates of deposit.

As defined by Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 3, the School District had no investments as of August 31, 2023.

C. RETIREMENT PLAN

Plan Description

The Palmyra Schools, District OR-1 Public Schools contributes to the Nebraska School Employees Retirement System, a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the Nebraska Public Employees Retirement System (NPERS). NPERS provides retirement and disability benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. The School Employees Retirement Act establishes benefit provisions.

In 1945, the Nebraska Legislature enacted the law establishing a retirement plan for school employees of the State. During the NPERS fiscal year ended June 30, 2021, there were 265 participating school districts. These were the districts that had contributions during the fiscal year. All regular public school employees in Nebraska, other than those who have their own retirement planes (Class V school districts, Nebraska State Colleges, University of Nebraska, Nebraska Community Colleges), are members of the plan.

Benefits Provided

Normal retirement is at age 65. For an employee who became a member before July 1, 2013: the monthly benefit is equal to the greater of the following: 1) the sum of a savings annuity, which is the actuarial equivalent of the member's accumulated contributions and a service annuity equal to \$3.50 per year of service; or 2) the average of the three 12-month periods of service as a school employee in which such compensation was the greatest, multiplied by total years of creditable service, multiplied by a formula factor (currently 2%) set by statute, and an actuarial factor based on age.

For an employee who became a member on or after July 1, 2013, the monthly benefit is equal to the greater of the following: 1) the sum of a savings annuity, which is the actuarial equivalent of the member's accumulated contributions and a service annuity equal to \$3.50 per year of service; or 2) the average of the five 12-month periods of service as a school employee in which such compensation was the greatest, multiplied by total years of creditable service, multiplied by a formula factor (currently 2%) set by statute, and an actuarial factor based on age.

Benefit calculations vary with early retirement. Employees' benefits are vested after five years of plan participation or when termination occurs at age 65 or later. Vested members are eligible to receive an unreduced retirement benefit at the age 65.

For school employees who became members prior to July 1, 2013, the benefit paid to a retired member or beneficiary receives an annual cost of living adjustment, which is increased by the lesser of the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers or two and one-half percent.

The current benefit paid to a retired member or beneficiary is adjusted so that the purchasing power of the benefit being paid is not less than 75 percent of the purchasing power of the initial benefit.

For school employees who became members on or after July 1, 2013, the benefit paid to a retired member or beneficiary receives an annual cost-of-living adjustment, which is increased by the lesser of the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers or one percent. There is no purchasing power floor for employees who fall under this tier.

Contributions

Contribution provisions are established by State law and may be amended only by the Nebraska Legislature. The State contribution is considered a nonemployer contribution since school employees are not employees of the State. The contribution rates (as a percentage of covered payroll for the year) were as follows:

- Members (employees): Each member contributed 9.78% of monthly salary.
- School District: The School District contributed 101% of the member contributions.
- State: The State contributed 2% of estimated payroll for the plan year.

The School District's contribution to the Plan for its year ended August 31, 2023, was \$446,564

For the District's year ended August 31, 2023, the District's total payroll for all employees was \$4,657,447. The total covered payroll was \$4,527,165. Covered payroll refers to all compensation paid by the District to active employees covered by the plan.

Plan Fiduciary Net Position

Detailed information about the Plans' fiduciary net position is available in the separately issued Nebraska Public Employees Retirement Systems Plan financial report. D. LONG-TERM DEBT

Long-term debt at August 31, 2023 consisted of the following:

Limited Tax Obligation Bonds, Series 2019, in the amount of \$1,320,000, were issued on October 9, 2019. The interest rate ranges from 1.60% to 2.20%. Payments of interest are made on December 15 and June 15 each year, with principal payments made annually on December 15. The Bond matures on December 15, 2029. Payments for this bond are made from the Qualified Capital Purpose Undertaking Fund.

In November 2022, the District issued \$9,910,000 of bonds at a premium of \$99,100. This is for the purpose of new construction for buildings. This is Phase 1 of three more bond issues. The District is only paying interest on this bond issue as of August 31, 2023.

E. RISK MANAGEMENT

The School is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets; errors or omissions; injuries to employees and to the public; or acts of God. For the fiscal year ended August 31, 2023, the School has approved insurance coverage through a commercial insurance company. The School's insurance coverage is as follows for various insurance policies: General Liability exposure, Umbrella Liability coverage, and Public Officials Errors and Omission exposure. Settled claims have not significantly exceeded this commercial coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

F. FEDERAL AWARD PROGRAMS

The School District received funds under various federal grant programs and such assistance is to be disbursed in accordance with the provisions of the various grants. Compliance with the grants is subject to audit by various government agencies which may impose sanctions in the event of noncompliance. Management believes that they have complied with all aspects of the various grant provisions and the results of adjustments, if any, relating to such audits would not have any material financial impact.

NOTE A. SCHEDULES OF CASH RECEIPTS, DISBURSEMENTS, AND FUND BALANCE – BUDGET AND ACTUAL

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying schedules of cash receipts, disbursements, and changes in fund balance – budget and actual are presented on the cash basis of accounting. This basis is consistent with the basis of accounting used in preparing the basic financial statements. All undisbursed appropriations lapse at the end of the budget year. For budgetary purposes, transfers to Employee Benefit Fund and Depreciation Fund are reflected as functional disbursements in the General Fund when transfers are made.

Budget Law

The District is required by state law to hold public hearings and adopt annual budgets for all funds on the cash basis of accounting. Total expenditures for each fund may not exceed the total budgeted expenditures. The General Fund is also subject to a total non-special education expenditures limit. Appropriations for expenditures lapse at year-end. Any revisions to the adopted budget of total expenditures to any fund require a public hearing.

Presentation

Governmental Accounting Standards requires that for reporting purposes, the General Fund include all activity of funds that do not generate a significant amount of revenues from outside sources. Therefore, in the fund financial statements, Employee Benefit Fund and Depreciation has been included in the General fund since their revenues are mainly derived from transfers from the General Fund. However, since the Employee Benefit Fund and Depreciation are required by State law to adopt their own budget and, therefore, the respective budgetary schedules have been included here.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

To the Board of Education

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the District No. OR-1, Palmyra, NE ("School District") as of and for the year ended August 31, 2023, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the School District's financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated October 30, 2023. Our report disclosed that as described in Note A to the financial statements, the School District prepares its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the School District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of District No. OR-1s' internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of School District No. OR-1s' internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or, significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Report on Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the School District's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Palmyra District OR-1 Schools for the year ended August 31, 2023. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards*, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated October 2023. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Significant Audit Matters

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by Palmyra District OR-1 Schools are described in Note A to the financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during the fiscal year ending August 31, 2023. We noted no transactions entered into by Palmyra District OR-1 Schools during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Management has corrected all such misstatements. In addition, none of the misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate, to each opinion unit's financial statements taken as a whole.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report.

We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated October 30, 2023.

Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a “second opinion” on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to Palmyra District OR-1 School’s financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor’s opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as Palmyra District OR-1 School’s auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

Other Matters

We were engaged to report on the Combining Schedule of Cash Receipts, Disbursements and Fund Balances and the Supplemental Schedules of Cash Receipts, Disbursements and Fund Balance – Budget and Actual, which accompany the financial statements but are not RSI. With respect to this supplementary information, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content, and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplementary information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves.

This information is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Education and management of Palmyra District OR-1 Schools and is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.

During the performance of our audit fieldwork for the year ended August 31, 2023, we performed the following procedures regarding Palmyra School District's student membership and attendance reporting and testing the District's allocation of expenses to the appropriate school district/building level:

1. We documented the District's policies and procedures for collecting student membership and attendance data.
2. We determined that the District was following its policies and procedures for collecting student census data.
3. We determined attendance at the District is collected at least daily and calculated to the nearest hundredth of a day.
4. We determined the District maintains a cumulative attendance and membership record for each student.
5. We determined the cumulative attendance and membership records contain the date of enrollment, number of days or partial days in attendance and absent during each school year enrolled, and the date of withdrawal or graduation.
6. We traced student attendance reported in the Nebraska Department of Education's approved ADVISER data collection system to the District's student information system for 2022-2023 school year.
7. We sampled 6 students from the ADVISER report for the year ended August 31, 2023 and traced the days enrolled, resent, and absent to the District's information system. Total days enrolled matched on all of the students sampled.

8. Using the same sample of 6 students, we traced the students to their student enrollment files to verify that the student was documented as an enrolled student of the District for the dates claimed in the attendance record.
9. We sampled 25 General Fund disbursements, noting the District's allocation to the school district/building level. The District's allocation for 25 items sampled was appropriate.

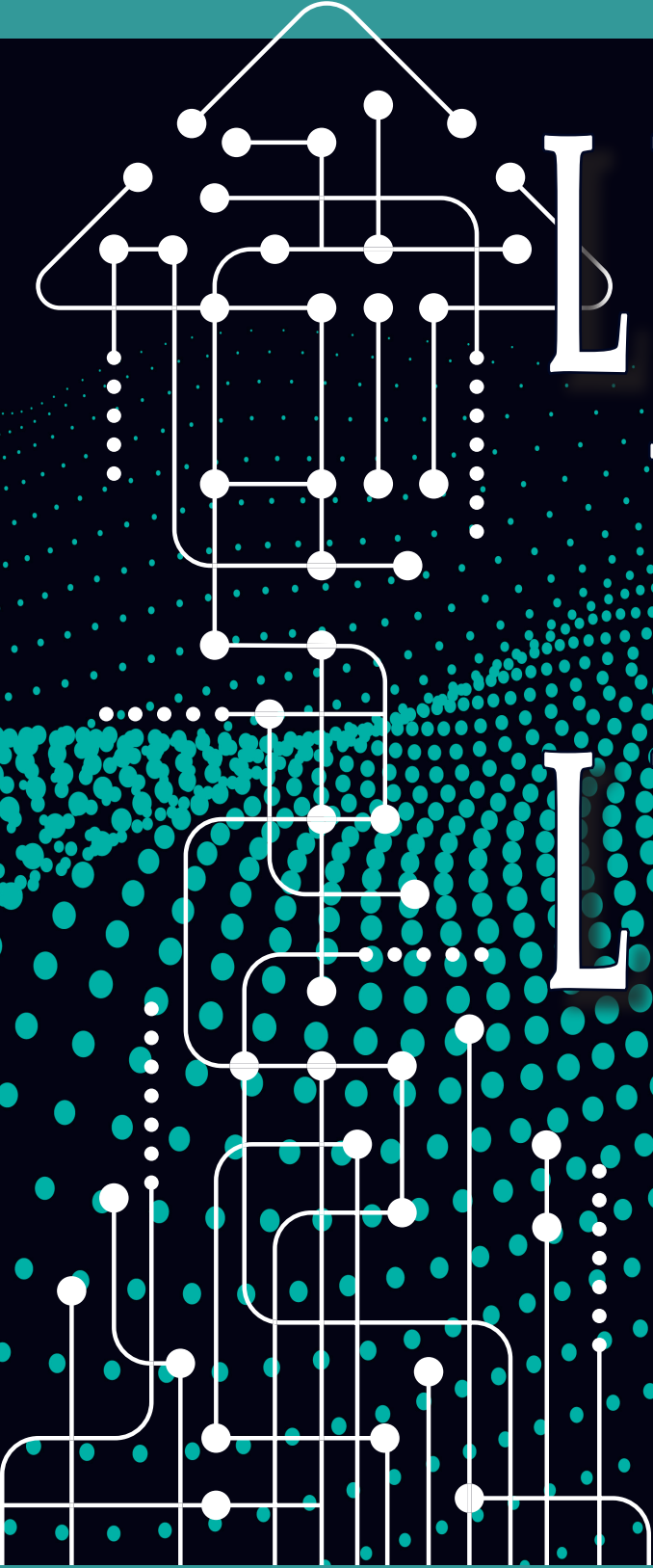

... POLICY

LB298 passed this year by the Legislature requires all school districts to begin reporting information by July 1 of each year about the testing of students for dyslexia. Nebraska Statute 79-11,157.01 now sets the guidelines for this testing and reporting, which addresses the continuing challenge of dyslexia. This problem affects 1 in 5 students and causes problems far beyond a student's difficulty with reading.
