The only piece we are still working on is tickets per student. The gym's capacity is 1,400. At 75% capacity we are restricted to 1,050. We also have to account for social distancing. I am hoping we don't have to restrict too much, especially with not having band set up (that provides us a little more space).

Track season is off and running. Track athletes have competed well at Doane and Malcolm. Coach Brannagan was happy to report a number of personal best performances.

The Lincoln Lutheran/Raymond Central soccer teams have had a great start to the season. The girls started the season 6-0 with a tough shootout win over Columbus Scotus, before falling to Omaha Mercy in a hard-fought 1-0 battle. They are currently 6-1 and will face Schuyler next. The boys have a small but hard-working team. They beat Seward last week, but currently sit at 1-6 on the season with Schuyler next on the schedule.

The Branched Oak Bucks are off to a 5-3 start. With over 50 kids on the team, we have added a number of Reserve baseball games. Like most spring seasons, there have been a number of rainouts, but I have had many players tell me it's nice to be back on the baseball diamond after losing last spring.

After a successful live performance at the High School Pops Concert, I will be working with Mr. Luke and Mr. Strouf to hold the rest of the Jr-Sr High Concerts in person with restrictions for the remainder of the year.

Electronic Contracting Company is on the homestretch of their work on a new sound system in the Main Gym. With a couple parts on temporary backorder, we are looking to complete well before our deadline of the May 16 HS Graduation. A big thanks to Jared, Ron, and the ECC crew for working with us to still hold classes while installing the speaker system. I am excited to work with the new system.

I have been in discussion with the City of Ceresco about the possibility of moving our softball practice and games to the field in Ceresco for the upcoming fall season. Talks have slowed somewhat as Coach Prai and I noticed some areas where the field may not be up to code to hold a high school event. I will continue to work with the City to see what could be done in the future.

The Central Players Speech Team recently finished 5th as a team at the State Speech Competition held at Kearney High School. Congratulations to our individual medalists: Grace Cadotte-6th in Poetry; Olivia Nelson-3rd in Informative; Eleanah Enevoldsen-5th in Persuasive; and Hunter Kohl-5th in DI.

State Testing (NSCAS) - Testing window is now open for the Phase I Pilot. The format for the tests are new this year. NDE describes these as adaptive through-year tests. Since the testing is new, limited results will be available to the public. The ELA (English Language Arts) Test and the Math Test are being administered to students in grades 3-8. The students take the tests on-line for an unlimited amount of time. Students in grades 5 and 8 will also be administered the Science Test. Students who qualify for accommodations may take their test on the computer with accommodation. No paper/pencil tests will be given this year. RC also has some students who are given an alternate version of the test if they meet the qualifications. Mr. Steve Rose and Mrs. Keely Schaffer are facilitating the technology components for the on-line tests. Each school has their own schedule, with all the testing completed by April 29. Makeup testing will be given the following week. I held training sessions for all staff who will serve as proctors for testing.

ACT - All juniors took the ACT on April 6. A huge thank you to Ms. Tasha Osten and Mrs. Allison Stansberry for facilitating all the many tasks associated with giving the ACT.

Professional Learning - Teachers met on March 24 to review data and begin preparations for Summer Academy.

Parent-Teacher Conferences were held via Zoom on March 9 and 11. The home-school connection is vital for the education of our students.

Planning for 2021-22 - A parent meeting for all 2021-22 Raymond Central prospective kindergarteners was held on March 29. There are currently a total of 42 kindergarteners registered in the district for 2021-22. Visitation Day for prospective kindergarteners will be Monday, May 3. Transition date for 5th to 6th grade is scheduled for April 29 with a meeting for parents to be held in August. The hiring process for next school year is mostly complete with screening, reference checks, and interviewing.

Thank you to the PTO for providing meals for the teachers during parent-teacher conferences. The PTO is sponsoring some end of year special events for our students. We appreciate their continued support.

Other happenings at Valparaiso:

We participated in Severe Weather Awareness week and practiced a tornado drill on Wednesday, March 24.

Many staff received their second vaccination on March 25. Consequently, both March 25 and March 26 were very busy at school covering classrooms. Special thanks to all staff who did "whatever it takes" to make it happen.

Students were encouraged to participate in a reading challenge during March. Valparaiso had 47 students complete their reading logs to document reading at home for at least 20 minutes a day for 20 days in March. Students who met the challenge received a free book. Thank you to the PTO for purchasing the books and to Mrs. Hlavaty for organizing and facilitating the challenge.

An online Book Fair was held from March 4-17. We usually have a Book Fair at the school in conjunction with parent teacher conferences, but we adjusted for this year.

Growth and Development was presented to 4th and 5th graders on April 1. Genders and grades were split. Nurse Amanda Ehlers led the video and discussion for each grade for the girls. Mr. Steve Rose led the boys at each grade level with a video and discussion.

The Plant Sale will be held on May 1. Drive thru pick up is scheduled from 9am to 3pm at the Valparaiso Elementary parking lot. All ordering is now complete. A limited number of plants will be available for open sale. Thank you to Mrs. Kristine White and Mrs. Kendra Carlson for organizing the sale and to all who ordered plants. All proceeds benefit the Jump Start to Kindergarten and Kindness Retreats.

TeamMates is hosting a Book Fair at Barnes and Noble located at South Pointe Pavilion in Lincoln. In store shopping days are May 8 and 9. The online shopping dates are May 8-13.

Track and Field Day is being planned for the week of May 10 with upper grades attending in the morning and primary grades participating in the afternoon. Each school will have their own day at their own site to align with our current protocols.

The Elementary Music Program for grades 3-5 is scheduled for May 10. To align with current protocols, the concert will be virtual. Mr. Strouf and Mr. Luke will record the segments and then send the video out to families. Positive feedback was received from families regarding this format for the Winter Concert.

Plans are being made to host 2021 Summer Academy. Classes will be held in the mornings on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays with wrap around care available through Civic Nebraska for a fee. Participants will be invited to attend; notices will go out to families later in April.

The window for NSCAS state wide testing is open from March 22-April 30 for students grades 3-5.

Parent-Teacher virtual conferences were held March 9 and 11 from 4:15-8:00. Ceresco had 98% of the 137 parents participate. Thank you to the teachers for providing this opportunity for parents to support their child's education.

Raymond Central is excited to announce a new program for this summer. We will be offering Summer Academy 2021 free of charge in June. This learning experience will be offered by invitation

only. Students will participate in a variety of learning activities based on his/her progress towards grade level learning goals. Teachers are designing engaging lessons to close the learning loss in grade level benchmarks for reading, writing, and math. Cross grade level groups of grades K and 1, grades 2 and 3, and grades 4 and 5 will be offered at each elementary school; however, these groupings are dependent on student need and participation numbers. Participants will be expected to attend each day the Summer Academy is planned.

Summer Academy 2021 will take place from June 8-July 1 on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Approximate times will be from 9:00-11:30am. A take home lunch will be provided to participants. Wrap around child care will be available through the Civic Nebraska Summer Program for a fee. Invitations to individual students and their families for Summer Academy 2021 will be sent home in mid April.

The Kindergarten parent meeting was held Monday, March 29 at 7:00 in the high school new gym. Currently, Raymond Central has 40 students registered for Kindergarten.

Special Education-Numbers continue to increase in the Special Education Department. In May, the final distribution will be added to the Board Report.

Curriculum Report

Administration presented data from the Fall 2020 to Spring 2021 MAP scores showing positive results. MAP is a summative assessment and adaptive to individual student learning. It is one measure of student learning with standards.

Steve Rose reported on the work of our EIR Grant which will enhance STEM and Computer Science throughout the district.

Superintendent's Report

The last day of school for students will be Friday, May 14 with an 11:45 AM dismissal at our elementary school sites and a 12:00 PM dismissal at the Jr-Sr High School. Teachers will report for the week of May 17-21 and we will also provide a couple of days for classified staff to make up for missed time due to snow days.

We served 143 four-day meals to students over spring break. Thank you to Patty Hudson and her team for prepackaging meals and making this possible. We are planning to continue the Summer Lunch Program starting the week of May 17.

We are excited to announce the expansion of our preschool program with a stand-alone 3-year-old program. Right now we have 36 four-year-olds (max capacity) and 19 three-year-olds. We are currently working on the space where the 3-year-olds will be housed.

Wellness Committee Update - The Wellness Committee met on March 31 to discuss the Farm to Table Grant, Monthly Meal Program, Summer Lunch Program, and also the Governor's Wellness Award.

RC staff (over 60%) completed the personal wellness survey. The data collected from this will be used to create staff wellness goals.

The committee will also be reviewing student movement during class time through a teacher survey.

Teacher Evaluation Committee Update - The Teacher Evaluation Committee met on March 30 to continue the creation of our updated evaluation process and protocols. Significant steps were taken forward. The committee will meet on April 27 to finalize the evaluation rubric and develop the process that will be used. We will also meet a representative from TeachBoost who will be digitizing the process for us.

COVID-19 Update - We will continue to wear masks for the remainder of the school year. We will

also continue our mitigation protocols within our three school sites. We have received confirmation from both health departments that the variant strands have made their way to Nebraska. Thank you for everyone's continued efforts in helping to stop the spread of the virus. 85% of RC staff voluntarily signed up and were vaccinated.

We have not made any decisions about COVID-19 related protocols for the 2021-2022 school year. These conversations will occur over the summer.

PLC Summer Institute - ESU2 will be hosting a virtual Solution Tree PLC Workshop in Fremont June 2-4. We are seeking teachers who are interested in spending three days out of their summer to learn with the nation's experts on collaboration, MTSS, data-driven instruction, assessment, and more.

Raymond Central's Summer Academy for K-5 - Mrs Dostal and Mrs Egr have been working hard to develop Raymond Central's Summer Academy for 2021. The focus will be to close learning gaps for students in grades K-5. More information will be communicated when plans are finalized.

Update on Student Leadership Equity Work - Our plan is to create a 20-minute video introducing the work that the leadership team has been doing. We are still planning to bring Aaron Davis in to share his stories with our students. Bottom line is that our students need more experience and exposure to the world around them to understand differences among everyone. If we cannot identify our own bias, it will be difficult to create the movement we are looking to do across our amazing district.

Goal 1: Ensure continuing well being of staff and students by creating an equitable framework for responding to and recovering from a pandemic.

Goal 2: Continue the creation of a 10-year facilities strategic plan for implementation that addresses maintenance and improvements for existing building assets.

Goal 3: Develop progress monitoring tools to evaluate the effectiveness of district initiatives to ensure the sustainability over time.

Prom will be held March 27. Below is what was sent to Junior and Senior Parents. We are grateful for all the support in helping us create a memorable experience for our students!

Good afternoon! After many discussions, Raymond Central has developed a plan to safely host prom for our juniors and seniors. Prom will be held Saturday March 27, 2021. We feel it is important to provide our students with this experience as they have not had a dance since fall 2019, however, we must continue to stay diligent in our efforts to limit exposure to COVID-19 and its variant strands. As with any activity through the school, exposure of COVID-19 during prom may result in students quarantining depending upon the exposure and mitigating measures.

1. The dance will be held at Raymond Central Jr/Sr High. We are working to find donations for decorations since the dance will be held in the main gym. This space was selected as it provides the most space for the number of students planning to attend and we want to make sure the decoration makes it look less like a gym. Following are the protocols we will follow due to Covid:

- a. Temperatures will be taken at the door. Anyone with a 100 degree or higher fever will not be able to enter the dance.*
- b. Students will be required to sanitize their hands upon entering the dance and will be advised to wash/sanitize their hands often.*
- c. Masks will be required. Students will be given a wristband upon arrival. If a student is told to put their mask on, the wristband will be cut off. The next time we have to ask a student to put their mask on, they will be asked to leave. Wristbands may also be removed for inappropriate dancing or not following reasonable expectations.*
- d. There will be no dinner hosted by the school before Prom.*

2. Raymond Central students may bring a date from another school in the State of Nebraska only. Any student (dates included) that has or is displaying any symptoms of COVID-19 will be asked to not attend.

3. The crowning of Prom Royalty will be at 8:00 PM with the dance to follow. The dance will run from

4. Parents of Prom Royalty will be permitted to attend the crowning at 8:00 PM. The following protocols will be followed:

- b. Parents will be required to sanitize their hands upon entering the building.

Assessment - Students in grades 3-8 completed the NWEA MAP assessments. We are preparing for the statewide assessments this spring. All Nebraska juniors will be administered the ACT. Ms. Osten and Mrs. Stansberry have been working diligently to get the ACT testing requirements in place for our April 6 testing date. The NSCAS (Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System) summative assessments testing window is March 22-May 7. These assessments will measure student achievement relative to Nebraska's academic standard and will look quite different this year as the state transitions to a through year adaptive testing model. A Phase 1 Pilot is being administered in English Language Arts (gr 3-8) and Math (gr 3-8). The Science (gr 5 & 8) assessment will be a field test required for all grade 5 and 8 students. Most assessments will be administered on line with a few of the students given alternate assessments according to their IEPs. Due to the nature of the changes in the NSCAS system, assessment results will not be made public and limited data will be available to districts and individual student families. Mr. Steve Rose and Ms. Keely Schafer will monitor the computer components. Principals and teachers will be scheduling the assessments in their own buildings. I will be training most test proctors the week of March 15-19 to review testing protocols and changes made with the NSCAS system.

Curriculum and Instruction - I attended the spring NACIA (Curriculum Directors) virtual meeting on February 26. Dr. Dulaney from NSCA shared legislative updates. Dr. Lane Carr from NDE presented information regarding curriculum resources and the Nebraska Teacher and Principal Frameworks. Dr. Jeremy Heneger from Statewide Assessment shared updates to assessment for the spring and next year. Elementary teachers will continue work to align science standards, identify essential learnings, and create curriculum maps on March 8.

Professional Learning - PLCs met on March 8 to review data and make adjustments for action plans. All staff watched and then discussed the third episode of *The Mind Inside*. Progress continues on Grading and Assessment with the School Improvement Team. The Teacher Evaluation Committee had another meeting the afternoon of March 8. Teachers involved with the EIR grant have been working hard to implement practices in their classrooms. The teacher innovators and administration team will meet on March 24 to create action plans.

Staff Evaluation - Teacher PRIDE portfolios have been turned in. I will be meeting with probationary teachers for summative conferences and then move on to tenured teachers. Support staff evaluations will be next.

Parent Teacher Conferences - Conferences are scheduled for March 9 and 11 using a virtual format. Families have been asked to schedule their conferences using the on line system PTCfast.com. Report Cards for third quarter will be sent home on March 9 as well as the most recent NWEA MAP testing results. Thank you to our PTO for providing meals for teachers during conference nights.

An online book fair is being hosted on March 4-17. Usually we have an in person book fair during parent teacher conferences. Thank you to Ms Janet Dannelly for organizing the book fair.

We observed Read Across America Day/Dr. Seuss's birthday the week of March 1-4. Snippets from Dr. Seuss books were shared throughout the week. In conjunction with the theme for the day, everyone was encouraged to dress accordingly such as *One Fish, Two Fish, Red Fish, Blue Fish*, wear something

red or blue. Kudos to our teacher leaders Ms. Janet Dannelly, Mrs. Shelly Hlavaty, and Mrs. Monica Blank for their efforts. We are also encouraging all students to participate in a 20 minutes a day for 21 days in the month of March Reading Challenge. Students who read for 20 minutes for 21 days in March will earn a prize - a free book (shh - it's a surprise for students)!

A Kindergarten Round Up Parent Meeting is scheduled for March 29 at the High School. Parents of potential kindergarten students will meet to discuss kindergarten for 2021-2022. We will follow district protocols and procedures for safe gathering.

Curriculum Report

Superintendent's Report

School Improvement Team Update - THE SIP Team met last Friday to discuss the new book (Grading from the Inside Out) and to develop a plan of action for the rollout of our "grading for learning" movement. PLCs will engage in conversations from one of the chapters at the April late start along with hearing from our Jr/Sr High School Math PLC. We will then spend time at the end of the school year going through the districtwide document.

The Teacher Evaluation Committee met on Monday for 4 hours to discuss the document. The committee was able to develop the "proficient" category under each standard and performance indicator. The next step will be to meet in a couple of weeks to begin developing the other language for the categories.

Transportation Update - We started full routes (door-to-door service) on Tuesday. A big thank you to Cheryl Rieck for her work on developing these routes. Thank you to our bus drivers for being flexible and working through the new routes. I also want to thank our families for their patience. We do have a lead for another driver and will continue to search for more.

Feasibility Study Update - The Facilities Committee met this morning to discuss the executive summary.

Goal 1: Ensure continuing well being of staff and students by creating an equitable framework for responding to and recovering from a pandemic.

1. Performance Indicators:

- a. Expand the community knowledge and information about equity in the district through the implementation of the Board of Education adopted resolution in response to current racial disparity and injustice.
 - i. *The Student Advisory Group (Superintendent Advisory Committee) presented their work to the Board of Education at the February 2021 meeting. Since that meeting, the leadership team has met to develop the next steps. It was determined that the team will reach out to Aaron Davis, share the document broken down into what the resolution looks like and sound like, and will meet with him in the near future via Zoom.*
- b. Continue to monitor the spread of COVID-19 to make data-informed decisions and communicate accordingly.
 - i. *Each week I engage in three COVID-19 related Zoom Meetings. One meeting is with the Lancaster County Health Department, one with ESU2 superintendents, and one with the Three Rivers Health Department. These meetings focus on local data to be used when making decisions.*
 - ii. *85% of Raymond Central's staff have been vaccinated at this point in time. This took a lot of time and effort on the administrative team to develop schedules to cover classes, transport staff, and step into classrooms. The vaccine was open to all staff on a voluntary basis. The next mass vaccination will take place on March 25th.*
 - iii. *Our plan moving forward is to continue the mitigation strategies we have in place. With less than 9 weeks of school left, we must remain diligent in our successful practices. Our mask mandate will continue throughout the end of the school year as variant strands of COVID-19 have found their way into Nebraska.*
- c. Preserve the continuity of essential school functions through the use of research based mitigating measures.

- i. *We have fully adopted our remote learning plan which asked parents/guardians to complete a form requesting their students learn from home. This lowered our overall numbers of remote learners for the second semester. I want to thank our teachers and staff for their efforts in making remote learning an option for students. At this point in time, remote learning will not be an academic option for students next year.*
 - ii. *We have collaborated with the local health department to create a safe and healthy plan for students to attend prom. Students have not attended a school-sponsored dance since 2019. We are excited to provide this opportunity for students and I appreciate the efforts of our administrators, parents/guardians, and other organizations who have contributed to ensuring our students a prom experience.*
 - d. **Minimize educational and social disruption.**
 - i. *We currently have 22 students learning remotely full-time between grades K-12. This number is down from over 30 as we closed out the second semester. Students still engage in remote learning if they test positive for COVID-19 or someone in their family does which requires quarantine.*
 - ii. *As I stated earlier, the district was able to create a vaccination schedule that allowed for any staff member who wanted a vaccine to get one. This took a team effort, however, we were able to complete this task with minimal disruptions to the learning environment.*
 - iii. *We also learned that the free Zoom accounts were nice to use until issues arose. Since then the district has purchased Zoom accounts for staff through ESU2. This allows us to monitor and track student IP addresses if behavior issues arise.*
 - e. **Respond to academic losses.**
 - i. *Professional Learning Communities are now reviewing and using MAP and FastBridge data to develop individual student learning plans. This will continue through spring. The administrative team has been discussing a summer school option for students. The summer school program will look different for students in grades K-5, 6-8, and 9-12. We will use CARES2 money to fund this and will share more information when it is available. Ideally, the program will be for any student who has not met grade-level expectations during the 2020-2021 school year.*
 - ii. *The Jr/Sr High School also implemented a Friday School on March 5th, which was approved for COVID-19 planning time. Students who were failing or falling behind were invited in to work with staff to get caught up.*
 - iii. *We continue to revise our MTSS structure to ensure students have the interventions necessary to close achievement gaps.*
 - iv. *Steve Rose has been working hard to get our new software, EDUclimber up and running. This software will be a one-stop-shop for student data. It will break down a student's attendance, demographic, achievement scores, etc. One of the most difficult tasks for Steve is uploading historical data.*

Goal 2: Continue the creation of a 10-year facilities strategic plan for implementation that addresses maintenance and improvements for existing building assets.

1. *Performance Indicators:*

Develop progress monitoring tools to evaluate the effectiveness of district initiatives to ensure the sustainability over time.

2. Performance Indicators:

- a. Sustain an effective and meaningful Professional Learning Community framework at RC to drive professional inquiry among staff.
 - i. *Professional Learning Communities continue to be our vehicle for professional learning, growth, and collaboration. We have revamped the two-hour late starts to provide 1 hour of PLC time and 1 hour of teacher preparation time. This balance came from survey data when teachers were asked what they needed to continue high levels of teaching in their classrooms. Teachers continue to discuss Essential Learning Outcomes that stem from content/grade-level standards. We continue to use the 4 questions from the work of Dufour's "Learning by Doing". We will engage teachers in additional professional learning around effective PLCs at the end of the school year and the beginning of next year.*
 - ii. *Every PLC has created a data-driven SMART Goal that they will collaboratively work towards for the 2020-2021 school year. This goal has been revisited monthly to determine next steps.*
 - iii. *We will send another team of teachers to a Solution Tree PLC Summer Institute. Mrs. Dostal is currently working to find a date and location for this. Our goal is to provide the opportunity for all staff to attend over the span of several years.*
 - iv. *We have worked on teacher engagement into the revised teacher evaluation document that is still in draft form. This has been an excellent opportunity for administration, teachers, and BOE members to reflect on what current practice is and connect it to best practice. We have made strides toward creating a document that includes teacher reflection, focus on STEM activities, our equity work, etc. It has been a difficult process to condense all of the work we have done as a district into a single document, however, the committee remains committed to having this done by May.*
- b. Adopt the Multi-Tiered System of Supports to ensure learning for all students through targeted interventions.
 - i. *We continue to create our MTSS system as resources become available. The academic side of the triangle continues to improve with the increased use of Fastbridge and MAP assessments. Teachers have also started to co-create common assessments to track student progress. Teachers have collaborated to*

- provide support for students at all levels. The key to a successful MTSS structure is understanding what essential learning outcomes students are working towards. Feedback and assessment are key to providing targeted support to students.*
- ii. *The behavior side of the triangle is currently under construction. Once the grading and assessment component is complete, more targeted interventions and supports can be implemented. The next step is to create a district-wide behavior system.*
 - iii. *The social-emotional side of the triangle is taking a step forward through the Disaster Grant. Training will be provided for staff on trauma-informed care, self-care, etc.*
 - iv. *We are excited for Mrs. Egr to lead this work going into the 2021-2022 school year. It is important we have a district lead as creating a behavior model for the district will require a systematic approach across three building sites.*
- c. Create a districtwide grading and assessment framework focused on student growth and learning.
- i. *The School Improvement Team has been reading the book "Grading Inside Out". The team is now aligning the draft grading and assessment document with their learning around effective practices. This will be presented to teachers at the end of May with a soft rollout during the first semester of the 2021-2022 school year.*
- d. Create a Positive Behavioral Intervention System of Supports district-wide to track and reward positive behavior.
- i. *This performance indicator is a work in progress. No specific update at this time.*
 - ii. *This will become a priority for research during the 2021-2022 school year.*
- e. Update/Modify the current teacher evaluation system (P.R.I.D.E.) to emphasize teacher growth and reflection for the betterment of student learning.
- i. *The Teacher Evaluation Committee has a draft document that outlines the components for teacher evaluation. There is a face-to-face meeting scheduled for Monday, March 8th where the team will align the standards with components to ensure no overlap exists and expectations are consistent.*
- f. Model and reinforce a "fail forward" attitude among staff and students to focus on learning rather than compliance.
- i. *As we continue to become more focused on STEM, teachers will be implementing the 4 c's (communication, collaboration, creativity, critical thinking). This not only aligns with our Vision 2025, but it is also what our students need to engage in to meet our district's mission statement. Steve Rose has been leading the charge through our EIR grant. He has been getting into classrooms and monitoring progress through the DiscoveryEd Digital Leadership Corp. At the next late start, the administrative team, Steve, and the 16 teachers who are participating in the leadership corp will meet. We will also engage in instructional walkthroughs to collect data on student engagement in the near future.*
 - ii. *Our professional readings and conversations around grading practices have increased our knowledge around engagement and learning versus compliance. This has been a topic of discussion through our partnership with DiscoveryEd.*
 - iii. *I have continued to model a positive outlook during a year that it could be easy to fall in a crack. Our buildings have done a number of things to build culture and stress the importance of teamwork. We are truly in this together and living day-to-day.*

Facilities Report

The Facilities Priority List is continually updated. Large projects we have left to complete are:

- Replace another 2 Addison HVAC units at the Jr/Sr High School
- Re-pave the main drive at the Jr/Sr High School
- Replace the roof over areas 2, 4, 6, and 8 at the Jr/Sr High School
- Create the waterway in our farmland to the south to eliminate the erosion issue. This will also allow us to develop our cross country/community walking course.
- Phase I concrete work at the Jr/Sr High School
- Lighting for the main drive (this may be a two-year project)

Video Board - Mrs. Osten and I have been working on updating the video board outside the Mustang Room. We have been starting to add pictures, content, and update records.

Teachers are designing engaging lessons to close the learning loss in grade level benchmarks for reading, writing, and math. Cross grade level groups of grades K and 1, grades 2 and 3, and grades 4 and 5 will be offered at each elementary school; however, these groupings are dependent on student need and participation numbers. Participants will be expected to attend each day the Summer Academy is planned.

Summer Academy 2021 will take place from June 8-July 1 on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Approximate times will be from 9:00-11:30am. A take home lunch will be provided to participants. Wrap around child care will be available through the Civic Nebraska Summer Program for a fee.

Invitations to individual students and their families for Summer Academy 2021 will be sent home in mid April.

6. The Kindergarten parent meeting was held Monday, March 29 at 7:00 in the high school new gym. Currently, Raymond Central has 40 students registered for Kindergarten.

1. State Testing (NSCAS) – Testing window is now open for the Phase I Pilot. The format for the tests are new this year. NDE describes these as adaptive through year tests. Since the testing is new, limited results will be available to the public. The ELA (English Language Arts) Test and the Math Test are being administered to students in grades 3-8. The students take the tests on-line for an unlimited amount of time. Students in grades 5 and 8 will also be administered the Science Test. Students who qualify for accommodations may take their test on the computer with accommodation. No paper/pencil tests will be given this year. RC also has some students who are given an alternate version of the test if they meet the qualifications. Mr. Steve Rose and Mrs. Keely Schaffer are facilitating the technology components for the on-line tests. Each school has their own schedule, with all the testing completed by April 29. Makeup testing will be given the following week. I held training sessions for all staff who will serve as proctors for testing.
2. ACT – All juniors took the ACT on April 6. A huge thank you to Ms. Tasha Osten and Mrs. Allison Stansberry for facilitating all the many tasks associated with giving the ACT.
3. Professional Learning – Teachers met on March 24 to review data and begin preparations for Summer Academy.
4. Parent-Teacher Conferences – Conferences were held via Zoom on March 9 and 11. The home-school connection is vital for the education of our students. The attendance report is attached.
5. Planning for 2020-21 – A parent meeting for all 2021-22 Raymond Central prospective kindergarteners was held on March 29. There are currently a total of 42 kindergarteners registered in the district for 2021-22. Visitation Day for prospective kindergarteners will be Monday, May 3. Transition date for 5th to 6th grade is scheduled for April 29 with a meeting for parents to be held in August. The hiring process for next school year is mostly complete with screening, reference checks, and interviewing.
6. PTO – Thank you to the PTO for providing meals for the teachers during parent-teacher conferences. PTO is sponsoring some end of year special events for our students. We appreciate their continued support.
7. Other happenings at Valparaiso:
 - We participated in Severe Weather Awareness week and practiced a tornado drill on Wednesday, March 24.
 - Many staff received their second vaccination on March 25. Consequently, both March 25 and March 26 were very busy at school covering classrooms. Special thanks to all staff who did “whatever it takes” to make it happen.
 - Students were encouraged to participate in a reading challenge during March. Valparaiso had 47 students complete their reading logs to document reading at home for at least 20 minutes a day for 20 days in March. Students who met the challenge received a free book. Thank you to the PTO for purchasing the books and to Mrs. Hlavaty for organizing and facilitating the challenge.
 - An online Book Fair was held from March 4-17. We usually have a Book Fair at the school in conjunction with parent teacher conferences, but we adjusted for this year.
 - Growth and Development was presented to 4th and 5th graders on April 1. Genders and grades were split. Nurse Amanda Ehlers led the video and discussion for each grade for the girls. Mr. Steve Rose led the boys at each grade level with a video and discussion.
 - The Plant Sale will be held on May 1. Drive thru pick up is scheduled from 9am to 3pm at the Valparaiso Elementary parking lot. All ordering is now complete. A limited number of plants will be available for open sale. Thank you to Mrs. Kristine White and Mrs. Kendra Carlson for organizing the

sale and to all who ordered plants. All proceeds benefit the Jump Start to Kindergarten and Kindness Retreats.

- TeamMates is hosting a Book Fair at Barnes and Noble located at South Pointe Pavilion in Lincoln. In store shopping days are May 8 and 9. The online shopping dates are May 8-13.
- Track and Field Day is being planned for the week of May 10 with upper grades attending in the morning and primary grades participating in the afternoon. Each school will have their own day at their own site to align with our current protocols.
- The Elementary Music Program for grades 3-5 is scheduled for May 10. To align with current protocols, the concert will be virtual. Mr. Strouf and Mr. Luke will record the segments and then send the video out to families. Positive feedback was received from families regarding this format for the Winter Concert.

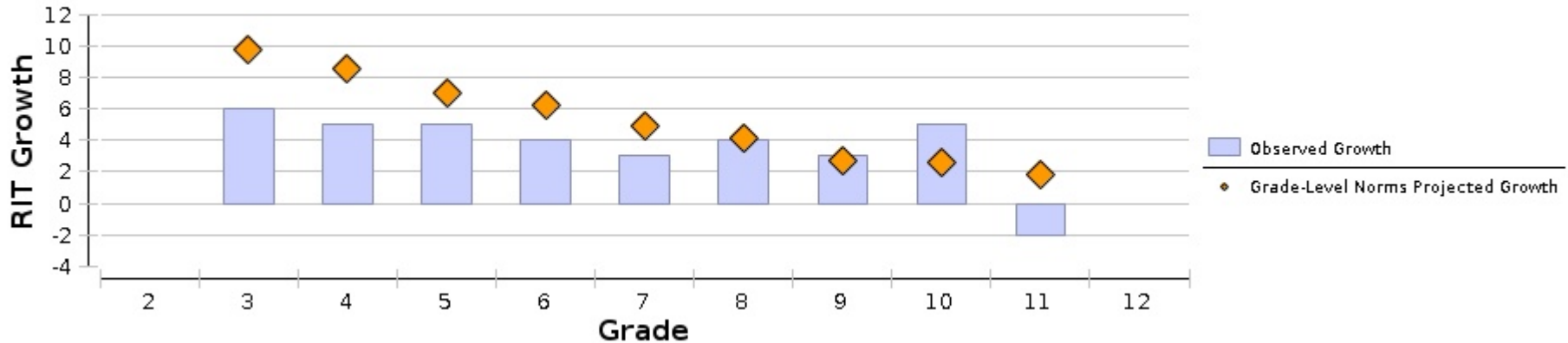

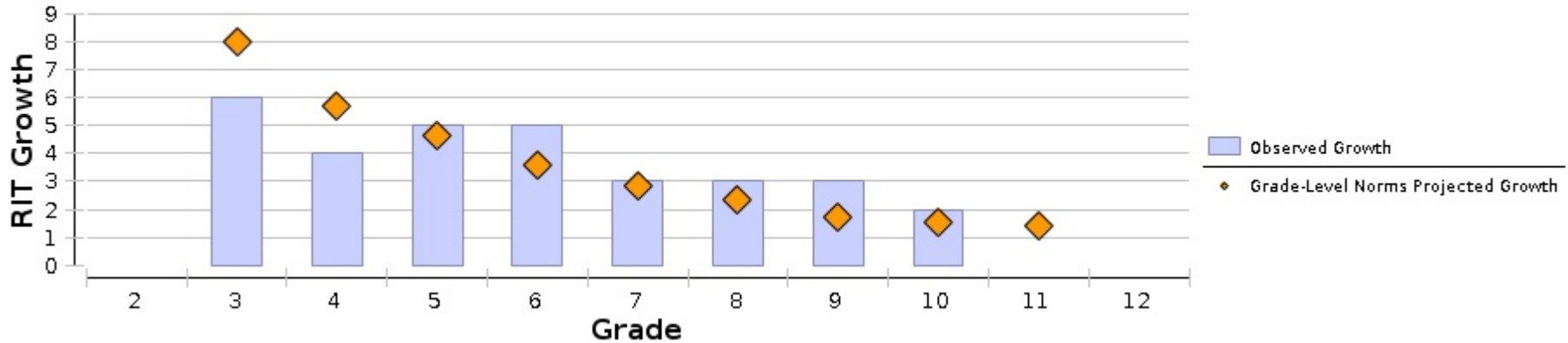

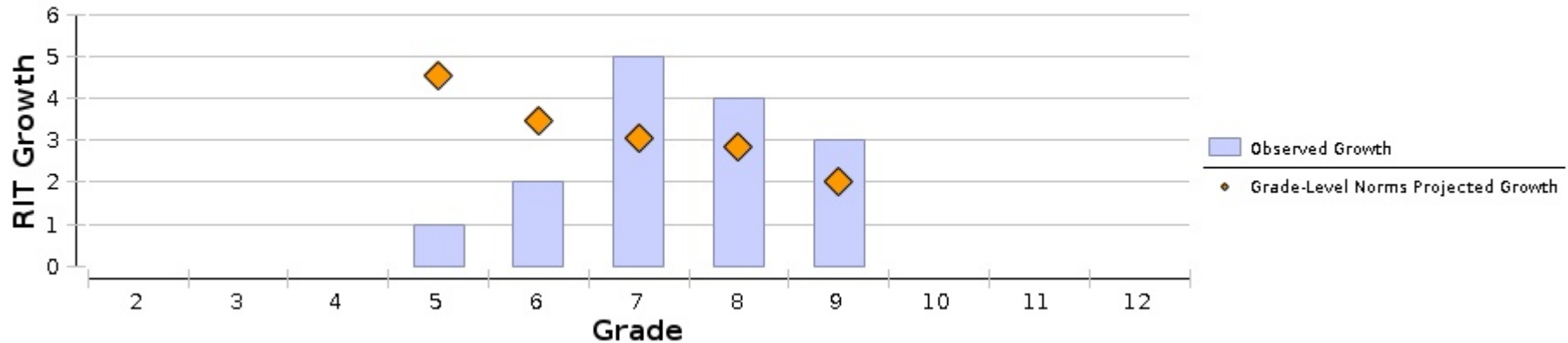

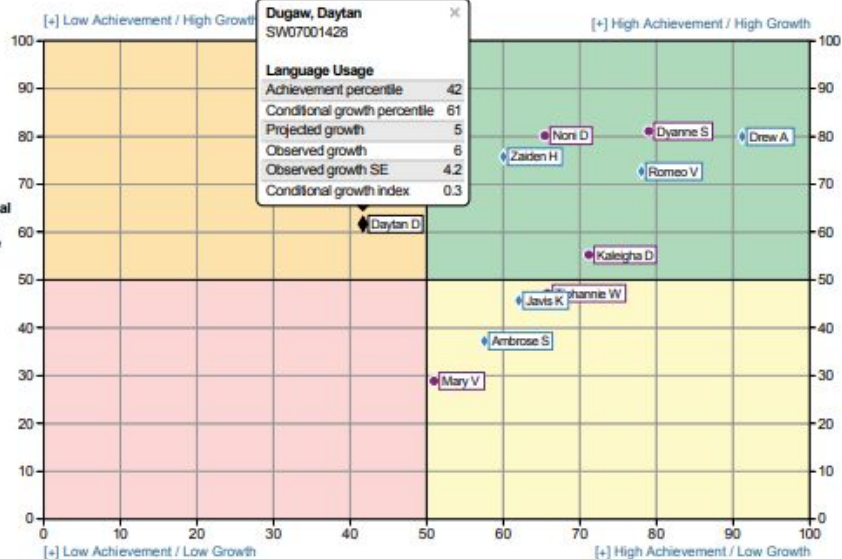

The Future of Work: Will Our Children Be Prepared?

Collectively Administrators and Teachers have participated in almost 500 hours of targeted professional development in the area of STEM this school year.

 - Admin Professional Development (4 sessions) and individual coaching sessions (7 scheduled) with Albert DuPont.
 - STEM Calibration Walkthrough 3/16/21 and 4/13/21
 - 1st Round: 16 classrooms 2-3 groups in each classroom
 - 2nd Round: 8 classrooms (6-12)
 - Gathering [evidence](#) to begin conversations around what STEM looks like in the classroom.
- 16 teachers being trained the first 3 years
 - Developing “First Followers”
 - 3 at Ceresco (Traci H. 1st, Kim H. 2nd, Nikole F. 4th)
 - 3 at Val (Kendra C. K, Jamie E. 2nd, Erin B. 4th)
 - Lori Morgan - STEM / Computer at Elementary
 - 3 at 6-8 (Adison K., Jill H., Sydney P.)
 - 6 at 9-12 (Celia N. Greg W., Carolyn E., Courtney P., Nicole H., Rebecca P.)
- Professional Development and Coaching
 - Teachers have completed 5 professional development trainings and 10 individual coaching sessions with Discovery Education Trainer Mark Jankowski.
 - Training has been via zoom but are going to transition to in-person training next year.
 - Teachers have been learning the suite of Discovery Education products.
 - Training is not just about those tools but about shifting the mindset of teachers and students to understand and apply the concepts of those 5C areas in relation to their learning and understanding of content in all subject areas.
 - Working on developing a STEM culture and mindset with vocabulary and lessons focused in and around the use of the 4Cs (Communication, Collaboration, Critical Thinking, and Creativity).
 - RC is developing the 5th C of “Connections to the Real World” (Citizenship)
 - A [Calibration Document](#) is in progress to develop what a STEM environment will look like for students and teachers at Raymond Central.
 - Work was done on this [document](#) on 3/24 with all the Administrators and STEM teachers working to define those areas.
 - The next step in developing this process will be to do more walk-throughs and then put the document in front of the entire staff at the end of the year.

STEM Mentor Program and Camps

- Aimed at providing mentors to expose students to STEM related opportunities and careers
- Geared towards middle school and highschool girls, but shifting to other students next year.
- Focused on demographics of low socioeconomic, special education, and minority students
- Raymond Central currently has 7 students participating, and will be looking to have as many as 20 moving into the next school year.
- They have met with their mentors and will continue to do that once a month. All 7 students are also participating in a monthly STEM group activity that is being sponsored and led by the UNL College of Engineering (Sally Wei)
 - The [STEM Activity](#) this last month was structured around roller coaster engineering and the engineering design process. (touchscreens, Artificial Hearts)
- Summer Camp Opportunities
 - These will not happen this year due to covid.
 - Moving forward these will become available to more than just mentored students and will involve multiple day camp opportunities that will provide STEM activities and opportunities to learn about STEM related careers and learning opportunities.

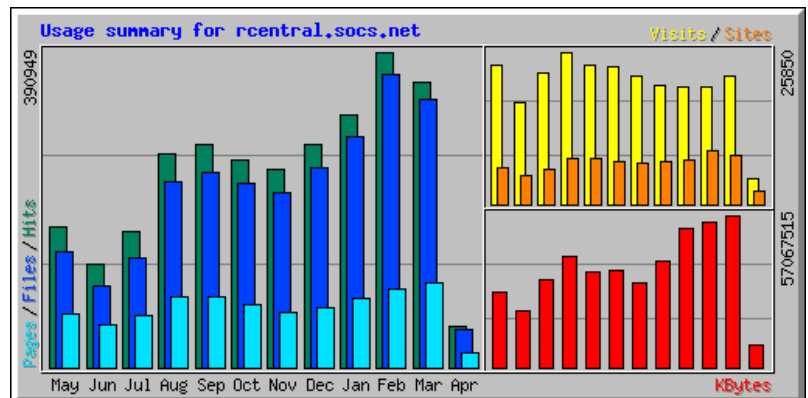

STANDARD RESPONSE PROTOCOL

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND GUARDIANS

Our school has adopted The "I Love U Guys" Foundation's Standard Response Protocol (SRP). Students and staff will be training, practicing, and drilling the protocol.

COMMON LANGUAGE

The Standard Response Protocol (SRP) is based on an all-hazards approach as opposed to individual scenarios. Like the Incident Command System (ICS), SRP utilizes clear common language while allowing for flexibility in protocol.

The premise is simple - there are five specific actions that can be performed during an incident. When communicating these, the action is labeled with a "Term of Art" and is then followed by a "Directive." Execution of the action is performed by active participants, including students, staff, teachers and first responders. The SRP is based on the following actions: Hold, Secure, Lockdown, Evacuate, and Shelter.

HOLD

"In Your Classroom or Area"

Students are trained to:

- Clear the hallways and remain in their area or room until the "All Clear" is announced
- Do business as usual

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Close and lock the door
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual



SECURE

"Get Inside. Lock outside doors"

Students are trained to:

- Return to inside of building
- Do business as usual

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Bring everyone indoors
- Lock the outside doors
- Increase situational awareness
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual



LOCKDOWN

"Locks, Lights, Out of Sight"

Students are trained to:

- Move away from sight
- Maintain silence
- Do not open the door

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Recover students from hallway if possible
- Lock the classroom door
- Turn out the lights
- Move away from sight
- Maintain silence
- Do not open the door
- Prepare to evade or defend



EVACUATE

"To a Location"

Students are trained to:

- Leave stuff behind if required to
- If possible, bring their phone
- Follow instructions

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Bring roll sheet and Go Bag (unless instructed not to bring anything with them, dependent on reason for evacuation.)
- Lead students to Evacuation location
- Account for students and adults
- Report injuries or problems using Red Card/Green Card method.



SHELTER

"State Hazard and Safety Strategy"

Hazards might include:

- Tornado
- Hazmat
- Earthquake
- Tsunami

Safety Strategies might include:

- Evacuate to shelter area
- Seal the room
- Drop, cover and hold
- Get to high ground

Students are trained in:

- Appropriate Hazards and Safety Strategies

Adults and staff are trained in:

- Appropriate Hazards and Safety Strategies
- Accounting for students and adults
- Report injuries or problems using Red Card/Green Card method.





STANDARD RESPONSE PROTOCOL

PARENT GUIDANCE

In the event of a live incident, parents may have questions about their role.

SECURE

“Get Inside. Lock outside doors”



Secure is called when there is something dangerous outside of the building. Students and staff are brought into the building and the outside doors will be locked. The school might display the Building is Secured poster on entry doors or nearby windows. Inside, it will be business as usual.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A SECURE EVENT?

Probably not. Every effort is made to conduct classes as normal during a secure event. Additionally, parents may be asked to stay outside during a Secure event.

WHAT IF PARENTS NEED TO PICK UP THEIR STUDENT?

Depending on the situation, it may not be safe to release the student. As the situation evolves, Secure might change to a Monitored Entry and/or Controlled Release.



WILL PARENTS BE NOTIFIED WHEN A SCHOOL GOES INTO SECURE?

When a secure event is brief or the hazard is non-violent, like a wild animal on the playground, there may not be a need to notify parents while the Secure is in place.

With longer or more dangerous events, the school should notify parents that the school has increased their security.

LOCKDOWN

“Locks, Lights, Out of Sight”



A Lockdown is called when there is something dangerous inside of the building. Students and staff are trained to enter or remain in a room that can be locked, and maintain silence.

A Lockdown is only initiated when there is an active threat inside or very close to the building.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A LOCKDOWN?

The natural inclination for parents is to go to the school during a Lockdown. Understandable, but perhaps problematic. If there is a threat inside the building, law enforcement will be responding. It is unlikely that parents will be granted access to the building or even the campus. If parents are already in the school, they will be instructed to Lockdown as well.

SHOULD PARENTS TEXT THEIR STUDENTS?

The school recognizes the importance of communication between parents and students during a Lockdown event. Parents should be aware though, during the initial period of a Lockdown, it may not be safe for students to text their parents. As the situation resolves, students may be asked to update their parents on a regular basis.

In some cases, students may be evacuated and transported off-site for a student-parent reunification.

WHAT ABOUT UNANNOUNCED DRILLS?

The school may conduct unannounced drills, however it is highly discouraged to conduct one without announcing that it as a drill. That's called an unannounced drill and can cause undue concern and stress.

Parents should recognize that the school will always inform students that it is a drill during the initial announcement.

It's important to differentiate between a **drill** and an exercise. A drill is used to create the “Muscle Memory” associated with a practiced action. There is no simulation of an event; this is simply performing the action. An exercise simulates an actual event to test the capacity of personnel and equipment.

CAN PARENTS OBSERVE OR PARTICIPATE IN THE DRILLS?

The school welcomes parents who wish to observe or participate in drills.



2021 Raymond Central/VABA Agreement

For the 2021 Raymond Central baseball season (and softball, pending Ceresco agreement), RC and VABA agree to the following conditions:

- RC is responsible for Jared Shanahan's hours for field prep prior to home events and as needed for practice.
- VABA will charge RC \$25 for one field and \$40 for both fields in one day to use the field groomer. The total payment for the season will be submitted to VABA no later than 30 days after the final home event.
- RC will purchase drying agent for fields on a per bag charge. For the 2021 season, the cost per bag will be \$12.00. Jared Shanahan will keep a log of the number of bags used during the season.
- RC will purchase the lime for lining fields for school-sponsored games.
- RC parents will be responsible for working the concession stand during home games. At the end of each season, VABA will donate 20% of the profits to the baseball and softball teams no later than 30 days after the final home game.
- RC will rake around bases, fill in the batter's box and pitcher's mound, and remove all bases from the field and place them in the dugout after each practice and game.
- Per the 2020 Agreement, RC will purchase up to 4 tons of infield conditioner for the 2021 season (\$360 per ton) as it was put on hold due to COVID-19. VABA will purchase additional infield conditioner as needed.

These conditions were mutually agreed upon by both Raymond Central and VABA on March 17, 2021. A meeting will be scheduled in January 2022 to discuss conditions for the 2021 seasons.
