B. Board Policy, Handbooks, and Support Programs

This committee is responsible for annual review of board policies, handbooks, and crisis/safety plans. This committee is also responsible for the support and development of support programs(nursing, food service) in the district.

1. Consider, discuss, and take action to approve second reading of first installment of new and amended board policies.

This update includes three new policies and four revisions of existing policy. Actions described on NDE's Launch Nebraska webpage are recommendations or suggestions, not mandates. Thus, Policy 105.00 Return to School Committee is optional, and if adopted, the word "required" in paragraph one should be replaced with the word "recommended."

New Policies:

Policy 105.00 Return to School Committee meets a requirement described on NDE's new Launch Nebraska webpage at <https://www.launchne.com/>. This committee has been mandated to help districts cope with the very broad range of decisions and actions that will need to be taken in the near future to deal with Covid-19 and any other related emergencies. However, actions described on NDE's Launch Nebraska webpage are now listed as recommendations or suggestions, not mandates. Thus, Policy 105.00 Return to School Committee is optional, and if adopted, the word "required" in paragraph one will be replaced with the word "recommended."

Policy 205.08 Board Policy and Temporary Waivers is added to formalize the fact that for the immediate future there may be several temporary waivers of existing NDE Rules and Regulations to deal with the Covid-19 disruptions.

Policy 607.10 Classroom Environment is added to handle a fairly new concern created by the manufacture and marketing of essential oils which some students and staff may be highly allergic to and which would disrupt the educational environment. It wouldn't be surprising to see more products or items of classroom disruption, as yet unimagined, added to this language in the future.

Revised Policies:

Three policies have been revised to deal with disruptions caused by the presence of personal security products in the schools such as mace and tasers. Not surprisingly, these can be misused or purposely taken from the possession of students or staff and used to disrupt school or injure others.

Policy 504.11 Weapons,

Policy 504.16 Searches and Seizures, and

Policy 801.04 Bus Safety Program are being revised to include the prohibition of these devices without specific permission of the building principal and storage during school hours in a secure

location.

Policy 508.15 Concussion Awareness is being revised due to occasional hesitation on the part of students, parents or guardians to be forthcoming about a student's concussion. It places a higher expectation on parents and guardians to notify the school of such injuries and flatly requires the student to make such notification, which implies appropriate punishment to students for lack of doing so. I have also included for your use or reminder three useful tools created by NDE for concussion monitoring and treatment:

1. Post-Concussion Symptom Checklist,
2. Return to Academics Progression, and
3. Return-to-Learn Protocol.

I'm also attaching a copy of

Policy 502.02 Nonresident Students with the sixth paragraph underlined simply for your review. This is NOT a revised policy, but NDE is taking a closer look at the criteria districts have put in place for making decisions to accept or reject option enrollments. If you have such criteria in place, please review them, and re-adopt them if they will be kept.

More things are coming later this summer with new Title IX regulations for sexual harassment having been greatly revised, more changes probably coming from NDE due to Covid-19 for the upcoming year, and a special session of the Legislature still to be held.

2. Consider, discuss, and take action to approve first reading of second installment of new and amended board policies.

Policy Update Subscribers,

I have cleaned up and simplified Policy 104.00, using more of the direct instructions from Rule 10.009 regarding the School Improvement Plan required of districts every 5 years. This should not be confused with the district annual report issued annually as covered in policy 1002.00. Many districts have optionally attached their mission and vision statements, and sometimes even their educational goals, to this policy directly or as an administrative regulation for it.

LB 148 recently changed statute 84-1411 regarding the provision of public notice for board meetings. All meeting notices after late July must be published in the local paper of record. Policies 204.07 and 204.11 have been revised accordingly. Policy 204.02 regarding emergency meetings has been slightly revised for clarity.

The recent Supreme Court ruling regarding the firing of long-term employees for being homosexual or transgender in *Altitude Express Inc. v. Zarda*, *Bostock v. Clayton County*, and *R.G. & G.R. Harris Funeral Homes v. EEOC* has resulted in changes to our major policies dealing with anti-discrimination and protected categories in employment and education. Policies 103.00, 402.01.

404.06, 501.00 and 504.18 all reflect these changes. However, nothing is as constant as change and if the Feds do not postpone the implementation of new Title IX regs, policies 404.06 and 504.18 will both see enormous changes and expansions next month.

The discussion of educational equity in all aspects of our schools has become much more frequent the last couple of years. I have enclosed a new Policy 501.01 Educational Equity as an optional policy for districts wishing for such a policy. A couple of districts had already requested this and have it in place, but in the future there will be more demand for having many of these board expectations as a part of your policy manual.

Ratification and Affirmation of Previous E-Meetings. On March 17, 2020, Governor Ricketts issued Executive Order 20-03, which allowed public boards (including school boards) to meet virtually. On May 19, 2020, Governor Ricketts issued Executive Order 20-24, which extended Executive Order 20-03 through June 30th. Governor Ricketts has indicated that he will not issue another extension. As a result, effective July 1, school boards will need to meet in- person. Since Executive Order 20-03 was issued, some have questioned whether the Governor had the authority to unilaterally waive certain parts of the Open Meetings Act. To resolve this question proactively, and avoid any potential legal argument in the future, we recommend that any board that met virtually or remotely at any point between March 17th and June 30th pass the following motion:

"Move to ratify, affirm and approve all actions, votes, motions, decisions, notices, minutes and all other matters addressed, approved or otherwise acted upon by this Board of Education at all meetings that occurred during the

months of March, April, May and June as if set forth fully and incorporated herein entirely by this reference."

C. Building, Grounds, and Transportation

This committee is responsible for recommending approval of building/grounds and transportation programs, vehicle replacement schedule, building and maintenance and upgrade schedule.

Due to the COVID-19 school closure, the second semester rate was reduced accordingly. This service has worked well for our morning and afternoon routes. Below is an outline of the arrangements we used last year.

Lonnie's Trailer Court Bus Service

1. This is an unsupervised load/unload bus service.
2. The morning bus route pickup: 18th and Fort Street at 7:15 AM.
3. The afternoon bus route drop off: 18th and Fort Street at 4:15 PM.
4. Regular bus route rules apply.
5. Fee (per bus): \$450 per semester (\$5 per day/ \$1.66 per mile).
6. First Semester bus payment due: September 11, 2020.
7. Second Semester bus payment due: January 8, 2021.
8. We will use the same buses that go to Richland Elementary.

A. Superintendent's Report

1. **Summer School Update: (Dr. Gibbons)** We were able to start summer school July 6. We screen all students and staff that enter the building by taking temperatures and having them apply hand sanitizer. Staff wear masks. We are not requiring children to wear masks.

At the high school level, we have averaged 35 students each day.

As of Thursday, July 9, we have 101 students in the morning session K-8 and, we have 79 in the afternoon session.

In the afternoon, students are working in their grade levels doing science projects and reading books. Kindergarten students wrote a book about Orbeez, 1st grade has been practicing site words and exercising, 2nd grade has been doing the science of motion, 3rd grade is making dioramas , 4th grade is reading Wonder, 5th grade is reading "Frindle"

(Ms. Bebout) April Becker working with the United Way and Community and Family Partnership put together activity backpacks for elementary students in Schuyler. There were 100 backpacks per grade level 1st - 5th grade, so 500 total! There were books and other writing activities in each backpack. What a wonderful opportunity for our students :)

ASP summer camp has been so successful! My goal this year was 100 students. This is of course much lower than previous years. We hit this goal on July 8th! Very exciting. We also had a great opportunity to have professional soccer players from Australia come and work for our program

teaching students different soccer drills throughout the day. Graeme Eaglesham runs a non-profit out of Omaha and came to Schuyler to work with our students. Jared Severson is working with middle school students making masks that will be donated to the community. We have partnered with Michelle Evert who is the Colfax County Deputy Emergency Manager. She had a donation of material that will help with this service. We also have many other fun and exciting clubs: Dual Language, Art, Sports, Writing, and many others. Staff and students are both excited to be back in school doing activities.

2. Graduation Update:

a. **Senior Banquet: Friday, July 17th at 6:00 PM at the West Gym.** Board members are welcome to attend and help serve, eat, and participate in the program. Please let Sally know if you are planning to attend.

b. **Graduation: Saturday, July 18th at 7:00 PM at the Football Stadium.** We need to know who wants to help with this ceremony. Parents and families will be seated on the football field according to social distance guidelines (8 per group).

3. **Re-opening plans for Nebraska's schools:** We have been working on re-opening plans for the beginning of the school year (COVID-19) We will be organizing our return to school committee to begin meeting the week of July 20th. Attached is an overall plan developed by NRCSA superintendents and health professionals to use as a guide. See attached information.

This update includes three new policies and four revisions of existing policy. Actions described on NDE's Launch Nebraska webpage are recommendations or suggestions, not mandates. Thus, Policy 105.00 Return to School Committee is optional, and if adopted, the word "required" in paragraph one should be replaced with the word "recommended."

New Policies:

Policy 105.00 Return to School Committee meets a requirement described on NDE's new Launch Nebraska webpage at <https://www.launchne.com/>. This committee has been mandated to help districts cope with the very broad range of decisions and actions that will need to be taken in the near future to deal with Covid-19 and any other related emergencies. However, actions described on NDE's Launch Nebraska webpage are now listed as recommendations or suggestions, not mandates. Thus, Policy 105.00 Return to School Committee is optional, and if adopted, the word "required" in paragraph one will be replaced with the word "recommended."

Policy 205.08 Board Policy and Temporary Waivers is added to formalize the fact that for the immediate future there may be several temporary waivers of existing NDE Rules and Regulations to deal with the Covid-19 disruptions.

Policy 607.10 Classroom Environment is added to handle a fairly new concern created by the manufacture and marketing of essential oils which some students and staff may be highly allergic to and which would disrupt the educational environment. It wouldn't be surprising to see more products or items of classroom disruption, as yet unimagined, added to this language in the future.

Revised Policies:

Three policies have been revised to deal with disruptions caused by the presence of personal security products in the schools such as mace and tasers. Not surprisingly, these can be misused or purposely taken from the possession of students or staff and used to disrupt school or injure others.

Policy 504.11 Weapons,

Policy 504.16 Searches and Seizures, and

Policy 801.04 Bus Safety Program are being revised to include the prohibition of these devices without specific permission of the building principal and storage during school hours in a secure location.

Policy 508.15 Concussion Awareness is being revised due to occasional hesitation on the part of students, parents or guardians to be forthcoming about a student's concussion. It places a higher expectation on parents and guardians to notify the school of such injuries and flatly requires the student to make such notification, which implies appropriate punishment to students for lack of doing so. I have also included for your use or reminder three useful tools created by NDE for concussion monitoring and treatment:

1. Post-Concussion Symptom Checklist,
2. Return to Academics Progression, and
3. Return-to-Learn Protocol.

I'm also attaching a copy of

Policy 502.02 Nonresident Students with the sixth paragraph underlined simply for your review. This is NOT a revised policy, but NDE is taking a closer look at the criteria districts have put in place for making decisions to

accept or reject option enrollments. If you have such criteria in place, please review them, and re-adopt them if they will be kept.

More things are coming later this summer with new Title IX regulations for sexual harassment having been greatly revised, more changes probably coming from NDE due to Covid-19 for the upcoming year, and a special session of the Legislature still to be held.

Community Service

Schuyler Middle School recognizes the importance of community service by our students. Schuyler Middle School has a standing practice of asking students to perform community service by working/helping a non-profit organization or helping work at a community function within the Schuyler Community Schools district. Students are asked to complete 20 hours of community service between the beginning of their 6th grade year and the end of their 8th grade year in order to receive their 8th grade graduation certificate and in order to earn incentive day. Forms for reporting community service hours can be picked up in the SMS office and returned for the office staff to track the accumulation of hours.

Page: 27: Add highlighted words to reflect changes in SMS dress code.

"Shorts, skirts, or athletic shorts that do not reach mid-thigh (above fingertip length) or longer or pants that contain holes above the knee."

Students who have not attended intervention will be referred to the counselors and placed on a discipline step."

Once teachers have counseled a student individually and provided at least one retraining session after school you may choose to proceed to the following step program. The STEP Program is implemented as such...

Step 1 Refer the student to the office, where they are coached up by a Counselor. These students need to negotiate their way back into the teacher's classroom. (The last 5 minutes of class the teacher finds coverage for their class and meets the student in the office to discuss a plan to return to class.) The student makes up the class time missed after school that day to get the instruction missed. Parents are contacted and the incident is documented by the teacher in IC as a Behavior Referral.

Step 2 Parent/Guardian notified by Teacher and a parent meeting with the counselor and administration is set up to discuss behavior and consequences. Students remainsuspended from the class until a plan is made as a results of the meeting.

Step 3 Students are required to attend Saturday School. If not on the Student Assistance Team, they will be referred to SAT. (If Saturday School is skipped they will be assigned ISS and they will still need to complete Saturday School.)

Step 4 Parent/Guardian notified by administration that the student will be serving ISS. Incident is documented in IC.

Step 5 Parent/Guar. notified by administration that the student will be serving an extended ISS. Incident is documented in IC.

Step 6 Parent/Guardian notified that they will be serving OSS. Incident is documented in IC.

Step 7 Parent/Guardian and administration discuss alternative strategies to include alternative education, alternative placement and the possibility of expulsion.

We will subject the following supplementary information to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, and we will provide an opinion on it in relation to the financial statements as a whole, in our report combined with our auditor's report on the financial statements:

1. Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards.
2. Combining Schedule of Assets and Fund Balance – Modified Cash Basis.
3. Combining Schedule of Receipts, Disbursements, and Changes in Fund Balance – Modified Cash Basis.
4. Management Discussion and Analysis

The following other information accompanying the financial statements will not be subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the financial statements, and our auditor's report will not provide an opinion or any assurance on that other information.

1. Budgetary Comparison Schedules.

Audit Objectives

The objective of our audit is the expression of opinions as to whether your financial statements are fairly presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting, and to report on the fairness of the supplementary information referred to in the second paragraph when considered in relation to the financial statements as a whole. The objective also includes reporting on—

- Internal control over financial reporting and compliance with the provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and award agreements, noncompliance with which could have a material effect on the financial statements in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.
- Internal control over compliance related to major programs and an opinion (or disclaimer of opinion) on compliance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal awards that could have a direct and material effect on each major program in accordance with the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996 and Title 2 U.S. *Code of Federal Regulations* (CFR) Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance).

The *Government Auditing Standards* report on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance and other matters will include a paragraph that states that (1) the purpose of the report is solely to describe the scope of testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control or on compliance, and (2) the report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. The Uniform Guidance report on internal control over compliance will include a paragraph that states that the purpose of the report on internal control over compliance is solely to describe the scope of testing of internal control over compliance and the results of that testing based on the requirements of the Uniform Guidance. Both reports will state that the report is not suitable for any other purpose.

Our audit will be conducted in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards for financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996; and the provisions of the Uniform Guidance; and the guide to auditing and reporting for Nebraska School Districts issued by the Nebraska Department of Education, and will include tests of accounting records, a determination of major program(s) in accordance with the Uniform Guidance, and other procedures we consider necessary to enable us to express such opinions. We will issue written reports upon completion of our Single Audit. Our reports will be addressed to the Board of Education of Schuyler Community Schools. We cannot provide assurance that unmodified opinions will be expressed. Circumstances may arise in which it is necessary for us to modify our opinions or add emphasis-of-matter or other-matter paragraphs. If our opinions are other than unmodified, we will discuss the reasons with you in advance. If, for any reason, we are unable to complete the audit or are unable to form or have not formed opinions, we may decline to express opinions or issue reports, or we may withdraw from this engagement. If circumstances occur related to the condition of your records, the availability of sufficient, appropriate audit evidence, or the existence of a significant risk of material misstatement of the financial statements caused by error, fraudulent financial reporting, or misappropriation of assets, which in our professional judgement prevent us from completing the audit or forming an opinion on the financial statements, we retain the right to take any course of action permitted by professional standards, including declining to express an opinion or issue a report, or withdrawing from the engagement.

Audit Procedures – General

An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements; therefore, our audit will involve judgment about the number of transactions to be examined and the areas to be tested. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements. We will plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, whether from (1) errors, (2) fraudulent financial reporting, (3) misappropriation of assets, or (4) violations of laws or governmental regulations that are attributable to the District or to acts by management or employees acting on behalf of the District. Because the determination of abuse is subjective, *Government Auditing Standards* do not expect auditors to provide reasonable assurance of detecting abuse.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, combined with the inherent limitations of internal control, and because we will not perform a detailed examination of all transactions, there is a risk that material misstatements or noncompliance may exist and not be detected by us, even though the audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with U.S. generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards*. In addition, an audit is not designed to detect immaterial misstatements or violations of laws or governmental regulations that do not have a direct and material effect on the financial statements or on major programs. However, we will inform the appropriate level of management of any material errors, any fraudulent financial reporting, or misappropriation of assets that come to our attention. We will also inform the appropriate level of management of any violations of laws or governmental regulations that come to our attention, unless clearly inconsequential, and of any material abuse that comes to our attention. We will include such matters in the reports required for a Single Audit. Our responsibility as auditors is limited to the period covered by our audit and does not extend to any later periods for which we are not engaged as auditors.

Our procedures will include tests of documentary evidence supporting the transactions recorded in the accounts, and may include tests of the physical existence of assets, and direct confirmation of certain other assets and liabilities by correspondence with selected individuals, funding sources, creditors, and financial institutions. We will request written representations from your attorneys as part of the engagement, and they may bill you for responding to this inquiry. At the conclusion of our audit, we will require certain written representations from you about your responsibilities for the financial statements; schedule of expenditures of federal awards; federal award programs; compliance with laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements; and other responsibilities required by general accepted auditing standards.

Audit Procedures – Internal Controls

Our audit will include obtaining an understanding of the District and its environment, including internal control, sufficient to assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements and to design the nature, timing, and extent of further audit procedures. Tests of controls may be performed to test the effectiveness of certain controls that we consider relevant to preventing and detecting errors and fraud that are material to the financial statements and to preventing and detecting misstatements resulting from illegal acts and other noncompliance matters that have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. Our tests, if performed, will be less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on internal control and, accordingly, no opinion will be expressed in our report on internal control issued pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards*.

As required by the Uniform Guidance, we will perform tests of controls over compliance to evaluate the effectiveness of the design and operation of controls that we consider relevant to preventing or detecting material noncompliance with compliance requirements applicable to each major federal award program. However, our tests will be less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on those controls and, accordingly, no opinion will be expressed in our report on internal control issued pursuant to the Uniform Guidance.

An audit is not designed to provide assurance on internal control or to identify significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. Accordingly, we will express no such opinion. However, during the audit, we will communicate to management and those charged with governance internal control related matters that are required to be communicated under AICPA professional standards, *Government Auditing Standards*, and the Uniform Guidance.

Audit Procedures – Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, we will perform tests of Schuyler Community Schools' compliance with provisions of applicable laws, regulations, contracts, and agreements, including grant agreements. However, the

objective of those procedures will not be to provide an opinion on overall compliance and we will not express such an opinion in our report on compliance issued pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards*.

The Uniform Guidance requires that we also plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the auditee has complied with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal awards applicable to major programs. Our procedures will consist of tests of transactions and other applicable procedures described in the *OMB Compliance Supplement* for the types of compliance requirements that could have a direct and material effect on each of Schuyler Community Schools' major programs. The purpose of these procedures will be to express an opinion on Schuyler Community Schools' compliance with requirements applicable to each of its major programs in our report on compliance issued pursuant to the Uniform Guidance.

Other Services

We will also assist in preparing the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes of Schuyler Community Schools in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting and the Uniform Guidance based on information provided by you. These nonaudit services do not constitute an audit under *Government Auditing Standards* and such services will not be conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. We will perform the services in accordance with applicable professional standards. The other services are limited to the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes services previously defined. We, in our sole professional judgement, reserve the right to refuse to perform any procedure or take any action that could be construed as assuming management responsibilities.

Management Responsibilities

Management is responsible for (1) designing, implementing, establishing, and maintaining effective internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, including internal controls over federal awards, and for evaluating and monitoring ongoing activities, to help ensure that appropriate goals and objectives are met; (2) following laws and regulations; (3) ensuring that there is reasonable assurance that government programs are administered in compliance with compliance requirements; and (4) ensuring that management and financial information is reliable and properly reported. Management is also responsible for implementing systems designed to achieve compliance with applicable laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements. You are also responsible for the selection and application of accounting principles; for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and all accompanying information in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting; and for compliance with applicable laws and regulations (including federal statutes) and the provisions of contracts and grant agreements (including award agreements). Your responsibilities also include identifying significant contractor relationships in which the contractor has responsibility for program compliance and for the accuracy and completeness of that information.

You are responsible for including all informative disclosures that are appropriate for the modified cash basis of accounting. Those disclosures will include (1) a description of the modified cash basis of accounting, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and how the modified cash basis of accounting differs from GAAP; (2) informative disclosures similar to those required by GAAP; and (3) additional disclosures beyond those specifically required that may be necessary for the financial statements to achieve fair presentation.

Management is also responsible for making all financial records and related information available to us and for the accuracy and completeness of that information. You are also responsible for providing us with (1) access to all information of which you are aware that is relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements, (2) access to personnel, accounts, books, records, supporting documentation, and other information as needed to perform an audit under the Uniform Guidance, (3)

additional information that we may request for the purpose of the audit, and (4) unrestricted access to persons within the District from whom we determine it necessary to obtain audit evidence.

Your responsibilities include adjusting the financial statements to correct material misstatements and confirming to us in the management representation letter that the effects of any uncorrected misstatements aggregated by us during the current engagement and pertaining to the latest period presented are immaterial, both individually and in the aggregate, to the financial statements as a whole.

You are responsible for the design and implementation of programs and controls to prevent and detect fraud, and for informing us about all known or suspected fraud affecting the School District involving (1) management, (2) employees who have significant roles in internal control, and (3) others where the fraud could have a material effect on the financial statements. Your responsibilities include informing us of your knowledge of any allegations of fraud or suspected fraud affecting the District received in communications from employees, former employees, grantors, regulators, or others. In addition, you are responsible for identifying and ensuring that the District complies with applicable laws, regulations, contracts, agreements, and grants. Management is also responsible for taking timely and appropriate steps to remedy fraud and noncompliance with provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, or abuse that we report. Additionally, as required by the Uniform Guidance, it is management's responsibility to evaluate and monitor noncompliance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal awards; take prompt action when instances of noncompliance are identified including noncompliance identified in audit findings; promptly follow up and take corrective action on reported audit findings; and prepare a summary schedule of prior audit findings and a separate corrective action plan. The summary schedule of prior audit findings should be available for our review on September 30, 2020.

With regard to using auditor's report, you understand that you must obtain our prior written consent to reproduce or use our report in bond offering official statements or other documents.

You are responsible for identifying all federal awards received and understanding and complying with the compliance requirements and for the preparation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards (including notes and noncash assistance received) in conformity with the Uniform Guidance. You agree to include our report on the schedule of expenditures of federal awards in any document that contains and indicates that we have reported on the schedule of expenditures of federal awards. You also agree to include the audited financial statements with any presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards that includes our report thereon. Your responsibilities include acknowledging to us in the written representation letter that (1) you are responsible for presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards in accordance with the Uniform Guidance; (2) you believe the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, including its form and content, is stated fairly in accordance with the Uniform Guidance; (3) the methods of measurement or presentation have not changed from those used in the prior period (or, if they have changed, the reasons for such changes); and (4) you have disclosed to us any significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement or presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards.

You are also responsible for the preparation of the other supplementary information, which we have been engaged to report on, in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting. You agree to include our report on the supplementary information in any document that contains, and indicates that we have reported on the supplementary information. You also agree to include the audited financial statements with any presentation of the supplementary information that includes our report thereon. Your responsibilities include acknowledging to us in the written representation letter that (1) you are responsible for presentation of the supplementary information in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting; (2) you believe the supplementary information, including its form and content, is fairly presented in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting; (3) the methods of measurement or presentation have not changed from those used in the prior period (or, if they have changed, the reasons

for such changes); and (4) you have disclosed to us any significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement or presentation of the supplementary information.

Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining a process for tracking the status of audit findings and recommendations. Management is also responsible for identifying and providing report copies of previous financial audits, attestation engagements, performance audits, or other studies related to the objectives discussed in the Audit Objectives section of this letter. This responsibility includes relaying to us corrective actions taken to address significant findings and recommendations resulting from those audits, attestation engagements, performance audits, or studies. You are also responsible for providing management's views on our current findings, conclusions, and recommendations, as well as your planned corrective actions, for the report, and for the timing and format for providing that information.

With regard to the electronic dissemination of audited financial statements, including financial statements published electronically on your website, you understand that electronic sites are a means to distribute information and, therefore, we are not required to read the information contained in these sites or to consider the consistency of other information in the electronic site with the original document.

You agree to assume all management responsibilities relating to the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes, and any other nonaudit services we provide. You will be required to acknowledge in the management representation letter our assistance with preparation of the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes and that you have reviewed and approved the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes prior to their issuance and have accepted responsibility for them. Further, you agree to oversee the nonaudit services by designating an individual, preferably from senior management, with suitable skill, knowledge, or experience; evaluate the adequacy and results of those services; and accept responsibility for them.

Engagement Administration, Fees, and Other

We understand that your employees will prepare all cash or other confirmations we request and will locate any documents selected by us for testing.

At the conclusion of the engagement, we will complete the appropriate sections of the Data Collection Form that summarizes our audit findings. It is management's responsibility to electronically submit the reporting package (including financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, summary schedule of prior audit findings, auditor's reports, and corrective action plan) along with the Data Collection Form to the federal audit clearinghouse. We will coordinate with you the electronic submission and certification. We will provide copies of our reports to Schuyler Community Schools; however, management is responsible for distribution of the reports and the financial statements. Unless restricted by law or regulation, or containing privileged and confidential information, copies of our reports are to be made available for public inspection.

The audit documentation for this engagement is the property of Pekny & Associates, CPA's, PC and constitutes confidential information. However, subject to applicable laws and regulations, audit documentation and appropriate individuals will be made available upon request and in a timely manner to regulatory agencies providing direct or indirect funding, or the U.S. Government Accountability Office for purposes of a quality review of the audit, to resolve audit findings, or to carry out oversight responsibilities. We will notify you of any such request. If requested, access to such audit documentation will be provided under the supervision of Pekny & Associates, CPA's, PC personnel.

RETURN TO SCHOOL COMMITTEE

BOARD POLICY AND TEMPORARY WAIVERS OF NDE RULES

The Board understands that due to local, state or national emergency situations, the Nebraska Department of Education may occasionally issue temporary waivers of NDE Rules and Regulations. In the case of contradictions between waivers and existing board policy, all temporary waivers of NDE Rules and Regulations shall also apply to and have priority over respective district policies for the duration of their active status.

NONRESIDENT STUDENTS/OPTION ENROLLMENT

Students who are eligible to attend a Nebraska public school but who are not legal residents of the school district may be admitted into the school district in accordance with the option enrollment program authorized by state statutes. Option enrollment students shall be accepted without charge. If the student has previously had an option enrollment accepted in any district, the application shall be rejected unless a statutory exception to this rule applies for that student.

Application for option enrollment should be made between September 1 and March 15 for enrollment during the following and subsequent school years. Upon agreement of the school boards of the resident district and the option (receiving) district, deadlines for application and approval of the option may be waived. Following the March 15 deadline, applications requesting admittance must contain a release approval from the resident district prior to the option district's consideration for acceptance.

The application for option enrollment does not require a release from the resident district and the receiving district has forty-five days to issue acceptance or rejection if:

1. after February 1 the student relocated to a different resident district, or
2. the student's option district merged with another district effective after February 1, and
3. the student's attendance would occur during the next immediate and subsequent school years.

For applications submitted by the March 15 deadline, written notification of approval or rejection of the application will be made before April 1 to the student's parent/guardian and the resident district. If the district rejects an application for a student to option in or out, the district will provide notification by certified mail to the parent/guardian of the reasons for rejection and the process for appealing the decision to the State Board of Education.

The board shall adopt standards and conditions for acceptance or rejection of a request for release of a resident student submitting an option application after March 15. Such standards shall not include the failure to meet the March 15 deadline. For those applications, the option district shall notify the parent/guardian and the resident district whether the application is accepted or rejected within sixty days after submission. False or substantively misleading information submitted by a parent/guardian on an application to an option district may be cause for the option district to reject a previously accepted application prior to the student's attendance.

The board shall adopt a resolution setting forth its specific standards for acceptance and rejection of applications as an option school. Standards will conform to those set forth by

WEAPONS

The board believes weapons and other dangerous objects and look-a-likes in school district facilities cause material and substantial disruption to the school environment or present a threat to the health and safety of students, employees and visitors on the school district premises or property within the jurisdiction of the school district.

Weapons and other dangerous objects and look-a-likes shall be taken from students and others who bring them onto the school district property or onto property within the jurisdiction of the school district or from students who are within the control of the school district.

The term "dangerous object" shall include noxious or flammable material, fireworks, devices intended to administer an electric shock (tasers, electric batons, prods, or stun guns) chemical weapons (i.e. mace, pepper spray), martial arts weapons or other instruments including those which eject a projectile or substance of any kind, or any replica or facsimile of any of the above, whether functional or nonfunctional, whether designed for use as a weapon or for some other use.

Parents of students found to possess weapons or dangerous objects or look-a-likes on school property shall be notified of the incident. Confiscation of weapons or dangerous objects shall be reported to the law enforcement officials, and students will be subject to disciplinary action including suspension or expulsion.

Students bringing firearms as defined in 18 U.S.C. 921 to school or knowingly possessing firearms at school may be expelled for a period of not less than one year. Students bringing to school or possessing dangerous weapons, including firearms, will be referred to law enforcement authorities. The superintendent shall have the authority to recommend this expulsion requirement be modified for students on a case-by-case basis. For purposes of this portion of this policy, the term "firearm" includes, but is not limited to, any weapon which is designed to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive, the frame or receiver of any such weapon, a muffler or silencer for such a weapon, or any explosive, incendiary or poison gas.

Weapons or dangerous objects under the control of law enforcement officials shall be exempt from this policy. Firearms kept in a locked firearm rack that is on a motor vehicle or that are contained within a private vehicle operated by a nonstudent adult that are not loaded are also exempt. Firearms also may be possessed by a person for the purpose of using them, with the approval of the school, in a historical reenactment, in a hunter education program, or as part of an honor guard. The principal may allow authorized persons to display weapons or other dangerous objects or look-a-likes for educational purposes and must be kept in a designated location during the school day. Such a display shall also be exempt from this policy. It shall be the responsibility of the superintendent, in conjunction with the principal, to implement this policy.

The board believes weapons and other dangerous objects and look-a-likes in school district facilities cause material and substantial disruption to the school environment or present a threat to the health and safety of students, employees and visitors on the school district premises or property within the jurisdiction of the school district.

SEARCHES, SEIZURES AND ARRESTS

School district property is held in public trust by the board. School district authorities may, without a search warrant, search students or protected student areas based on a reasonable and definable suspicion that a school district policy, rule, regulation or law has been violated.

The search shall be in a manner reasonable in scope to maintain order and discipline in the schools, promote the educational environment, and protect the safety and welfare of students, employees and visitors to the school district facilities. The furnishing of a locker, desk or other facility or space owned by the school and provided as a courtesy to a student, even if the student provides the lock for it, shall not create a protected student area and shall not give rise to an expectation of privacy with respect to the locker, desk, or other facility.

School authorities may seize any illegal, unauthorized or contraband materials discovered in the search. Items of contraband may include, but are not limited to, nonprescription controlled substances, marijuana, cocaine, amphetamines, barbiturates, apparatus used for controlled substances, alcoholic beverages, tobacco, weapons, explosives, poisons, stolen property and dangerous objects as defined in Policy 504.11. Such items are not to be possessed by a student without specific permission of the building principal while they are on school district property or on property within the jurisdiction of the school district; while on school owned and/or operated transportation; while attending or engaged in school activities; and while away from school grounds if misconduct will directly affect the good order, efficient management and welfare of the school district.

Possession of such items will be grounds for disciplinary action including suspension or expulsion and may be reported to local law enforcement officials. The board believes that illegal, unauthorized or contraband materials may cause material and substantial disruption to the school environment or presents a threat to the health and safety of students, employees, or visitors on the school district premises or property within the jurisdiction of the school district.

The superintendent or building principal shall only release minor students into the custody of a law enforcement officer upon presentation of a court order or warrant for the student's arrest, or under conditions for temporary custody of a juvenile without a warrant as provided by state statutes.

The principal or designee will attempt to notify the parent/guardian or responsible relative prior to the student's release and the place to which the student is reportedly to be taken, except in cases of child abuse.

It shall be the responsibility of the superintendent, in conjunction with the administrative team, to implement this policy.

CONCUSSION AWARENESS

Training to recognize the symptoms of concussions and brain injuries and their proper medical treatment shall be made available to coaches of the district's athletic teams.

The district will provide information on concussions and brain injuries to athletes and their parents or guardians prior to the beginning of practice or competition including at least:

1. The signs and symptoms of concussions;
2. The risks posed by sustaining a concussion; and
3. The actions a student should take in response to sustaining a concussion including the notification of coaches.

A student participating on a school athletic team shall be removed from a practice or game when reasonably suspected of having sustained a concussion or brain injury in that activity after observation by a coach or a licensed health care professional who is professionally affiliated with or contracted by the school. Any parent or guardian who suspects a student has sustained a concussion is expected to immediately notify district coaches or administrators of the injury. Students who suspect they have sustained a concussion shall immediately make such notification.

The injured student shall not be permitted to participate in any school supervised team athletic activities involving physical exertion, including, but not limited to, practices or games, until the student;

1. has been evaluated by a licensed health care professional;
2. has received written and signed clearance to resume participation in athletic activities from the licensed health care professional;
3. has submitted the written and signed clearance to resume participation in athletic activities to the school accompanied by written permission to resume participation from the student's parent or guardian.

If a student is reasonably suspected after observation of having sustained a concussion or brain injury and is removed from an athletic activity as required above, the parent or guardian of the student shall be notified by the school of the date and approximate time of the injury suffered by the student, the signs and symptoms of a concussion or brain injury that were observed, and any actions taken to treat the student.

The district shall establish a return to learn protocol for students that have sustained a concussion. The return to learn protocol shall recognize that students who have sustained a concussion and returned to school may need informal or formal accommodations, modifications of curriculum, and monitoring by medical or academic staff until the student is fully recovered. It is the responsibility of the superintendent to implement this policy.

CLASSROOM ENVIRONMENT

Classrooms are expected to be maintained in a safe, orderly manner at all times in keeping with providing an appropriate, healthy learning environment. Any items for display or use in the classroom shall meet this criterion. The use of essential oils or essential oil diffusers will not be permitted in district facilities by students, staff or visitors.

BUS SAFETY PROGRAM

The superintendent shall direct the preparation of a Safe Pupil Transportation Plan that, at a minimum, shall address weapons, dangerous objects, pupil behavior, terroristic threats, severe weather, hazardous materials, medical emergencies, driver/passenger procedures in the event of mechanical breakdowns of the vehicle, and driver procedures in the event that the drop-off location is uncertain or appears unsafe to leave students. The plan shall also address general guidelines for the functional capacity of a pupil transportation driver and a process to confirm a driver's ability to conduct daily tasks and emergency evacuations.

The superintendent shall plan and implement a safety-training program for pupil transportation vehicle operators and vehicle passengers. The superintendent shall monitor the scheduling of inservice and educational opportunities for transportation personnel to improve their awareness and skills regarding pupil transportation vehicle safety. Pupil transportation vehicle operators shall attend local workshops and all inservice meetings.

Administrative rules and regulations shall be adopted to govern the safe operation of pupil transportation vehicle. Students violating these regulations may have their riding privileges revoked or suspended. Parents will be responsible for damage done to transportation vehicles or equipment by their children.

The school district shall conduct pupil transportation vehicle safe riding practices instruction and emergency safety drills at least twice a year for students who utilize school district transportation. The emergency evacuation drill procedures should be conducted according to guidelines established by the Nebraska Department of Education.

Each pupil transportation vehicle shall have, in addition to the regular emergency safety drill, a plan for helping those students who require special assistance to safety during an emergency. This shall include, but not be limited to, students with disabilities.

Pupil transportation vehicle drivers are required to attend each safety drill.

Pupil transportation operator procedures will include a prohibition against use of a handheld wireless communication device to read a written communication, manually type a written communication, or send a written communication while operating a pupil transportation vehicle which is in motion. Handheld wireless communication device means any device that provides for written communication between two or more parties and is capable of receiving, displaying, or transmitting written communication. Written communication includes, but is not limited to, a text message, an instant message, electronic mail, and Internet web sites.

Concussion Management Team (CMT) Sample Return to Learn Protocol

The CMT ensures that every student who suffers a concussion is monitored for a safe return to activity.



<p>1. Concussion occurs! </p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• If at school sporting event or other school activity, family is notified of possible concussion
<p>2. Encourage parent to obtain medical confirmation of concussion from a licensed health care provider.</p>
<p>3. Parent signs Release of Information form allowing the school to be notified of concussion by the health care provider and for information sharing.</p>
<p>4. CMT Contact person notified of concussion by parent, coach, athletic trainer or health care provider.</p>
<p>5. CMT Contact person informs appropriate school personnel (teachers, school nurse, athletic trainer, coaches, etc.) of concussed student and specifies general accommodations from health care provider, if available.</p>
<p>6. CMT implements a gradual Return to Learn Protocol based on the individual needs of the student. (Refer to Return to Academics Progression form.)</p>
<p>7. CMT documents physical, cognitive, behavioral and emotional symptoms of concussed student and assesses the student's needs based on symptoms. (Refer to Post-Concussion Symptom Checklist).</p>
<p>8. CMT designs individual academic adjustment/accommodation plan with appropriate school staff and works with SAT process to coordinate academic adjustments/accommodations during recovery (about 2-3 weeks) and reviews with student and family.</p>
<p>9. CMT -Teachers monitor the effectiveness of adjustments, accommodations and symptoms of concussion and report progress/recovery data and results regularly to CMT contact person.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Data on progress/recovery shared with family and student.• Family tracks and regularly reports progress on physical, cognitive sleep and emotional symptoms to CMT.
<p>10. CMT makes adjustments and readjustments to individual plan until student no longer has special needs in the classroom resulting from the concussion.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Student progress and updates are communicated to appropriate school staff, family and student.
<p>11. CMT and family agree student is symptom free and function is "back to baseline" in the classroom.</p>

- If symptoms last more than 2-3 weeks, follow up assessment and academic adjustments may need to be strengthened or remain in place longer.

HARASSMENT BY EMPLOYEES

Harassment of employees, students, volunteers or visitors will not be tolerated in the school district. School district includes school district facilities, school district property, or property within the jurisdiction of the school district; while on school-owned or school-operated transportation; while attending or engaged in school activities; and while away from school grounds if the misconduct directly affects the good order, efficient management and welfare of the district.

Other individuals whose behavior is alleged to be in violation of this policy will be subject to appropriate sanctions as determined and imposed by the superintendent or board.

Sexual harassment shall include, but not be limited to, unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when:

- submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's employment, education, or participation in school programs or activities;
- submission to or rejection of such conduct by an individual is used as the basis for decisions affecting such individual's employment or education; or
- such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's work or educational performance or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive working or learning environment.

Sexual harassment as set out above, may include, but is not limited to the following:

- verbal or written harassment or abuse, or unwelcome communication implying sexual motives or intentions;
- pressure for sexual activity; repeated remarks to a person with sexual or demeaning implications;
- unwelcome touching;
- unwelcome and offensive public sexual display of affection;
- suggesting or demanding sexual involvement, accompanied by implied or explicit threats concerning one's job, promotions, recommendations, etc.

Harassment on the basis of race, religion, national or ethnic origin, color, marital status,

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disability, sex, veteran status, age, pregnancy, childbirth or related medical condition, or other prohibited status means conduct of a verbal or physical nature that is designed to embarrass, distress, agitate, disturb or trouble individuals when:

- submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of a student's education or of an individual's participation in school programs, activities or employment;
- submission to or rejection of such conduct by an individual is used as the basis for decisions affecting the individual; or
- such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's performance or
- creating an intimidating, offensive or hostile learning or work environment.

Harassment as set forth above may include, but is not limited to the following:

- verbal, physical or written harassment or abuse;
- repeated remarks of a demeaning nature;
- implied or explicit threats concerning one's grades, achievements, etc.;
- demeaning jokes, stories, or activities directed at an individual.

Employees, students, volunteers or visitors who believe they have suffered harassment shall report such matters to the investigator for harassment complaints. However, claims regarding harassment may also be reported to the alternate investigator for harassment complaints.

Upon receiving a complaint, the investigator shall confer with the complainant to obtain an understanding and a statement of the facts. It shall be the responsibility of the investigator to promptly and reasonably investigate claims of harassment and to pass the findings on to the superintendent who shall complete such further investigation as deemed necessary and take such final action as appropriate. It is the intention of the district to complete its investigation within ten (10) working days after receiving a complaint unless extenuating circumstances such as unavailability of a witness or needing additional time because of the complexity of the investigation or the need to involve outside experts. The extended timeframe for investigation due to extenuating circumstances shall not exceed ten (10) days without the consent of the complainant, unless the alleged victim agrees to a longer time limit. Information regarding an investigation of harassment shall be confidential to the extent possible, and those individuals who are involved in the investigation shall not discuss information regarding the complaint outside the investigation process.

No one shall retaliate against an employee or student because they have filed a harassment complaint, assisted or participated in a harassment investigation, proceeding, or hearing regarding a harassment charge or because they have opposed language or conduct that violates this policy. This policy should be used when an employee is the alleged harasser or the alleged victim. It is strongly recommended the investigator and alternate investigator be of opposite sexes.

It shall also be the responsibility of the superintendent, in conjunction with the investigator and principals, to develop administrative rules regarding this policy. The superintendent or superintendent's designee shall also be responsible for organizing training programs to educate employees, students and others involved with the school district about harassment and the school district's policy prohibiting harassment. The training shall include how to recognize harassment and what to do in case an individual is harassed. The employee training will be documented in personnel files to ensure a record of training for each employee.

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OBJECTIVES FOR EQUAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS

This section of the board policy manual is devoted to the board's goals and objectives for assisting the students of the school district in obtaining an education. Each student shall have an opportunity to obtain an education in compliance with the policies in this series. It is the goal of the board to develop a healthy social, intellectual, emotional, and physical self-concept in the students enrolled in the school district. Each student attending school will have the opportunity to use it and its education program and services as a means for self-improvement and individual growth. In so doing, the students are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that assures each student the same opportunity.

The board supports the delivery of the education program and services to students free of discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, religion or marital status, sexual orientation or gender identity and provides equal access to the Boy Scouts and other designated youth groups. This concept of equal educational opportunity serves as a guide for the board and employees in making decisions relating to school district facilities, employment, selection of educational materials, equipment, curriculum, and regulations affecting students.

Board policies, rules and regulations affect students while they are on school district property or on property within the jurisdiction of the school district; while on school owned, operated, or chartered transportation; while attending or engaged in school activities; and while away from school grounds if misconduct will directly affect the good order, efficient management and educational processes of the school district.

This section of the board policy refers to the term "parents" in many of the policies. The term parents for purposes of this policy manual shall mean the legal parents. It shall also mean the legal guardian or custodian of a student and students who have reached the age of majority or are otherwise considered an adult by law.

Inquiries by students regarding compliance with equal educational opportunity laws and policies, including but not limited to complaints of discrimination, shall be directed to the superintendent or his or her designee.

EDUCATIONAL EQUITY

The District is committed to equity and excellence for all students. Educational equity is defined as providing all students, regardless of socioeconomic status, race, ethnicity, language, religion, sex, gender, orientation, cognitive/physical ability, or mobility the high-quality instruction and support needed to reach and exceed state educational standards.

The district will identify and address any disparities that result in low-income students and minority students being taught at higher rates than other students by ineffective, inexperienced, or out-of-field teachers.

To achieve educational equity, the District will commit to:

1. using district-wide and individual school-level data disaggregated, when appropriate, by socioeconomic status, race/ethnicity, national origin, language, special education, and mobility, to inform district decision making;
2. working to raise the achievement of all students; and
3. graduating all students ready to succeed.

In order to reach the goal of educational equity for each and every student, the District shall monitor students' progress in meeting the state academic standards by:

1. developing and implementing a well-rounded program of instruction to meet the academic needs of all students;
2. identifying students who may be at risk for academic failure;
3. supporting efforts to reduce the overuse of discipline practices that remove students from the classroom;
4. providing additional educational assistance to individual students the District determines need help in meeting the state academic standards; and
5. identifying and implementing instructional and other strategies intended to strengthen academic programs and improve school conditions for student learning.

The District will provide organized, system-wide means of incorporating educational equity into its educational program by:

1. Providing every student with access to high quality curriculum, support, and other educational resources;
2. Providing multiple pathways to success in order to meet the needs of the entire student body and actively encourage, support, and expect high academic achievement for each student;
3. Working to create schools with a safe, supportive and inclusive environment; and
4. Seeking to promote educational equity as a priority in professional development.

The Superintendent will include equity practices leading to specific goals and strategies

in the District's school improvement plan. The Superintendent will periodically report to the Board on progress in the implementation of this policy.

Thank you for being an active member of the Nebraska Rural Community Schools Association (NRCSA)! Your continued membership will help assure NRCSA's ongoing effort to continue rural community school advocacy. Thanks to you, NRCSA had 201 member school districts and Educational Service Units in 2019-20 representing over 75,000 students across 89 counties and 24 legislative districts throughout Nebraska. We have grown each year for the last nine years, in spite of losing member districts to local reorganization, and we hope to see growth again for 2020-21.

Why Remain a Member of NRCSA?

We are the only organization focused on rural community K-12 school districts and their role in Nebraska's public education system. Depth of membership matters when talking to senators and other officials. Senators view NRCSA as representing all "rural, community districts". The more members we have, the larger the true number of districts and students represented, the stronger our voice. The common theme for membership is being a rural community school.

NRCSA can act as a forum for advancing ideas and concerns, whether legislative, Department, or any entity having a role in public education. This has included representing members to groups such as rural education research groups, rural membership advocacy groups, rural interest groups, collaborative groups, Nebraska Department of Education, and NREA (national) committee participation.

NRCSA offers two annual statewide events (Legislative Forum and Spring Conference) which offer members the chance to learn about issues affecting rural schools, the opportunity to develop professionally, network with personnel representing other districts and interact directly with policymakers and providers as well as NRCSA leaders. Both events are focused on our rural community schools' issues and interests. The Spring Conference is also the event that highlights awards, speakers, scholarships, exhibitors, music groups, many learning and information opportunities, and of course NRCSA food.

NRCSA offers recognition to those who demonstrate outstanding leadership and character in rural schools through exceptional scholarship and awards programs. In 2020, NRCSA awarded sixteen \$1,000 scholarships, seven Outstanding Educator Awards, and eight Closing the Achievement Gap Effective School Awards.

NRCSA provides, exclusively sent to Superintendents and Board of Education members of member schools, written updates from the Executive Director on current association activities and involvement within the legislative process. In the past the updates have gone only to the Superintendents and Board Presidents. We have expanded our updates to include all Board of Ed members. We are requesting the district Superintendent provide board member email contact information, or at least for the Board President, so the NRCSA communications can be sent to a larger audience directly. We encourage our updates to be used as board meeting information, as well.

NRCSA currently offers leadership roles, ten elected and 59 appointed positions, for superintendents of member districts to be further involved. Elected opportunities include six NRCSA district (regional) representatives, three presidency cycle offices, and one secretary office as the ten-member Executive Committee. There are ten appointed members of the Scholarship & Recognition Committee, twenty-two appointed members of the Legislative Committee (including seven ex-officio past NRCSA presidents), twelve appointed members of the Rural Teacher Committee, and fifteen members of the NRCSA Closing the Gap Project Team.

Planning a Safe Return to School in Nebraska

Scenario 1: Minimal Community Spread

Mental and Social Emotional Health

- Establish a crisis response team that includes school principals, school nurses, mental health specialists, and parents, to focus on student and staff mental health and wellness using trauma informed models.
- Assess natural resources (personnel, existing partners) to determine if there is a need for external support, and reach out to the existing vendor community to assess the potential for expanded work.
- Evaluate staff mental health readiness utilizing questionnaires, surveys, and direct outreach. If any screening does occur, it should comply with privacy and HIPAA requirements.
- Where feasible, institute a universal mental health screening tool that can be used for both teachers and students. If any screening does occur, it should comply with privacy and HIPAA requirements.
- Provide resources for staff self-care, including [resiliency strategies](#).
- Designate a mental health liaison (school-based) who will work with the district, local public health agencies, and community partners.
- Consider additional resources required to serve special needs populations.

Hygiene

- Provide adequate supplies to support healthy hygiene behaviors (e.g. , soap, hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol for safe use by staff and older children, paper towels, and tissues).
- Teach and reinforce handwashing with soap and water for at least 20 seconds and/or the safe use of hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol by staff and older students.
- Systematically and frequently check and refill hand sanitizers
- Encourage staff and students to cough and sneeze into their elbows, or to cover with a tissue. Used tissues should be thrown in the trash and hands washed immediately with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- Limit sharing of personal items and supplies such as writing utensils.
- Keep students' personal items separate and in individually labeled cubbies, containers or lockers.

- Limit use of classroom materials to small groups and disinfect between uses or provide adequate supplies to assign for individual student use.

Spacing and Movement

- Changes to class sizes and spacing unnecessary; can resume normal seating.
- No changes in movement between classes is required.

Screening Students

- Children who become ill at school should be placed in a designated area of quarantine with a surgical mask in place. Nurses should wear N95 masks when caring for these students.
- Students sent home from school should be kept home until they have tested negative or have completely recovered according to CDC guidelines.
- Students are allowed to enter the building at only 1-2 sites and must egress from other exits to keep traffic moving in a single direction.
- Parents are not allowed in the school building except under extenuating circumstances determined by district and school officials; adults entering the building should wash or sanitize hands prior to entering.
- Only one parent per child should be allowed to enter except under extenuating circumstances determined by district and school officials.
- Strict records, including day and time, should be kept of non-school employees entering and exiting the building.
- Parents are encouraged to check student's temperature at home every morning using oral, tympanic, or temporal scanners; students with a temperature of 100.4 or greater should stay home and consider coronavirus testing if no other explanation is available.
- Parents are encouraged to ask their children or monitor for symptoms of COVID-19, including cough, congestion, shortness of breath, or gastrointestinal symptoms every morning. Any positives should prompt the parent to keep the student home from school.

- If resources allow, temperature checks on students can be performed once per day by staff; febrile students should be sent to the nurse's office for transport home.

Testing Protocols for Students and Responding to Positive Cases

- Students who develop fever or fall ill at school should be transported by their parents, or ambulance if clinically unstable, for off site testing.
- Parents should be notified of the presence of any positive cases in the classroom and/or school to encourage closer observation for any symptoms at home.
- Students sent home from school should be kept home until they have tested negative or have completely recovered according to CDC guidelines.
- In the event that a student tests positive, immediate efforts should be made to contact any close contacts (those who spent more than 10 minutes in close proximity to the student) so that they can be quarantined at home. Classmates should be closely monitored for any symptoms. At this time, empiric testing of all students in the class is not recommended, only those that develop symptoms require testing.
- Parents are encouraged to check student's temperature at home every morning using oral, tympanic, or temporal scanners; students with a temperature of 100.4 greater should stay home and consider coronavirus testing if no other explanation is available.
- Parents are encouraged to ask their children or monitor for any cough, congestion, shortness of breath, or gastrointestinal symptoms every morning. Any positives should prompt the parent to keep the student home from school and seek out testing.

Responding to Positive Tests Among Staff and Students

- In the event of a positive test among staff or a student, the classroom or areas exposed should be immediately closed until cleaning and disinfection can be performed.
 - If the person was in the school building without a facial covering, or large areas of the school were exposed to the person, short term dismissals (2-5 days) may be required to clean and disinfect the larger

areas. This decision should be made in concert with the local public health department.

- If possible, smaller areas should be closed for 24 hours before cleaning to minimize the risk of any airborne particles.
- Cleaning staff should wear an N95 respirator when performing cleaning of these areas along with gloves and face shield. Districts should work with local public health departments to fit staff for N95 respirators.

Dining, Gathering and Extracurricular Activities

- Encourage students, teachers, and cafeteria staff to wash hands before and after every meal.
- Meal activities continue per normal operating procedures.
- When possible, students and teachers wash hands before and after every event.
- Large scale gatherings are allowed per normal operating status.
- Extracurricular activities and gatherings conducted normally.
- After school programs are open and operating normally.

Athletics

- All activities are allowed to continue per normal procedures.
- Spectator events are allowed per normal procedures.

Personal Protective Equipment

- No personal protective equipment is required for staff or students.
- Regular use of hand sanitizer and hand washing is encouraged.

Cleaning

- School campuses should undergo normal cleaning on a daily basis.
- Strongly recommended that frequently touched surfaces including lights, doors, benches, bathrooms, etc. should undergo cleaning with either an

[EPA-approved disinfectant](#) or dilute bleach solution ($\frac{1}{3}$ cup bleach in 1 gallon of water) at least twice daily.^[2]

- Libraries, computer labs, arts, and other hands-on classrooms should undergo standard cleaning procedures per normal operating status.
- Strongly suggested that student desks should be wiped down with either an [EPA-approved disinfectant](#) or dilute bleach solution at the beginning and end of every day.
- Strongly suggested that playground equipment and athletic equipment can be cleaned with either an [EPA-approved disinfectant](#) or dilute bleach solution twice daily.
- Strongly suggested that staff should wear gloves, surgical mask, and face shield when performing all cleaning activities.

Busing and Student Transportation

- School busing operations proceed normally.
- No changes to schedules or seating patterns on the buses are required.

Medically Vulnerable Students and Teachers

- Systematically review all current plans (e.g., Individual Healthcare Plans, Individualized Education Plans or 504 plans) for accommodating students with special healthcare needs and update their care plans as needed to decrease their risk for exposure to SARS-coV-2.
- Create a process for students/families and staff to self-identify as high risk for severe illness due to SARS-coV2 and have a plan in place to address requests for alternative learning arrangements or work re-assignments.
- Enable staff that self-identify as high risk for severe illness to minimize face-to-face contact and to allow them to maintain a distance of 6 feet from others, modify job responsibilities that limit exposure risk, or to telework if possible.

- Arrange all desks facing the same direction toward the front of the classroom.
- Class sizes should be kept to less than 20 students or less (as afforded by necessary spacing requirements and personnel).
 - If all students cannot fit in the classroom space available, it is recommended that a staggered school schedule that incorporates alternative dates of attendance or use of virtual teaching be implemented.
- Teachers should try to maintain six feet of spacing between themselves and students as much as possible.
- Assemblies of less than 50 students at a time are discouraged but allowed as long as facial coverings remain in use.
- Large scale assemblies of more than 50 students should be discontinued.
- Facial coverings should be worn at all times in hallways for grades K-12, as feasible or tolerated and/or most essential in times where physical distancing is difficult. Any one that has trouble breathing or is unconscious should not wear a facial covering. Any one that is incapacitated or unable to remove the facial covering without assistance, should not wear a facial covering.
- Classroom windows should be open as much as possible and conditions allow.
- As able, schools should try to cohort groups of students to isolated hallways or areas that can be monitored for positive cases if there is a SARS-coV-2 exposure.
- As able, specialists from laboratories, libraries, and other specialized services or locations should be brought to the classrooms instead of having students transit to those locations.
- Flow of foot traffic should be directed in only one direction, if possible.

- If one way flow is not possible, hallways can be divided with either side following the same direction.
- Efforts should be made to try and keep six feet of distance between persons in the hallways.
- Staggered movements at incremental intervals should be used if feasible to minimize the number of persons in the hallways as able.
- Floor tape or other markers should be used at six foot intervals where line formation is anticipated.
- Provide social distancing floor/seating markings in waiting and reception areas
- Mark six feet of spacing to remind students and staff to always stay six feet apart in lines and at other times when they may congregate
- Provide marks on the doors of restrooms to indicate proper social distancing
- Have staff monitor arrival and dismissal to discourage congregating and ensure students go straight from a vehicle to their classrooms and vice-versa

- If cafeterias need to be used, meal times must be staggered to create seating arrangements with six feet of distance between students.
 - Disposable utensils should be employed.
 - Serving and cafeteria staff should use barrier protection including gloves, face shields, and surgical masks; N95 respirators are not required.
- Assemblies of up to 50 students at a time are discouraged but allowed as long as facial coverings remain in use.
- Outside guests are not allowed to attend.
- Large scale assemblies of more than 50 students should be discontinued.
- Off-site field trips discontinued.
- Students, teachers, and cafeteria staff wash hands before and after every meal.

- If possible, classrooms should be utilized for eating in place, taking into consideration food allergies.
- If possible, school supplied meals should be delivered to classrooms with disposable utensils.
- These assemblies, schools will offer telecasting of events if able.
- Students and teachers wash hands before and after every event.
- After school programs may continue with the use of facial coverings.

Athletics

Required

- Students, teachers, and staff wash hands before and after every practice, event, or other gathering. Every participant should confirm that they are healthy and without any symptoms prior to any event.
- All equipment should be disinfected before and after use.
- Schools should follow guidance from the Nebraska High School Athletics Association and local public health departments when deciding which sports can be safely conducted and with any restrictions required.
 - Spectators are allowed provided that face facial coverings are used by observers at all times.
- (E) Weight room and physical conditioning activities should follow guidance from the Nebraska High School Athletics Association.
- Sports that do not allow adequate distancing such as football, wrestling, basketball, etc. should be discontinued.
- Large scale spectator or stadium events are not allowed
- Locker rooms and group changing areas should be closed.
- Handshakes, fist bumps, and other unnecessary contact should be minimized.

- Any uniforms or other clothing that need to be washed/laundered at school can be washed in warm water with regular detergent. These should be single use without sharing of ice towels or other materials.
- Each participant should use a clearly marked water bottle for individual use. There should be no sharing of this equipment.

Personal Protective Equipment

- All staff and students should wear facing coverings at all times except for meals; facial coverings may be homemade or disposable level one (basic) grade surgical masks. Any one that has trouble breathing or is unconscious should not wear a facial covering. Any one that is incapacitated or unable to remove the facial covering without assistance, should not wear a facial covering.
- Gowns, hair coverings, and shoe covers are not required.

Cleaning

- Frequently touched surfaces including lights, doors, benches, bathrooms, etc. should undergo cleaning with either an [EPA-approved disinfectant](#) or dilute bleach solution should now be cleaned every two-four hours.
- Libraries, computer labs, arts, and other hands on classrooms should undergo cleaning with either an [EPA-approved disinfectant](#) or dilute bleach solution should now be cleaned after every class period. Efforts should be made to minimize sharing of materials between students as able.
- Student desks should be wiped down with either an [EPA-approved disinfectant](#) or dilute bleach solution after every class period.
- Playground equipment and athletic equipment can be cleaned with either an [EPA-approved disinfectant](#) or dilute bleach solution twice daily.
- Staff should wear gloves, surgical mask, and face shield when performing all cleaning activities.

Busing and Student Transportation

- [Clean and disinfect](#) transportation vehicles regularly. Children must not be present when a vehicle is being cleaned.

- Ensure [safe and correct use](#) and storage of cleaning and disinfection products, including storing products securely away from children and adequate ventilation when staff use such products.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces in the vehicle (e.g., surfaces in the driver's cockpit, hard seats, arm rests, door handles, seat belt buckles, light and air controls, doors and windows, and grab handles) prior to morning routes and prior to afternoon routes.
- Keep doors and windows open when cleaning the vehicle and between trips to let the vehicles thoroughly air out.
- Clean, sanitize, and disinfect equipment including items such as car seats and seat belts, wheelchairs, walkers, and adaptive equipment being transported to schools.
- Create a plan for getting students home safely if they are not allowed to board the vehicle.
- Create a policy that if an individual becomes sick during the day, they must not use group transportation to return home and must follow protocols outlined above.
- If a driver becomes sick during the day, they must follow protocols for sick staff above and must not return to drive students.
- Encourage the use of hand sanitizer before entering the bus. Where possible, hand sanitizer should be supplied on the bus.
- Where possible, allow for six feet of social distancing between students, and between students and the driver, while seated on vehicles if feasible (e.g., by utilizing larger vehicles with more seats, by increasing frequency of routes to reduce occupancy, one rider per seat in every other row)
- (Consider keeping windows open while the vehicle is in motion to help reduce spread of the virus by increasing air circulation, if appropriate and safe)

Considerations for Developing Re-Opening Plans for Nebraska's Schools

INTRODUCTION

➔ Member Superintendents and Educational Service Unit Administrators of the Nebraska Rural Community Schools Association (NRCSA) have developed ideas for consideration to support districts and communities in determining their plans and strategies for reopening schools. NRCSA's Considerations for Developing Re-opening Plans for Nebraska's Schools provides a tiered approach of ideas that schools may choose to consider before students and employees return to school buildings, along with considerations that may be applicable throughout the school year. It is designed to help districts prioritize the health and safety of students and teachers as they open school buildings and deliver instruction for the 2020-2021 school year.

➔ This document is not intended to provide prescriptive or restrictive guidelines to districts. It is simply a framework for districts as they build their re-opening plans. NRCSA recommends school districts continue to monitor CDC, state agency, and local and district health department guidance and comply with directives as these are issued. The Nebraska Department of Education's "Launch Nebraska" → <https://www.launchne.com/> will be especially important for the district as it develops its local plan. It may also be advisable to confer with the school district's attorneys on some issues. The information provided in this document is not mandated, or state required. Local school districts have the authority and flexibility to meet their individual needs and be responsive to their communities.

➔ Nothing in this document should be construed as a mandate, and the committees which compiled these considerations did so with an intent to always provide room for, and respect for, the latitude of local control. Superintendents, school officials and local Boards of Education are the best determinants of decision making at the local level. They know their communities best.

Each committee was chaired by a Nebraska School District Superintendent or ESU Administrator and co-chaired or assisted by a colleague. Committees included diverse membership representing predominantly superintendents, but also ESU administrators and specialists.

MODEL

While state decisions may decide the general format that school takes in the fall, it will fall to the local administration and Board of Education to decide the fine details of any format. Basically, the general formats that may be utilized with the opening of the new school year will fall into one of three modes based on community spread of Covid-19. These modes are (1) low or no spread, (2) minimal or moderate spread, or (3) substantial spread. The general formats that the school year may take, based on these modes would appear to be as follows:

LOW/NO SPREAD	MINIMAL/MODERATE SPREAD	SUBSTANTIAL SPREAD
School buildings are open, with minimal restrictions. The district may choose to initiate preventative practices or additional proactive protocols.	School buildings are open, but use may be minimal, altered, or staggered. Such use may be based on social distancing directives.	School buildings are closed. The closure may be short-term or extended and will likely be based on state (NDE) or district health declaration.

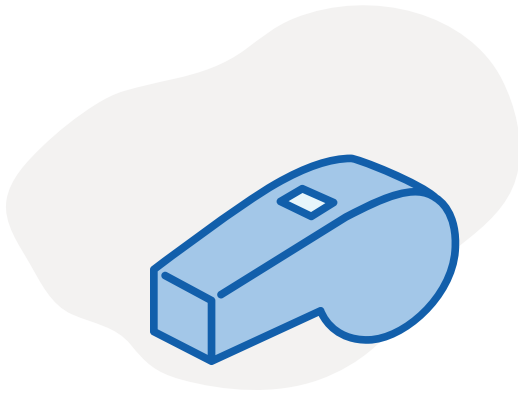

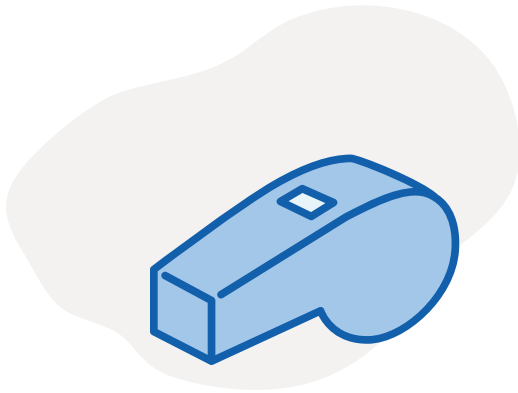

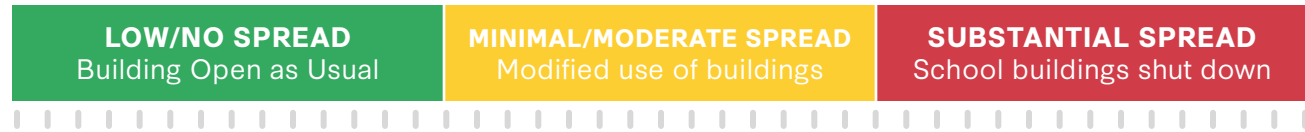

Develop standard operating procedures (SOPs) for the following:

- A learner, faculty, staff or visitor is symptomatic for COVID-19
- A learner, faculty, staff or visitor test positive for COVID-19
- A learner, faculty, staff or visitor is exposed to an individual positive for COVID-19

The process should include:

- Processes to trace & contact relevant parties who may have been exposed
- Communication with environmental services to facilitate rapid cleaning and disinfecting surfaces to immediately limit learners, faculty and staff exposure
- Working with families and local authorities to take appropriate steps to prevent, diagnose and if necessary, quarantine/isolate or refer for treatment
- Working with public health authorities to make emerging antiviral therapy and/or vaccines available in a timely way as they become available.
- Develop and implement a return to school policy in coordination with local public health authorities for all recovering individuals, those returning from caring for an infected individual and those returning to the community from international and high-risk national locations
- Screening, list of support services available in the community for learners, faculty, and staff for loss of resilience, stress, depression and suicidal ideation
- Training for learners, faculty, and staff on the signs of mental health such as loss of resilience, stress, depression and suicidal ideation
- Learner access to mental health supports such as school counselors, school social workers, etc.
- Have available for staff, parents, and families educational materials on loss and grief and ways to cope with stress
- Identify a mental health team that among other things can identify students and families in need of emotional and psychological support and refer to school community services/supports if needed

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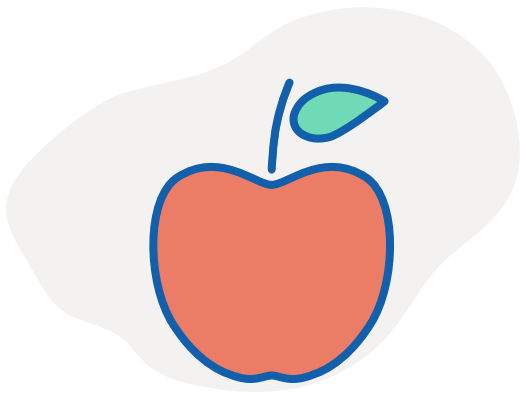

Schools will attempt to limit student interactions by practicing social distancing and the following if applicable.

- Serve lunch in classrooms or other available spaces ie. gym.
- Expand lunch periods so fewer students are in a space at one time.
- Consider outside seating if possible.
- Consider open campus for high school students
- Eliminate student use of keypad for point of sale, instead assign one staff member or use remote scanning of ID card.

In regards to the distribution of food schools may consider the following practices:

- No use of salad bar, or self-serve fruit and vegetable bar; instead provide individually wrapped items.
- Use foam or disposable trays.
- No self-serving by students. Food items will be individually packaged or placed on trays by food service personnel. Students may pick up prepackaged items, but a space will be maintained between items to prevent students from touching the food of others.
- Food service staff will comply with NDE safety requirements and recommendations such as face shields, gloves, disinfecting, etc.

NDE will provide “guidance” (based on “best practices”) on safely reopening, but it will ultimately be a local decision on how schools reopen this fall.

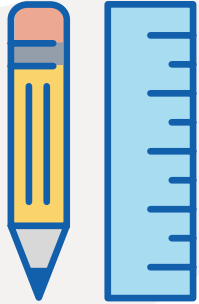

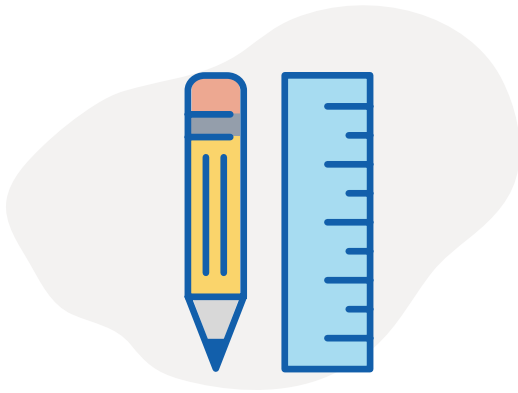

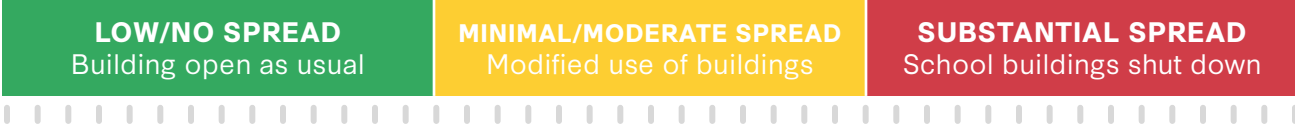

Start dialogue with your staff about the following:

(as level of spread increases, revisiting many of these topics is advised)

- The difference between a health condition and fear of returning to work (the checklist and processes above will help with this).
- Reminder that, due to COVID-19, duties may be assigned in which nobody is thinking about. For example, extra lunch room duty, extra cleaning, etc.
- Discuss with staff about extra duty pay if the sports season is partially or fully cancelled (education association/negotiations issue).
- Discuss how the negotiated agreement may apply to teaching and learning in a remote setting. Are there any anticipated issues, concerns, etc?
- Discuss with teachers about preparations and expectations to teach BOTH face-to-face and online.
- Discuss with teachers about the possible need to downsize the district (possibly RIF) because of COVID-19 in future years.
- Discuss with staff about the need and availability of mental health services for employees.
- Schedule time during the fall inservice for training of staff in safety protocol procedures with COVID-19 and document training.
- Review teacher certification endorsements for all teachers, as districts may need to be creative or change assignments to meet student/district/staff needs.
- Discuss with teachers about the possibility of reassignment. They are assured a position, but not a specific assignment.

Convey to staff the expectations moving forward in regard to teaching:

- Discuss staff expectations and how this may be measured under alternative learning environments, i.e. will teacher evaluation look different under remote learning, wearing a mask, etc.
- Guidelines for working from home in a remote learning environment and expectations regarding hours, duties, etc.
- Use of personal/sick/bereavement leave under remote learning environment.
- Reasonable expectations of supervision in remote learning environments.

The nature of this document is to provide suggestions, guidance, and considerations for a wide-variety of scenarios that school districts may encounter when planning for school opening in the fall in relation to SPED/504 Planning. It is imperative that each school district take into account the health status of the local community, the resources that are available to each school, and to remain flexible in meeting the educational, social, emotional, and health needs of each child. These practices and considerations are intended to be relevant for all stages of school operations.

Best Practice for all Districts to follow in regards to students with Disabilities

Revisit IEP and determine if goals can be accomplished under current operating conditions.

- If **YES**, carry out services to support goals.
- If **NO**, bring together the IEP team to determine how services can be modified to reflect current operating systems. Schools may want to consider remote learning, teletherapy, small on-site learning, sending staff to student homes, or having one-to-one service delivery.

Schools should ask the following question to Parents and IEP Team Members when reviewing all IEP's and 504 Plans prior to school starting: "Have the student's needs changed based on lack of in-person instruction?" Include a written response to this question as a Covid Impact Statement in the Plan.

- If **NO**, carry out services to support goals. Document parent response to this.
- If **YES**, bring together the IEP team to determine how services can be modified to reflect current operating systems. Document parent concerns and response. Schools may want to consider remote learning, teletherapy, small on-site learning, sending staff to student homes, or having one-to-one service delivery.
- Suggestion is to include a COVID Impact Statement that details the answer to this question in the Notes of IEP or 504 Plan.

Considerations for School Districts

- If there is a directive or mandate that in-person education is "banned" then that will trump the IEP. If the DHM or guidance is just a recommendation to cease in-person education, then schools can use best judgement about how to best serve the students.
- Schools should follow the guidelines put forth by the local Health Departments, such as social distancing and use of PPE devices. Therapists and service providers may encounter situations where work with PPE devices or social distancing is not possible. This should be addressed to determine the best way to still deliver services, but these barriers should not be an automatic reason to stop services.
- If there is a local outbreak, schools will need to make a decision on what services will look like if schools will move to a modified schedule or if schools need to close. If services can still be delivered to identified students in a small group or a one-to-one environment, continuation of services should still be a consideration. This is a local decision that will need to be addressed and determined. Considerations in this scenario are staffing, availability of rooms and spaces, number of students to be served, services to be provided, parental willingness to implement the plan, etc.
- Compensatory and recoupment of lost learning. If you have concerns or need guidance on this, please refer to Launch Nebraska Document.

Considerations for School Districts *continued...*

- When making decisions regarding student services, school districts may want to consider putting all student services type considerations into one target area to ensure that no consideration area(s) get overlooked. This would include academic services, behavior services, OT services, PT services, SLP services, OHI services, and 504 Plans.
- Launch Nebraska Health Document currently recommends homogeneous grouping for small schools and sets static group sizes at 20 students. Students can leave the homogenous grouping for services and/or the SPED teacher/therapists are able to come into the homogeneous classroom. See Best Practice statement at top of document and be very mindful of Least Restrictive Environment (LRE) when grouping students. DO NOT just put all students that qualify for SPED services in a group for easier access. LRE is still required and expected.
- When budgeting, school administrators may want to consider that funding may need to be adjusted if it is necessary to provide a new level of services to students. This may be due to personnel, equipment, contracted services, etc.
- *If needing to make changes to IEP/504 Plans to address changes in instructional delivery (i.e. in-person to remote learning), a PWN should address this change until the IEP/504 plan is due for review/renewal. Districts do not have to hold an IEP/504 meeting for all students prior to the start of the school year. See Best Practice Section at top of document.*

Alternatives for Districts to Consider for COVID-19 Safe Transportation if there is a Risk

Note: NDE guidance indicates that school busing operations proceed normally when there is Low/No Spread. Therefore these considerations may be applicable to only Minimal/Moderate Spread depending on the desire of the district:

- Bus drivers and monitors wear masks at all times while transporting students.
- Employ bus monitors on each bus to ensure that passengers are adhering to health and safety expectations and to conduct temperature screenings.
- Take the temperature of all students prior to entry on the bus in the morning and then again before afternoon routes and activity trips.
- Develop a protocol with parents such as: if students have temperature above 100.4 they may not ride the bus either morning or afternoon routes, or before activity trips (e.g. when the student has a fever during the school day, the parent/guardian must arrange transportation back home for their child).
- All students and staff apply hand sanitizer as they enter the vehicle.
- When doubling up is necessary, sit students together who are from the same household.
- Develop seating arrangements based on the order students get on and off the bus (e.g. for AM routes, the first student on, sits at the back of the bus, the last student on, sits at the front of the bus).
- Disembarking should happen from front to back to minimize exposure.
- Drivers stay home if they have a fever or other COVID-19 related symptoms.
- Sanitize all surfaces after every route or trip.

- Consider offering parents the option to bring their child(ren) to and from school rather than ride the bus.
- Consider whether passengers will wear masks, if feasible.
- Consider using multiple buses for activity trips to better space students for large activity groups, if feasible.
- If all certified drivers become suddenly unavailable due to COVID-19 related circumstances, consider utilizing clause 001.02A (iv) in NDE Rule 91 allowing for "...the operation of small vehicles in emergency situations when approved by the school administrator or person designated by the local governing school board."
- Consider increasing the number of bus routes for heavily populated routes, if feasible.
