V. Discussion Items and Reports

A. Discuss End-of-Year Recommendation

This year we took 3 days for inclement weather and 2 days for extreme cold. Accreditation requires 1030 hours for elementary and 1085 for secondary. The Department of Education gave an additional 12 hours for inclement weather this year. All buildings are beyond these requirements without this exception. Due to the exceptional efforts made to create and maintain a safe and healthy learning environment, we don't believe your decision will set a precedent for future considerations.

Recommendation:

1. **Teachers:** Teacher contracts are 185 days. We recommend keeping the end-of-year contract date of May 21st for all 185 day contracts.
2. **Support Staff:** Our policies pay support staff for two inclement weather days. We recommend keeping the end-of-year contract date of May 21st, however, we also recommend allowing 9 month employees three additional days of work if requested.

If you decide to add days, we will put an item to "Amend the 2020-21 school calendar" on the May board agenda for board action.

B. Review Priority School April Update

Priority Plan update: This past month we were able to meet with our consultants four different days. We met on March 2nd and 3rd, as well as March 22nd, 23rd. We had a long list of to-do items, but I feel the meetings went well and were very productive. During our time with Dr. Kennedy, we visited classrooms to support high quality instruction.

Mr. Kasik continued his teaching study. Again, this is three teachers visiting other teachers' classrooms to gain insight on effective strategies they could use into their classrooms. We also spent part of a day working on our Checkpoint #2 of our progress plan. During this time our admin team rates how we feel we are doing on each area of our plan while our consultants rate how they feel we are doing. We then come together

to discuss and come to a consensus on how to rate us as a team. This has been an excellent process, and we were able to come to a consensus fairly quickly. We will have one more rating this year.

We also spent time during their visit discussing ACT and MAP administration and goal setting, as well as summer professional development opportunities, coaching for administrators, and visiting our newcomer's program. We have four more days scheduled on April 14-15, and April 28-29.

Middle School Assistant Principal's Report: Mr. Banahan

Spotlight Program: The program that I want to highlight is our District and Building MTSS (Multi-Tiered System of Supports) teams. As a District we have placed a huge importance on creating an MTSS program, and after the Strategic Plan was approved we began planning as a district team to get the ball rolling on this area. We have created a district level team that will create the foundation for our district, but we will also have building level teams that will work to help improve the education for all of our students. At the Middle School we had begun working on this earlier this year to get some changes already in place to jumpstart our transition into MTSS. This has allowed us to look at different changes we want to implement into our school day for next year, and what data we will look at to measure the impact that our interventions are having upon our students.

Spotlight Staff: The staff member I would like to highlight is Mrs. Samantha Ladwig. Mrs. Ladwig is one of our 8th grade English Language Arts teachers and she is currently involved with our STEM Leadership Corp, District MTSS team, and Process Champions. Mrs. Ladwig is a Schuyler graduate who came back to Schuyler to raise her family here with husband Mark (also a Schuyler grad) and has been deeply involved in ensuring that our students are getting the best education possible here. This year she stepped up and joined our STEM LC group and has really put herself out of her comfort zone by trying new ways to teach Language Arts to our students. While working with the STEM LC, we are really focusing on allowing our teachers to facilitate the learning while having the students taking on the role of doing more of the discovery aspect of learning. This is hard for teachers, giving up the control of the classroom and not just sharing information with the students. Mrs. Ladwig has done a phenomenal job with this, and when visiting her classroom and with the students in 8th grade they are definitely enjoying this process as it is allowing them to develop a deeper understanding of the concepts being taught while also allowing them to showcase their talents in ways they are presenting their learning to their peers in the classroom. We are very grateful that Mrs. Ladwig took this opportunity to grow herself as an educator, and the benefit that our students and other teachers are getting from her and the other STEM Leadership teachers is going to continue to help move our district forward!

Spotlight Upcoming Events: This month students have taken the MAP test to measure the growth of our students from the beginning of the school year until the end to see how much they have grown this school year. We have also begun our NSCAS testing which is the state level testing which tests students in the areas of Mathematics and Language Arts in grades 6-8 and in Science for those in 8th grade. We are also heading towards end of the year celebrations that include Academic Honors night on May 11th.

Middle School Principal's Report: Mr. Zavadil

Staff Member Spotlight: This month I would like to highlight the work of Mrs. Kment. Mrs. Kment has worked a lot in the past month preparing for our NSCAS testing that we started on April 7th. Mrs. Kment has work a lot with teachers, administration and Dr. Gibbons to organize testing groups, help set testing dates, and coordinate test accommodations for students on IEP's and LEP programs. This is a mountain of work that she has taken on and organized very well for our building. Our students have been taking these assessments in their

classrooms which is a switch on procedures from years past. Our teachers feel that this is the best environment to allow students to perform their best.

Upcoming Events: We are barreling towards the end of the year and we have many events occurring at the middle school as we wrap up the year. April 26th is our home Middle School track invite, April 30th will be our 6th grade Track and Field meet. May 6th will be our end of the year Middle School Band and Choir Concert.  - ACT - April 6 (All students in the 3rd year cohort; juniors)
- There are changes occurring in the state assessments so this year is being considered a pilot and will not be considered for accountability purposes.
- We have completed some of our program reviews. Attached is a document that shows an example of the data and a data analysis narrative. The programs evaluated here are Capturing Kids Hearts, APL Instructional Strategies and the OnToCollege ACT Test Prep. The analysis of the data shows that these programs are worthwhile and should continue to be implemented. The school improvement team did identify some worthy next steps.
 - Need all staff to have some sort of involvement with ACT/OnToCollege work to build the culture of wanting to do well on the ACT. How can we involve seniors? More College visits? Develop and implement a fidelity check for OnToCollege.
 - For CKH - Have Process Champions present at staff meetings more often. Have the Flippen Group come in and coach for a day. (Campus TrAction).

- For APL - Continue to train new staff, continue refresher courses every few years. Highlight specific strategies at staff meetings. Model strategies at staff meetings

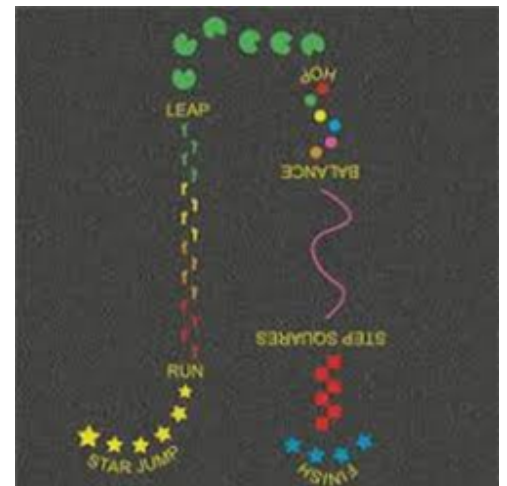

Colin Gibbons Eagle Scout Project

- I am Colin Gibbons with Troop 211 and I am working on my Eagle Project.
- An Eagle Project is a requirement to become an Eagle Scout, the highest rank of a Scout.
- An Eagle Project gives a Life Scout the opportunity to plan, develop, and give leadership to others and themselves. The Scout chooses their project and develops it on their own. Any project is to help a school, community, religious center or something like that. My beneficiary is the elementary school.
- My project is a sensory trail located at the elementary school playground on the concrete. The area I am working with is roughly a 28 by 30 square foot area.

- A sensory trail is a course of movements to keep kids active and to improve a child's motor skills such as, hand-eye coordination, balance and spatial awareness, and if I implement it, sensory courses can also help with counting, shapes, colors, and other educational needs. Trails allow kids to focus for longer periods of time in classes by giving the children's brains a motor activity to comprehend and take in the information they have learned. Here is an example of a sensory trail.



- I have already received approval from Peter Heusinkzelt, the council project approval representative, and the principals of the elementary school.

- **Commercial Property** – Coverage of buildings and grounds
- **General Liability** – Coverage if you were found grossly negligent (example would be if you knowingly failed to remove a patch of ice and someone is injured)
- **Linebackers and Employment Practices liability** – Covers Errors and Omissions as school board or administrators and also if an employee came back and sued you for firing them. Will defend that lawsuit and potentially pay out.
- **Cyber Data Compromise** – Coverage for compromised data. If the school was hacked – pays for the credit monitoring and data restoration.
- **Crime:** Covers embezzlement of funds or employee dishonesty.
- **Commercial Inland Marine:** Covers anything that goes out and about (instruments/uniforms) and it also includes your buildings in the course of construction.
- **Auto:** Covers the liability and full coverage on cars/vans/buses.
- **Workers Compensation:** Covers employee on the job injuries.
- **Umbrella:** ‘Excess liability’ if the underlining limits were exhausted. Example: a school employee was in an accident driving a car and severely injured someone.

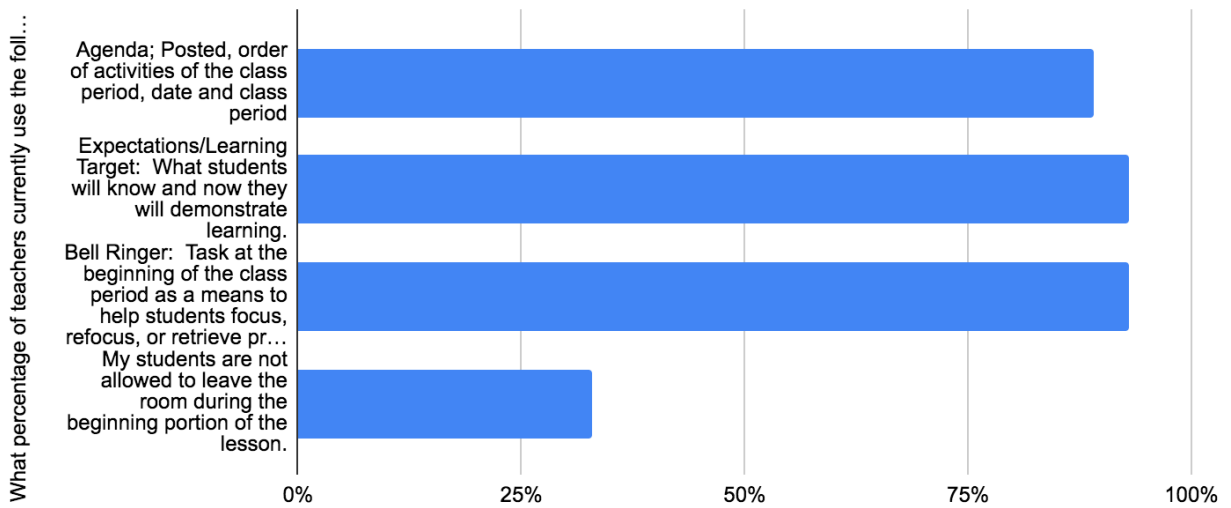

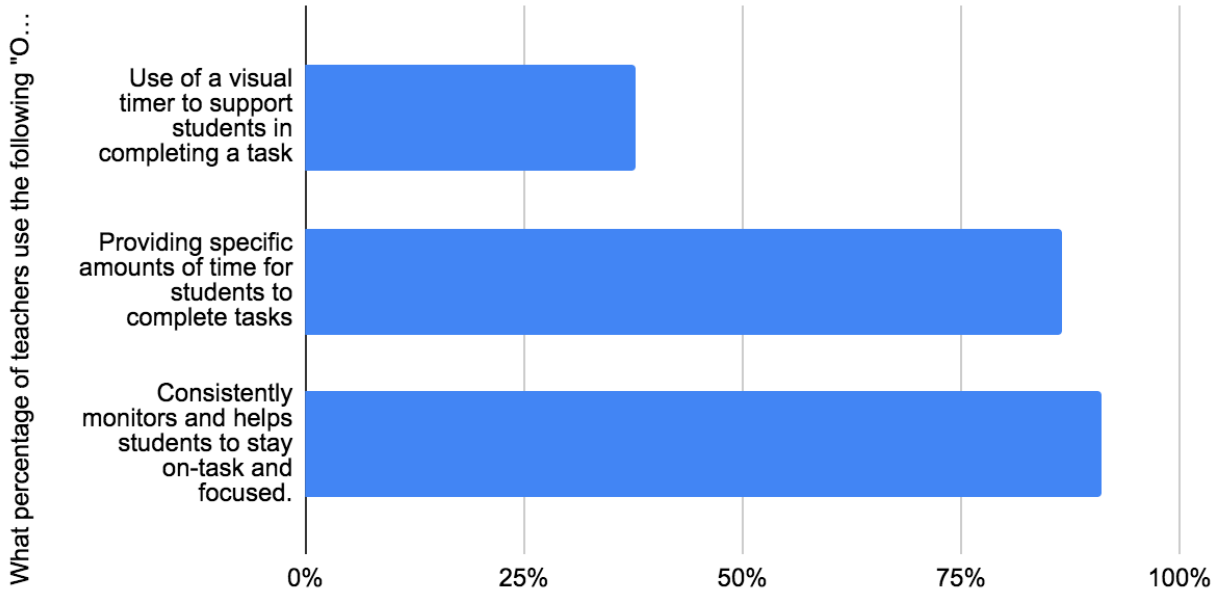

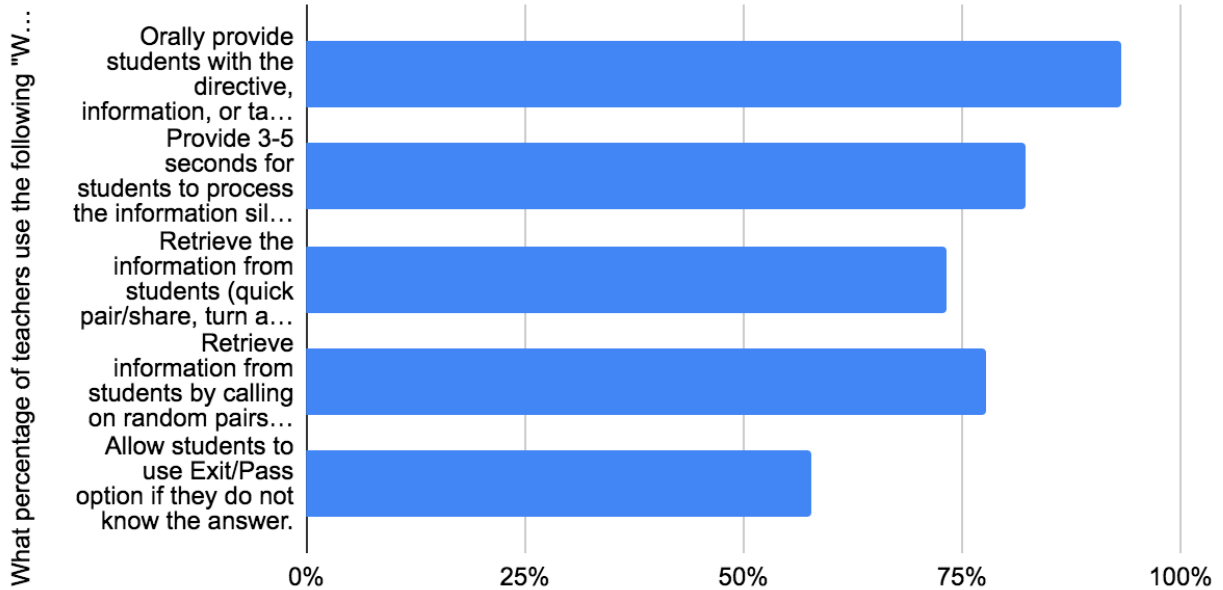
What percentage of teachers currently use the following "Beginning of Class" strategies?



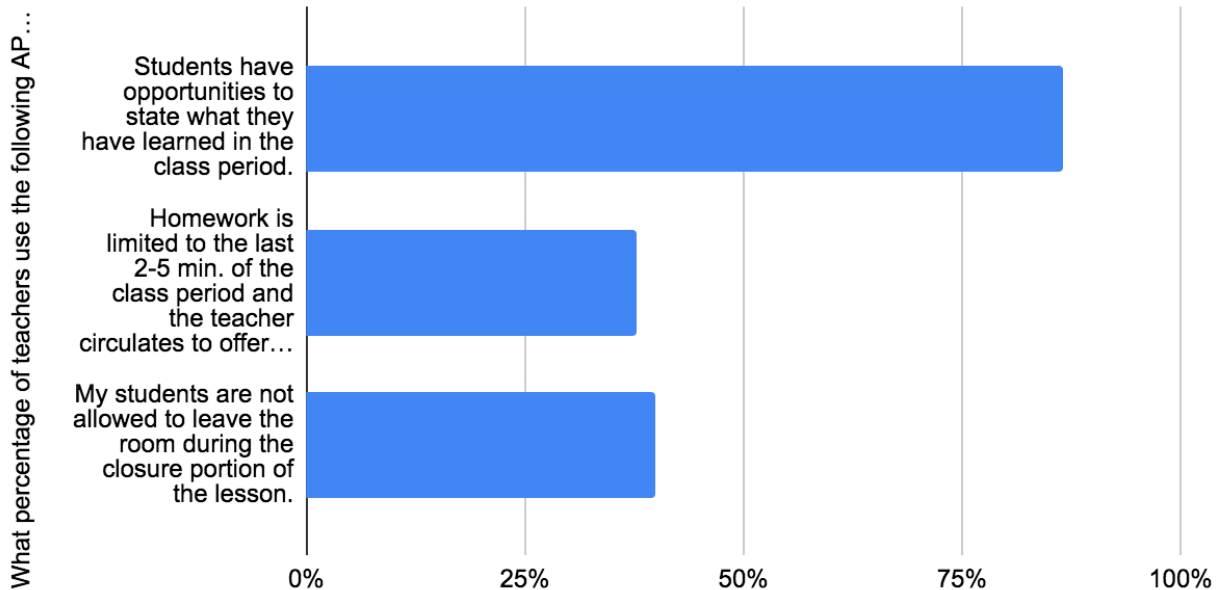
What percentage of teachers use the following "On the Clock" strategies



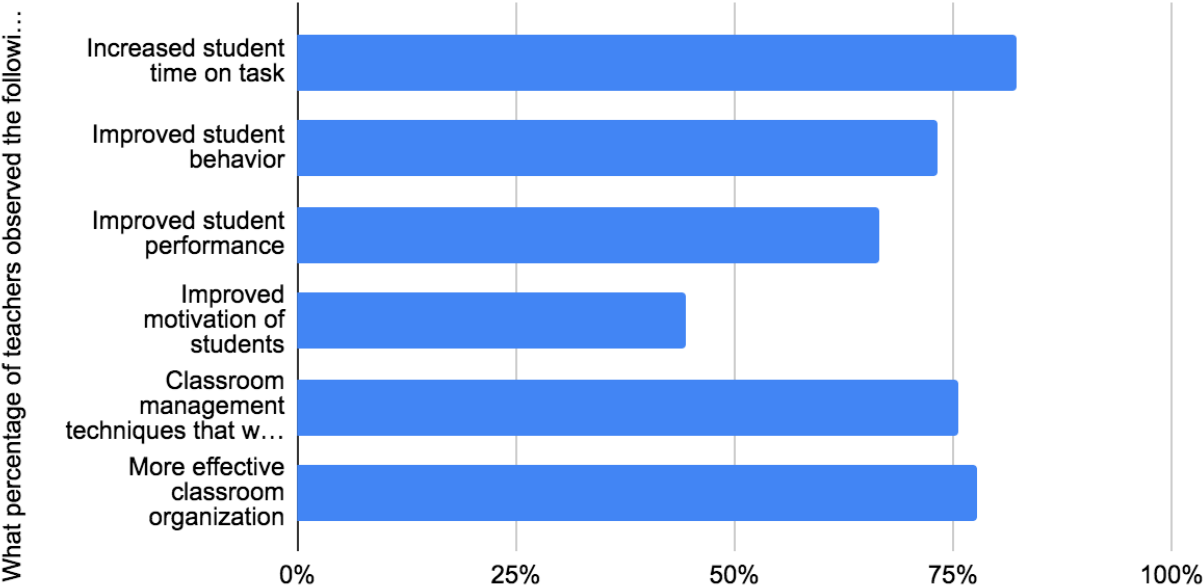
What percentage of teachers use the following "Wait Time" strategies on a daily basis?



What percentage of teachers use the following APL Closure strategies?

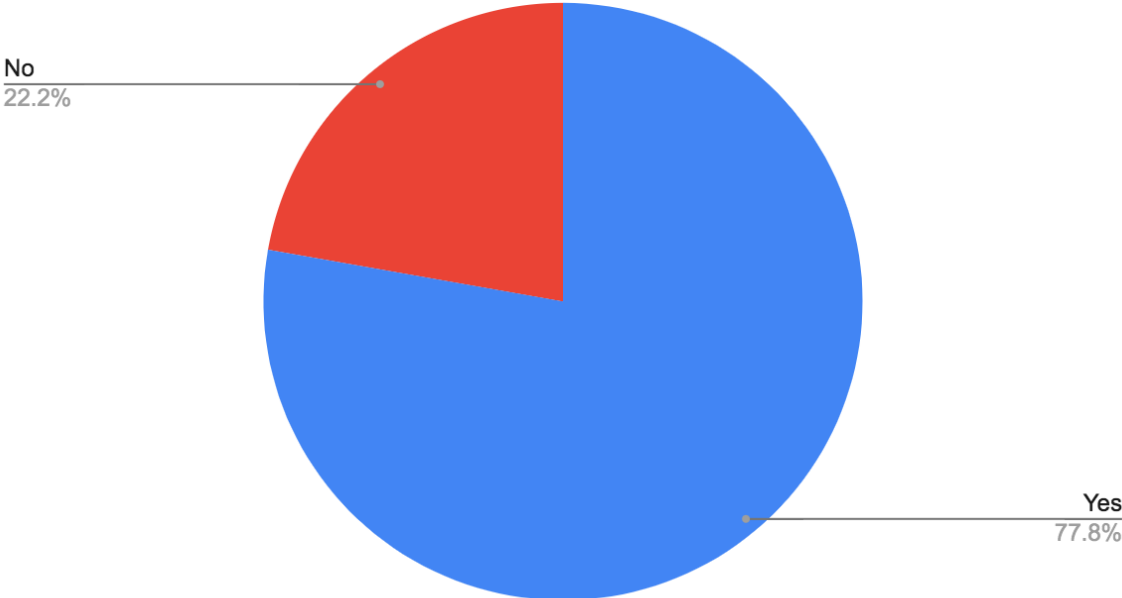

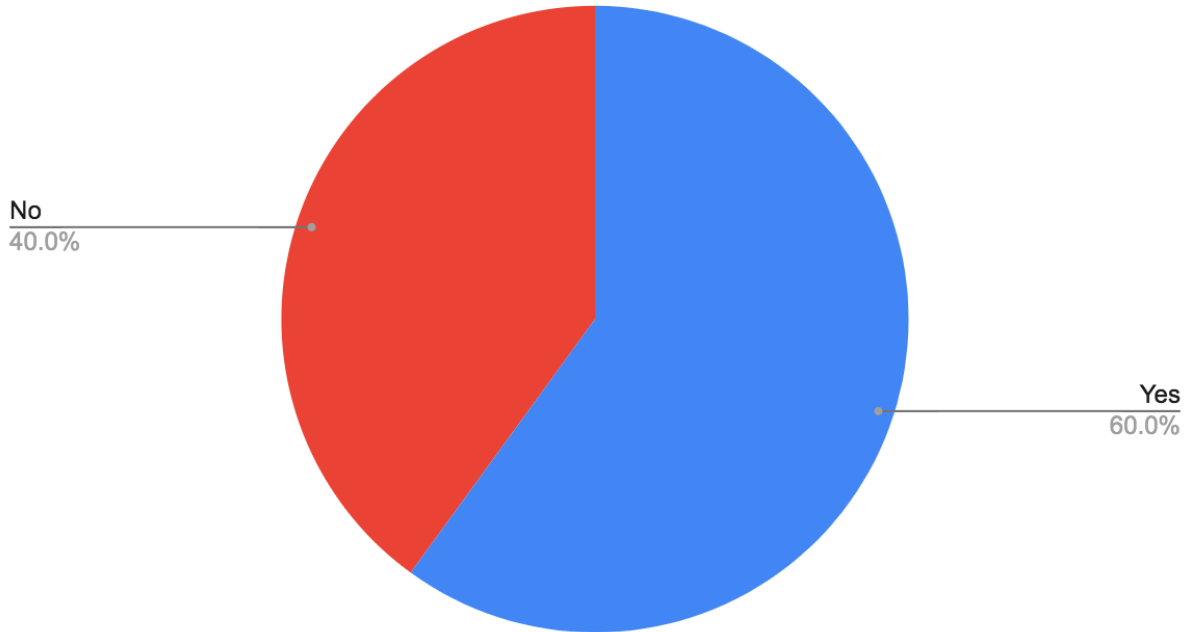

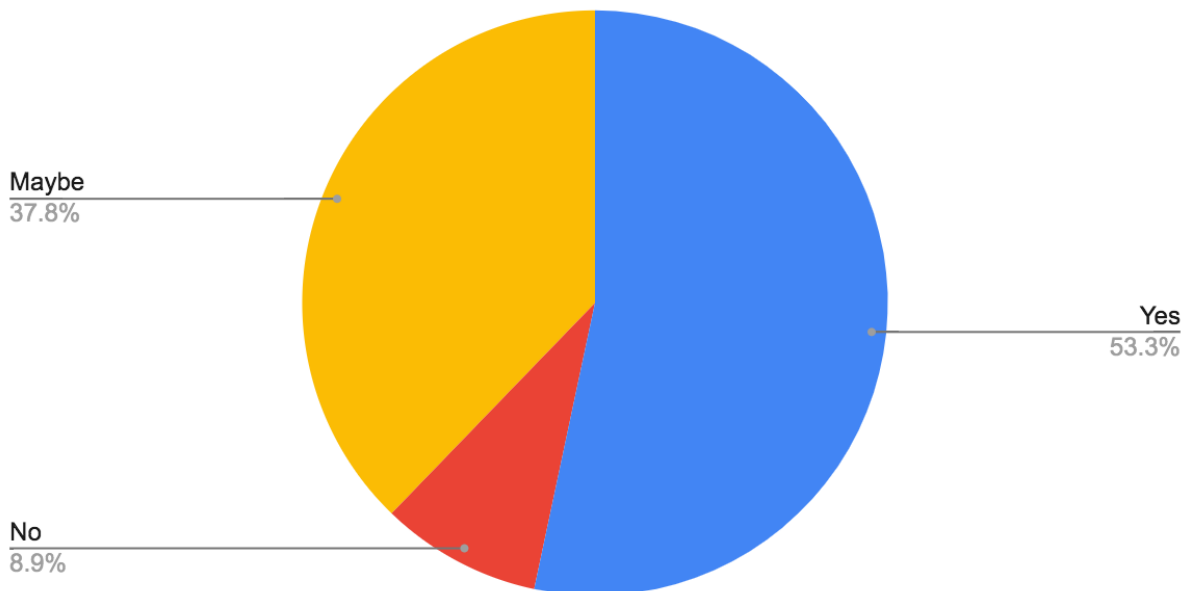
The whole program is designed for teachers to have more interaction with students. That personal interaction is supposed to help develop the student-teacher relationship.

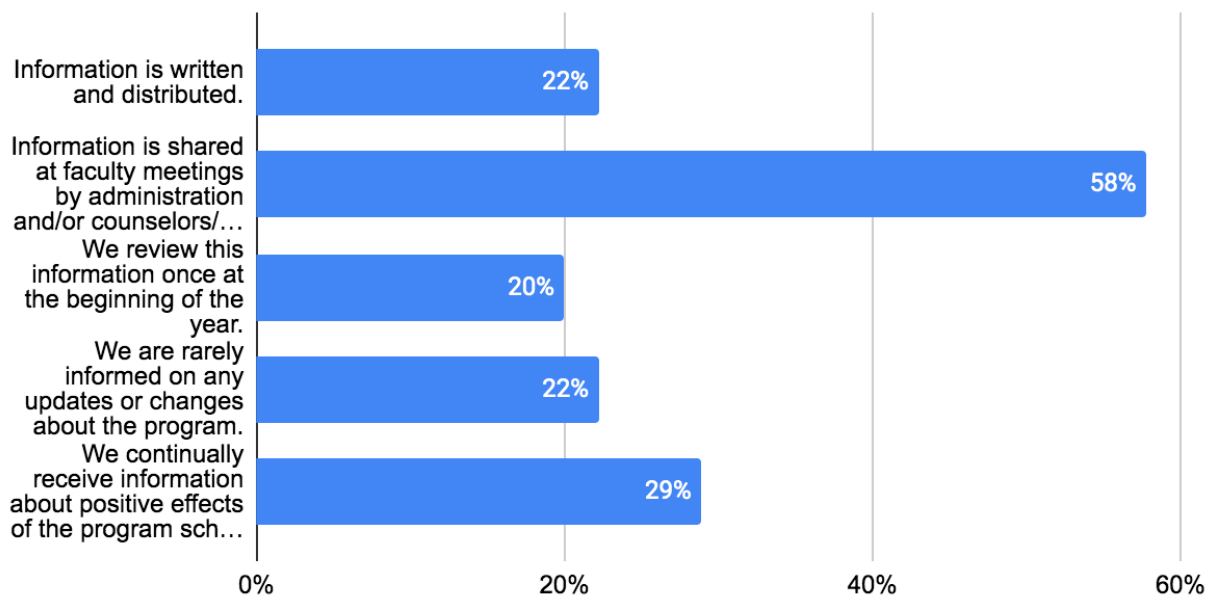

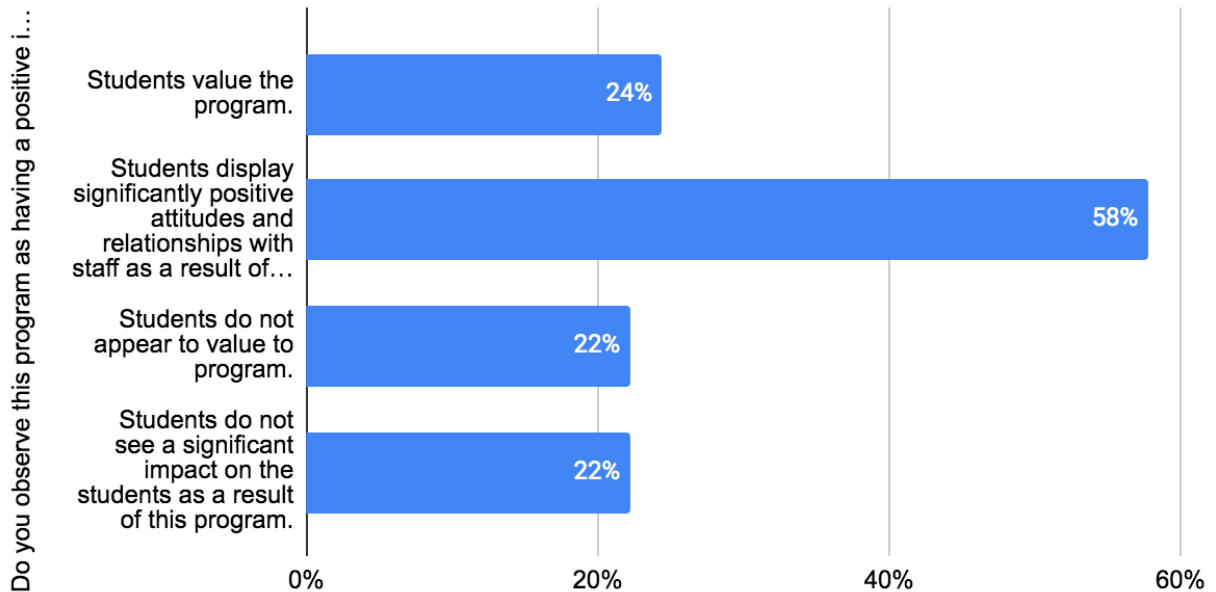

 - b) CKH is also observed during walk-throughs and observations.

- 4) What next steps were taken in response to the program review?
 - a) Need all staff to have some sort of involvement with ACT/OnToCollege work to build the culture of wanting to do well on the ACT. How can we involve seniors? More College visits? Develop and implement a fidelity check for OnToCollege.
 - b) For CKH - Have Process Champions present at staff meetings more often. Have the Flippen Group come in and coach for a day. (Campus TrAction).
 - c) For APL - Continue to train new staff, continue refresher courses every few years. Highlight specific strategies at staff meetings. Model strategies at staff meetings.

Dear Mr. Brabec:

We are writing this letter collectively to express our concern over the handling of a critical incident where a student brought weapons to Schuyler Central High School on February 24, 2021.

There was a 90-minute gap between the time that a gun, a knife and a magazine containing ammunition for the gun were located inside Schuyler Central High School and when law enforcement was called to the scene.

What if this was a coordinated attack on the school? What if there had been additional students in the school with guns? In the Columbine High School attacks bombs and other weapons were used in addition to guns and, in a school shooting situation, every second matters.

This is not the first incident that law enforcement has had issues with school personnel. A 911 hang up came from the Schuyler High School during school hours. Law enforcement went to Schuyler Central High School to investigate. Dr. Hoelsing attempted to physically stop law enforcement officers from investigating the call and subsequent hang up.

Obstruction in the State of Nebraska is defined as, "a person commits the offense of obstructing a peace officer, when, by using or threatening to use violence, force, physical interference, or obstacle, he or she intentionally obstructs, impairs, or hinders (a) the enforcement of the penal law or the preservation of the peace by a peace officer or judge acting under color of his or her official authority or (b) a police animal assisting a peace officer acting pursuant to the peace officer's official authority." Obstruction is a class I misdemeanor.

Overall, the relationship between law enforcement and the Schuyler Community Schools at the present time is strained. Previously law enforcement was able to complete school visits and were allowed to complete school shooter training and after-dark building search practice inside of school facilities.

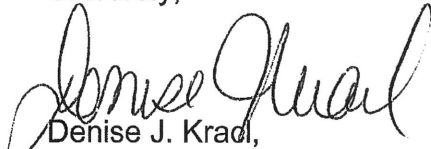
Denise Kracl personally saw a new law enforcement officer turned away from visiting and touring the Schuyler Middle School after school hours so that he could see the layout of the school in case an incident occurred. The officer literally said to her that he was stopped at the door and was not allowed inside.

Law enforcement was recently invited to participate in a training that the school is involved in but the training will be virtual and no law enforcement officers are allowed near the building.


We are writing to make your Board, as well as the public, aware of the incident that happened at Schuyler Central High School on February 24, 2021 as well as ongoing issues. Law enforcement have met with school officials and nothing in this situation seems to be changing.

We are so very thankful that no one was injured as a result of either incident but, the safety of our children and staff at Schuyler Community Schools should never be second to anything.

We are writing in response to concerns outlined in a March 5, 2021 letter from the County Attorney, County Sheriff, and Schuyler Police Department. In the letter, they expressed concern about incidents involving the school that demonstrated a lack of cooperation and/or illegal action taken by school officials. Included in this response are the facts and correspondence addressing the allegations outlined in the letter.

1. **High School incident involving a weapon on 2/24/2021:** Dr. Lefdal notified Dr. Hoelsing a few minutes before 9:53 AM on Wednesday, February 24, 2021. Dr. Lefdal shared that he was given a tip from a teacher about a weapon in a bookbag in school. Dr. Lefdal explained that he had the student and the bag separated and under control and to proceed with the scheduled interview. Dr. Hoelsing completed the principal screening interview (30 minutes). Dr. Lefdal and Mr. Kasik then searched the bag and found the weapons. Dr. Hoelsing arrived at the high school at 10:40 AM and called the school attorney to ask for input and assurance on the procedures to follow. Dr. Hoelsing left the building at 10:52 AM and returned to the district office. Dr. Lefdal followed through with contacting the Schuyler Police and the parent. Dr. Lefdal worked with the school attorney on the school consequences and response to our educational responsibilities. Following the police processing the situation, Dr. Hoelsing and Dr. Lefdal contacted the school attorney to see what we could share with staff and parents about the situation. A meeting was held with high school staff at the end of the day and the same information was shared via phone and text to preschool-12 staff and high school parents at 4:30 PM. Dr. Lefdal followed District Safety Protocols, Policies, and Nebraska State Statutes.
2. **Interference on a 911 call and subsequent hang-up investigations:** On September 15, 2020 Mr. Banahan received a call from Schuyler Dispatch asking about a 911 emergency call. Mr. Banahan told Dispatch that a student was seen on the phone in the Field House Lobby and there was no emergency. The only other 911 call investigation over the past 3 years in student records was initiated at the high school at 3:40 PM on November 7, 2019. The police officer came to the high school after school hours. Dr. Lefdal worked with the officer to identify the student on camera and the officer went to the student's residence to follow-up. Dr. Lefdal met with the student the following day on consequences for this action. There was no interference or obstruction to these 911 hang-up investigations.
3. **Refusal of an officer to enter the middle school building (2017):** Mr. Zavadil contacted County Attorney Kracl requesting the name of the officer and the date he was refused entry to the middle school building. Mr. Zavadil was informed that the officer was CPL. Dan Freed. Mr. Zavadil contacted CPL. Freed who recalled the incident from 2017 (4 years ago), that he was greeted at the office by staff including Mr. Zavadil and asked if he could tour the building. This request was around the time of the protest called "**a day without immigrants**". Mr. Zavadil explained that this was not a good time for unannounced visits as students shared their fear of ICE raids and possible INS deportations. Similar conversations were held at that time with Schuyler Police Chief Bang, who agreed of the need to be sensitive to this situation.
4. **First Meeting with Schuyler PD and County Sheriff:** In August 2020, administrators were made aware of a concern that the relations between the school and Law Enforcement were strained. Administrators met with Sheriff Messerlie and Police Chief Farber to discuss their concerns. Chief Farber expressed his desire to establish good relations between students and law enforcement. At the meeting, the administrators expressed their continued interest in working with law enforcement officers and welcomed them into the buildings. We left the meeting with an understanding of our mutual interest to work together.
5. **Follow-up meeting with County Sheriff and Schuyler PD:** On March 9, 2021 administrators met again with the Chief Farber and Sheriff Messerlie to discuss concerns with the district's handling of the February 24th high school incident and ongoing concern of strained relations. Chief Farber shared his concern about the 90-minute lag and again stated his interest in having a stronger presence in our schools. Sheriff Messerlie shared that his office spent more time in schools in northern Colfax County as Schuyler had their own police force. After discussion, school administrators again shared their interest in working with law enforcement and welcomed officers to the buildings anytime.
6. **NDE Emergency Response Virtual Workshop:** In December 2020, Dr. Hoelsing received an email from Scott Stemper (NDE) asking us to register school representatives, County Emergency Manager, County Sheriff, Chief of Police and Fire Chief for a workshop to update our Safety Plan with the new requirements from FEMA and Department of Education. On March 4, 2021 Scott Stemper (NDE) sent a follow-up email to all school and community participants explaining the virtual format for the 2-Day Workshop. The attached email correspondence states "**We ask every person attend on their own device, at a location separate from the rest of the team.**" See attached March 4th email correspondence from Scott Stemper.

7. **NDE Training and Follow-up Workshop:** On March 16-17, 2021 County Officials Michelle Evert, Luis Venzor, City Police Chief Farber, Retired State Trooper Dan Klimek (Nesbitt & Associates) Mrs. Riha, Ms. Bebout, Mr. Zavadil, Dr. Lefdal and Dr. Hoelsing met online with NDE and area schools in a virtual workshop to update our Critical Response Plans and Safety Manual. The Schuyler School/Community Crisis Team will meet, **in-person**, at the District Office on April 1st to continue work on this Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP). Once completed, this plan will be presented for review and approval by the board of education and submitted to the Department of Education for the 2021-22 school year.
8. **Outside Agency Access to Students:** The March 5, 2021 letter expressed concern about administrative interference in investigations at school. Board Policy 504.17 and State Statutes 79-254 through 79-294 set guidance and procedures for outside agency questioning and release of students to the peace officer. See attached Board Policy 504.17 and accompanying Nebraska State Statutes included in the "Student Discipline Act".

Over the past 8 years, Schuyler Community Schools has prioritized a commitment to establishing strong school and community partnerships. Emergency Response Community Support

Flood of 2019 Response: The school district provided shelter for displaced victims and food service for emergency response workers and displaced families. The district also set up a mileage reimbursement program for families affected by road closures.

COVID-19 Quarantine: We met with CHI Officials and set up rooms in the District Office to accommodate possible COVID-19 quarantine, isolation, and hospital employee housing needs.

COVID-19 Shot Clinic: Provided nurses, support help and interpreters to assist CHI in the coordination and operation of shot clinics at the Oak Ballroom in Schuyler.

COVID-19 School Closure: Schuyler Community Schools provided expanded free breakfast and lunch for all 1-18-year-old children in the district from March 2020 through the start of the 2020-21 school year (10,000 to 12,000 meals per week). This daily service, along with the weekend backpack program, provided support for families in our district experiencing food insecurity during the school closure.

In closing, the administrative team has shared this information and evidence to address concerns stated in the March 5, 2021 letter. Schuyler Community Schools remains committed to working with the various community boards, committees, and agencies to provide coordination, cooperation and services in our community. This network provides the backbone to support a variety of needs and services across our community and contributes to the belief that Schuyler is a great place to live, prosper, and raise a family.
