Theresa Seipel read the Mission Statement.

G. Presentations

1. Foundation Presentation

2. CPS Foundation Executive and Marketing Director Nicole Anderson said her marketing theme is I'm a Discoverer. She said CPS staff are the best form of marketing. Anderson said since she started in January through May a lot has happened. There is a new CPS Foundation website www.cpsanchor.com. She has tried to design it to be a one stop shop for alumni. The new site also allows for online registrations and donations. This year the foundation awarded 25 scholarships and \$5,000 in dual credit scholarships for Career and Technical Education classes.

3. There were three applications for classroom grants and two were awarded. Chelsea Werner was approved to purchase speech apps for kids to use. Anderson said these are very cost effective because the app can be put in the cloud so it doesn't need to be on a specific machine. Stacy Smith and Heidi Field were also approved to purchase bands to be used in strength and conditioning.

Carl Edwards was selected as Operations Employee of the Year and Stacy Smith was named Educator of the Year. Anderson and Executive Director of Operations and Technology Leonard Kwapnioski are working with Platte Valley Precast to get the sidewalk around the anchor poured. The goal is to have it done before the first reunion in July. She said she has also been pushing for people to purchase bricks. The Discoverer Dash is set for Sept. 13. The first year of the dash there were 60 kids who registered, a little over 100 last year and this year the goal is 150. The lighting of the anchor will be on Dec. 7 after the first home basketball game. There will be smores and some entertainment

to go along with the ceremony. Anderson said she has also been working on getting out the I Love Public Schools message and how it benefits people. Another big push was for the #BeKind challenge that CHS teacher Patrick Clark issued to students and the community.

There has been a growth in Facebook communication. Anderson is working on getting patrons to continue to return the page and stay engaged. She said it is important that CPS is showing consistent growth in all areas. By next year, there should be even more growth. Ideally, she said she would like to see the district site be more even with the schools instead of having the district having more contact. Anderson said it has been challenging to keep people engaged over the summer since not much is going on in the schools. Her goal is to do one post a week to try to keep people engaged. There are more women than men who like CPS on Facebook and the numbers of likes increase at the middle and high school levels. Anderson said the Facebook age demographics are interesting. Centennial and Emerson have a higher average age between 25-34, which must mean the families are a little younger. She said more of those 27 and younger will be more involved in Instagram. She said the goal is to try to connect to more families. By going to Instagram, there may also be more kids going on and liking photos. This would provide a good teaching opportunity to show kids how to use social media correctly.

The top things for 2019-20 is focusing on the I am a Discoverer Branding and the CPS logo. Other important issues include an increased focus on engaging alumni and students in the conversation; strategic and consistent use of digital platforms - Instagram, Twitter, Facebook and the website; an increased communication amongst district staff; the anchor project; #BeDiscovererKind; and the Kramer Education Center. Superintendent Dr. Troy Loeffelholz said the district website arrangement is all across the board. He said they are working on getting three or four things that are consistent at all schools so people will know where to find things. When the district switched to the new site, everything was just converted over. Anderson said with branding and marketing, the district is selling to the parents. Anderson said everyone needs to feel like they are a Discoverer. Board President Candy Becher asked if each of the elementary schools will still get to have a mascot. Anderson said they also need to have that connection with the school, so the mascots will stay. The idea of being a discoverer is to discoverer something greater than yourself.

Dr. Loeffelholz said the district is still working with Clark Creative Group on coming up with a C logo. He said several districts also have specific guidelines on how to use the logo. Dr. Loeffelholz said Clark Creative is still researching if the current C is a copyright infringement. He said the district is

trying to be proactive about the logo. Dr. Loeffelholz said before a logo is adopted, it will be approved by the board.

H. Board Special Functions

1. CPS Elementary Student Handbook

North Park Principal Bob Hausmann said there were a few additions and some cleanup done to the handbook. He said the principals felt that some of the wording needed to be consolidated. Hausmann said some of the changes were asked to be made by the school nurses, which is a reflection of what the state is saying must be changed. Hausmann said one of the major changes in this area is that children with headlice will not be sent home, but their parents will be contacted and a treatment plan will be developed. Dr. Loeffelholz said legally, these students cannot be sent home and treatments could be done at school.

2. Financial Reports M2, M3, M4a

The approximate revenue of \$6.3 million is a larger amount than usual because of the hefty property tax payment, Executive Director of Business Operations and Human Relations Dave Melick said. The lunch account also has a positive balance. Candy Becher asked why does the district make money on the lunches. Melick said when more lunches are sold and the company is working efficiently, there should be a profit. Becher said it bothers her that the district is making money off of the lunches. Dr. Loeffelholz said it is not uncommon to have a positive balance. He said the lunch fund is supposed to be self-sustaining, but it also must include the replacement of equipment. Dr. Loeffelholz said the district bought all the equipment for the new high school out of the lunch fund. Melick said the district will have one more payment of state aid in July because there is no payment in August. He said the district will also be doing less advertising in the Omaha World Herald because most of the people are not finding out about the jobs through that medium and it is costly. He said the district is focusing more on online advertising. CDW was paid \$7,247.36 for LCD projects. The \$55,616.55 payment was made to Father Flanagan's Boys' Home for the educating of students at Duncan with half being special education and half being regular ed.

3. Financial Report M4b

Seipel Repair was paid \$1,802.68 for brake work on a suburban and a bus and regular services on other vehicles.

4. Financial Report M5

Imagine Learning Inc. was paid \$10,073 for student licenses. This is an alternative program used at the elementary and middle school level. Marzano Research was paid \$28,400 for professional development and a trainer to come and work with staff. Executive Director of Curriculum and Instruction Amy Romshek said this is not even the full payment. NWEA Northwest Evaluation Association was paid \$21,235 for the math growth test for next year.

5. Certified Personnel

Kelsey Newman was hired as the new high school science teacher and will also be the head softball coach. Rachel Schmid resigned as the SPED Early Childhood Teacher. Melick said it is highly unlikely there will be a replacement found. He said there is a plan in place to move people around to make it work.

K. Acceptance of Gifts/Donations

The total contributions for May were \$32,448.82. The year to date donations are \$381,448.82. Dr. Loeffelholz said a few years ago the total donations were only at \$100,000. The CPS Foundation received \$20,000 from Behlen Mfg. for 3D printers for CMS and STEM on the Go. There was also a \$30,000 donation to STEM on the Go. There are more than 50 kids signed up for the STEM Enrichment Camps this summer.

L. Business Operations and Human Relations

1. Administrative Functions

1. Surplus Property

Melick said many of these items are broke or outdated, and the district has no use for them now.

2. Meal Prices for 2019-2020

The lunch prices will remain the same as last year. Melick said the district is not allowed to lower the price even though there

is a surplus of money. Dr. Loeffelholz said some years the district has had to increase the rate but not this year. Theresa Seipel said if there is extra money, perhaps some funds could be used to make the lunches a little nicer. Melick said he will pass that information along. Dr. Loeffelholz said food service will be replacing some equipment this summer.

2. Updates

Melick encouraged the board to read the article in the Omaha World Herald about state aid. He said it is very informative. There are 284 staff participating in the Emergency Medical Bank. There were a little over 200 days available this year and the amount used ranged from 1.25 days up to 15 days. There were 11 teachers who benefited from the bank. Melick said this bank does not cover everything. There are 95 days left over. Melick said he will be asking teachers to donate a day because the balance fell below 100 days. Staff must put in a day to take advantage of the bank.

2. Updates

Kramer Education Center is enclosed and work is starting on the inside. Dr. Loeffelholz said once the area dries out, some landscaping will be done to get the water to drain away from the building. He said quotes will also be sought to put up a Kramer Education Center Sign.

N. Curriculum and Instruction

1. Administrative Functions

1. Approval of Courses for 2019-2020: Anatomy & Physiology, Environmental Science, Biology, Chemistry, Science 5th, Science 6th, Science 7th, Science 8th, Introduction to Business, Accounting, and Advanced Accounting

Romshek said these 11 courses are not new but rewritten. The four at the high school are anatomy and physiology, environmental sciences, biology and chemistry. There were new science standards for grades 5-8. At this level, curriculum needed to be rewritten. Romshek said this had to be done because NDE determined what units of study had to be taught. She said students can get a taste of many topics at different levels. The business courses have been updated and some were eliminated. Romshek said these

will continue to be worked on next year. She said she feels the middle school science is a step in the right direction.

2. Purchase approval for texts and resources for the following courses:

Anatomy & Physiology materials
5th through 8th Science materials
Introduction to Business materials
Accounting materials
Advanced Accounting materials

The total cost of the high school science textbook materials will be 13,387,22. The middle School STEMscopes for grades 5-8 will cost \$51,025.45. Romshek said the teachers wanted to pilot one more science curriculum but they couldn't find anything better than STEMscopes. They will be buying a three-year subscription. Romshek said this program is filled with a lot of resources, and it does mean that the students will be on their Chromebooks all class. She said it is very hands on. Romshek said the science teachers looked hard and STEMscopes is a good product. The Business and Marketing books will cost \$17,628.00.

2. Updates

No updates were given.

O. Student Services

1. Administrative Functions

1. Request for Speech Therapists

Dr. Loeffelholz said the caseloads are very big for the speech therapists. There are 488 students in need of services which is up from the last five years. Dr. Loeffelholz said it is time to add more help, but he said it is doubtful the district will find someone. He said for some of the hard to fill positions like the SLP, the district may want to consider hiring every year. The board wanted to know if an SLP could be paid more since the position is hard to fill. Melick said the pay is negotiated, but there is some wiggle room with the signing bonus. Contracting services for these students is also not easy because their caseloads are just as high.

2. Updates

There were no updates given.

P. Superintendent's Report

July 15 will be the only meeting for the month. The board

retreat will be on August 5, and this will be the Committee as a Whole meeting. The regular meeting will be on August 19. The next Community 4 Kids meeting will involve daycare and preschool providers. Dr. Loeffelholz said many of these providers are wanting professional development. He said this is something the district could help provide. If students are not going to CPS, they would at least be attending a quality daycare or preschool. Dr. Loeffelholz said other communities invite private providers to professional development. The next opportunity for professional development will be July 9 with dinner at 6 and meeting starting at 6:30 at the ESU north building. Dr. Loeffelholz invited the board members to attend if they wanted.

Q. Board Sharing

Mike Jeffryes said his children just got back from taking a trip to Costa Rica. He said it was a fantastic experience. Doug Willoughby said he was grateful for the minutes and the detail that is included. Seipel said summer is a very busy time of year and it is going fast. Mike Goos said he did not have anything to share this month. Candy Becher said the board will do the executive session next month on the superintendent's evaluation. She said she is also glad that it is summer. Dr. Loeffelholz said the board should review how to handle trips that are overseas and being hosted by teachers in the summer, but are not school sponsored. He said these are not school sanctioned activities so the school cannot be used for meetings or fundraising. If they are school sanctioned, they must fall under the guidelines of the district. He said if the meetings and other things happen inside the school, the district could be liable. The board did not think this is something the district should be involved in, so this will be discussed more in the future.

II. Executive Session

The board did go into executive session.

III. Adjourn

The meeting adjourned at 7:15 p.m.

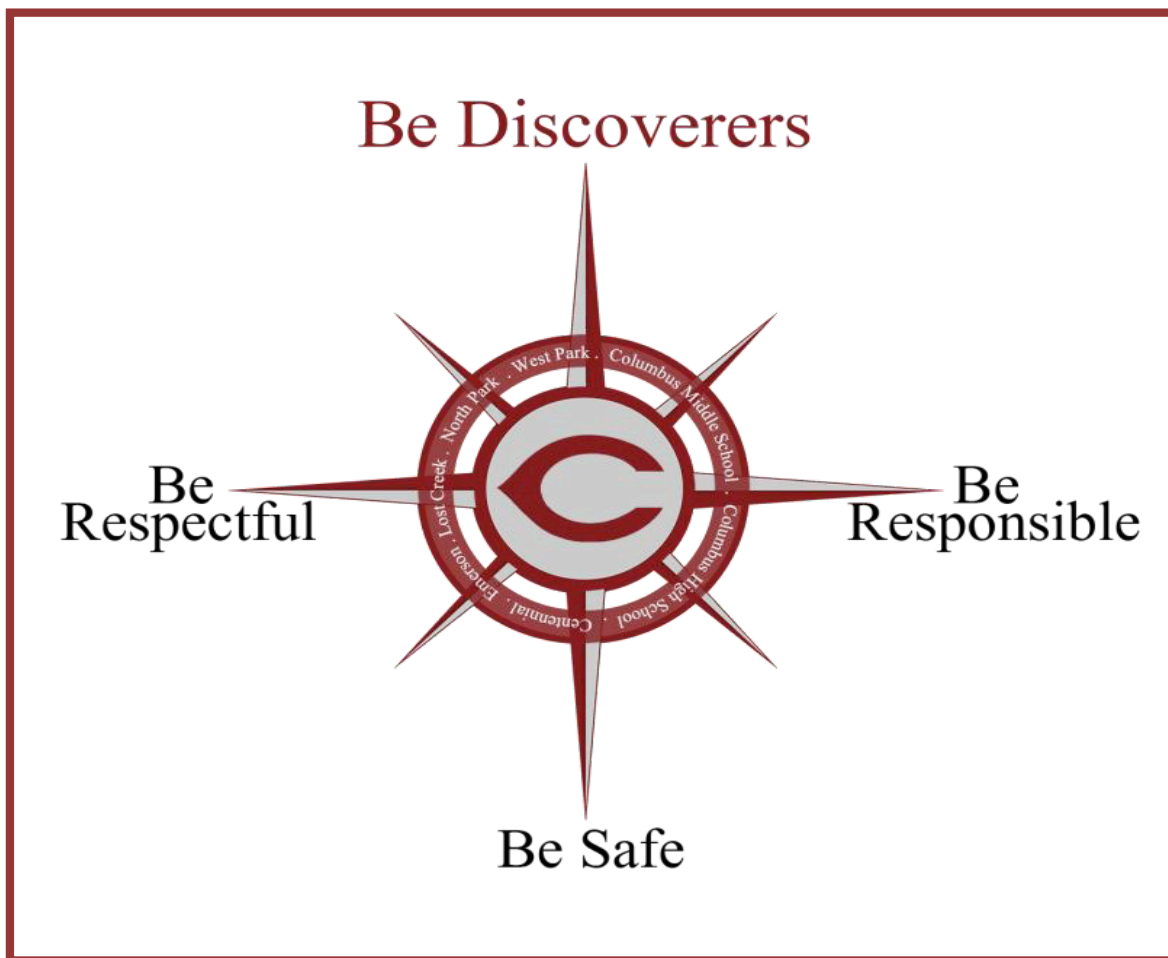

ATTENDANCE POLICY

In order for students to gain the maximum benefit of the educational program provided by Columbus Public Schools, it is necessary for students to be regular and punctual in their attendance at school. It is the belief of Columbus Public Schools that students missing more than 20 days of school per year will not be able to achieve in the school setting. Exceptions may be made to this 20-day maximum only in the event of major illness or accident, which would prevent the student from attending classes. All such major illness or accident-related absences should be verified in writing by the family physician and updated regularly. Arrangements should be made to obtain missing assignments by contacting the student's teachers. **Columbus Elementary Schools will be consistent with State Law and policies established by the Columbus Board of Education.**

5 Day - Any time a student accumulates a total of five (5) or more absences the parent will be contacted and notified of the total number of absences, the dates of these absences, and the time period of accumulation.

10 Days - Any time a student misses a total of ten (10) days of school, that parent shall be contacted and notified of the total number of absences and the current policy relating to attendance at school.

15 Days - When a student has missed a total of fifteen (15) school days, the parents shall be notified of the total number of unexcused absences and a telephone or personal conference shall be held with the parent, principal, and student (if appropriate) in attendance. At 15 days, parents may be told that all future absences will have to be verified by either the school nurse or a written excuse from a physician. The county attorney, attendance monitor and school social worker may be notified of school concerns regarding the student's attendance.

20 Days - When a student misses a total of twenty (20) school days, the parents shall be notified of the total number of absences and a conference may be held. The county attorney, attendance monitor, and school social worker will be notified of school concerns regarding the student's attendance. At 20 days, parents may be told that all future absences will have to be verified by the school health office or by a written excuse from a physician.

Absence - Parents or legal guardians are **REQUIRED** to notify the school by 8:30 a.m. the day of the student's absence or tardiness unless the absence has been prearranged. Parents or guardians who do not call regarding a student's absence will be called at home or work to ensure the safety of the child. Students are marked as absent even when a doctor's note has been obtained. Students are counted absent anytime they are not at school, regardless of the reason.

Students who are absent during the school day are not permitted to participate in after school or evening activities.

Tardiness – Students are expected to be on time to school. Students will be counted tardy if they are not in their classrooms by 8:00 a.m. When students arrive late, an adult must check in the student at the school office. Excessive tardies may result in a parent contact, parent conference, and notification to the attendance monitor, school social worker, and county attorney.

Students are counted as tardy if they arrive between 8:00 – 8:30 a.m. Students who arrive after 8:30 a.m. are counted as absent for a quarter of the school day.

Makeup Work – Work missed during an absence **MUST** be made up. Students are responsible for obtaining make-up work from each of their teachers and completing the work in a reasonable amount of time. Parents or siblings may make arrangements to pick up textbooks or other materials by contacting the school office, which is open until 4:00 p.m. Students may be required to stay after school in order to make up the missed instructional time and assignments.

Vacations – We request that parents or guardians notify the school of vacations at least one week prior to the start of the vacation. Students are responsible for getting and completing all work missed during the vacation. Families are strongly encouraged to use scheduled school breaks for vacations whenever possible in order to avoid having their child(ren) miss school. (See Makeup Work)

Leaving During the School Day – Students leaving the building for any reason during the time school is in session must check out through the School Office. In case of illness, the school nurse or other school official will check the student before being excused. Before being released from school, the student's parent or other responsible adult will be contacted and

advised of the student's need to be dismissed from school. Students who leave school due to illness during the school day are responsible for getting and completing all missed work. Students who have left school during the school day due to illness may not return for any after school or evening activities.

BICYCLES

Bicycles should be parked in the racks as soon as students arrive at school. The school is not responsible for damage to or theft of bicycles. It is recommended that sturdy locks be used with bicycles to discourage theft. Bicycles should not be ridden on the sidewalks around the school. For safety purposes, students need to walk their bike on the sidewalk when approaching the school.

BIST (BEHAVIOR INTERVENTION SUPPORT TEAM)

Columbus Public Schools utilizes the BIST model to support students and the learning environment. When students struggle to make positive behavior choices, the following continuum of support is provided. **Based on student need, individual intervention plans may be developed to support the academic and behavioral needs of students.**

Safe Seat: The Safe Seat is a place within the classroom for students to think about their behavior. The Safe Seat is away from the other students (as in the back of the classroom) while still being within the learning environment. When students are asked to move to the Safe Seat, they continue to do their work and listen to the instruction. They do not, however, actively participate in the learning activity. Students remain in the Safe Seat until the teacher has the opportunity to process with them. Processing involves helping the student understand their misbehavior and the appropriate expectations for the learning activity and classroom.

Buddy Room: If students are unwilling to sit in the Safe Seat or sit quietly in the Safe Seat, they move to the Buddy Room. The Buddy Room is another classroom, preferably at the same grade level. Students may be asked to complete a Think Sheet while in the Buddy Room. The Think Sheet is a tool to help students identify their misbehavior(s) and feelings, and think about what they need to do when they return to their classroom. A student remains in the Buddy Room until the teacher has time to process with them.

Recovery Room: If students are unwilling to go to the Buddy Room or sit quietly in the Buddy Room, they move to the Recovery Room, which is located in the office. While in the Recovery Room, students must demonstrate that they are calm, ready to learn, and ready to follow directions. ~~Students remain in the Recovery Room only as long as it takes them to demonstrate that they are ready to return to the learning environment.~~

~~A teacher will notify parents in the event that their child has been moved to the Buddy Room Recovery Room.~~

The goal of BIST is to help students learn the following life skills so that they will become responsible students and citizens:

- I can make good choices even when I am mad.
- I can be okay even if others are not okay.
- I can do something even when I don't want to (or it is hard).

CHECK OUT PROCEDEURES

- The student must present a parental note to their teacher before school starts. Phone calls from parents will also be accepted.
- The student must report to the office in order to be checked out by an adult before leaving the school building.
- The student must report to the office to check in if he/she returns to school before the end of the day.
- Students will not be called out of class until the parent arrives to check them out.

CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

All adults are required by law to report any suspected case of child abuse or neglect to the authorities. Abuse and/or neglect are defined by Nebraska State Law LB 28-710 as follows: *“Abuse or neglect shall mean knowing, intentionally, or negligently causing or permitting a minor child or an incompetent or disabled person to be: (a) placed in a situation that endangers his or her life or physical or mental health; (b) cruelly confined, or cruelly punished; (c) deprived of necessary food, clothing, shelter, or care; (d) left unattended in a motor vehicle, if such minor child is six years of age or younger; or (e) sexually abused.”*

CLASSROOM SUPPLIES

The school will provide a list of classroom supplies needed by students. Parents will be notified if any additional supplies are needed throughout the year.

CLASSROOM VISITATIONS

Parents/guardians are welcome to visit their child’s classroom during school hours. Please check with your child’s teacher regarding the best time to visit. All visitors are asked to report to the school office for a visitor badge when they arrive. Children who do not attend our school may not visit during the school day. Parents who have court ordered supervised visitation with their child(ren) are required to prearrange any school visits through Health and Human Services so that the caseworker can be present.

CONTACT INFORMATION

Parents are required to supply the school with current information regarding work, home and cell phone numbers so that the school can contact parents in an emergency. Parents should also provide phone numbers of relatives or friends who may be called in the event that a parent cannot not be reached. **If these phone numbers and/or your address should change during the school year, please notify the school office.**

COUNSELORS, SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGISTS & SCHOOL SOCIAL WORKERS

Parents can contact counselors, school psychologists and school social workers by calling the building secretary. Counselors and school psychologists are student focused and address concerns that affect the student’s academic, behavioral, physical, social and emotional health. School social workers are parent/family focused and address concerns that impact a parent’s or family’s quality of life requiring community support services.

DATING VIOLENCE

Columbus Public Schools strives to provide physically safe and emotionally secure environments for all students and staff. Positive behaviors are encouraged in the educational program and are required of all students and staff. Dating violence will not be tolerated. For purposes of this policy, dating violence means a pattern of behavior where one person uses threats of, or actually uses physical, sexual, verbal or emotional abuse to control his or her dating partner. Dating partner means any person, regardless of gender, involved in an intimate relationship with another person primarily characterized by the expectation of affectionate involvement whether casual, serious or long term. Consequences may include restriction of privileges, schedule change, activities suspension/expulsion (where appropriate), ISS, OSS, alternative placement and/or expulsion. Incidents of dating violence involving students at school will be addressed as the administration determines appropriate, within the scope and subject to the limits of the district’s authority.

DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS

THE DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS THAT A TEACHER AND/OR ADMINISTRATOR CAN ADMINISTER INCLUDE:

1. Guidance: A conversation between the student and school personnel. The purpose of this conversation is not to scold the student, but to inform him/her that his/her behavior needs to change so that he/she does not violate the rights of others, or to help the student improve his/her learning capabilities.
2. Conference: A meeting of student's parent(s) or legal guardian(s) and school personnel to discuss the student's behavior or learning progress. The school intends to seek the assistance of the student's parent(s) or legal guardian(s) in helping the student to become a better student.
3. Detention: Requiring that a student serve time in the office for a period of time. It is intended that students serving an office detention will be completing classroom work, reflecting on their behavior and creating a plan to change their behavior in order to successfully return to the classroom.
4. School Clean Up: Requiring a student to clean up certain items of the school that the student failed to care for properly. The student may be required to clean more than just the item(s) damaged by himself/herself in order to encourage the student to take better care of school property in the future.
5. The Use of Force: Teachers, administrators, and other school district employees may use force to restore order to the educational environment or to protect students and staff from physical harm.

THOSE DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS THAT ONLY ADMINISTRATORS MAY ADMINISTER INCLUDE:

1. Rearrangement of School Schedule: Assigning a student a new schedule of classes, which may be shortened from a regular schedule due to academic and/or behavioral needs and/or in-school suspension when the behavior of the student is such that the student cannot conduct himself/herself in an acceptable manner. A student assigned to a shortened schedule will be required to check into the office before his/her school day begins and out of the office after his/her school day ends. A student assigned to in-school suspension for the reasons of usage of alcohol, tobacco, controlled substances, extortion, possession of firearms, setting off false alarms or bomb threats, or at administrative discretion, shall not be allowed to participate in school-sponsored activities until he/she is reinstated to school. The intent of this action is to improve the student's behavior.
2. Restriction of Extracurricular Activities: Informing a student that he/she cannot participate in certain activities because of his/her past or present behavior. Such actions as this are intended to improve student behavior at home and at school.
3. Loss of Privileges: Action taken by the principal and/or assistant principal(s) to assist a student in resolving his/her behavioral problems. The action is in the form of certain stipulated conditions agreed to by the school, the student, and parent(s) or legal guardian(s).
4. Requirement That a Student Receive Counseling/Educational Evaluation: An action that may require a student to visit a guidance counselor, medical counselor, or psychological counselor to assist the student in resolving his/her problem.
5. In-School Suspension: Students are placed in the detention room rather than their regularly scheduled class(es). Students are supervised and expected to carry on their studies, as well as abide by the rules set down for in-school suspension. Assigning students to in-school suspension is at the discretion of the principal.
6. Suspension and Emergency Exclusion:
 - (a) Short term: A forced withdrawal of a pupil from school. Such action will comply with state statutes. A short-term suspension will not exceed five school days in length.
 - (b) Long term: A forced withdrawal of a pupil from school. Such action will comply with state statutes. A long-term suspension will not exceed twenty school days in length.

Any student who is suspended from school will not be allowed to participate in any after school or evening activities or be allowed on any school property until he/she is reinstated to school.

Expulsion: The permanent withdrawal of a student from school. Such action will comply with existing state statutes.

1. Exclusion: Immediate withdrawal of a student from school for:
 - a. (a) presenting a clear threat to the
 - b. physical safety of himself/herself or others, or for being so extremely disruptive as to make temporary removal necessary to preserve the rights of other students to pursue an education.
 - c. (b) a dangerous communicable disease 79-4177
2. Legal Action in Court of Law: Any disciplinary action taken against a student will comply with existing state and school board policies and shall afford the student due process.

PROTOCOL FOLLOWED FOR STUDENT THREATS

1. Principal is informed of the threat.
2. Threat assessment is conducted.
3. If the threat is deemed viable, parents of the student making the threat are called. The School Resource Officer (SRO) or Police and HHS may be called to assist with the initial investigation.
4. Student may be suspended under emergency exclusion if deemed appropriate.
5. If the student is suspended under emergency exclusion, the student may return to school after a psychologist has evaluated the student to determine the child is no longer considered a threat to themselves or others. This evaluation is at the cost of the parent.

SHORT-TERM SUSPENSION PROCEDURE (1-5 DAYS)

The essential ingredients of due process afforded the student in a short-term suspension (1-5 days) and set forth in School Policy 505.02 are as follows:

1. Notice of the charge against the student.
2. An explanation of the charge against the student.
3. An opportunity for the student's explanation of the incident(s), issue(s), and/or event(s).
4. Written notification within 24 hours, or such additional time as is reasonably necessary, to the parents or guardians of the student stating:
 - (a) the reason(s) for the short-term suspension.
 - (b) dates of the short-term suspension.

The decision of the administrator shall be final.

LONG-TERM SUSPENSION PROCEDURE (6-20 DAYS)

Due process afforded the student in Long-Term Suspension, Expulsion or Exclusion, and covered in detail in School Policy 505.02. Written notification to parent(s) or legal guardian(s) indicating the following:

1. The rule(s) or standard(s) of conduct allegedly violated.
2. The penalty recommended by the school official in charge.
3. A statement indicating the student has a right to a hearing on the specified charges upon request.
4. A description of the hearing process and appeal procedure.
5. A form for parents to fill out in order for parents to request a hearing (to be signed and returned to the Superintendent of Schools).

Nothing in the above procedure precludes the student, student's parent(s), legal guardian(s), or representative from discussing and settling the matter with the appropriate school personnel prior to the hearing. In the event the school does not receive a request for a hearing within five (5) school days following the receipt of the written notice, the punishment shall go into effect. A hearing can still be requested prior to thirty (30) calendar days after the actual receipt of written notice; however, the punishment imposed may continue in effect pending the final determination. The appeal procedure shall be as set forth in School Policy 1005.02.

DRESS CODE

Students may wear any clothing that does not interfere with the purpose of school or break one of our school rules. Clothing which creates a distraction to staff or students or disrupts the learning process in any manner will not be allowed. Any piece of clothing or any item brought to school should not contain any reference to violence, gang affiliation, profanity, sexual innuendoes, or promote the use of tobacco, alcohol, or drugs. **Students who wear inappropriate clothing to school will be asked to change into appropriate clothing provided by the school, parent, or guardian.**

The dress code specifically prohibits the following kinds of clothing:

- Any piece of clothing or any item brought to school containing any reference to violence, gang affiliation, profanity, sexual innuendoes, or promotes the use of tobacco, alcohol or drugs.
- Clothing identified by police or other law enforcement agencies as gang-related apparel. Some of these items would be sagging pants, long baggy coats, specific colors that promote gang activity with slang symbolism.
- Clothing which is disruptive to the learning environment because it is too tight, too short, has holes in inappropriate places, or exposes bare midriffs.
- Girls may be asked to wear a sweater or shirt over tops with spaghetti straps, halter-tops or tank tops if it is determined to be inappropriate by an administrator.

If parents or guardians are unsure as to whether clothing is appropriate, they are welcome to call the school and visit with the counselor or principal.

FIELD TRIPS

Classes may take educationally based field trips during the school year under the direction of the classroom teacher. **Permission slips need to be signed by parents/guardians prior to field trips that are outside of Platte County.** Parents will be notified of any field trips within Platte County.

Elementary students not participating in a field trip due to parent request should remain at home during the field trip time. Students remaining at home will be regarded as absent from school. Children who arrive after the bus departs will be the responsibility of the parent. The same expectations regarding student behavior that are enforced at school shall also be enforced during the field trip.

On occasion, parents are asked to help supervise groups of students on field trips. If selected, parents are expected to ride the bus to help with supervision as students travel to/from the field trip. We want parents to keep in mind that their first priority when taking on this responsibility is for the safety of the children they have been designated to supervise. For this reason parents may not bring younger siblings or extended family members on school field trips. It is our belief that the parent would not be able to adequately supervise our students if they also have to care for younger siblings or extended family members.

Parent volunteers shall conduct themselves in a manner fitting to their age level and maturity and with mutual respect and consideration for the rights of others while attending school events. Parents failing to conduct themselves accordingly will not be selected to supervise field trips or school activities.

HEALTH SERVICES

EMERGENCY HEALTH SITUATIONS

~~In the event of a student needing emergency medical attention, 911 will be called first and then the parents will be notified.~~
In the event of a student experiencing an emergency breathing problem or systemic allergic reaction (anaphylaxis), our CPS health offices follow the state wide emergency protocol.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE TO LIFE-THREATENING ASTHMA OR SYSTEMIC ALLERGIC REACTIONS

~~State regulation, which became effective on October 1, 2003, requires that our school (or any early childhood education program) be prepared to implement an emergency treatment plan, called a protocol, anytime a student or staff member experiences a **life threatening** asthma attack or systemic allergic reaction (anaphylaxis).~~ The protocol requires that 911 is called first. After that call is made, an EpiPen injection will be given and then albuterol is provided through a nebulizer. ~~An EpiPen is a small pre-filled, automatic injection device that resembles a highlighter. It is used to deliver epinephrine.~~

~~Epinephrine is a medication that is used to bring quick relief by improving breathing and lung function. Albuterol is another medication that is used to bring breathing relief (commonly found in metered dose inhalers). The nebulizer is a machine that mixes the albuterol with air to provide a fine mist (aerosol) for breathing in through a mask or mouthpiece.~~

The protocol steps are designed to provide quick, effective care in order to prevent death from occurring due to severe asthma attack or anaphylaxis. Staff members have been trained to recognize signs and symptoms of a life-threatening “breathing” emergency and to properly administer the medications.

If you know that your child has asthma or a known allergy, it is **critically important** that you communicate this information to our school staff. You may also contact health personnel at your child’s school. For each student with a known allergic condition or asthma, you must provide the school with (1) written medical documentation, (2) instructions, and (3) medications as directed by a physician. In the event that your student experiences a life threatening asthma attack or systemic allergic reaction, we will defer to the specific documents and medication that you have provided. If you do not have medical documentation and instructions on file with the school for your students, we will defer to the regulatory protocol described above. If, for whatever reason, you do not want your student to receive the life-saving emergency treatment under the protocol, you must file your written objection with the schools.

HEAD LICE

When it is reported or suspected that a student may have head lice, the student will be discreetly sent to the health office. The Health Aide or School Nurse will examine the student’s head for evidence of live lice. **If a student is found to have live lice, the family will be contacted by the Health Aide or School Nurse and will be assisted in developing a treatment plan.**

~~If a student is found to have live lice, the student will be sent home for treatment. The student may return to school once treatment has been initiated. The Health Aide or School Nurse will examine the student upon reentry to school. All students with evidence of live lice will be excluded from school until treatment has been completed. If treatment is evident and progress is being made toward removal of nits and casings, students may be in school and periodically reexamined.~~

~~Extended absences due to head lice infestation will be referred to the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services.~~

IMMUNIZATION

~~Nebraska law requires that students receive the following immunizations prior to admission into school: Mumps, Measles, Rubella, Hepatitis B, Polio, Varicella or date of disease in case of varicella (chicken pox) and DPT. Exceptions to this requirement are based on religious beliefs or medical waiver from a physician. In addition, students must have a physical exam and vision exam prior to kindergarten entrance or when enrolling from out of the state.~~

Nebraska law requires that students shall be protected against Poliomyelitis, Diphtheria, Pertussis, Tetanus (DPT), Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR), Hepatitis B, and Varicella (chicken pox). Any student who does not comply with immunization requirements shall not be permitted to continue in school until he or she shall so comply. Exceptions to this requirement are as follows:

- Medical exemptions for health reasons substantiated by a signed statement from a physician
- Religious conflict substantiated by a signed affidavit that is notarized by the student’s legal guardian

KEEPING STUDENTS AT HOME

~~Students should not be sent to school if the student has a fever, is vomiting, has a contagious disease or contagious skin condition or has diarrhea. The child should remain at home until they are fever or symptom-free for twenty-four (24) hours.~~

MEDICATIONS

~~In the event that a student needs to be given a prescribed or “over the counter” medication at school, parents need to complete the proper form, which is available at the school office. This form includes the dosage and the frequency with which the medicine is to be given. Normally, no more than a week’s supply should be sent at any time. Prescription medications must be in a properly labeled container dispensed by a pharmacy.~~

~~Any non-prescription medications such as aspirin, Tylenol, or cough drops must be in their original container. Aspirin or Tylenol is not routinely given to students at school. In the event of a headache, parents will be notified and they may bring medication to their child.~~

Medication may be administered at school when such treatment is necessary for school attendance and cannot otherwise be accomplished. Parents need to complete the proper form **prior** to school personnel administering medication to a child in school. This form is available in the school health office or the CPS district website.

All medication products must be sent to the school in the original container with label intact. This includes “over the counter” medications such as Acetaminophen, Ibuprofen, etc.

SCREENINGS

Students enrolled in Columbus Public Schools are provided health screening in accordance with Nebraska State Statute. The screening is conducted to help identify health concerns in as early a stage as possible, in an effort to enhance learning. Screening is not intended to be diagnostic but to identify students with potential problems.

Each student will be screened of vision, hearing, dental, height and weight. The state statute requiring health inspections in Nebraska does not allow a waiver option. Parents who request that their child not be screened at school must provide current screening results from a medical provider.

STUDENT ILLNESS

Students should not be sent to school with a **fever of 100 or greater, vomiting, diarrhea, or have signs of a contagious illness or skin condition**. Students should not return to school until they are **symptom free for 24 hours** without the use of Acetaminophen or Ibuprofen (Tylenol, Motrin Advil, etc.).

HOMEWORK

Homework refers to tasks that a student is assigned to do on his/her own time after school hours. It may be work for which the student needs additional practice due to absence or lack of attention or effort at school. Homework assignments serve as a means of providing a bond of common effort between parent, child, and teacher. In order for homework to be effective, each participant – teacher, student, and parent – must understand and be committed to carrying out his/her responsibility. If any of the three (teacher, student, parent) do not fulfill their responsibilities, then the positive effects of homework will be reduced.

Homework Responsibilities of Teacher

1. Communicate to students and parents homework goals and expectations.
2. Set clear and concise expectations concerning assigning, returning, and evaluating homework.
3. Coordinate homework assignments with other teachers with whom students work, and who may assign homework.
4. Assign appropriate homework.

Homework Responsibilities of Students

1. Know and understand what is required for completion of the assignment.
2. Assume responsibility for completing and returning assignments.
3. Complete assignments neatly and do quality work.

Homework Responsibilities of Parents

1. Maintain a positive attitude towards learning and the value of homework.
2. Be aware of the homework policy and individual teacher requirements.
3. Help your child find a study area that is quiet and relatively free of distractions.
4. Be patient with your child and praise him/her for any effort made.
5. If your child has difficulty understanding the directions, help them with explanations. **Do not do the homework for your child!**
6. Look over the assignment when your child reports the work is complete to affirm completion and quality.

LIBRARY MEDIA CENTER

Students may check out material for a period of two weeks and may renew the materials once. No fines are charged for overdue materials, however, students are expected to pay for damaged or lost materials. If the item is not returned, a letter will be sent to parents requesting that the material be returned. In the event that materials are not returned or paid for, or if a student repeatedly returns items in a damaged condition, the student may have library media center privileges restricted or

report cards withheld. Money will be refunded for materials that were lost and paid for, then later found and returned to the library media center.

NONCUSTODIAL PARENTS

The School District assumes that non-custodial parents have all the rights and privileges of custodial parents unless presented with a certified copy of a court order or decree limiting those rights.

NONDISCRIMINATION STATEMENT

In accordance with Federal civil rights law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, the USDA, its Agencies, offices, and employees, and institutions participating in or administering USDA programs are prohibited from discriminating based on race, color, national origin, sex, disability, age or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity in any program or activity conducted or funded by the USDA.

PARENT APPEAL PROCEDURES

In the event a parent is denied access to any topic listed in Board Policy 1005.02 or who is unsatisfied with the solution presented by the administration in accordance with the Parental Objection Provisions of 1005.02, said parent has the right of appeal as listed below:

1. Upon receipt of the administrator's decision, the parent has five (5) school days to appeal that decision by contacting the Office of the Superintendent of Schools.
2. The Superintendent of Schools shall inform the Board no later than the next regularly scheduled Board meeting that an appeal has been made. The privacy of the individual filing the appeal shall be maintained.
3. The Superintendent of Schools shall meet with the parent and administrator in an attempt to resolve the matter within ten (10) school days of receipt of such an appeal.
4. The parent shall receive from the Superintendent his/her decision within five (5) school days of the meeting stated in #3.
5. Upon receipt of the Superintendent's decision, the parent shall have five (5) school days to appeal this decision to the Board of Education to be considered at its next regularly scheduled meeting. Such requests are made by contacting the Office of the Superintendent of Schools. Appeals to the Board will include the parent's/guardian's name and the nature of the objection.
6. Final decision will rest with the Board of Education.

PARENT/GUARDIAN INVOLVEMENT AND PARTICIPATION

School Board Policy 1005.02 provides parents/guardians with the information as to when and how they can access instructional materials. This policy includes the following:

- The Elementary Student Handbook will be sent home with students at the beginning of each school year. Parents/guardians are required to return the signature form indicating that they have received the handbook.
- Parents/guardians are invited to review instructional materials. Parents/guardians can gain access to instructional materials by contacting the school office.
- Parents/guardians are welcome to visit their child's classroom during school hours. Parents/guardians are asked to contact their child's teacher to schedule the best time to visit.
- The building administrator will notify parents/guardians if a substitute teacher will teach their child for four or more weeks.

PARENT VOLUNTEERS

We welcome parent volunteers at each of our elementary schools. Volunteers help students and teachers with various tasks in the classrooms. Parents can volunteer any amount of time that they have available. All volunteers are requested to check in/out at the school office when entering and leaving the building. Parents who volunteer on a regular basis will be subject to a background check. **CPS has the right to deny parent participation on field trips and/or with classroom or school activities.**

PETS IN SCHOOL

Due to allergies and safety issues, family pets are not allowed in the school building. Due to student safety, family pets are not allowed on school grounds during school hours, including drop off and pick up times.

PROGRESS REPORTS TO PARENTS

The school year is divided into four grade report periods. Report cards are distributed at the end of each grading period. Parent-Teacher Conferences are scheduled twice during the school year. Dates and times of these conferences will be sent to parents prior to conferences being held. Parents or teachers may arrange additional conferences when they are necessary.

RIGHT TO DUE PROCESS

The policy of the Board of Education states: *"The Board of Education of the Columbus Public Schools views the establishment of rules and responsibilities governing student behavior as a necessary element of the educational process."*

The rules and responsibilities governing student behavior established pursuant to this policy and other School Board policies affecting student personnel shall be approved by the district's established procedure prior to their use. All rules and responsibilities established by the school district and any rules established by individual buildings governing student behavior at the school shall be publicized.

The Board recognizes that each classroom teacher needs to establish certain rules governing the educational process he/she is in charge of. Any rules established by individual teachers are to be reflective of school policies and rules. Such rules are exempt from Board approval and need only to be made known in each individual class of which he or she is in charge. Any behavior on the part of a student that violates school policies, rules, or regulations may be subject to disciplinary action. Any disciplinary action shall be administered within the fundamental framework of due process.

SCHOOL HOURS

- School Day: 7:55 a.m. – 3:25 p.m. (2:15 p.m. on early dismissal Wednesdays)
- Office Hours: 7:30 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.
- Breakfast: 7:25 a.m. – 7:45 a.m.
- After School Program 3:25 p.m. – 6:00 p.m. (2:15 p.m. on early dismissal Wednesdays)

Supervision is provided before and after school from 7:45 a.m. – 3:35 p.m. ***Students need to be picked up by 3:35. On early dismissal Wednesdays students need to be picked up by 2:25.***

SCHOOL INITIATED PHONE CALLS AND TEXT MESSAGES

Columbus Public Schools does send a lot of information to parents regarding upcoming events and activities in order to keep parents informed. The *Federal Telephone Consumer Protection Act* states: **“All phone calls—whether live, automated, or prerecorded voice calls or text messages—made to cell phones using an auto-dialer or other automated dialing technology; are prohibited unless the calls are made for emergency purposes or made with the prior express consent of the cell phone subscriber.”**

In order to conform with the new regulations within the *Federal Consumer Protection Act*, schools need to obtain the “prior express consent” of the parent prior to making calls to the parent’s cell phone number.

The Federal Communications Commission has stated, “People who knowingly release their phone numbers have given permission to be called at the number which they have given, absent instructions to the contrary.”

By signing receipt of this handbook, you are giving Columbus Public Schools permission to call all cell phone numbers that are registered in PowerSchool for school and student purposes.

SCHOOL MEALS

The schools provide daily breakfast and hot lunch through Lunchtime Solutions. Children who bring cold lunches may purchase milk.

Families are encouraged to keep account balances in the positive at all times. Deposits are accepted at each school building and at the Administration Building. Deposits may be made by cash or check. Account balances may be obtained through the parent access portal in PowerSchool. If online access is not available, the District Food Service office may be contacted at (402) 563-7055. Each day that a student eligible for reduced price or paid meals brings the actual amount of the cost of the meal, that student will be provided a breakfast and/or lunch and the amount received will be applied to the cost of that meal rather than to reduce a prior negative balance.

In the event that a student's account balance reaches -\$15.00, the student will be offered an alternate meal meeting reimbursable requirements of the USDA school nutrition program. The District will also provide the necessary forms for the student's parent or guardian to apply for free or reduced price meals. Such benefits may be applied for at any time during the school year.

To the extent possible, all actions pertaining to students with negative account balances will be handled as confidentially as possible. Communications regarding account balance concerns will be provided in writing by an assigned District Food Service staff member and/or by automated phone calls. Students will not be used as couriers of such information.

Parents should contact the school if their child has any food allergies or requires a special diet as specified by a doctor. Any student going home for lunch needs written permission from a parent/guardian. Students that require a special medical diet, as specified by a doctor, may request that it be prepared in the cafeteria.

No student or parent may bring in commercially prepared food such as Pizza Hut, Subway, Burger King, McDonald’s, etc, during CPS breakfast or lunch periods. Students and parents may bring in sack lunches that are made at home. Students or parents who bring a cold lunch to school are asked to drink juice or water, or purchase a carton of milk. Pop is discouraged.

SOCIAL MEDIA

In an effort to better inform parents and the community, Columbus Public Schools will be using social media to share information. Social media includes but is not limited to Facebook, Twitter, blogging and podcasting. When posting information on social networks sites (such as Facebook), the district will only post group photos/videos with no student names. If a student’s name is used, there will be no photo. Students will not be allowed to post on any social media pages from the district. Social media will be monitored by each building principal and only be used with their approval. Parents who assist with field trips or school activities are required to follow these same social media guidelines.

STUDENT BIRTHDAYS

School Board Policy 508.13 includes the following, "All foods offered on the school campus will meet or exceed the USDA Smart Snacks in School nutrition standards and/or state nutrition standards." The Smart Snacks in Schools applies to celebrations such as student birthdays. Due to this federal law and district policy, students are no longer allowed to bring food items to school when celebrating their birthday. In lieu of food items, students may bring party favors, pencils, erasers, etc. to share with classmates.

Birthday party invitations should not be distributed at school unless they are given to all the boys and/or girls in the classroom. The school is not allowed to share student contact information, which includes home address and phone numbers. Gifts sent to students at school on birthdays or other occasions will be kept in the office and given to students at the end of the school day in order to minimize disruptions during instructional hours.

STUDENT CONDUCT

The expectations for all students who attend Columbus Public Schools are to BE SAFE, BE RESPECTFUL and BE RESPONSIBLE. Students are taught what it looks like to be safe, respectful and responsible in all areas within the school as these expectations encompass all of the daily routines and procedures within the classroom and within the school.

The following policies and procedures have been established and approved by the Board of Education of the Columbus Public Schools for use in all schools within the school district and at all school-sponsored events. **Compliance with the following standards of conduct is mandatory.**

ACTIVITIES FORBIDDEN BY LAWS OF NEBRASKA OR THE UNITED STATES

Students, as citizens of the United States and the State of Nebraska, are to obey all laws established by these respective governmental agencies. The school, in addition to any action taken by law enforcement agencies, may discipline students who violate these laws during the school hours or at school-sponsored events.

ALCOHOL, DRUGS, AND TOBACCO

Students are not to consume, possess, sell, or distribute any drug (including tobacco), narcotic, alcohol, or substance purported to be a drug, narcotic, or alcohol, at school, on school grounds, or at school-sponsored events. This rule does not prohibit possession or consumption by a student of a substance that has been prescribed to him/her by a person licensed to prescribe.

Students are prohibited from consuming any drug, narcotic, controlled substance, alcohol, or substance purported to be a drug, narcotic, alcohol, controlled substance or any facsimile of any substance in any quantity immediately prior to coming on school grounds or to a school-sponsored event. Disciplinary action will be in accordance with District Policy 504.14.

BEHAVIOR TO AND FROM SCHOOL

Students are not to interfere with the ability of other students to travel to and from school safely and without verbal, physical, or sexual harassment. Students are not to participate in activities, which are potentially dangerous to themselves, other students, or the public while on their way to and from school.

BULLYING, EXTORTION & INTIMIDATION

Threatening, bullying or intimidating another student(s) or school personnel is prohibited at school, on school grounds, at school-sponsored events, or going to and from them.

CHEATING

Students who cheat, plagiarize, or forge in connection with academic endeavor and/or school procedures are subject to disciplinary action.

CLASSROOM RULES

Teachers may establish reasonable rules in their classrooms to assist them in providing a positive environment for learning. Students are expected to follow these rules and may be disciplined for noncompliance.

DAMAGE OR THEFT OF SCHOOL OR PRIVATE PROPERTY

Students are not to participate in any activity not properly supervised by school personnel that could possibly damage or deface school or private property. If a student damages school or private property, he/she is financially responsible for all

damages and may be disciplined. Students are prohibited from borrowing without permission, or stealing private or school property. Students who do either of these things may be disciplined.

FALSE FIRE ALARMS AND/OR BOMB THREATS

Students are not to falsely set off fire alarms or falsely report bomb threats.

FIGHTING

Students may not engage in verbal or physical fights in school buildings, on school grounds, at school-sponsored activities, or on their way to and from school. Students are prohibited from hitting, striking, kicking, or in any other way harming another student or school personnel. Disciplinary actions are based on the frequency and severity of the student's behavior and age.

INSUBORDINATION / CLASSROOM DISRUPTIONS

Students are to comply with reasonable directions or requests from teachers, student teachers, substitute teachers, teacher aides, secretaries, principals and other school personnel during any period of time the student is properly under the authority of school personnel. Any student who fails to comply with directions or requests of school personnel will be considered insubordinate. Disciplinary actions are based on the frequency and severity of the student's behavior and age.

SEARCH AND SEIZURE

Students possess the right of privacy of person as well as freedom from unreasonable search and seizure of property guaranteed by the Fourth Amendment of the Constitution. This individual right, however, is balanced by the school's responsibility to protect the health, safety, and welfare of all students.

School employees may conduct searches when they have reason to suspect that the health, safety, and welfare of students may be in danger. Any school employee making a search or a seizure will follow these guidelines:

1. General searches of school property (including personal items found on school property) will be conducted at any time when there is a reasonable cause for school employees to believe that something that violates a law or school rule is on school property. This search of school property may be made without the student being present.
2. Illegal items (firearms, weapons, drugs) or other possessions reasonably determined to be a threat to the safety or security of others, or may possibly interfere with school purposes, may be seized by school personnel.
3. Items, which are used to disrupt or interfere with the educational process, may be temporarily removed from a student's person.
4. A student's person may be searched by school employees when there is reasonable cause to believe that the student has on his/her person illegal items or other items that may interfere with school purposes.

SEXUAL DISCRIMINATION

It is the policy of the Columbus Public School District to comply in spirit as well as in fact with the regulations implementing Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 prohibits sex discrimination in federally assisted education programs. Specifically, Title IX states: "*No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving federal financial assistance.*"

Any student who has a grievance should complete a grievance form and forward it to the Superintendent.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

Sexual harassment in any form will not be tolerated. If violations occur, disciplinary action will be taken. Any discrimination on the basis of race, creed, national origin, sex, age or handicap will not be tolerated.

WEAPONS, EXPLOSIVES, AND MATERIAL THAT CAN BE IGNITED

The before-mentioned material items are prohibited on school property or at school-sponsored events unless authorized by proper school authorities. A student shall not knowingly possess, handle, or transmit any object or material that is ordinarily or generally considered a weapon or any look-alike or facsimile of a weapon.

STUDENT PLANNER

Every student in grades 1-4 is issued a planner. One planner is issued FREE to each student. Lost or misplaced planners MUST be replaced and purchased by the student for \$3.00.

STUDENT RECORDS

School Board Policy 507 and its accompanying rules govern the maintenance of student records. These records are maintained to assist the instructional, guidance, and educational progress of the student and for legitimate research to better the educational programs of the school district. Parents and/or legal guardians may request in writing that information contained in student records be released for their purposes. In the event of a student transfer out of the district, student records, including academic, attendance, and discipline information will be sent to the requesting school district.

Schools may make public certain non-confidential “directory information” in association with recognition for such things as academic excellence, extracurricular honors and awards, or participation in officially recognized school sponsored activities. “Directory information” may include such things as name, address, date and place of birth and dates of school attendance. Any parent or legal guardian who does not wish the school district to release such “directory information” must notify the principal of the school that the student presently attends.

STUDENT RETENTION

Parents are included in the retention process. The school will notify parents as early as possible if retention is being considered. Parents, teachers, support staff, and the principal discuss any retention that is considered. The building principal makes the final decision regarding student placement.

STUDENT RIGHTS, RULES, AND RESPONSIBILITIES

State rules, rights, and responsibilities are automatically school district policy as well as building level policy. Therefore, we must be sure that students and parents have been given the opportunity to read them. **Parents and students are required to sign the SIGNATURE SHEET found at the beginning of this handbook.** This information is reviewed with students at the beginning of each school year.

RESPONSIBILITIES AND RIGHT TO AN EDUCATION

A student’s right to an education in Nebraska is granted because of provisions in the state’s Constitution. There are two very important things a student must do faithfully to protect this constitutional right. Those two things are: attend school and participate in the learning activities.

There are many other things responsible students do while they are students, but nothing is more important than doing the schoolwork assigned by their teachers and being in school on a regular basis.

The policy of the Columbus Public Schools regarding the right to an education states: *“The State of Nebraska, as provided for in Article VII, Section I of the Nebraska Constitution, established public schools to provide free education for students between the ages of five and twenty-one. All residents of the Columbus Public Schools from ages five through twenty-one are entitled to attend public schools without tuition. All students are entitled to equal educational opportunities.”*

Along with one’s right to equality of educational opportunity, each student has a commensurate responsibility to act in such a way as to not interfere with the rights of others to the same opportunity.

Essential to the fostering and maintaining of educational opportunity, is reasonable and necessary order in the schools. A student may forfeit his/her right to educational opportunities when his/her conduct is such that it substantially disrupts the educational process and deprives others of their rights. The most important things a student must do to protect his/her right to an education are stated as Responsibilities. These Responsibilities include:

RESPONSIBILITY AND RIGHT OF FREEDOM OF EXPRESSION

The right to freely express oneself is justifiably tempered with responsibilities to ensure that the expression made does not interfere with the rights of others. The official school policy and the responsibilities students have when expressing themselves are contained in this handbook to promote reasonable communication to reflect one of the purposes of Columbus Public Schools. **That purpose is to encourage the use of good language skills while providing educational experiences for students.**

The official school policy in regard to Freedom of Expression states: *“The Board of Education of the Columbus Public Schools recognizes the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America as being an essential part of the*

learning process. The Board of Education further recognizes that students need guidance in exercising the right of Freedom of Speech so that they do not interfere with the rights of others. The following statements are made to guide students in exercising their constitutional right of Freedom of Speech."

RESPONSIBILITY AND RIGHT TO FREEDOM OF ASSEMBLY

Official school policy states: "The Board of Education of the Columbus Public Schools recognizes that Freedom of Assembly is a right protected by the First Amendment of the constitution of the United States. The exercise of this right must be conducted in a responsible manner so as not to interfere with the educational activities of the school district."

The right to assemble in a school building, on school grounds or at school activities can be protected by following the responsibilities listed below.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF STUDENTS WHEN EXPRESSING THEMSELVES

When students express themselves at school, at school-sponsored activities, or in public places away from school, they must abide by the following rules:

1. The expression shall not contain words that are considered indecent, lewd, obscene, profane, vulgar, off-color, fighting or gutter words (four-letter words); phrases which contain threats, or physical gestures which are offensive or threatening to anyone seeing or hearing the expression; and expressions which undermine or are disrespectful to school personnel.
2. The expression of the student shall not contain words, phrases, or gestures that ridicule or belittle others.
3. The expression of the student shall not encourage other persons to violate school rules.
4. The expression of the student shall not be unusually loud, or interfere with or obstruct any lawful mission, process, function, or purpose of the school.
5. The expression of the student shall not be slanderous.
6. The expression of the student shall not be libelous.
7. The expression of the student about, or directed to, any teacher, administrator, or other school employee at any time in a public place shall comply with the six previously stated rules governing student expression. (Example: Any student who shall refer to a teacher in a public place at any time by a lewd or obscene name in such a loud voice that the teacher and/or others hear the insult may be disciplined by the school authorities.)

Any student who fails to meet these requirements when expressing himself/herself may be disciplined.

SYMBOLIC EXPRESSION AND RELATED ACTIVITIES

Symbolic expression is defined as that type of expression, exclusive of verbal and written expression, which conveys the personal ideas, feelings, attitudes and opinions of an individual. Length of hair, choice of clothing, buttons, badges, armbands, and physical gestures are some examples of symbolic expression.

Each student has the right to express himself/herself by way of symbols subject only to the restrictions that such expression does not result in over exhibitionism, disruption of the educational process, obscenities, disrespect, or obvious annoyance to others.

SUPPORT SERVICES

A variety of support services are offered by Columbus Public Schools. In order to be eligible for these services, students must meet criteria established by the district or state.

TECHNOLOGY INTEGRATION & INTERNET USAGE

Computer Network/Internet access is available to students and teachers in Columbus Public Schools. We believe that an Internet/Network access offers valuable, diverse, and unique resources to both students and teachers. Our goal in providing this service is to promote educational excellence in the district by facilitating resource sharing, innovation, and communication.

Access to the Internet enables students to explore thousands of libraries, databases, and bulletin boards while exchanging messages with users throughout the globe. In addition, the system is used to increase school and district communication, enhance productivity, and assist teachers in upgrading their skills through greater exchange of information with their peers.

The system also assists us in sharing information with the local community, including parents, social service agencies, government agencies, and businesses.

With access to computers and people from around the world also comes the availability of material that may not be considered to be of educational value in the context of the school setting. Families should be warned that some material obtained via the Internet might contain items that are illegal, defamatory, inaccurate, or potentially offensive. We have taken precautions to restrict access to controversial materials through the installation of an Internet filtering device. However, on a global network, it is impossible to control all materials and an industrious user may discover controversial information, either by accident or deliberately. We firmly believe, however, that the benefits to students from online access far outweigh the possibility that users may procure material that is not consistent with our educational goals. We strive to ensure that use of Internet/Network resources is consistent with our stated mission, goals, and objectives.

Students using the Internet will follow all laws, policies, and rules governing computers and iPads. This includes (but is not limited to) copyright laws, software publisher's rights, license agreements, acts of terrorism, assault, threats, and expectations for student and parent privacy. Students at Columbus Public Schools shall receive instruction in Internet Safety. This curriculum will include the appropriate use of social networking sites, cyber-bullying, and other topics as are relevant in encouraging digital citizenship. A copy of the Internet Safety Curriculum may be found in the district Curriculum Office and each school media center.

APPROPRIATE USES AND DIGITAL CITIZENSHIP

While working in a digital and collaborative environment, students should always conduct themselves as good digital citizens by adhering to the following guidelines:

1. **Respect Yourself:** I will show respect for myself through my actions. I will select online names that are appropriate. I will use caution with the information, images, and other media that I post online. I will carefully consider what personal information about my life experiences, or relationships I post. I will not be obscene. I will act with integrity.
2. **Protect Yourself:** I will ensure that the information, images, and materials I post online will not put me at risk. I will not publish my personal details, contact details, or a schedule of my activities. I will report any attacks or inappropriate behavior directed at me while online. I will protect passwords, accounts and resources.
3. **Respect Others:** I will show respect to others. I will not use electronic mediums to antagonize, bully, harass, or stalk people. I will show respect for other people in my choice of websites. I will not visit sites that are degrading to others, pornographic, racist or inappropriate.
4. **Protect Others:** I will protect others by reporting abuse and not forwarding inappropriate materials or communications. I will avoid unacceptable materials and conversations.
5. **Respect Intellectual Property:** I will request permission to use copyrighted or otherwise protected materials. I will suitably cite all use of websites, books, media, etc. I will acknowledge all primary sources. I will validate information. I will use and abide by the fair use rules.
6. **Protect Intellectual Property:** I will request to use the software and media others produce. I will purchase, license, and register all software or use available free and open source alternatives rather than pirating software. I will purchase my music and media and refrain from distributing these in a manner that violates their licenses.

iPAD USE

Student iPad use will be contained to the school building. Students will use their iPad in various learning settings and classrooms throughout the day. Student iPads are to be kept at school and are not allowed to leave the school building. Students will receive regular training during the school year to address appropriate care and usage of the iPad, as well as digital citizenship training.

Students will log into their iPad using their school-issued student ID. Students are not to share their account passwords with anyone other than their parent/guardian. **In the event of a compromised account the Columbus Public School Technology Department reserves the right to disable a student's account.**

EMAIL

Students' email access will be through a Google Gmail system managed by the Columbus Public Schools. This email system is monitored by the Columbus Public Schools Technology Department and all messages sent or received through this system are archived and subject to filtering of inappropriate content. Students are expected to use appropriate language when sending emails and are not to transmit language/material that is profane obscene, abusive, or offensive to others. Student email accounts are subject to inspection at any time by school administration, parent/guardian or designee. **In the event of**

noncompliance with appropriate email use, the Columbus Public School Technology department reserves the right to terminate a student's email account.

GOOGLE APPS FOR EDUCATION

The Columbus Public Schools district utilizes Google Apps for Education for students, teachers, and staff. This permission form describes the tools and student responsibilities for using these services. As with any educational endeavor, a strong partnership with families is essential to a successful experience.

As a district, we only authorize the use of tools and applications that support the implementation of our curriculum and have been through a rigorous educational process. Our district utilizes several computer software applications and web-based services, operated not by school district, but by third parties. A complete list of the programs with the privacy policy for each can be found on our district website:

The following services are available to each student and hosted by Google as part of Columbus Public Schools on-line presence in Google Apps for Educations:

Mail - an individual email account for school use managed by Columbus Public Schools

Calendar – an individual calendar providing the ability to organize schedules, daily activities and assignments

Docs – a word-processing, spreadsheet, drawing, and presentation toolset that is very similar to Microsoft Office

Sites – an individual and collaborative website creation tool

Using these tools, students collaboratively create, edit and share files and websites for school related projects and communicate via email with other students and teachers. These services are entirely online and available 24/7 from any internet-connected computer. Examples of student use include showcasing class projects, building an electronic portfolio of school learning experiences and working in small groups on presentations to share with others.

In order for our students to use these educational programs and services, certain Board Policy approved directory information may be provided to the website operator strictly for educational purposes. This directory information may consist of the student's name, username, district e-mail address, grade level, age and/or date of birth. The need for such information is necessary to utilize software and web-based services as part of the classroom instruction. **A signature on the Student Handbook Signature Page constitutes consent for our school district to provide this directory information.**

TECHNOLOGY USE IN THE COLUMBUS PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICT IS GOVERNED BY FEDERAL LAWS INCLUDING:

Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA)

COPPA applies to commercial companies and limits their ability to collect personal information from children under age 13. By default, advertising is turned off for Columbus Public School's presence in Google Apps for Education. No personal student information is collected for commercial purposes. This permission form allows the school to act as an agent for parents in the collection of information within the school context. The school's use of student information is solely for educational purposes. For more information on COPPA, please visit <http://www.ftc.gov/privacy/coppafaqs.shtm>

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

FERPA protects the privacy of student education records and gives parents the rights to review student records. Under FERPA, schools may disclose directory information (refer to Board Policy 507.02), but parents may request the school not disclose this information. Parents are provided the opportunity annually to opt out of disclosing their student's directory information on the District's Enrollment Form. For more information on FERPA, please visit <http://www.ed.gov/policy/gen/guid/fpco/ferpa>

Guidelines for the responsible use of Google Apps for Education by students:

1. **Official Email Address.** All students will be assigned a *username@discoverers.org* email account. This account will be considered the student's official CPS email address until such time as the student is no longer enrolled with Columbus Public Schools.
2. **Prohibited Conduct.** Please refer to student handbook and Acceptable Use Policy.

3. **Access Restrictions.** Access to and use of student email is considered a privilege accorded at the discretion of the Columbus Public School District. The District maintains the right to immediately withdraw the access and use of these services including email when there is reason to believe that violation of law or District policies have occurred. In such cases, the alleged violation will be referred to a building Administrator for further investigation and adjudication.
4. **Security.** Columbus Public Schools cannot and does not guarantee the security of electronic files located on Google systems. Although Google does have a powerful content filter in place for email, the District cannot assure that users will not be exposed to unsolicited information.
5. **Privacy.** The general right of privacy will be extended to the extent possible in the electronic environment. Columbus Public Schools and all electronic users should treat electronically stored information in individuals' files as confidential and private. However, users of student email are strictly prohibited from accessing files and information other than their own. The District reserves the right to access these Google systems, including current and archival files of user accounts when there is reasonable suspicion that unacceptable use has occurred.

TELEPHONE USAGE

The telephone at the school is a business telephone. Therefore, the use is limited to students. If the reason to use the telephone is legitimate, the teacher will give the student permission to use the telephone. These calls should be kept to a minimum and be kept brief. Calling to make arrangements to go to or play at another student's house is not a legitimate reason.

UNNECESSARY STUDENT ITEMS

Students should not bring items to school that may interfere with learning or endanger the health and safety of others. This includes but is not limited to cell phones, fidgets spinners, hand-held games, i-pods, trading cards, etc. The school is not responsible for the lost, theft or damage of any unnecessary items brought to school. The teacher or principal may confiscate such items. The return of confiscated items is at the discretion of the teacher or principal. **If an item is not on the school supply list or directly requested by a teacher or staff member, please do not bring it to school.**

The Columbus Public Schools does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, national or ethnic origin, sex, marital status, age or handicap in administration or access to, or treatment or employment in, its programs and activities. If you have any special needs request that will assist you in participating in services, program and activities of the Columbus Public School District, please contact your building principal or the superintendent of schools.

Executive Director of Building Operations and Technology Leonard Kwapnioski said Lost Creek has been having issues with carpeting especially on the south side. He said carpet will be changed out in six classrooms, and the accordion walls will be replaced with a solid wall with a door between them. Dr. Loeffelholz, Mr. Melick, and Mr. Kwapnioski met with the Building and Sites Committee. The money for any expenses comes out of the maximum amount that can be assessed in the building and sites fund. Dr. Loeffelholz said there will be money left over for other things. Some board members expressed concern that by approving the nonprofit corporation, it would appear the district already made up its mind about the project, yet there are no details. He said the board did not need to approve this tonight, but this must be done first to allow for planning. Dr. Loeffelholz said a public hearing can be done when and if the board decides to access the money. He said the community is aware of what the district is looking at for the Kramer Education Center. Dr. Loeffelholz said right now the district is not spending anything. Dr. Loeffelholz told the board the only thing they were being asked to do tonight is create the corporation to borrow the money in the future. He said the board is not agreeing to spend a certain dollar amount, but it is just saying the amount will not exceed \$5 million. There will be no payments until the district decides to borrow the money. In order to get some grant funding, the district must show that it is making a commitment and creating the nonprofit. Dr. Loeffelholz said just because the district creates the nonprofit doesn't mean it will ever be used. There will not be any additional tax dollars collected because this is already money being collected in the building and sites fund. Dr. Loeffelholz said once the plans become more concrete, a board will be created to oversee the nonprofit corporation. Board member Theresa Seipel said this will show other entities that CPS is moving forward. Dr. Loeffelholz said this is a step by step process, but if the board does not

want to do this now then it pushes everything back. Board member Doug Willoughby said the board has not made a final decision to create the early childhood center, and this seems like it is already a done deal. Seipel said the board has made early childhood a priority, and it should be done now, and this is the first step in getting it accomplished. Seipel said if the community questions the decision, this will provide an opportunity for the board to explain. She said this way the district can get this accomplished without raising taxes and be done with it in seven years. This isn't locking the district into building anything right now. Dr. Loeffelholz said this must be done first before the district can enter into any other agreements. He said no money will be spent without the board approval. CPS turned in a grant two weeks ago, and this will open the door to apply for other grants to show the district is committed and can be counted as part of in-kind matching funds. Dr. Loeffelholz said the district's goal is to get some of the \$5 million in grant funds.

The CHS Winter Percussion requested permission to go to the WGI World Percussion Championships in Dayton, OH. The group plans on leaving on Tuesday morning, April 14 and returning Saturday morning. Melick said there are four teaching positions left to fill: speech and language pathologist, high school English, high school science and early childhood. He said there have been 32 new staff hired and 17 in-district transfers. Principals have been busy hiring. Melick said it has been challenging trying to recode all the budget items. Next year there will be all new codes. Melick said this is being required because it will make it easier to follow the money and show more transparency. He said this will also allow people to compare districts to see how the money is being spent.

Executive Director of Business Operations and Technology Leonard Kwapnioski said the panels and insulation are up at the Kramer Education Center. He said the portable has also been removed. Kwapnioski said over the next couple of months, he will be spending some money to update all the networks in the district. He said the cost will be around \$63,000, and he plans to buy everything upfront. Kwapnioski said most of the project will be reimbursed, and he will file for this in July. Kwapnioski said this is a great opportunity for the district, and the money will be coming out of the depreciation fund and will be put back once the reimbursement is received. Kwapnioski said the portable at West Park will be moved shortly. He said Dr. Loeffelholz has received his new computer and 100 of the staff have new machines already with 80 more being distributed tomorrow at CMS. Lost Creek, West Park and North Park will receive machines on Friday and Centennial on Thursday. Kwapnioski said the building secretaries will be the first classified staff to receive machines since they will be leaving.

I.O.1. Administrative Functions

I.O.2. Updates

Tracking growth and improvement - The goal is to have 100 percent of teachers show evidence of tech integration at all levels of the SAMR mode. Tech Integration Specialist Brandi Fleming said this is the first year for K-12 to be one to one with devices. Last spring, the media specials and Fleming worked to provide a model to provide common language, initial training of the model and coaching and support. Fleming said the SAMR model is a tech framework that categorizes four levels of classroom tech integration, provides a common language for tech integration across all grade levels and a content shift from teacher center to student centered technology. Fleming said the areas are: Redefinition Technology allows for the creation of new task previous inconceivable; Modification Technology allows for significant task redesign; Augmentation is a

little more advanced but still teacher centered with functional improvement; and Substitution Technology is more teacher centered with no functional change. Fleming said the first-year teachers had to learn how to apply technology in all areas and not reteach a tool. A survey was sent to teachers at the end of quarter one asking if they integrated technology at any levels. Fleming said the point of the survey was to get data. Another survey was sent at quarter three to see if there was any growth. She said there was not a huge change from quarter one to quarter three. Fleming said the teachers are learning where technology fits appropriately. She said teachers will continue to be given surveys and to see how the curriculum department can support them. The media specialists are the front line in all buildings. Fleming said the media specialist and she try to meet with every teacher quarters 1, 2 and 3 during the school day. Fleming said they are not looking for everyone to be at level three and four all the time. She said they would like to see more people take a risk and get to those levels.

Executive Director of Curriculum and Instruction Amy Romshek said there has been some changes in the Global Destination Imagination. Last year there were 26 students plus four managers who attended, and the cost was \$23,250 plus \$2,000 for gas and hotel for total of \$25,250. This year \$22,000 for the team, and parents will pay \$1,800 for hotel and food and \$800 for gas and parking. This brings the total cost to \$24,600. Romshek said there is probably around the same amount of students going this year. Board member Mike Jeffryes said they are now staying in downtown Kansas City and all the kids are at different hotels. In the past, all participants stayed in dorms.

EdReports.org helps the district to find quality materials. Romshek said it is an independent nonprofit designed to improve K-12 education. The report provides independent analyses of instructional materials. Romshek said several foundations provide support for this group. She said this is not the entire selection progress it is part of it. She said the report is about 20 pages long. The report shows indicates for all the categories. Romshek said the company is using national standards for alignment. EdReports.org takes about four to six months to review the materials.

I.O.2.1. Social Media

Fleming said the district is looking at modifying the staff social media guidelines. She said there needs to be a strict division between personal and professional. She said most of the guidelines are to help staff get through this process. Classroom teachers should not post kids to their personal page. It can be posted on their professional page first and then shared to the personal page. She said there is still a lot of opportunities to teach kids about safely using social media. Fleming said the

staff is being told now with the hopes that personal and professional will be separated by August. Fleming said the document is still a work in progress. She told the board to let her know if they have any questions or concerns. Fleming said one of the biggest changes is teachers will be expected to know who is on the do not photo list in their classes. Dr. Loeffelholz said it is tricky for staff who work in the district and are also parents. He said if attending an event as a district employee, people can't take pictures of their child and other kids. If it is on their own time, they can take what they want for photos, but they must be posted to the classroom page first and then shared. Once people sign a contract with CPS, no matter what they do they are still associated with the school. Fleming said the policy is just asking staff to be aware of their surroundings. She said one easy fix is to take off the employment on the personal page. The professional approved social media avenues are Facebook, Twitter or Instagram. If staff members want another social media account, they must request one in writing from the Superintendent. Fleming said the policy is designed to protect everyone.

Executive Director of Student Services & Special Education Jason Harris said the Community for Kids grant has been submitted. He said the group will next meet on June 3 and hopefully CPS will find out if it is approved. This grant will allow focus groups to be formed, connect the district with other grant and fundraising opportunities and connect with donors who have done similar projects. Harris said board members Theresa Seipel and Mike Goos will now be invited to attend the meetings as the district moves forward.

I.Q. Superintendent's Report

Dr. Loeffelholz thanked the board for attending graduation yesterday. He said it was a good ceremony. The Legislative session will end early. Dr. Loeffelholz said there are still several bills that could impact education. He said one of these is LB147, which allows teachers to restrain students. This bill did not make it out of committee but a senator can request it to come out by a vote of the legislature. Dr. Loeffelholz said there are several issues with this bill including that all teachers will need to be trained on how to restrain a student. He said he is hoping it does not pass. Sherwood Foundation representatives did a tour of the high school STEM area to see where their matching funds went. If the library project can be completed, CPS would get an additional \$50,000 bonus. Dr. Loeffelholz said the foundation representatives were very impressed with the STEM area. He said the planning meeting for the new library was held and the group seems more willing to listen this time. Dr. Loeffelholz said there was not a large turnout for the meeting but there was some

good input. The Columbus Economic Council still has the high school at the top of the list for funding. He said he and CPS Marketing Director Nicole Anderson held a meeting with 40 businesses to see where STEM education was going next. Areas that were identified as needs include: business and marketing management, early childhood and health care. The principals all did their continuous improvement presentation report to the administration and will give it to the board at the retreat. Dr. Loeffelholz said he is recommending the board only have one meeting in June and July. He suggested the second Monday in July for retreat or in early August. Dr. Loeffelholz said he will talk with Candy Becher to come up with some dates. He reminded the board they must do the superintendent evaluation next month. He said the board will be sent a survey to fill out electronically with all the information going to the board president. The evaluation must be done by the next board meeting. Dr. Loeffelholz will send the survey out by the end of the week with a deadline of June 5.

I.R. Board Sharing

Theresa Seipel said she enjoyed graduation. She also said she hopes all the staff knows how much the board appreciates all they do, and they enjoy the summer break. Seipel said she hopes Steve Woodside and Jackie Herink enjoys their retirement. Doug Willoughby thanked Woodside and Herink for their years of service and encouraged them to consider subbing for the district. Doug Molczyk thanked Woodside and Herink for their years of service and said they will be greatly missed. He appreciates all the staff and what they do. Molczyk said the CHS vocal music performance was outstanding, and he even watched the soccer game at the same time. He said the CMS Band concert was also good. He said it is great to see all the students and their achievements. Molczyk said this is his favorite board meeting of the year. Candy Becher said CHS student Jayden Boesch invited her to see his robotics presentation, which he wrote 10 pages of code. She said it was performed in front of the businesses, and they were very impressed with his work. Becher said it is exciting to see what CPS students are doing. She said the presentation was really good PR for the district. Becher thanked Woodside and Herink for their years of service and said their experience will be hard to replace. Mike Jeffryes also thanked Woodside and Herink for the service to the district and wished them luck in their retirement. He said it was a really cool experience to see his first child graduate from CPS.

He thanked the district, and administration for the job they did in helping her reach the goal. Jeffryes said he loves the small-town pride, and Columbus is a fantastic. He said it was exciting to see his daughter graduate from his alma mater. Jeffryes said it is amazing to see how far CPS has progressed in the last 25 years, and he is excited about CPS's future




Because our lunch fund cash balance continues to be in good shape, the Paid Lunch Equity calculation tool provided by NDE's Nutrition Services office does not require that we increase prices for the 2019-20 school year. Further, our May balance will be approximately \$60,000 higher than last year's, so I see no need to increase prices.

Therefore, I am requesting board approval of retaining the following breakfast and lunch prices for the 2019-20 school year:

I am recommending, we have the 8 SLP's serve our district from B-21, but continue to have the non-publics served by an online therapy company. This will save our SLP's travel time to the non-public buildings and allow them to focus on students in our buildings.

The estimated final cost for PresenceLearning will be \$74,105 for the 18-19 school year, but we have not received the final bill. I have also explored another company, Global Therapy, and their estimated cost would be \$89,280 for the 19-20 school year. However, within that price Global Therapy will also conduct evaluations. PresenceLearning does not conduct evaluations currently. That would be an additional \$450 per student. I currently have a CPS SLP assigned to complete non-public evaluations, but our current SLPs were overwhelmed with evaluations all buildings. Could we consider switching to Global Therapy so the cost would include evaluations as well?

Global Teletherapy Consulting Services Agreement

This Consulting Services Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into as of June 11, 2019 (the "Effective Date") by and between **Global Teletherapy LLC**, a Maryland limited liability company ("Global Teletherapy") and **Columbus Public Schools**, with its principal place of operation in **Nebraska** (together with its agents, employees, and affiliates, "Client"). Global Teletherapy and Client are referred to herein individually as a "Party" or collectively as the "Parties."

1. **Services.** Global Teletherapy will staff school with speech therapists who provide therapy services (the "Services") according to the schedule set forth in Exhibit A hereto; and under such conditions regarding the environment, equipment and supervision necessary for the provision of Services as set forth in Exhibit B hereto.
2. **Fees and Payment Terms.** In consideration for the Services to be provided, Client agrees to pay Global Teletherapy in accordance with the fee schedule set forth on Exhibit A, and all such fees generated from the Services performed by Global Teletherapy shall be considered earned as the work is performed.
3. **Term and Termination.** This Agreement shall be in effect as of the effective date for services for the entire 2019- 2020 school year unless previously terminated in accordance with the terms of this Section 3 (the "Initial Term"). Either Party may terminate the Agreement for any reason upon ninety (90) days prior written notice to the other party, so long as at least 90 days of Services have occurred upon the delivery date of such notification, and, provided the terminating Party has provided notice of such breach to the other Party and an opportunity to cure such breach during a period of not less than thirty (30) days following such notice. Upon the expiration or termination of this Agreement for any reason, all amounts owed to Global Teletherapy under this Agreement, which accrued before such termination, or expiration will be immediately due and payable. In addition to the post-termination obligations in this Section 3, Sections 5 and Sections 6 through 20 will survive any expiration or termination of this Agreement. Following the expiration of the Initial Term, this Agreement shall automatically renew on an annual basis unless either party gives written notice of its intention not to renew 90 days before expiration of the then-current term.
4. **THIRD PARTY INFORMATION; HIPAA COMPLIANCE.** Client understands that it may receive confidential and proprietary information relating to Global Teletherapy's business. Client agrees that the Global Teletherapy's proprietary information is confidential and is the sole, exclusive and extremely valuable property of Global Teletherapy. For the purposes of this Agreement, "Confidential Information" means all information disclosed by Global Therapy to Client or by Client to Global Therapy, which is in tangible form and labeled "confidential" (or with a similar legend) or which a reasonable person would understand to be confidential given the nature of the information and circumstances of disclosure. Subject to the express permissions of this Agreement, Global Therapy and Client will protect each other's Confidential Information from unauthorized use, access or disclosure in the same manner as each protects its own Confidential Information, but with no less than reasonable care. The Company understands that

the Company may receive from third parties confidential or proprietary information, including, but not limited to, personal, medical, or other information relative to the Company's Clients and patients (collectively, "Third Party Information") subject to a duty on Company's part to maintain the confidentiality of such information and use it only for certain limited purposes. The Company agrees to hold Third Party Information in confidence and not to disclose to anyone (other than Company personnel who need to know such information in connection with their work for Company) or to use, except in connection with the Company's work for Client, Third Party Information unless expressly authorized in writing by an officer of the Client or required by law. The Company agrees to comply with all requirements under The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 ("HIPAA") Privacy Rule regarding the use and disclosure of Third Party Information.

5. RIGHTS TO DELIVERABLES; OWNERSHIP.

5.1. Rights to Deliverables. The Parties hereby agree that the specified Services to be completed pursuant to Exhibit A hereto primarily involve the provision of qualified speech-language pathologists, to provide both direct and indirect supplemental educational services, all of which are to be delivered remotely or via the web, to Client students with identified or suspected special needs as described in Exhibit A.

5.2. Ownership. Without limiting the foregoing, Global Teletherapy and its licensors reserve and retain ownership to all Preexisting Intellectual Property (as defined below), and Global Teletherapy hereby grants to Client a non-exclusive, fully paid, limited license to use Preexisting Intellectual Property solely in connection with Client's use of the Services. "Preexisting Intellectual Property" means all of Global Teletherapy's inventions (whether or not patentable), works of authorship, designs, know-how, ideas, concepts, information and tools in existence prior to the commencement of the Services, including, but not limited to, ideas (whether or not patentable) know-how, technical data, techniques, concepts, information or tools, and all associated intellectual property rights thereto developed by Global Teletherapy or its personnel in connection with providing Services pursuant to this Agreement that derive from, improve, enhance or modify Global Teletherapy's Preexisting Intellectual Property. Global Teletherapy's Preexisting Intellectual Property also means all inventions (whether or not patentable), works of authorship, designs, know-how, ideas, information and tools, including without limitation software and programming tools developed by Global Teletherapy or its personnel in connection with providing Services generally to support Global Teletherapy's product and/or service offerings (including, without limitation the Services) and which can be so used without use of Client's Confidential Information.

5.3. Grant of License. Client agrees to maintain (and not supplement, remove, or modify) all copyright, trademark, or other proprietary notices on such materials. Provided Client is not in breach of any term of this Agreement, Global Teletherapy grants Client a non-exclusive, limited license, which license shall terminate upon expiration or termination of this Agreement, to reproduce and distribute the Materials solely to assist in the provision of Services in accordance with the terms herein.

6. **Disclaimer of Warranties.** The Services are provided "as is" without any warranty and Global Teletherapy expressly disclaims any and all warranties, express, implied, or statutory, including warranties of title, noninfringement, merchantability, and fitness for a particular purpose.

7. **Limitation of Liability.** In no event will Global Teletherapy be liable for any incidental damages, consequential damages, or any lost profits arising from or relating to this Agreement or to the Services, whether in contract or tort or otherwise, even if Global Teletherapy knew or should have known of the possibility of such damages. Global Teletherapy's cumulative liability relating to this Agreement will not exceed the lesser of actual fees paid by Client to Global Teletherapy during the school year immediately preceding the date on which a claim is made; provided that such amount shall under no circumstances exceed \$1,000. Client acknowledges that the Agreement reflects an adequate and acceptable allocation of risk and that in the absence of the foregoing limitations Contactor would not enter into the Agreement.

8. **Non-Solicitation.** Client shall not, during the term of the Agreement and for one (1) year thereafter, directly or indirectly solicit, induce, or attempt to induce any Global Teletherapy employee or contractor without Global Teletherapy's prior written consent.

9. **Indemnification.** Client agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Global Teletherapy, its officers, agents and employees against any and all losses, consequential damages, incidental damages, injuries, claims, actions, causes of action, judgments or liens arising from, or alleged to have arisen from the acts or omissions of Client, its officers, agents, or employees in connection with the Services.

Global Teletherapy agrees to defend, indemnify, and save free and harmless Client, its officers, agents and employees against any and all losses, injuries, claims, actions, causes of action, judgments or liens arising from, or alleged to have arisen from the acts or omissions of Global Teletherapy, its officers, agents, or employees in connection with the Services.

If any party to this Agreement has a claim made against it for which it has the right to indemnification hereunder (such party, the "Claiming Party"), then the Claiming Party shall promptly provide the other party hereto (the "Indemnifying Party") notice of the commencement of any such claim; but the omission so to notify the other party will not relieve it from any liability which it may have to the other party otherwise than under this Agreement. The foregoing indemnification obligations shall include against any and all expenses (including attorneys' fees), witness fees, damages, judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement and any other amounts that the Claiming Party becomes legally obligated to pay because of any claim or claims made against or by it in connection with any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, arbitrational, administrative or investigative (including an action by or in the right of the Claiming Party) to which Claiming Party is, was or at any time becomes a party, or is threatened to be made a party, pursuant to the services provided pursuant to this Agreement. The Indemnifying Party shall advance, prior to the final disposition of any proceeding, promptly following request therefor, all expenses incurred by the Claiming Party in connection with such proceeding upon receipt of an undertaking by or on behalf of the Claiming Party to repay said amounts if it shall be determined ultimately that Claiming Party is not entitled to be indemnified under the provisions of this Agreement. Notwithstanding anything

in this Agreement to the contrary, no Claiming Party shall be entitled to indemnification by the Indemnifying Party if the Claiming Party's conduct giving rise to the claim for which indemnification is sought constitutes willful misconduct or is a violation of criminal law.

10. Designation of Client's Responsible Party. In order to best facilitate the implementation of this Agreement, Client agrees to designate a contact person responsible for the implementation and facilitation of this agreement, as well as a contact person(s) at each site the Services will be delivered (each such person shall hereinafter be referred to as the "Client Responsible Party").

11. Client Representations. Client hereby represents and warrants to Global Teletherapy as follows: (i) Client has the right, power, and authority to enter into and perform its obligations under this Agreement, (ii) Client has obtained all necessary consents in accordance with its operations to execute and deliver this Agreement and perform its obligations under this Agreement, (iii) the undersigned has the right, power and authority to enter into this Agreement on behalf of Client, (iv) this Agreement constitutes the legal, valid and binding obligation of Client, enforceable against Client in accordance with its terms, subject only to the effect, if any, of (A) applicable bankruptcy and other similar laws affecting the rights of creditors generally and (B) rules of law governing specific performance, injunctive relief and other equitable remedies, and (v) the execution, delivery, performance of and compliance with this Agreement will not, with or without the passage of time, result in any violation or be in conflict with or constitute a default under any contract to which Client is a party or any terms or provisions thereof.

12. Independent Contractor. The Parties are independent contractors, and no agency, partnership, franchise, joint venture, or employment relationship is intended or created by this Agreement. Neither Party is authorized to make any representation, contract, or commitment on behalf of the other Party.

13. Arbitration. The Parties agree that any and all disputes, claims, or demands in any way arising out of or relating to this Agreement shall be resolved, to the fullest extent permitted by law, by final, binding and confidential arbitration in Baltimore, Maryland.

14. Assignment. Global Teletherapy's rights and obligations under this agreement will bind and inure to the benefit of its successors and permitted assigns.

15. Headings. The headings in this Agreement do not affect its interpretation.

16. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the agreement among the Parties with respect to the Services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement, and supersedes all prior negotiations, understandings or agreements (oral or written), between the Parties concerning its subject matter.

17. Severability. In the event that any provision of this Agreement will, for any reason, be determined by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability will be interpreted as closely as possible so as not affect any other provision of this Agreement, and such provision will further be modified by said court to permit its enforcement to the maximum extent permitted by law.

18. Governing Law. This Agreement will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Maryland without regard to the conflicts of law provisions thereof.

Exhibit A: Services, Schedule, Fees and Support

1. Services. Global Teletherapy will make available to Client qualified licensed Speech Language Pathologists to provide both direct and indirect supplemental educational services, all of which are to be delivered remotely or via the web, to Client students with identified or suspected special needs, including, but not limited to: direct therapy, evaluations, consultation, IEP meeting scheduling, preparation and attendance, review of records to familiarize case manager with student history, monthly case notes, collaboration with staff and parents, preparation, daily documentation, scheduling and other related tasks.

2. Schedule and Location of Services. Services will be provided exclusively via computer or telepractice, unless otherwise agreed in writing.

3. Summary of Scope of Work. Global Teletherapy understands that the scope of Services to be provided are as follows: The following list will outline the services and rates provided by Global

Teletherapy's Nebraska licensed/ credentialed therapists . For purposes of this contract, **full time therapists are defined as any combination of therapists that together work 40 hours per week and does not necessarily equate to headcount.** The details on the work to be provided will be:

A. Per Diem Services to be provided by Global Teletherapy Speech Therapists for \$2480 per week for 1 FTE Speech Therapist. These therapists will provide all Speech Therapy related services for Columbus Public Schools and will be compensated regardless of caseload or absences. Working time will include direct therapy, evaluations, consultations, IEP meeting preparation and attendance, collaboration with staff and parents, therapy preparation, daily documentation, scheduling and other related tasks.

a. Equipment. Client may purchase web cameras, and head sets, from Global Teletherapy, at \$45 per webcam, \$35 per head set.

b. Invoices. Global Teletherapy shall invoice Client on a monthly basis and Client shall pay all amounts due within thirty (30) days of Global Teletherapy invoice date.

c. No Refund. All fees due hereunder are non-refundable and are not contingent on any additional services to be provided.

d. Outstanding Balances. Balances outstanding in excess of thirty (30) days shall accrue interest at a rate equal to the Applicable Federal Rate plus one and one half percent (1.5%) per month, from due date until paid, plus Global Teletherapy's reasonable costs of collection.

5. **Standard Maintenance & Support Plan**. Client understands that therapists of Global Therapy provide the Services through a third-party platform created, maintained, updated and provided by Citrix/GoToMeeting (the "Third-party Provider"). The Maintenance & Support services offered by Global Teletherapy are limited to assisting the client in working with the Third Party Provider to troubleshoot and resolve any issues that affect the provision of the Services.

a. Global Teletherapy has chosen to use the Third-party Provider platform because of its reliability and the availability of dedicated, professional technical support in the unlikely event a technical problem arises. In addition, since Third-party Provider is currently employed by millions of users, we do not expect, anticipate or foresee any significant technical problems. However, should a problem arise prior to, during, or following a teletherapy session, the following policies have been designed to facilitate the best user experience.

b. If during a session, a problem arises, then the therapist will perform initial troubleshooting, using his/her knowledge and experience with the system and/or by calling Third-party Provider support and following their instructions. A Client paraprofessional must be available to follow

any instructions or support recommendations of the therapist or Third-party Provider support. Therapist involvement in troubleshooting will not exceed the duration of one session. If the problem is not resolved by the end of the session, therapist will contact Global Teletherapy, and a Global Teletherapy representative will be in touch with the Client Responsible Party and/or Third-party Provider Support to identify the problem. The Client Responsible Party shall work with Global Teletherapy in commercially reasonable manner to resolve this issue.

c. If the problem is determined by Global Teletherapy and Citrix to be the result of an internal Citrix, clinician, internet, hardware or other Global Teletherapy-related issue, Global Teletherapy will assume responsibility for resolving the issue, and will work to solve the problem in a commercially reasonable manner.

d. Any necessary repairs to be made by Global Teletherapy or Client are expected to be performed in a commercially reasonable manner and on a reasonable timeline.

e. Client agrees to cooperate and work closely with Global Teletherapy to reproduce errors, including conducting diagnostic or troubleshooting activities as reasonably requested and appropriate. Also, subject to Client's approval on a case-by-case basis, Users may be asked to provide remote access to their workstation for troubleshooting purposes.

f. Global Teletherapy will work with users to set-up and trouble-shoot new equipment. Additional equipment (beyond what is provided to the user as stated in the Agreement) is the responsibility of the Client. Upon Client's request Global Teletherapy can order necessary equipment but user will be invoiced for such equipment.

g. Global Teletherapy cannot support the use of hardware, software and operating system configurations that do not meet the specified requirements found within this Agreement.

h. Global Teletherapy may change its Standard Maintenance & Support Plan from time to time in its sole discretion.

Exhibit B: Environment, Equipment, and Supervision

Client shall provide Global Teletherapy with the below. Global Teletherapy will not begin services until all of the below criteria are met in order to ensure student success:

1. Computer Set-Up.

- Computer with monitor
- Web camera with 15 FPS (frames per second) capture rate
- Headset (or speakers if in an empty room) with attached microphone (provided by GT)
- phone or cell phone with speaker capability in the immediate vicinity of the computer where service is delivered

2. Environment.

- A suitable non-noisy controlled space such as a resource room, classroom, computer room, library and/or home setting.**
- Ample lighting that shines either (i) from above the student or (ii) directly on the face of the student but not (iii) from behind the student and directly into the webcam.**

3. Supervision.

- A paraprofessionals (or parents) to provide the below services. Additional services may or may not be required.**
 - Transporting the student to/from the telepractice session.**
 - Assisting the student with technology set-up (e.g., attaching the headset to the computer).**

- iii. **Ensuring that the conferencing connection with remote therapist is functioning. Contacting the therapist via phone if necessary.**
- iv. **Remaining in the sessions to ensure that any technology glitches are reported and fixed**
- v. **Providing cues, prompts, and models for the student upon therapist direction.**
- vi. **Helping relay information between the school staff and the therapist related to scheduling, absences, or school functions.**

b. The paraprofessional shall act under the directive of Global Teletherapy's SLP except in the event of emergency.
